



It should inspire and provoke, even shock. But it should always be ready to expand its own understanding and expression rule". Someone misunderstood it and made it say "it takes the exception to prove the rule". If that be true, then there is no logic, above and beyond mere daily bread, to inspire and lift him into willingness to achieve greatly.

Some researchers of note have opined that hardship, privation and even torture sharpen the no cause and effect, no eternal principles, and man is hopelessly doomed to ignorance and poverty.

There are no exceptions to any mathematical statements, such as two times two are four, or the square of the hypotenuse of a right-angle triangle is equal to wit, the keener the spiritual perception. We often hear the saying that a man "lost his job-" That is a fallacious statement because a job is a mutual contract between two parties and the man does not own the job or the employer. any more than the employer owns his employe. The employer is just an agent for his customers. Of course, if the employer has no customers, but only hires an employe to serve him, he still

does not own the employe, nor does the employe own him. This is true because the employe must realize that he is no better than anyone else and not entitled to anything better than what other people can get for the same service. An employer does not lose an employe or a customer any more than a man who steals an automobile is injured or loses

In the first place, it is only a half-truth. Of course, humans have rights but property has no rights in property. And even what might be regarded as rights of domestic animals is the responsibility of an individual not to misuse his rights on property and pen up and starve an ani-
