## Rhee Ignores Demand Of Opponents That He Quit

### Widespread Rioting Continues

SEOUL (UPI) — Both President Syngman Rhee and his controversial vice president, Lee Ki Poong, have considered — and rejected — the idea of resigning to end South Korea's political unrest, it was reported today.

Opposition leaders have demanded the resignation of both and new presidential elections to wipe out the memory of the March 15 elections when Rhee was unopposed and Lee was accused of winning through fraud.

Political circles said Rhee met with members of his ruling Liberal Party and asked them whether he should resign and call new elections. The sources said party leaders urged him to remain at his post.

The report that Lee had offered to resign was carried in the opposition Tonga Ilbo newspapers which quoted a top Liberal Party member. It said party members urged him not to resign despite the growing demands he do so.

The biggest demonstration today took place in Incheon where 25,000 school children marched in defiance of police and demanded their schools be reopened. Unlike last week, police regarded them with a benevolent eye today.

A smaller but more vicious demonstration broke out in Kunsan, 100 miles south of Seoul, where 1,000 students surged through the streets demanding new presidential elections.

Rhee, in a statement distributed by the government press office, said today he "couldn't help crying" over the "vicious and outrageous" anti-government riots of Tuesday. He appealed to Koreans for orderly behavior that could end martial law.

## Yeggs Peel Sealtest Dairy Safe, Make Off With \$2,300

Police are searching for at least two burglars who cracked the safe of the Sealtest Dairy, 125 S. Houston, last night for what was the biggest haul in several years in Pampa.

The thieves took an estimated \$2,100 to \$2,300 in what was described by Chief of Police Jim Conner as "an amateurish job."

Investigators are still trying to figure out how the burglars got on top of the roof of the plant. They originally started to drill a hole in the roof. After breaking their saw, they removed the air conditioner and entered through a vent.

After gaining entry to the plant office, they "peeled" the safe, using crowbars and a sledgehammer and took 14 money sacks containing checks and cash.

However, they left two crowbars, a pair of vise-grip pliers, a saw, punch and chisel, and missed \$86 in cash, lying in plain sight in the safe. Fifty-six dollars of the over-looked cash was in a money sack, the other \$30 in a brown envelope.

Also a mystery is now the thieves got-out-of-the-building through locked doors without breaking a window. A door leading to a back room, which was the only way out besides the front door, was locked from the inside of the storage room and showed no evidence of being forced. The front door was not forced — and no windows were broken.

"I can't figure out how they got on top of the building, or how they got out of it without breaking a window," said Lieutenant D. L. Day, who assisted in the investigation.

The break-in was discovered at 4:16 a.m. by "Red" Turlington, when he reported-for-work at the plant.

## Student Climbers Found Dead On Colorado Peak

BOULDER, Colo. (UPI) — Coed Jane Bendixon, 19, of Davenport, Iowa, the lone survivor of an attempt by three Colorado University students to scale freezing, 14,255-foot Long's Peak, was recovering from severe frostbite at the university hospital here today.

The bodies of her companions, David L. Jones, 18, of Webster Groves, Mo., and Prince D. Willmon, 23, of Fort Smith, Ark., were found by U.S. National Park Service rangers and expert climbers from Boulder Thursday.

Jones apparently was killed by a 250-foot fall on the south face of the mountain. Willmon, who had been left in an ice cave, exhausted, while Jones and Miss Bendixon went for help, froze to death.

A helicopter from Lowery Air Force Base at Denver will attempt today to bring the bodies off the mountain. If weather prevents the operation, a rescue party which camped overnight on the peak will bring them down in sleds.

They started to climb Long's Peak, which is closed to mountaineers at this time of year, early Tuesday, after a snowfall.

James A. Greig of Glenview, Ill., who stayed behind because he did not feel well, came off the mountain Tuesday night.

He reported to rangers at Estes Park that his companions probably were stranded on the peak. Miss Bendixon, Jones and Willmon had spent their Easter vacation climbing, and all were experienced mountaineers.

Miss Bendixon said they got within 500 feet of the summit Tuesday, but were driven back by icy gales. Then they realized that Willmon's hands were so frozen he could not make a rope descent, and they were in dire trouble.

Miss Bendixon and Jones scooped out a protective shelter for Willmon in the snow, and headed down the mountain early

Wednesday for help. "We decided to go two different ways down the mountain," she said. "I fell twice and bumped my head so hard I blacked out. I must have been out an hour or so."

When she recovered, Miss Bendixon could not find Jones.

Jones apparently tried to continue for help alone, but died in a 250-foot fall.

Miss Bendixon fought her way alone down to the town of Allens Park. She got there, exhausted and badly frost-bitten, Wednesday night.

Jones was killed when he fell 250 feet down the south face of the mountain and rolled an additional 850 feet. Willmon, who had been left exhausted in an ice cave died when he fell and rolled about 400 feet down the mountainside. His body was found below the ice cave.

## Daniel Predicts Reelection By Overwhelming Majority

Gov. Price Daniel predicted today he will win his campaign for a third term in the May 7 Democratic primary, election by the biggest majority ever accorded a Texas governor.

Daniel issued his forecast at an early morning press conference in Houston, as the political tempo stepped with the election date slightly more than two weeks away.

The governor slapped at critics of his state finance program with the statement that "anyone who promises to balance the budget and clear up our educational problems with a general sales tax is simply riding a dead horse."

He predicted a "landslide" victory for Daniel's bid for a third term. He said he expected to win by a "big margin" and that he would "be re-elected by an overwhelming majority."

## Rights Bill Will Change A Pattern

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Justice Department believes the new civil rights act will help greatly to break down historic patterns of discrimination against Negro voters.

But department civil rights experts said today they did not expect the new legislation to work any miracles in assuring Southern Negroes full voting privileges overnight.

In fact, they held out little hope that it would increase Negro voter participation in this year's elections.

The House approved the bill Thursday by an overwhelming 288-95 vote and sent the measure to President Eisenhower to be signed into law.

The House originally passed the bill last month. The Senate made changes which Southern and liberals agreed weakened the measure. The House then accepted the modifications.

## DeGaulle Arrives Today For Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Charles de Gaulle arrives today for pre-summmit talks with President Eisenhower and a program of pomp and ceremony in tribute to his restoration of France to the ranks of the great powers.

Eisenhower and top officials planned to welcome the French leader and his wife at an extravaganza military ceremony at the airport and escort them in a motorcade along the streets of downtown Washington.

The de Gaulles were due at the military air transport terminal at noon e.s.t. in a special plane bringing them from Toronto, where they wound up a four-day Canadian visit.

## Johnson Will Not Declare Candidacy

HOUSTON (UPI) — Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson said he knows he will be boomed at the national convention for nomination as the Democratic presidential candidate, but he still refused to open the door of acceptance all the way and admit he would like to officially enter the race.

There had been speculation in Washington that the Senate majority leader from Texas would announce his outright candidacy in a speech at Houston Thursday or in the one he plans to make in Denver today.

In a press conference after his Houston speech, Johnson was asked point blank if he would accept the Democratic nomination. He paused for a moment, then smiled and said:

"I have never shirked my duties and responsibilities and have served my country in any capacity desired of me. I have been named leader of the Senate, and I plan to devote all my time to that full-time job."

House Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas, who has spearheaded the Johnson-for-President movement in Texas and other states, has commented recently that he thinks it is about time for Johnson to declare himself.

The senator said he knew that Rayburn had made some such suggestions, but declined to be drawn out further.

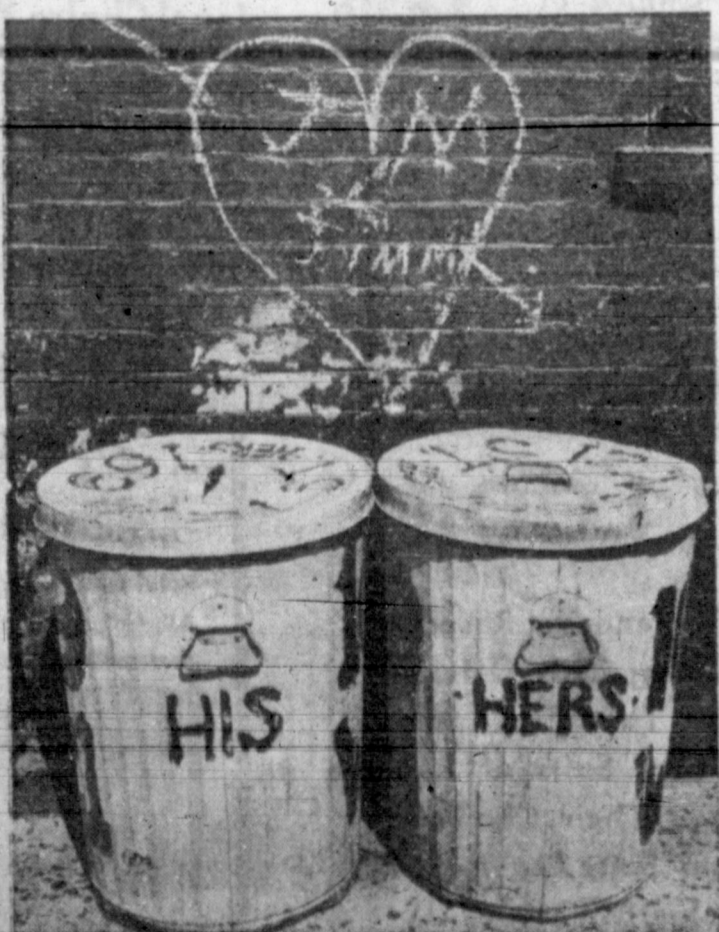
## Religious Issue Cannot Be Dropped In Coming Election

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The so-called religious issue appears sure to remain in the 1960 political campaign because it will be subject to constant assessment by those who will select the Democratic presidential nominee.

Sen. John F. Kennedy, a Roman Catholic, and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, a Protestant, two of the rivals for that nomination, both laid out arguments Thursday why there should be no such issue.

### Provisions Of Rights Bill Listed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Main provisions of the civil rights bill: Any attempt to obstruct any federal court orders, including school desegregation rulings, would be punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and one year in jail.

Persons crossing state lines to avoid prosecution for bombings, arson, etc., or possession of explosives for use in such violence would be subject to heavy federal penalties: false threats regarding such incidents and aiding in transportation of explosives across state lines for violence also would be subject to federal penalties.

Voting records in all federal elections must be preserved for 22 months.

Members of the Civil Rights Commission would be given power to hold hearings individually.

The federal government would have authority to arrange for education of servicemen's children in areas where public schools have been closed in desegregation disputes. (However, the bill does not contain authority to take over local schools built with the help of federal funds.)

## DEAR ABBY....

he will have tried to tell his parents before. If they had listened and understood earlier messages, serious trouble might have been avoided.

"What of the danger signals that are significant and indicate possible trouble ahead?" she continued. "First is unhappiness. One of the greatest responsibilities of parents is to nurture a child's capacity for happiness. Children are not automatically made happy by indulging all their desires; in fact, this often leads to even more dissatisfaction. Children are happiest and most secure when they feel loved but know where their limits lie. Happiness of our children requires the free gift of something of ourselves that is more than just the supplying of their needs."

"A second danger sign is irresponsibility. This is a common trait in adolescents today and is chiefly caused by permissive, indulgent parents who give too much to their children as well as do too much for them. It is a great kindness to encourage children to work and save for things they truly want. A lack of a sense of responsibility can lead to serious delinquency as these children have no respect for the rights of others or for any law or authority."

"A third signal is violence. The parent who sees a marked tendency toward violence in his child, particularly fire-setting or preoccupation with death or suffering, would be well-advised to seek professional help. Many parents are unwilling to admit the bitter probability of violence in their child until he has committed some really devastating act."

"Another serious danger sign" went on Mrs. McAnelly, "is reading difficulty. Since discouragement, frustration and insecurity are the foundations of many childhood troubles, the child who cannot read well has a serious problem. Reading difficulty is often caused by an emotional disturbance, but likewise such difficulty can lead to an emotional disturbance."

"A fifth signal is bed-wetting if persistent or frequent beyond the training period. This usually indicates an underlying disturbance with which the child cannot cope."

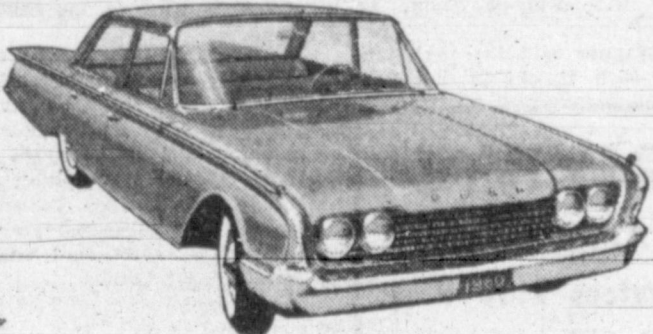

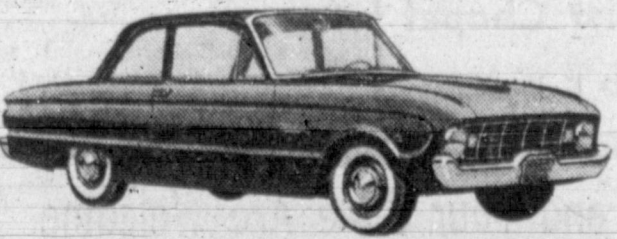

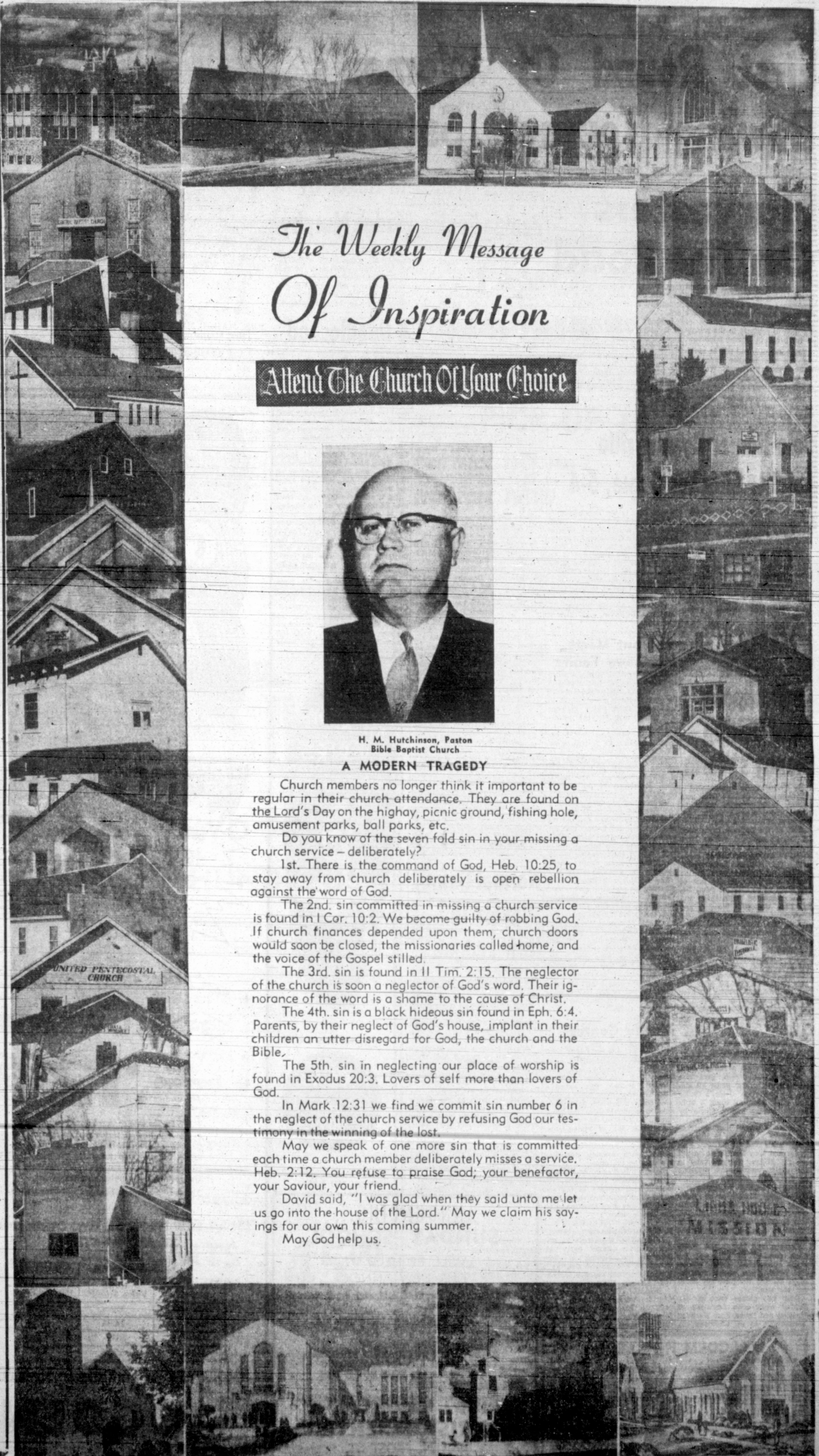

## Johansson Flies Home After Signing

NEW YORK (UPI) — Ingemar Johansson flew back to Europe Thursday night after signing for the fight Floyd Patterson feared he would not get.

Johansson, who won the world heavyweight title from Patterson last June 26, signed to give Floyd a chance to become the first man ever to regain that title. The bout, which may draw a million dollars at the gate alone, will be held on Monday June 20 at the Polo Grounds.

With final approval by the New York State Athletic Commission and the subsequent formal signing, the new promotional group, Feature Sports Inc., plunged full speed ahead today. It ordered the printing of tickets, which will sell for \$10 to \$100, and said its press headquarters will open next Monday in the Commodore Hotel.

# White Sox Continue Squeeze Winning

The Chicago White Sox are up to their old tricks. over the Kansas City Athletics. Nelson Fox, the AL's most valuable player in '59, led the White Sox' comeback from a 4-0 first-inning deficit with three singles and a double in four official trips. Fox doubled and scored the run that tied the score at 4-4 in the fourth inning, delivered a sacrifice fly that tied it again, at 5-5, in the sixth and then singled to set up the winning run in the 11th.

Fox, batting .900 after two games, led off the 11th with a single and moved to second when Minnie Miñoso walked. Kluszewski then delivered a line single down the right field line to chase

in Nellie with the decisive ratty. Gerry Staley, who shut out the Athletics with one hit over the last five innings, received credit for his first win. Bob Shaw, an 18-game winner last season, started for the Sox but was bombed for four runs and eight hits in 3 2-3 innings. Relief pitcher Ken Johnson was Kansas City's loser.

The New York Yankees downed the Boston Red Sox, 4-0, and the Washington Senators nipped the Baltimore Orioles, 6-5, in the other American League activity. Rookie Johnny Gabler pitched three-hit ball for seven innings and fireball relief specialist Ryne Duren finished up for the Yankees, who won their opening series, two games to one. Bill Skowron and Gil McDougald homered and Roger Maris had two hits for the Yankees. Ted Williams was out of the Red Sox' lineup for the second straight game.

## 36th KU Relays A Proving Ground

LAWRENCE, Kan. (UPI) — The 36th annual Kansas Relays opened today with the nation's top athletes using the vast track and field layout here as an Olympic proving ground.

Events highlighting today's schedule were the first of the decathlon trials, finals in the discus, broad jump and 500 meters, and preliminaries in the 100-yard dash, 120-yard high hurdles and four relays.

Closest competition expected in today's events will be in the discus, where the three top collegiate hurlers from last year will meet again.

Missouri's Don Cochran, defending relays champ who won the NCAA title last year at 178-0, will lead the field. His best career effort was 180-8 last year. He is undefeated over the past two seasons.

Pushing him here will be Houston's Bobby Weise, who finished second in the NCAA field last year, and Oklahoma's Mike Lindsay, who was third.

The field for the 5,000 meters, substituted for the two-mile this year to compare more favorably with the Olympic distance, was led by Al Lawrence, Houston's tiny distance star.

No American athlete has yet qualified at the Olympic standard of 13:45.0 set for the 5,000 meters, which is about three miles.

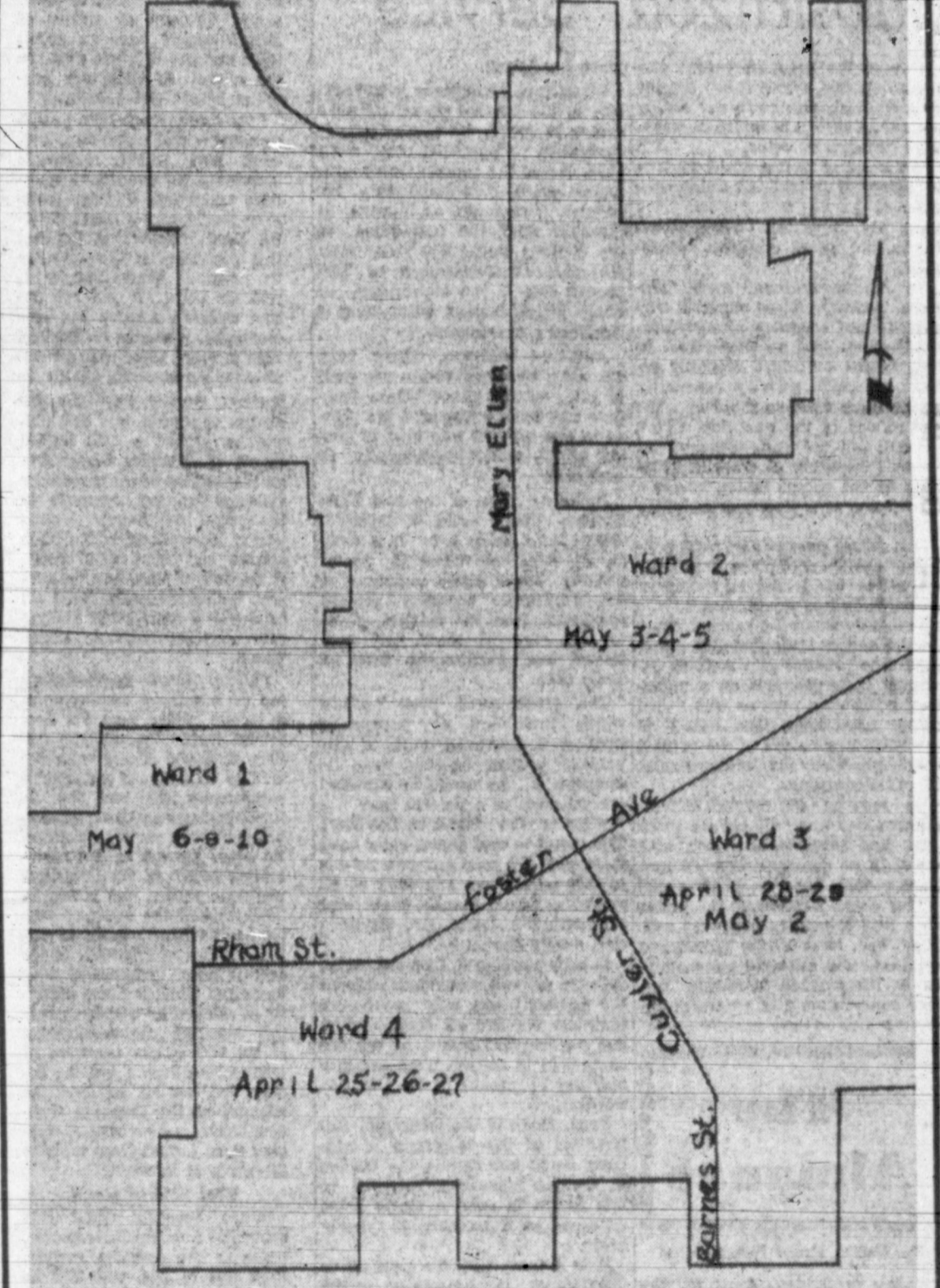

Marrying The Welfare State To Sound Money

Some time past I quoted considerably from Melchior Palyi's book on "A Lesson in French Inflation."

I think we could learn a lot as to why France got in the trouble it did if we would study what it did to bring it on. Palyi pretty well summarizes it in his last chapter, under the above subhead.

"Several aspects of the French monetary and fiscal reform are open to criticism, especially the rate of 17.5 per cent at which the franc was devalued. Devaluation was necessary, allegedly, in order to give French exporters an initial opportunity in the Common Market because the fact that their wage rates and social security burdens are higher than in the other five member countries and because 60 billion francs of export subsidies have been eliminated from the budget. Their burden has been shifted, in effect, from the shoulders of the French taxpayer onto those of France's commercial competitors. And huge profits were thrown into the laps of the speculators who had sold the franc short."

"The significant thing is the abandonment of managed money. Even though the full automatism of the gold standard — the goal of Minister Poincaré and top economist, Dr. Jacques Rueff, has not yet been restored, a vicious inflationary automatism, the escalator, has been jettisoned. In effect, real wages are cut by 5 per cent or more in the private sector, to a lesser extent also in the public sector. This is a real blow to the concept of the Welfare State, accompanied as it is by some unemployment, which is a good measure of short hours. But the workers are not the only class that 'pays' by months of austerity for the years of prodigality. Virtually all classes of French society have to accept some measure of 'punishment' in the interests of their own long-term benefit and security."

"The overhauling of the French economy is well under way. With costs held within reasonable bounds and the competitive incentives unleashed, business enterprise should gain a sound impetus. Most important is the fact that confidence in the currency be restored. Since January 1, 1959, the country's gold and foreign exchange reserve has been increasing. Presently, for the first time in years, these reserves outstrip the government's foreign obligations. By late May, 1959, the surplus of reserve was \$200 million as against a \$650 million deficit in 1955. There is no more ransacking (window dressing) in the central bank reports. A spectacular improvement of the trade balance and, most significantly, of the flow of funds into the savings institutions goes hand in hand with a remarkable (daily) rate of 'repatriation' of hidden wealth."

"All of these manifestations are the auspicious opening up of a reform rather than the final reform itself. The shipment of funds of Sound Money with the Welfare State was a compromise — apparently the best the De Gaulle regime considered enforceable without recourse to violence. Its hopes are set on the regenerating power of the liberalized market economy, the return of flight capital, the influx of foreign funds (German funds, in particular), the rehabilitation of the French saving propensity (the budgetary discipline) and a monetary standard, the development of the vast oil-gas resources of metropolitan France and the Sahara, and, last but not least, the stimulus of the European Common Market — perhaps a stepping stone toward freer trade in the whole of Europe."

What I think is the telegraph: a company could not handle the burden of written messages released in this nation in even a single hour, let alone on a monthly or yearly basis. It is a fact that the post office department is constantly in the "red." Income, however bolstered by repeated increases in postal charges, never quite comes up to cost of operating the bureau. Some persons, thus, imagine that the postal service is subsidized. But this is inaccurate. The entire mail system is subsidized for no one can possibly determine what the true cost of mailing anything really is. It could be, as a matter of fact, that were the postal processes put back into the market place, all phases of mailing, first, second, third and fourth class matter, parcel post and air mail, are all way overpriced. We do not know whether or not mail delivery is overpriced or underpriced. All we do know is that the price is wrong because knowledge respecting the value of the mailing system is impossible to determine. In this point of fact, what we have is a postal system

which loses money irrespective of postal charges. Some parts of this system may lose more than other parts. None of them make money. Even first-class letters are losers today. President Eisenhower wants to raise first-class postage to 5 cents per letter to overcome this loss. If one part did begin to make money, the lack of market place influences would quickly convert it into a loser, anyhow. This is one of the worst facets of a controlled economy. Only in a free market do buyers and sellers have the opportunity of discovering values and acting accordingly.

When fore supplants voluntarism in the market place, chaos ensues. Since everyone is compelled to purchase only one product and the product has a controlled price, it is impossible for anyone, bureaucrat or layman, to discover what the real value of the product would be. This may eliminate either shortages or surpluses. But in the elimination of these things, human satisfaction is banished permanently.

And, in addition, there is a curious tendency within any part of the market place where freedom to rise without any kind of control. It is only when the market place is free and uncontrolled that persons who produce can seek to exchange their products on a voluntary basis with persons who would rather have them than not. It is the voluntary nature of the market which provides the measurement of value meanings.

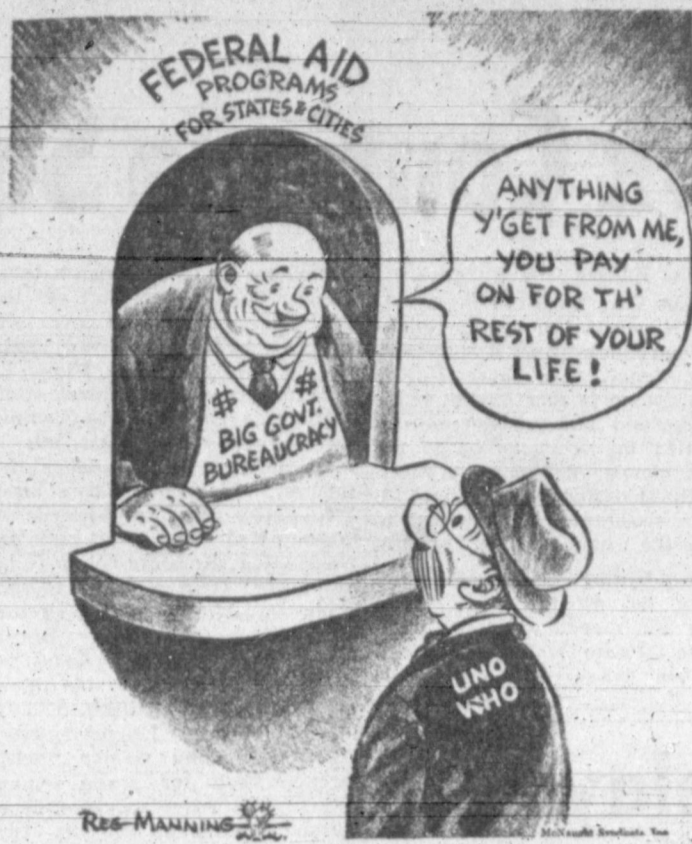

### Shortage Of Waterways Affecting Boat Business

NEW YORK (UPI)—The booming boat business in the United States is starting to run out of water just like the booming auto business began to run out of roads before World War II.

Especially, the shortage of waterways for boating is not in the inland states. A fellow in the middle of Ohio or Iowa may have less trouble finding water to use his boat than a resident of San Francisco or of the sea coast of New Jersey, according to Harry Conover, Jr., publisher of The Boating Industry, a leading trade magazine.

You might think the Atlantic and Pacific oceans provide enough water along our coasts for all the yachts and cruisers the boat factories could turn out for the next 100 years.

Not at all. Trouble is you can't moon pleasure boats in either ocean. The rising evening sun would batter them to pieces. And to take a pleasure boat from a safe mooring or marina slip in a coastal bay or river out to sea usually is an all day run with a hazardous return trip through an inlet.

And there aren't nearly enough inlets along either coast. From most coastal hamlets on bays and rivers, it's at least a 20-mile run to the ocean. The bays and rivers themselves already are overcrowded for pleasure boating. The traffic on summer weekends through the narrow channels—100 to 300 feet wide—in the bigger coastal bays isn't really as thick as auto traffic on a turnpike. But it seems even worse to the novice skipper at the wheel of an outboard cruiser or at the tiller of a sailing sloop.

Conover told United Press International the growth of the boat industry definitely will be choked off by the waterway shortage—plus the need for more marinas—if something isn't done on a big scale soon.

Some things are being done—but so far most of the steps taken are rather like trying to bail out the bilge of the Queen Mary with a teacup.

Digging new inlets will be tremendously expensive because of the breakwaters needed at their mouths and because of the possibility of posing new tidal water damage threats to property owners back on the bays and rivers, especially during the hurricane seasons.

But there is growing agitation for digging more inlets and canals with access to open sea. The federal government collects a tax on ocean fishing gear to raise money to improve launching facilities and access to fishing waters to the commercial fishing industry. Pleasure boaters benefit from these improvements and it has been suggested that

pleasure boats should contribute to this fund.

"A number of states now are diverting small percentages of their gasoline tax revenues from highways to improving public boating waterways," Conover said. "The Outboard Boating Club of America is working to get proper use for boating of gasoline tax paid by boat owners in all states."

Most states are starting to require larger boats to pay license fees and carry numbers like autos. This is a new source of revenue for waterway improvement but it will remain small as long as the expansion of boating is limited by the available water.

#### PLEADS GUILTY

CAMDEN, Ala. (UPI)—David Jackson, 19, a Negro high school pupil who worked as a school bus driver, pleaded guilty Tuesday to second degree manslaughter in the death of six fellow pupils killed March 22 when his bus was hit by a freight train at a crossing.
