There's An 'If' In This, But Mild Winter Due

as though we might be in for a generally mild winter--If the prevailing westerlies keep about the same course they

are on now. -If these lofty winds, also called jet streams, don't weaken and

start meandering. These are big "ifs" and the Weather Bureau wouldn't bet you a dead match that this winter won't turn out to be as mean as

Still, the high westerlies are performing a lot better than they were a year age at this time, and

there is no sign that they are about to doublecross us.

On the strength of their conduct during the first half of November, the bureau in its "30-day outlook" issued Wednesday predicted mild weather on the average for the month ending in mid-Decem-

The westerlies are great rivers of air which flow west to east around the Northern Hemisphere. They channel the weather, so to

Last fall for some reason they got off their normal course. In stead of moving generally over the middle of the country, they toured as far south as the Gulf

of Mexico.

Moreover, instead of driving more or less straight across the continent, they meandered. The result was that cold air masses from Canada and Alsaka were channeled southward.

This fall, the reverse is true, The westerlies are farther north than normal and moving faster than normal. They are crossing the country along the U.S.-Canadian border.

Because they come in from the Pacific their temperatures are on the mild side, and because they are moving fast and straight, they are fending off invasions of cold air from the far north.

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
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Jesus Christ the Son of God and the Son of Man

NEW YORK - Every now and then some friend who goes in for this kind of thing invites me to his club. Before he dies, since his name is newsworthy usually, he will be described by that ancient and vanishing phrase of Victorian compousness: "a prominent clubman." When he dies his obituary, certainly in the New York papers, will end: "His clubs were: ... and list them.

We met on Park Ave. in the 50's the other twilight and asked me to join him in a libation to the arrival of night. We went in, the club being hard by, and he scarcely had signed for me in the guest book when an old boy, dressed to the nines and a prominent clubman if I ever saw one, came up and said: "John, you owe me \$10. Double or nothing?" "Sure," said my host, "A.M. or P.M.?" The old man thought for a moment and said: "A.M., I think. Yes, I'm sure.

We walked on into the bar and said: "What was that?" we play a little game here," said John. "Silly kind of thing. Ghoulish, really. You have to be pushing 60 to make a cent at it. It's a death game."

"What are the rules?" "Very simple, actually. But much depends on your honor and integrity. He bets me \$10 that I will not find an acquaintance, not necessarily a close friend, dead on the obit pages tomorrow morning. Or tomorrow afternoon's obit pages, as the case may be. That's the A.M. and P.M. thing. I lost today, as you heard. No one I knew died. But I'll surely get even tomorrow or may make \$10. I know of one old coot who is 88 and ailing wonderfully for me.' "Where do honor and integrity

come in?" "Well that's plain," said John. "He has to take my word for it that I actually knew someone just deceased. It would be too easy to scan the page and say, 'Oh, there's a fellow I met once.' But, in a club like this, it is no problem. I can't think of a member who would cheat for \$10. 1 had a sensational run of luck a year ago: a lot of young sprouts in their 40s, fellows I had met here and there as minor executives in corporations, began drop-ping off like flies. Heart, you know. All former football players or crew oars, naturally,"

"Are there variations?" "A few, but we play a rather conservative, basic game of identities here. One club I belong to goes in for variations.
