Fourth Dimension Turns Out To Be Another State Of Matter

NEW YORK (UPI)—Industry came known about plasmas to hint at their possible uses.

Ultimately, man-made plasmas may be used to convert heat directly into electricity, to fuse metals and other solids better than can be done now, and to provide a braking and steering force for space ships.
 Republic Aviation Co. has succeeded in making an experimental plasma engine fueled by nitrogen that ran for 118 hours.
 Bell Aircraft Co. and Sperry Gyroscope Co. have made plasma generators, each employing a different principle.

But there is a huge difference between the electric arc glow—a man-made plasma—and the plasmas encountered in space. The man-made plasma is temporary; it disappears or returns to gaseous state when the current is turned off. But the plasmas in space are permanent. That's because, as the scientists say, they are in thermodynamic equilibrium.
 Researchers for industry and scientific institutions want to know a lot more about both kinds of plasmas. They believe both can be put to a lot of useful work.
 A plasma is a stream of mass the last few years since scientists learned how to work with very high temperatures that enough be-

Smoker Sues Manufacturer

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—A Boston chest surgeon testified Thursday in a cancer victim's damage suit against Liggett and Myers Tobacco Co. Overholt testified there was "no question that inhalation of tobacco smoke is the largest single factor in the causation of this type of lung cancer."
 Otto Pritchard, 61, a Pittsburgh cabinet maker, is suing the big tobacco firm, contending he contracted lung cancer after smoking Chesterfield cigarettes, manufactured by Liggett and Myers for more than 25 years.
 Overholt was one of two researchers to testify in the cancer mouse to smoke like a man. He cigarette trial, which could set a

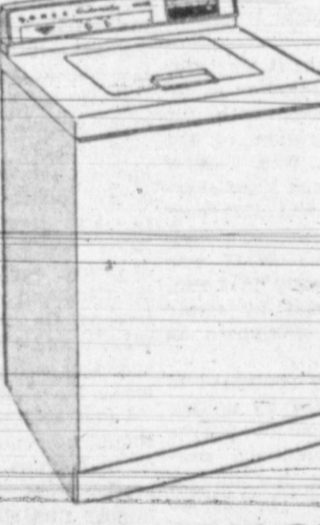
legal precedent in placing the blame for cancer. Dr. William Kremer, the doctor who diagnosed Pritchard's case here in 1953, testified that every patient he treated for epidermoid cancer had a history of heavy smoking. Kremer defined "epidermoid" as the cell tissue peculiar to the lining of the lungs.
 Kremer, asked by the tobacco company's counsel if non-smokers also contracted epidermoid cancer, replied he was "under the impression" there have been some cases.

THE TURNING POINT

Palm Sunday marks a turning point in the emphasis of the earthly ministry of Jesus Christ. It will be less than a week before His death upon the Cross. During the preceding years of His ministry he has seemed to avoid forcing the issue. Now, however, a new emphasis appears. He is like a soldier, who having spent months in training, at last goes to the front. He knows what lies ahead. He can no longer avoid joining the battle. Our Lord would not allow men to remain indifferent to His claims. Now in the final days He presses on His followers more and more sharply the alternative of either recognizing or rejecting His authority. It was a declaration of war on mere toleration.

Jesus presents to every man, woman and child a claim and a challenge.

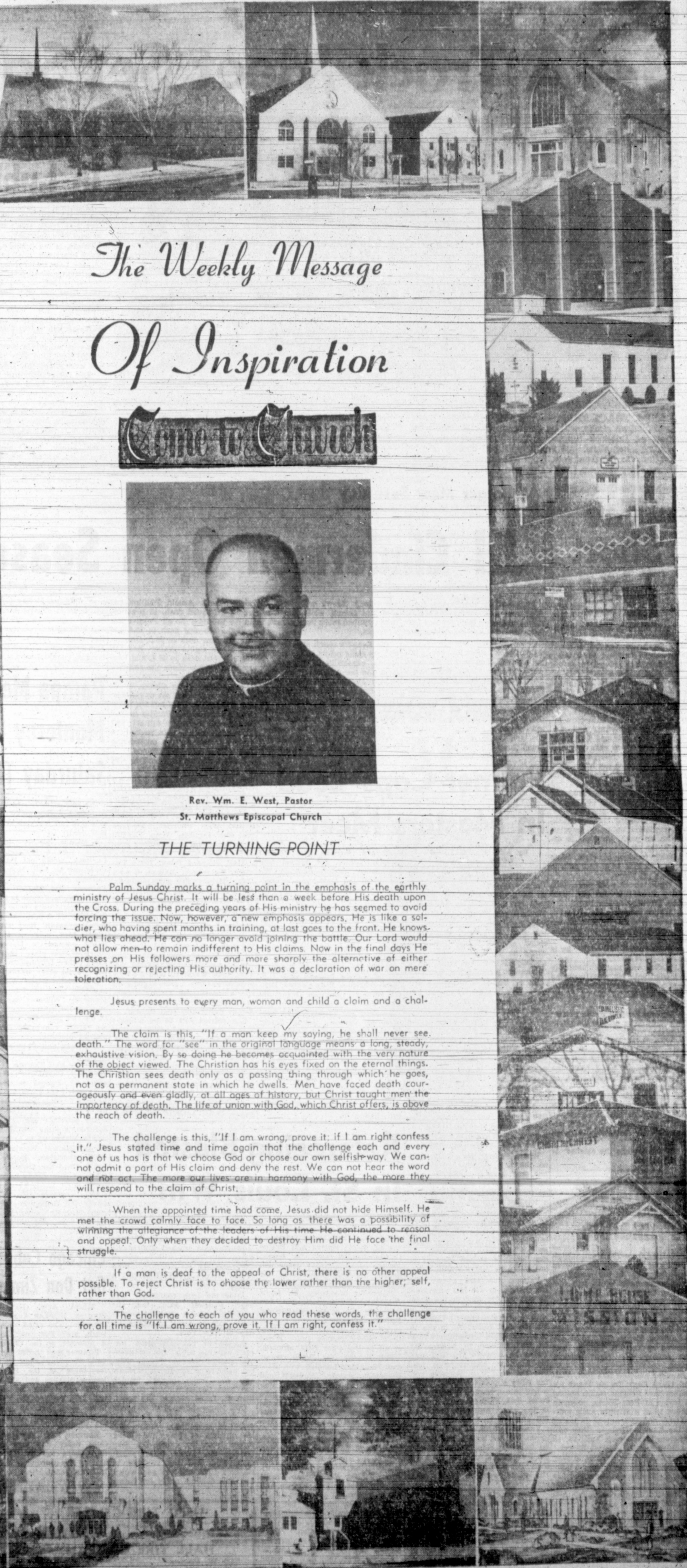
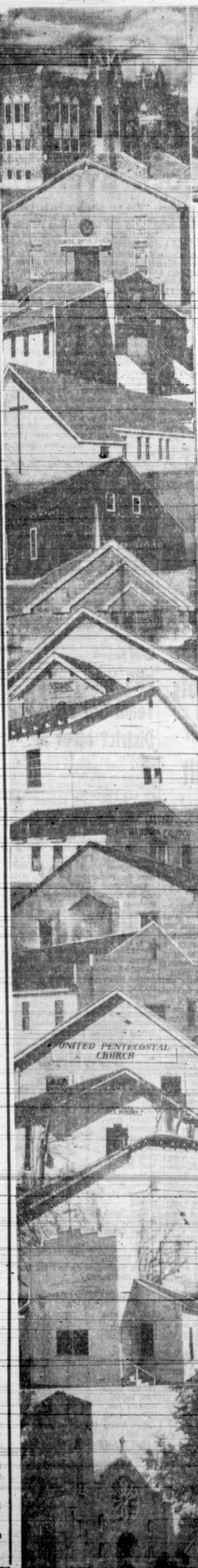
The claim is this, "If a man keep my saying, he shall never see death." The word for "see" in the original language means a long, steady, exhaustive vision. By so doing he becomes acquainted with the very nature of the object viewed. The Christian has his eyes fixed on the eternal things. The Christian sees death only as a passing thing through which he goes, not as a permanent state in which he dwells. Men have faced death courageously and even gladly, at all ages of history, but Christ taught men the impertinence of death. The life of union with God, which Christ offers, is above the reach of death.

The challenge is this, "If I am wrong, prove it; if I am right confess it." Jesus stated time and time again that the challenge each and every one of us has is that we choose God or choose our own selfish way. We cannot admit a part of His claim and deny the rest. We can not hear the word and not act. The more our lives are in harmony with God, the more they will respond to the claim of Christ.

When the appointed time had come, Jesus did not hide Himself. He met the crowd calmly face to face. So long as there was a possibility of winning the allegiance of the leaders of His time He continued to reason and appeal. Only when they decided to destroy Him did He face the final struggle.

If a man is deaf to the appeal of Christ, there is no other appeal possible. To reject Christ is to choose the lower rather than the higher, self rather than God.

The challenge to each of you who read these words, the challenge for all time is "If I am wrong, prove it. If I am right, confess it."

Moving Van Is Harbinger Of Spring As U.S. Nomads Prepare To Relocate

NEW YORK (NEA) — "Rise up," it says here in the Bible, "and come away. For, lo! the winter is past, the rain is over and gone."

And so, the voice of the moving van is heard in our land. For, according to the best available statistics, beginning with the first day of spring:

—One out of five Americans — about 41 million of us this year — starts the move from one home to another.

—Seven out of 10 moves will be the result of job change, with ambitious young men moving onward and upward. The rest will be retired folks moving southward, urbanites moving suburbanward and suburbanites moving upward.

—As usual, most of the moves will be made in two stages. The old man goes first, even though he has already secured his new job and mama and the kids will go later with the household.

—But whatever the motive or manner, this growing annual American relocation far out-distances and out-peoples any migration in the history of man. And there follows one curious — but traditionally American — result.

It is known as the moving specialist or relocation analyst or area researcher or personnel recruiter and like that.

Now, to itemize a few — and their impact on how America lives:

1. The relocation psychologist. Deep thought has taught him that an interruption of the school term can be a traumatic experience for children — even though job changes typically occur in the autumn or spring.

Consequently, according to industry statistics gathered by a nationwide van line (Atlas), the most popular household moving month has become August, followed closely by July and September. Once-popular May and October are far down the list today.

And more and more companies are paying for a new employee's hotel bills until his family can join him and settle in.

2. The moving counselor. "It used to be," according to Jerome Cirkor whose grandfather founded and named one of the oldest moving companies in the East, "you could tell a moving man by the scars on his back caused by the still-hot stoves he had to carry out to the cart."

"But today," Cirkor said, "his back is fine but his brow is scarred. The heavy work of moving is nothing compared to the reassurance and counsel he has to give to anxious mothers and scarred children."

This problem is so big, in fact, that it has drawn serious consideration from —

3. The social psychiatrist. The late, eminent Dr. Clara Thompson explained that the old-fashioned household usually included three generations under one roof. But now, families are cut off from their elder parents and grandparents by many miles and the values of mobility.

Little wonder, she said, that the modern American mother finds herself adrift and in need of counsel and comfort. Little wonder, too, that the modern mobile family comes home only to eat and sleep, and turns away from the campsite for all other activities.

4. The recruiters. With the growing demands of industry for more resources and manpower and the demands of manpower for more pay, a host of specialists has come along who can finger any area in the nation for factory relocation, specialists, management, minerals, etc.

It is not uncommon for an aircraft worker in California to answer an ad in his local paper that may send him to a job in Long Island, N.Y.

5. The real estate specialist. Consider the facts presented by Paul Palmer, who works out of New York but can marry any man to any piece of property anywhere in the world.

"Here's a typical one-room apartment," Miss Palmer said. "It rented for \$150 per month 10 years ago. Now it's \$235 — and



Carr To Tell About Vet Land Scandals

House Speaker Waggoner Carr, the only candidate opposing Will Wilson's bid for re-election as Attorney General, promised to reveal today the story behind the dismissal of Veteran's Land scandal indictments.

He planned to hold an early press conference in Houston as the three most hotly contested races for state office began to shift into high gear. The Democratic primary is May 7.

Carr pointed out that the indictments alleging fraudulent practices in connection with state purchase of land and resale to veterans were brought late in the administration of John Ben Shepherd, who preceded Wilson as attorney general.

Jack Cox, meanwhile, trying to unseat Gov. Price Daniel's third term bid, accused Daniel of leading Texas into bankruptcy and then limiting the area in which the problem can be solved.

Cox made a taped television speech to be broadcast over 25 stations Thursday night and tonight.

"The state of Texas is in serious trouble, broke and in debt," Cox said. "And this man who has led us into this bankrupt condition is asking you to elect him to a third term so he can, finish his program."

Cox, who advocates a 2 per cent general sales tax dedicated to public education, also criticized Daniel for telling a 30-member

Citizens Tax Study Commission the governor set up to find a solution to Texas fiscal problems without resorting to a sales or personal income tax.

"Texas needs more action and less double talk," Cox said, and said Daniel has "refused to face the facts."

He called attention to the \$88 million deficit in the general fund and charged Daniel's administration was "writing hot checks" every day in violation of the state constitution.

Daniel, in a speech at Altamira, said Texas is to preserve states' rights in its schools, there must be enough funds for improved education. He noted that his administration has helped school teachers get one pay raise and said "our greatest need today is to improve our public schools with our own money before the federal government enters the field."

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Ramsey pledged in Galveston, where he administered the oath of office to Senator-elect A. R. Schwartz, to stand firm in protecting recreational facilities along the coast by fighting to preserve the "traditional doctrine of open beaches for our citizens."

Wilson said in Corpus Christi he would continue to fight efforts to dump atomic wastes in the Gulf of Mexico "even if they have what they call safe containers."

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Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The political issue of a man's religion cut two ways in this week's presidential preference primary.

That issue induced substantial bloc voting by Roman Catholics in favor of their fellow religiousist, Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.). Kennedy won the pockets and larger areas in Wisconsin where Catholics are predominant among the voters. Some perhaps most of these Catholic pockets and areas also have been rated as predominantly Republican in this historically Republican state.

There was a cut from the reverse edge of the religious issue.

The movement of Wisconsin Republican Catholics into the Democratic primary reduced the aggregate vote of Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who was unopposed in the Republican primary. Nixon was low man on the popular vote totem pole in Wisconsin.

This fact may not — probably will not — hurt Nixon much but, as the old saying goes, it certainly did not do him any good.

He ran second to Kennedy in 12th, congressional districts and third to Kennedy and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey in the remaining seven.

It is not so bad as to lend much if any encouragement to those relatively few Republicans who cling to the idea that they may yet nominate for president Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York.

Rockefeller apparently is one of those who believes he may yet be nominated. He has avoided any endorsement of Nixon for the presidential nomination. His state of mind may have been better illuminated in his mid-winter statement withdrawing from the contest.

That statement followed publication of a series of polls indicating that Rockefeller could not defeat Nixon in the Republican national convention in July. Rockefeller phrased his withdrawal in the form of a charge that the party bosses were in league to prevent his nomination.

Intentionally or not, Rockefeller created a handy campaign issue for the Democratic nominee, whoever that may be. The issue will be this: That Nixon is the hand-picked candidate of the party

bosses, not the people's choice; the Republican people's, that is. If Rockefeller did not intend to create that issue for the Republicans he must be incredibly naive.

For Kennedy a solid test is coming up in the May 10 West Virginia primary, where there is no substantial Catholic vote.

If Kennedy merely matches or falls behind Humphrey in West Virginia, the political pros will have another reason to balk his nomination — the fear that Kennedy's religion would be a serious handicap, that Protestants might decide to do some bloc voting in November.

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Rising Water Surrounds A Georgia Town

Rising floodwaters surrounded a tiny Georgia town, chased 400 persons from their homes in Missouri and stranded 300 island-dwellers in the middle of the Mississippi River today.

The Mississippi, rising at a foot-a-day clip along southern Illinois, flooded thousands of acres of farmland near Cairo, and forced evacuation of 200 persons from the Dogtooth Bend area near the Mississippi's confluence with the Ohio.

Another 200 persons were driven from their homes at Mound City, Mo., when the Missouri punched through levees there.

The Flint River wrapped itself around Newton, Ga., cut off the four highways out of the village and turned 500 Newtonians into islanders.

The 300 residents of Kaskaskia Island, near Chester, Ill., began boating to the Missouri mainland as the Mississippi covered the island-to-mainland road and began rising along the Kaskaskia seaward.

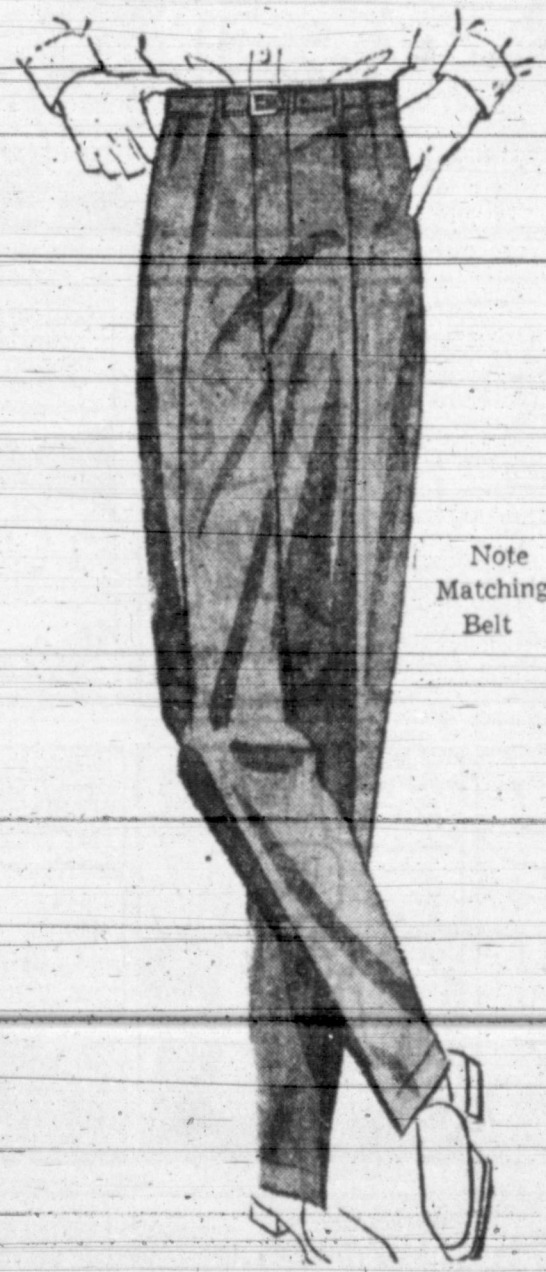
But the worst flood danger appeared to be over in the Midwest.

The Mississippi and the Missouri ebbed slowly from their levee-smashing crests in central Missouri and Illinois and authorities said it was unlikely any more dikes would split.

As the crests rolled downstream, they met mammoth levees designed to protect river towns from floods far mightier than those now threatening.

The American Red Cross said at least 31,000 persons had been directly affected so far by the Missouri-Mississippi floods in eight Midwest states.

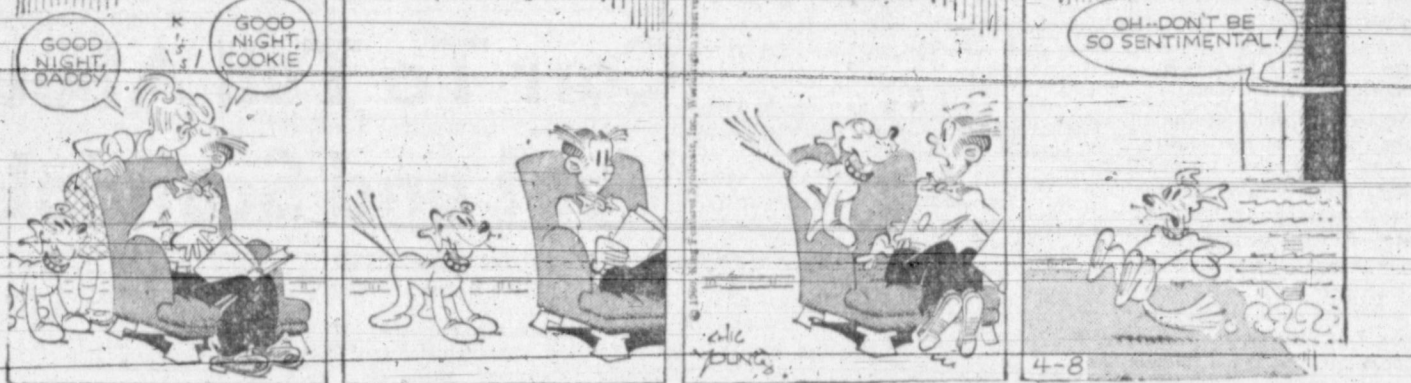

The man-of-the-week: Valerian A. Zorin, chief Soviet delegate to the 10-nation disarmament conference. The place: Geneva. The quote: United States disarmament policy is designed only to "complement its defense policy."

It was a clumsy distortion of a speech made three weeks earlier by U.S. Secretary of State Christian Herter that the Soviet delegate used in his bitter attack against the United States at the Geneva Conference. Herter, in a speech before the National Press Club in Washington on March 15, actually had argued that disarmament complements the American policy of keeping the world free and secure from aggression.

marking time, with a recess a probability, and some dramatic Soviet move a possibility just before the Paris summit meeting in May. Zorin's flat refusal to consider the U.S. proposal for outlawing outer space weapons and his insistence that the only plan that could be discussed was Khrushchev's sweeping proposal for world disarmament in four years marked him clearly as a man operating under rigid orders. When the West rejected the Khrushchev proposal as impractical, Zorin was left to await new orders. Zorin, unsmiling, heavy-set and nearing 60, was preceded to Geneva by his reputation. "Butcher of Prague" was one tag attached to him. It came from his assignment as Soviet ambassador to Czechoslovakia in 1948. He was accused of directing the Communist coup that led to the Red take-over of that once-democratic nation. After that demonstration of effective intrigue, he became a deputy foreign minister in Moscow during one of the harshest periods of the Stalinist cold war. In 1952 he became chief Soviet delegate to the United Nations where he is remembered as poker-faced and unimaginative. From the caution with which members of his own delegation treated him, there also was a suspicion that he was a member of the Soviet Secret Police.

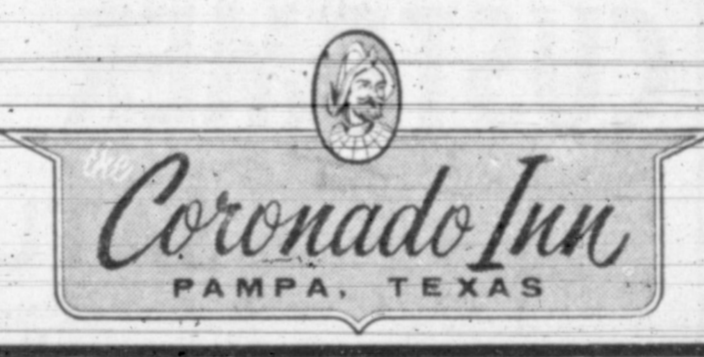
