If it's to be waffles, mix the batter before the guests arrive. Pour it into a gleaming porcelain enameled pitcher, cover with waxed paper, and store in the refrigerator until time to serve. Then bring the pitcher of batter right to the dining table and make the warries as they are eaten For an early evening meal the menu might be:

Spiced tomato juice cocktail Waffles (serve topped with creamed chicken, sweetbreads, ham or chipped beef)

Molded gelatin fruit salad on crisp lettuce Almond-pecan ice cream. Cupcakes Lots of coffee

When waffles are served as a late-evening snack, all you need served in addition is plenty of fragrant, hot coffee. But plan to serve a variety of toppings such as syrup, jam, jelly and sliced fresh fruits so that each person can choose his fa-

Pancakes make good midnight eating, too. Just as for waffles, the batter can be mixed in advance and stored in the refrigerator. When you are ready to bake the pancakes, the batter may be evenly poured onto the griddle right from the porcelain enameled storage pitcher. For a cozy, after-bridge foursome try this fruity version of the plain pancake. You'd better plan to make double the recipe and be certain to have enough coffee to serve second and even third cups.

Sour Milk Apple Pancakes 1 cup flour

teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon salt ½ teaspoon soda

1 egg 2 tablespoons melted butter

1 cup tart apples, peeled and finely chopped. Sift dry ingredients together.

Add sour milk and melted butter to beaten egg, and then add to dry ingredients. Stir until smooth. Fold In the chopped apple. Drop by spoonfuls on a greased hot griddle. Brown well on both sides. with a variety of toppings. Makes about 12 cakes, depending on size.



The great Methodist Church of this country with its 11,000,000 patriotic members, has been subected to a notable indignity over the week end. Its enormous prestige has been used by an unofficial adjunct of the church the so-called Methodist Federation for Social Action, as a national sounding board for Communists and fellow Political and diplomatic factors travelers to expound the gospel of the party line.

This has occured in a Kansas City conference f the federation. Accounts of the meeting have been given to the World-Telegram by Frederick Woltman, a reporter who has won the Pulitzer Prize for competency in ferreting out the efforts of fellow travelers to operate in the guise of unreproachable American organiza-

We are sure that Methodists, in general, are quite as shocked as we are to read Mr. Woltman's disclosures of what went on at that conference representing only a small minority of the church. Appealing in the name of religion and using the stories of Mary and Jesus, the Sermon on the Mount and the Good Samaritan, speakers made strong attacks on America's foreign policies while praising those of the Soviet Union. One speaker saw in the Christ-

mas story "not the improvement of the present social order but its revolutionary abolition and re-placement anew." And another forecast "an emerging new orde pushing its way up through blood, tears and strife." There was even defense of Russian concentration camps—on the ground of all things, that "wa, talk in Amerwas forcing the Soviets "to tighten up on civil liberties."

We can recall no other instance of so flagrant abuse a..d misuse of the name of a great church. None but insidious unprincipled leftists would have such unsurpassed gall. But there is a reassurance in the fact that the "social-action" program formulated at Kansas City s to go before he Methodist Church as a whole. And we are confident that the rank and of clergy and laymen once they have learned the facts, will lose no time in disavowing this curious offshoot. To that end, we commend the dispatches of Mr. Woltman for laying bare the facts.
