Self-Destroying Creations By Junk Sculptor

Firemen Heave Wet Blanket On Arty

NEW YORK (UPI) - The weirdest experiment in the history of the Museum of Modern Art would have been a blazing success. Thursday night if three unimaginative firemen hadn't put

out the fire. It all started when museum curators became interested in the eccentric young Swiss sculptor Jean Tinguely, who has been amazing Europe with self-destroying creations of artisticly ar-

ranged funk. The museum arranged for Tinruely to destroy his biggest masterwork before an invited audiof the fire that ravaged part of the museum in 1958, museum officials told Tinguely that he must perform his experiment in the institution's spacious garden.

For three weeks Tinguely and six helpers worked to build a monstrous structure called "Homage to New York." Their materials were old bicycle wheels, sewing machines, bathtubs, lathes, piano parts electric fans, trumpets, gongs, saws, radios and baby carriages culled from New Jersey dumps and painted dead

The result looked like a Rube Goldberg cartoon machine come true in the dimensions of 27-by-23 balloon. But when the audience, including museum board chairman Mrs. John D. Rockefeller III, arrived to watch the spectacle from the garden's snow-slush terraces, Tinguely was far from ready.

It took an hour of tinkering with the contraption's 15 motors. eight timers and 400 moving parts before it was ready to whirr, toot, puff saw, clank, smoke, smash, paint, vibrate and make music for a half hour before it

would literally fall apart. Suddenly the huge thing was throbbing in an artistic symphony of movement and sound. Within minutes a fire broke out in the shell of an old player piano and

three city firemen on hand in case of an emergency snapped to attention with king-sized extinguish-

By this time the guests, kibitzers on top the garden walls and apartment dwellers across the street were enjoying themselves. They cheered the frantic artist and booed and hissed the firemen yelling to them to "let it burn." The indecisive fire fighters fi-

nally concluded that safety came before art when the tottering contraption, racked by small explosions, gave birth to a miniature four-wheel chariot that went scooting across the garden under its own power with its tail section ablaze. When it charged into the

and set it wheeling back toward the firemen. It took quite a bit of foamite

to quell the conflagration which threatened priceless sculptures by Rodin, Malliol and Renoir nearby. The half-destroyed machine still smoking when Tinguely began posing in front of it for photographs. His ruddy face was all smiles.

"It was a success-marvelous, marvelous, marvelous," he said in French as excited art lovers clambered for bits of debris to keep as souvenirs.



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
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

"And certain men which came down from Judea taught the brethren, and said, except ye be circumcised after the manner of Moses, ye cannot be saved." Acts 15:1

Wherever and whenever the gospel has been preached there have always been some ready to compromise it, change it, or to propose a substitute for it. There are some who feel that they have been divinely appointed to set the world right in its thinking. Some profess to believe in Jesus as Savior but change the teachings of Christ to fit their own code of religious

It is very evident that these men who came down from Judea were religious quacks. They proposed a new way of salvation. They did everything they could to hinder Paul in his efforts to preach Christ. They made it hard for others to know the truth. They came from Jerusalem as if they had come from Headquarters with the last word on the matter of religion. They posed as true men when they were false. They taught error as if it were

Probably no field is as open to quacks as is religion. A religious quack is the worst kind of quack in the world. Each wants to set up his own standards. Each has a different theory. Each claims to be divinely sent. Each is a witness direct from God sent to set the rest of the world right.

Just as these men went telling the people they had to be circumcised in order to be save, so today men have set up their own ideas as to how men are saved. One says to perform a certain rite for salvation, another says to live by a given set of religious rules for salvation, another says you will be alright if you join the church, still another would say to practice a certain ceremony regularly for salvation. What are men to believe?

Generally, quack religionists are not interested in winning men to Jesus Christ but are more interested in preying upon church members to 'set them straight.' They would build up their own organization by tearing down that of someone else. In teaching the people that they had to be circumcised in order to be saved, the Judeaizers may have thought they were preserving the truth, but in reality they were preserving empty traditions that had no value in them. They had rather sacrifice truth than their tra-

What are men to believe today? Men are to believe the Bible! There is an account in the scriptures of Jesus telling a man how to b saved. This man came asking Jesus how he might be saved and in response Jesus told him. Regardless of what other Biblical characters may have said about salvation, if we believe the Bible at all, then we would have to agree that Jesus, because He was the Son of God, was more qualified to tell a man how to be saved than was any other man who has ever lived.

That account is found in the third chapter of the gospel of John. Every Idea that is advanced as to how man is saved can be tested against this chapter from the Bible, There is no need for anyone to be confused on salvation if he will study carefully this one chapter. The words of Jesus to Nicodemus represent the supreme authority. This is the way of salvation!

Better Jobs

"On Planning The Earth" "The Freeman" magazine has an interesting book review of "On Planning The Earth" by Geoffrey Dobbs.

Mr. Dobbs certainly points out how government planning leads to dictatorship and takes away from the individual his right to plan his own life; besides, how it means a much lower standard of living.

He points out how planning leads to "suicide of the self (soul)" and says that "perhaps" planning is "the only way in which the soul of man can be destroyed". This is the way T. Robert Ingam reviews Mr. Dobbs' book in "The Freeman";

"Good writing combines with profound thinking in this book by Geoffrey Dobbs, Senior Lecturer in Forest Botany at the University College of North Wales. 'On Planning the Earth' is a sweeping, brilliantly generalled attack or large-scale land planning, hydroelectric schemes, and other major reconstructions of the earth's surface.

"Mr. Dobbs had a profound sense of Christian values as they apply to things of the earth and to worldly powers expressed in temporal government. He analyzes the 'planning' movement as a whole as 'the major manipulation of natural resources in the interests of centralized power', using for his primary example the Tennessee Valley Authority, held up by planners in Great Britain as an example to be followed. Dr. Dobbs is professionally equipped to deal with the consequences of the TVA in the physical area, but he is equally competent when dealing with the social, political, and religious side effects.

"Dr. Dobbs raises questions about the long range effects of the TVA on soil erosion, for example, which cannot be ignored. More good agricultural land is flooded by the TVA than is reclaimed by irrigation, and the damage done to the productive elements of the earth's surface is nature's reply to the promises of

the planners. "If the TVA is really an anticonservation project, despite claims to the contrary, the real incentive for such land planning and water collection schemes must be sought elsewhere. Perhaps the incentive is political. Planning implies control, and control over the world is an end admirably served by the projects for which the TVA is an admitted model. The powers given to the Authority by Congress are such that the 'spread of control from water to almost everything else makes an instructive study of the totalitarian nature of plan-

'It has been noted', Dr. Dobbs writes, 'that the rain falls upon the just and the unjust, but such an arrangement is not regarded as fair by our Planners, who would prefer that the rain should be gathered into one place, and then "delegated" under strict control through the sluices to the people in strict proportion to the justice" of their claim, as determined by an impartial Committee'.

"The importance of the control of water in totalitarian planning is not new. The first centralized state arose on the banks of the Nile on a basis of water control. It is symbolized by the vastslave-built pyramid tombs of its rulers. For the People of God it typified the slavery from

The Doctor

What are called "food poisonfings" are rarely caused by eating poisonous food. Almost always, the trouble is due to contamination of perfectly good food by toxins or poisons produced bacteria that are introduced during food preparation.

This is the usual sequence of events: Someone with a skin infection, perhaps of the finger, prepares a mayonnaise dressing for a chicken salad or a custard filling for a cake or some pastry. A bug, usually a staphylococcus or a streptococcus, is introduced. The dressing or the filling pro-

vides an ideal diet for the invader who divides and multiplies every few seconds. At the end of a few hours,

especially if the food is not well refrigerated, the bacterial population is in the trillions. And each little bug is a factory for the manufacture of bacterial toxin. Comes mealtime, often at a

picnic or a sociable, and the diners pitch in. Within an hour or so, if the original invader was a staphylococcus, almost everyone will become violently ill. After a delay of a half - dozen or so hours, if the original invader was a streptococcus, the result will be quite as unpleas-Fortunately, recovery is rapid

in all instances. But prevention is much the better policy.

Never eat anywhere if a food handler has any kind of a skin infection. Never permit anyone with

a skin infection to prepare or serve food in your home or for a picnic or a sociable. If you are serving a salad with a mayonnaise dressing in your

home, do not mix the salad until your guests are seated. If you are serving a salad to a large gathering, excuse anyone who has a skin infection from

giving assistance. Prepare the meat as near to the hour of serving as is possible. Put jars of commercially prepared may onnaise on the tables and let each diner do his own mixing. If you are planning dessert for

a large gathering, avoid cakes and pastries with custard or whipped cream fillings. Serve a plain cake or cookies preferably with commercially prepared ice cream. If further sweetening is desirable, put out jars of flavored syrup or of jam.

And if your precautions fail and you or your guests suffer an attack of what is commonly called "food poisoning" or maine," don't let anyone add to your miseries by prescribing or giving a laxative or a cathartic of any kind.

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
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
