THE TURNING POINT

Palm Sunday marks a turning point in the emphasis of the earthly ministry of Jesus Christ. It will be less than a week before His death upon the Cross. During the preceding years of His ministry he has seemed to avoid forcing the issue. Now, however, a new emphasis appears. He is like a sol-· dier, who having spent months in training, at last goes to the front. He knowswhat lies ahead. He can no longer avoid joining the battle. Our Lard would not allow men-to remain indifferent to His claims. Now in the final days He presses on His followers more and more sharply the alternative of either recognizing or rejecting His authority. It was a declaration of war on mere

Jesus presents to every man, woman and child a claim and a chal-

The claim is this, "If a man keep my saying, he shall never see. death." The word for "see" in the original language means a long, steady, exhaustive vision. By so doing he becomes acquainted with the very nature of the object viewed. The Christian has his eyes fixed on the eternal things. The Christian sees death only as a passing thing through which he goes, not as a permanent state in which he dwells. Men have faced death courageously and even gladly, at all ages of history, but Christ taught men the importency of death. The life of union with God, which Christ offers, is above

The challenge is this, "If I am wrong, prove it; if I am right confess it." Jesus stated time and time again that the challenge each and every one of us has is that we choose God or choose our own selfish way. We cannot admit a part of His claim and deny the rest. We can not hear the word and not act. The more our lives are in harmony with God, the more they will respond to the claim of Christ.

When the appointed time had come, Jesus did not hide Himself. He met the crowd calmly face to face. So long as there was a possibility of winning the allegiance of the leaders of His time He continued to reason and appeal. Only when they decided to destroy Him did He face the final

If a man is deaf to the appeal of Christ, there is no other appeal possible. To reject Christ is to choose the lower rather than the higher; self, rather than God.

The challenge to each of you who read these words, the challenge for all time is "If I am wrong, prove it. If I am right, confess it."



jobs in our own country. Eisenhower proposes to do more of the same thing that is causing us to lose our gold and retard the well-being of every human being. His proposal is simply to extend credits to foreigners who want to buy American products. But how can the government very well extend credit when it actually owes, including Social Security guarantees and other endorsements, nearly one trillion dollars, or about \$6,000 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

Instead of wasting our energy in trying to correct the results, we should be directing our energy to the cause of our dollar buying less and less, our fear of unemployment, our loss of markets, and our increasing national debt. The cause is simply having the government attempt to do things that would violate the Declaration of Independence and the Commandments if done by an individual. It is a double standard of rightness, which, in reality, is no standard of right-

We want to return to moral, spiritual laws that are eternal. If we did this we wouldn't be worried about our foreign competition and jobs, but we would have an ever-increasing standard of living and integrity and selfreliance and goodwill to man-

Why? Why are we so confused? We are confused because in each community we have a double standard. We believe the city, county, and board of education have a right to do things that no moral individual would claim he had a right to do, such as taxsupported playgrounds, parks, fire departments, government schools that cannot teach the difference between right and wrong.

Parenthetically, fire departments should be owned by insurance companies. Then men would not be sitting idly waiting for a fire, but they would be using their time producing something of value to society. And men would be hired that would make a great effort to get individuals to understand what causes fires and explain to them that if they did not correct it, their insur ance rates would go up. This would be an individual matter, not a collective matter, as is the case when the fire department is owned by the city.

And, of-course, when each community believes there are no eternal principles that the city or the country or the board of education need obey, it is only natural for this collectivist idea to. spread to the state capitols and to Washington. It starts in the minds of men in each community. Correct that and we have the problem solved
