### Formal Opening Set For New Church Unit

Despite the fact that farmers have been hit by a variety of weather vicissitudes ranging from dry to wet with prospect heavy rains Tuesday and Tuesday night will not be severe crops in the Muleshoe area are generally good, a check made by the Journal Friday revealed.

J. K. Adams, county agent, figures there will be 10,000 acres of cotton to be replanted. Add to this 15,000 to 20,000 acres of dryland cotton yet to be planted. This means some 30,000 acres of cotton is yet to be put in the ground.

Hail also had been a factor in Bailey county this year. Generally, the West Camp area suffered only minor hail damage. However, the Progress area hail build-up became "increasingly severe as the hail headed into Parmer county."

The Burk Black farm and other farms in that vicinity had severe hail damage, among those hit was the Glen Splawn farm in Parmer county, where the cotton crop was completely destroyed by hail.

The checkup revealed that the Needmore community was "unfortunate in having a number of farm crops wiped out, and cotton was damaged to the extent that considerable replanting is now in progress in that area."

The Monday - Tuesday storm did considerable damage in the Maple area. The entire community could count its blessings in that the hail was not too widespread.

Sandblasters came out of the shed and moved across many fields late in the week in an effort to give quick control to blowing sand which always follows a heavy rain here.

Dryland farmers, meantime, are planting wherever it is possible to gam the two - fold advantage of stopping the moving sand and to get their crops planted before the time runs out.

Some farmers in the Bala area, where more than a foot of rain has fallen in recent days, had "unloaded" tractors running to pack the soil as advance preparation for preparing a footing for the heavier equipment. Farmers explained that the "steam - roller" system sent tractor wheels from spinning or miring down.

Dryland farmers have reported damage to one late-maturing field of Irish potatoes, but it is expected that the crop will have plenty of time to make complete recovery.

Cucumbers, watermelons and cantaloupes are up and show considerable promise, vegetable growers said.

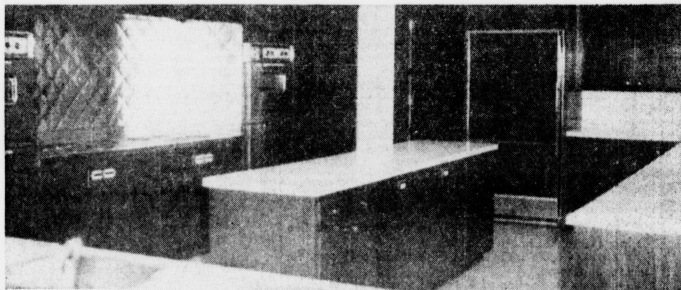

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows: "Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members." "Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible. "Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void for reason of its anticipatory nature. "This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
