





barracks-like dormitories of the Marienfelde Refugee Camp in the American sector of West Berlin bulged this last week with the infirm, the aged, the young and the very young refugees from the latest surge of Communist brutality.

There have been many examples of such in the past the Red Thinese communes, jamming milons into state-run cooperatives, for one; Stalin's action condemning millions of restive Ukrainians starvation; for another.

And alongside these must come the campaign of the last few weeks which in one savage sweep completed the collectivization of every farm in East Germany. From April 15 to April 19, more than 5,000 East German farmers fled their former lands and reached the haven of Marienfelde

refugee center. Statistics fail to tell the story. The church and the ruggedly individual peasant with his intense love of the land have provided two of the greatest stumbling blocks to the communization

of eastern Europe. Now, in East Germany, at least, the farmer no longer need be considered a factor. At Marienfelde one of the refugees produces a picture of the

farm machinery he wrecked before fleeing. Another tells of hours under siege in his barred cottage while Communist teams on 24-hour shifts outside blare through loudspeakers demands that he sign away his lands to the collective,

Suicides were commonplace. But for East German strongman Walter Ulbricht there was one overriding consideration. It was the plum he could hand Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev on the eve of the four-power sum-

mit meeting. With this, Khrushchev could point to an East Germany whose economy at last was totally divorced from the West. Independent labor unions had been replaced by state unions. Private farming had vanished and now the last of the small businessmen soon would vanish, too.

And for Khrushchev there also was a side benefit. For as tension mounted in Berlin over the flow of refugees, he could cite it, too, es a threat to world peace.

## GOP-Backed Health Plan Said Exfreme

The administration came out against the new Democratic proposal Friday. It has not taken a strong stand on the eight GOP senators' plan but Health Secretary Arthur S. Flemming has indicated it too goes too far.

Some informed Republicans said they would be surprised if Flemming did not come up with a new alternative when GOP congressional leaders have their regular weekly meeting with President Eisenhower at the White House Tuesday.

The latest, and least costly Democratic idea would provide 60 days of hospitalization benefit after a 10-day waiting period. Itwould apply only to persons 72 or older on social security. They could take either the health benefits or a \$2.20 a month increase

in cash benefits. Under this plan, the combined employer-employe payroll tax, now set at 6 per cent of the first \$4,800, would have to be boosted

to 6.14 per cent. The House Ways & Means Com mittee is expected to make a decision next week on the Democratic compromise. It already has rejected a bill sponsored by Rep. Aime J. Forand (D-R.I.) and backed by the AFL-CIO which would tie a broad health insurance program to the social security program.



The House Thursday passed a \$4,038,500,000 version of the same measure, which places authorized ceilings on the amounts which can be spent on various aid programs in the coming fiscal year. Actual money must be voted later.

The Senate bill actually allows \$1,425,500,000 in new authoriza-tions. The remaining funds in the total were authorized in previous




## Bomb-Proof Hospital For San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO (UPI)-Groundbreaking for the nation's first nuclear-age "survival complex" hospital—one that can't be bombed out-will take place on

Officials of the Southwest Texas Methodist Hospital made the announcement today. They said they have arranged \$4.3 million financing for the first 175 bed unit of what is eventually planned as a \$20 million hospital located in the northwest suburbs of San

Underneath the hospital will be a nuclear-bomb shelter, financed by a \$300,000 grant from the fed-

eral office of Civil Defense, The underground area will have such vital services as operating rooms, laboratories, radiology and other medical departments. It is designed to accommodate 1,200 persons, including patients and Hospital staff personnel, and will provide safe habitation for a pe riod of more than two weeks even if the above ground floors have been reduced to rubble.






