## Popular Vote For GOP Continues To Increase

### Irregularities Reported In Presidential Election

Republican leaders may demand a recount of votes in some sections of Texas because they say they have reports of "widespread irregularities" during Tuesday's presidential election.

Thad Hutcheson, GOP state chairman, said in Houston he has "very disturbing reports of irregularities" from San Antonio, Fort Worth, Houston, Tyler and Goliad.

"This (election) was the first time we have had a concerted poll-watcher system around the state, and we know from their reports that we lost thousands of votes through irregularities," Hutcheson said.

Among the charges he made were:

- A mysterious breakdown of 16 voting machines in San Antonio's strongest Republican precincts, and failure of officials to substitute paper ballots.
- "An unbelievably slow count" in Tarrant (Fort Worth) county, as well as some 30,000 "missing votes" from the city itself.
- Use of "undue influence" by election judges in between 10 and 20 Houston precincts.
- Hutcheson sent telegrams to all parts of the state urging Republican leaders to canvass their areas for any further irregularities and to double-check their final totals for the possibility of any more "lost votes."
- The GOP chairman charged voting officials in Fort Worth spirited ballot boxes away without counting Republican ballots.
- "Apparently the ballot boxes

were in unofficial custody of election judges who took them home after the polls closed Tuesday," Hutcheson said. "These boxes, as far as we know, were not sealed or locked."

"We are trying to avoid the attitude of being 'poor losers,' but (See ELECTION, Page 3)

### Police State Methods In Cuba Increase

HAVANA (UPI) — Supporters of Premier Fidel Castro began organizing "vigilance committees" throughout Havana today to seek out "friends of the Yankees."

The Castroites distributed handbills urging householders to heed the premier's plea to join the vigilantes and spy on their neighbors.

"Not all the work can be left to Fidel and the government," the handbills read. "Not all defense is the responsibility of the army, the police and the militia... There is a task for everyone... attend your neighborhood organizing meeting."

The streets of Havana already are patrolled nightly by militiamen, who keep tabs on the automobiles normally parked on their beats and report strange cars to police.

## Lower Level Federal Officials Due Shakeup After Inauguration

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI) — A major 1961 shakeup of below-cabinet level federal officials, including diplomatic personnel overseas, was being planned here today as President-elect John F. Kennedy prepared to shift his headquarters to Florida.

Some of his earliest appointments, it was learned on good authority, will be in the budgetary and personnel field in order to get his new federal manpower policies started as soon as possible.

Kennedy planned to take off for Washington at 2:30 p.m., EST, stopping long enough to let off his wife, Jacqueline. He then will continue to Palm Beach, Fla., where he is expected to spend two weeks in the sun. He will break his holiday for one day, flying to Texas next Thursday to discuss the new administration with his running mate, Lyndon B. Johnson.

At his first news conference since his election, Kennedy Thursday announced the initial steps in construction of his administration:

- Allen W. Dulles, director of Central Intelligence, and J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, will remain at their posts under the Kennedy regime.
- The Democratic victor in Tuesday's voting expects to accept President Eisenhower's invitation to a personal conference late this month to discuss transition of government from the Republicans to the Democrats.

He named Clark Clifford, Washington attorney and White House counsel during the Truman administration, to represent him in drafting transition plans with Gen. Wilton B. Persons, Eisenhower's chief assistant.

—He designated James M. Landis, former Harvard Law School dean, to undertake an immediate study of the federal regulatory agencies "with a view to maximizing the effective dispatch of their business." Landis knows the regulatory agencies well, having served on the Securities and Exchange Commission and the Civil Aeronautics Board.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican leaders realistically viewed their chances of reversing the presidential election result today as a 10,000 to 1 shot.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon's lieutenants still talked hopefully of taking back home his state of California from President-elect John F. Kennedy when the absentee ballots are counted. They also nursed a hope that the official canvass in Illinois would throw that state to Nixon.

Highly placed Republicans acknowledged, however, that winning both of those states from Kennedy along with the still undecided state of Alaska, still would not give Nixon enough electoral votes.

Nixon carried 25 states with 185 electoral votes in Tuesday's election, and held a slim lead today in Alaska, where 30 precincts were still unreported.

In California, with some 200,000 absentee votes to be counted Monday, Kennedy held a lead of almost 35,000. His lead in Illinois was less than 8,000.

If Nixon should salvage both of those states and Alaska, however, his electoral vote count still would be only 250, or 19 short of the needed majority.

Counting both California and Illinois in his column, Kennedy had won 23 states with 338 electoral votes.

With some precincts still not reported, the popular vote remained very close and gave Kennedy the victory by one of the narrowest margins in history. He polled 33,688,903 votes against Nixon's 33,329,680 and had 50.27 per cent of the two-party total.

At his first post-election news conference Thursday at Hyannis Port, Mass., Kennedy said he had expected the election to be close but not as close as it was.

At the same time, he announced acceptance of President Eisenhower's invitation to prepare for an orderly takeover of the administration after his inauguration Jan. 20.

Kennedy named Clark Clifford, Washington attorney and once White House counsel for President Truman, to represent him in conferences with Maj. Gen. Wilton B. Persons, assistant to the President.

Clifford and Persons will set up further conferences between Kennedy appointees still to be named and retiring administration officials.

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## Kidnap Suspect Sought

CONWAY, Ark. (UPI) — An ex-convict, described as armed and dangerous, released two Texas hostages at a tourist court here early today and became the object of an intense search in central Arkansas.

State police alerted local law authorities to be on the lookout for John Henry Schrimpscher, 35, of Beaumont, Tex., who had served terms in Arkansas and Louisiana prisons.

Schrimpscher had kidnaped two Beaumont detectives and tied them to a tree in a wooded area near Groves, 20 miles from Beaumont. He forced John Nunley, 24, Port Arthur, Tex., a Lamar Tech College student, to drive him away in Nunley's brother's station wagon. At Marshall, Tex., Schrimpscher forced Ray C. Clark, 40, a Fort Worth traveling salesman, into the car with them. He robbed Clark of \$150 in currency, a \$400 watch and a \$900 diamond ring.

## Veterans Day Honors Dead

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A torch, a wreath and a minute of silence will mark Veterans Day today at the white marble tomb of three American soldiers known to be God.

The torch, kindled in Antwerp, Belgium, will be enshrined near the tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery, final resting place of 107,000 service men killed in nine wars.

## U. S. Election System Likely To Be Analyzed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress appears likely to take a fresh look at the electoral college system for electing presidents in view of the close race between Sen. John F. Kennedy and Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

The narrow margin of Kennedy's victory dramatized the "winner take all" aspect of the system whereby the winning candidate gets all of a state's electoral votes no matter how small his majority of the popular vote.

Sens. Mike A. Mansfield, D-Mont., slated to succeed Vice President-elect Lyndon B. Johnson as Senate majority leader, and George A. Smathers, D-Fla., both said they would push for the abolishment of the electoral college.

The two Democrats said they wanted the president chosen on the basis of the popular vote.

Mansfield said that the electoral college was nothing but "a vestigial remnant that has outlived its usefulness" and was a relic of the "horse and buggy" days.

Smathers contended the electoral college gave the big cities too much power in the elections and completely wiped out the votes of those who backed the losing candidate within the state.

Kennedy, at a news conference Thursday in Hyannis Port, Mass., said he would not propose any "major overhaul" in the electoral college but it was learned that he might look with favor on abolishing the system.

Smathers conceded that proposals for abolishing the electoral college or making any changes in the procedure for electing a president had only a slim chance of getting through Congress.

"We can pass it in the Senate any time," Smathers said, "but it can't get by the House. There are too many votes from the big cities there."

## Weather Break Over Weekend

Texas was due to get a break in its current cold wave for the weekend with the warm-up expected to start in some sections tonight.

The U.S. Weather Bureau forecast a warming trend tonight in Northwest, North Central, Northeast and Extreme Southwestern Texas with the cold expected to hang on until Saturday in South Central, Southeast and Southwest Texas.

Thursday, the second consecutive day of winter weather in Texas, brought a low temperature of 21 degrees at Childress, freezing temperatures as far south as a line from Texarkana across the state to the Odessa area and rain showers along the Gulf Coast.

The Weather Bureau expected increasing cloudiness by Saturday in the northwest and north-central portions of the state.

Thursday's high temperature was 61 at Presidio and El Paso had 59.

Dalhart recorded a low this morning of 24 degrees and the highest minimum was 46 at Laredo.

Official U.S. Weather Bureau rainfall recordings for the 24 hours ended at 6 a.m. showed: Laredo .41 of an inch, Brownsville .09, Corpus Christi .36 and Victoria .09.

## Body Mixup Is Solved By Pearl-Inset Ring

BURLINGAME, Calif. (UPI) — Four attractive airline stewardesses wore identical uniforms and hairdos and carried similar handbags and luggage.

They piled into a taxicab for a trip that one never finished, that took another to a hospital bed with her pretty face swathed in bandages and that resulted in what a coroner called a 10,000 to one mixup in bodies—solved only because one of the women had a pearl-inset gold ring.

The taxicab carrying Mary Hawthorne, 26, and Joan Frost, 26, and two other American Airlines stewardesses was involved in a head-on collision near San Francisco—International Airport at nearby San Bruno. One of the young women and the taxi driver were killed. The other three were critically injured.

Miss Hawthorne's purse and identification arrived at the hospital beside the blanket-draped form of the girl who was killed. Airlin officials notified Mrs. Elsie Schnell in New York that the body of her daughter, Mary Hawthorne, would be sent home to New York.

Thomas Frost, an employee of a Philadelphia art gallery, was notified that his daughter Joan was injured. He and a son flew here to begin their bedside vigil beside the heavily bandaged girl, who was in a coma.

Today, Mrs. Schnell, who had mourned and made funeral arrangements in New York, exchanged places with the grieving Frost, who flew to New York to claim the body of his daughter Joan.

Frost collapsed in shock when he was told that the bandaged woman was Miss Hawthorne and the body in the coffin was that of his daughter.

How did the tragic puzzle become untangled?

Two of Mary's friends, stewardess Norma Pugh and flight engineer Bob Evans, stopped at the funeral home to pay their respects. Miss Pugh brought a ring which Mary cherished but had left in New York on her last trip to California. She received permission to

place the ring on the dead girl's hand.

The lid of the coffin was pushed back, and Evans ejaculated, "Oh, my God! That's not Mary."

The two other stewardesses involved in the auto accident — Teresa Di Placido, 22, of Eddyville, Pa., and Sheila Murray, 22, of Landon Terrace, N.Y. — said they understood how such a mistake could happen.

"We all look alike," Miss Di Placido said at her room in the hospital. "We're like four twins. The hospital was just trying to get us fixed up."

## No Monkey Business In This Factory

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI) — Three chimpanzees named Fudgie, Pudgie and Bobby go to work in a furniture factory today and Ben Friedman, 35, factory manager, swore it was anything but monkey business.

Friedman denied reports that the chimps will replace any of the human employees, and said if things work out it could actually result in creating jobs for more people.

He plans to start the chimps to work on a production line at 1 p.m. EST today and demonstrate to newsmen how well they work. Friedman said he would also make "some suggestions" on how chimpanzees can take over non-skilled jobs in other industries.

"There is no doubt that they can do the jobs," Friedman said. "We have been experimenting (See FACTORY, Page 3)

MOSCOW (UPI) — A courteous reply from President-elect Kennedy to Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's message of congratulations raised the possibility today that the Soviet government would suggest the two leaders meet face to face in the near future.

It was unlikely such a meeting would take place before Kennedy's inauguration Jan. 20, but diplomatic sources said the Kremlin might suggest it be held before a Big Four summit meeting which Khrushchev discussed with Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in New York.

## President Hasn't Yet Given Up

SAIGON (UPI) — Army paratroopers led by an American trained colonel staged a revolt against South Viet Nam President Ngo Dinh Diem in a pre-dawn coup today but Diem was still holding out in his palace at nightfall.

The rebels claimed they had overthrown Diem to "save the nation from communism and corruption." The claims appeared to be premature despite the fact the insurgents had carefully organized their revolt.

An ultimatum demanding Diem's resignation expired at 4 p. m. without incident. At 6:30 p. m. Vietnamese marines relieved the paratroopers in front of the presidential palace.

Col. Nguyen Khanh Thi, the young paratrooper colonel who led the revolt, actually entered the palace and conferred with Diem after his men stormed through the palace gates. Diem refused to resign, apparently holding out until armored forces could be rushed to his aid from My Tho, 90 miles southwest of Saigon.

The rebels told newsmen the revolutionary forces were in control of all key points in Saigon. They also seized the radio but before Diem had radioed for help. There were no signs of Diem's reinforcements this afternoon.

Tanks and armored cars manned by paratroopers trained their guns on the palace while their colonel tried to get Diem to resign. The guns were still there later in what appeared to be a well-organized siege.

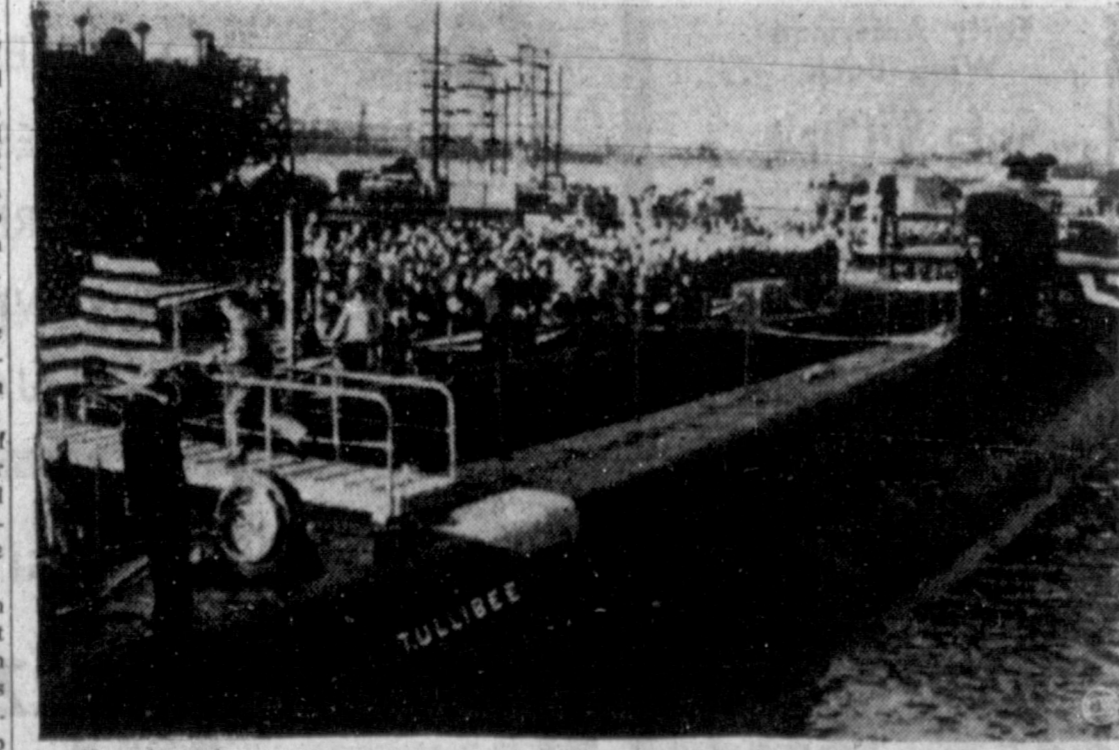
U. S. Ambassador Elbridge Durbrow was informed officially of the paratroopers' action by Lt. Col. Nguyen Vu Dong, second in command of the revolt. The statement was passed to Durbrow through Lt. Gen. Lionel C. McGarr, head of the U. S. military assistance group which trained Diem's 150,000 man army.

It was the first major assault on the five-year-old administration of Diem and appeared to be led by followers of former Emperor Bao Dai.

Asked by newsmen whether the paratroopers would accept Diem in any new government, Dong declined to answer but said he wanted Diem to recognize a revolutionary committee set up by the insurgents to run the country temporarily. He staunchly denied any Communist ties and accused Diem of favoring his own family in running the government.

The rebel forces began their coup by attacking the presidential palace with tanks and armored cars. They were met with heavy fire from Diem's palace guard.

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### Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI)—There appears to be a very considerable sentiment around that this is the last chance to get aboard for a resumption of the old bull market or for the beginning of a new one, according to Clark, Dodge & Co.

It says that chances for a wild Democratic spending program appear quite limited and the facts of business life should reassure their importance in short order.

Clark, Dodge thinks this is hardly the time to participate in a scramble for stocks as the market's current rally will soon have exhausted the last vestige of its technical strength.

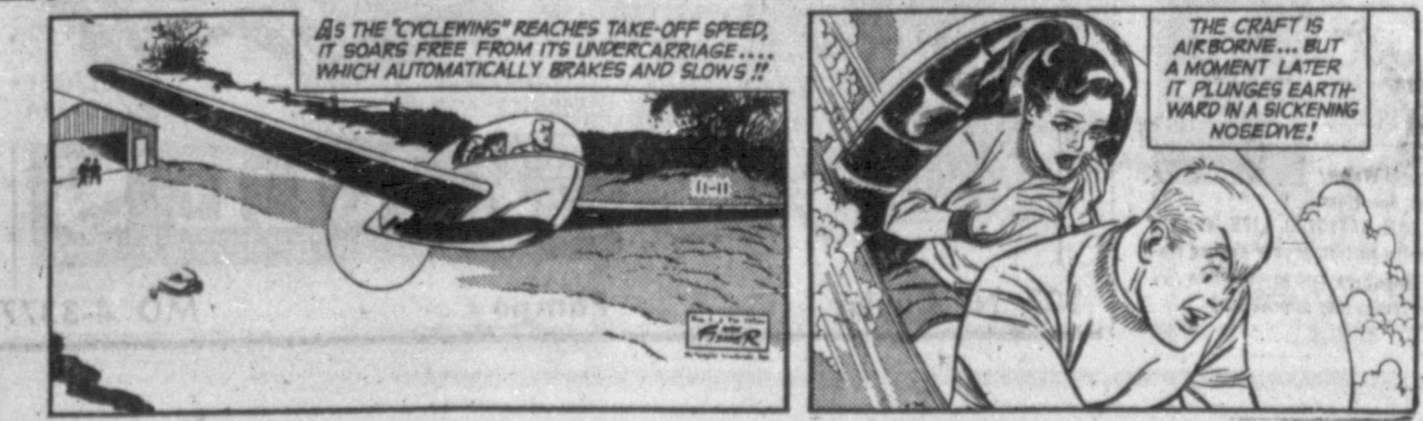

# Kennedy To Use Douay Bible In Taking Oath As President

WASHINGTON (UPI) — When President-elect John F. Kennedy takes his oath of office next Jan. 20, he probably will rest his hand upon a Douay bible rather than the King James version.

It's a safe bet that there will be fish on the White House menu every Friday.

These innovations can hardly be said to strike at the roots of the U.S. constitutional system. Will there be other, more basic ways

in which America's first Catholic president will differ from his 33 Protestant predecessors?

During the campaign, a number of Protestant clergymen voiced fears that a Catholic president would take orders from the Pope and would seek in various ways to give his church a preferred position in American society.

But many knowledgeable Protestants and Catholics expect precisely the opposite. They are convinced that Kennedy will go out

of his way to display his independence of ecclesiastical control, and his devotion to church-state separation.

Even before Kennedy was nominated, the Catholic magazine Commonweal observed that there would be no "organizational advantages for the church" in having one of its members in the White House.

"It might well be argued that 'Catholic interests' would actually be hurt by the election of a Catholic president," said Commonweal.

"As president, a Catholic might feel impelled to lean so far backward to show his fairness that he would be less free than a non-Catholic."

More recently, an article in the Protestant journal Christian Century asserted that Kennedy, being immune to any charge of anticatholicism, is "better equipped to deal with hierarchical pressures" than a Protestant president might be.

Those who hold this view note that it was an Episcopalian president, Franklin D. Roosevelt, who sent a special envoy to the Vatican, and a Baptist, Harry S. Truman, who proposed sending an ambassador.

Kennedy has said that he opposes any U.S. diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

It is also noted that Vice President Richard M. Nixon, a Protestant, said during the campaign that he favored letting each state decide for itself whether to include parochial schools in federal education aid. Kennedy said use of public funds for church schools

is "clearly unconstitutional." When U.S. Catholic bishops issued a statement last Thanksgiving strongly opposing any use of foreign aid funds to support birth control programs in other countries, Presbyterian Dwight D. Eisenhower promptly and fully endorsed their stand.

Kennedy said it would be a mistake for the United States to "advocate" population limitation in other countries. But he added, "I would not think it was wise for the United States to refuse assistance to a country which is pursuing a policy it feels to be in its own best interests."

One question which Protestant clergymen raised during the campaign is whether a Catholic president would be free to participate in interfaith religious ceremonies.

They cited canon 1258 of the Catholic code of canon law, which says "It is illicit for Catholics in any way to assist actively or take part in sacred worship of non-Catholics."

The Rev. Edmond D. Benard, dean of Catholic University's school of sacred theology, says the canon permits a Catholic public official to attend religious services of other faiths, as a "passive participant," when his attendance "is a reasonable part of his public functions."

Since Kennedy is fully aware of Protestant sensitivities on this subject, it seems likely that he will show up at interfaith religious ceremonies of a public nature as faithfully as Protestant officials appear at the annual "Red Mass" in Washington.

# Resettlement Of Refugees Hits 10,000

The World Council of Churches has resettled nearly 10,000 refugees in the first nine months of 1960, according to Miss Janet Lacey, of London, England, director of Interchurch Aid and Service to Refugees of the British Council of Churches. "World Refugee Year is by no means a dead duck," Miss Lacey reports. "Hundreds of thousands of refugees have found solutions to their problems because of the Year. Some \$33,000,000 has been pledged by 83 countries for the program of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees."

Despite the efforts of "World Refugee Year," says Miss Lacey, there will be a "continued residue" of refugees who because of illness, age, or other reasons cannot be resettled in lands outside their own. The construction of church sponsored homes for the chronic sick and aged in Europe, the Near East, and Australia are now being planned. Special World Council projects are primarily for local integration of refugees who cannot be moved from their countries of asylum. Vocational training programs and homes for the able-bodied are being provided.

## Church Leaders To Air Migrant Support Plans

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Protestant church leaders from all parts of the country will meet here next week to draft long-range plans for relieving the plight of migrant farm workers.

Counting women and children who often go to work in the fields when they are only 5 or 6 years old, there are about one million migrant farm workers in the United States. They "follow the crops" from state to state, harvesting fruits and vegetables.

Unprotected by minimum wage laws, jobless insurance and other social welfare measures that cover most Americans, the migrants are at the bottom of the U.S. economic ladder. Their average family income — with everyone in the family working — is about \$800 a year.

Their needs will be spotlighted at a three-day conference (Nov. 16-18) sponsored by the Migrant Ministry of the National Council of Churches. Participating in the national meeting will be official delegates from 34 state migrant committees, state and local church councils, church women's organizations, home mission boards and other agencies of 20 major Protestant denominations which have been working together on migrant problems since 1920.

Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell, chairman of the government's cabinet-level committee on migratory labor, and other prominent federal and state officials will also take part in the conference.

Its purpose is to draft a "10-year plan" for attacking the major inequities suffered by migrant families, including their often deplorable living conditions, low wages, irregular employment, unsafe transportation, and lack of health and educational services.

"Now is the time for action because right now many bodies, from civic groups to government, are aroused about the migrants plight and are demanding changes," said the Rev. Dr. Hermann N. Morse of the Migrant Ministry.

He said growing awareness of migrant suffering was reflected in the fact that seven bills to aid them were introduced in the last session of Congress. But no major legislation was enacted, however.

That indicates to church leaders a need for considerably more "awareness" of the problem, both among congressmen and among their constituents. The conference here will chart lines along which thousands of local churches can help to promote it.

Humphrey of Amarillo, District 10 Brotherhood president, will speak. Special music will be provided by soloists from church choir and also Paul Biggs and Alan Greer will be featured in special numbers.

Sunday, November 20, has been designated "Victory Sunday." On that day the church leaders are expecting the membership to underwrite and over subscribe the largest budget the church has adopted. For the last number of years the church has underwritten the program in one day.

What is Your future? What is my future? What, with the world-hatred and bias, is the future of this world? Even world leaders wonder what may set off the powder keg we live in.

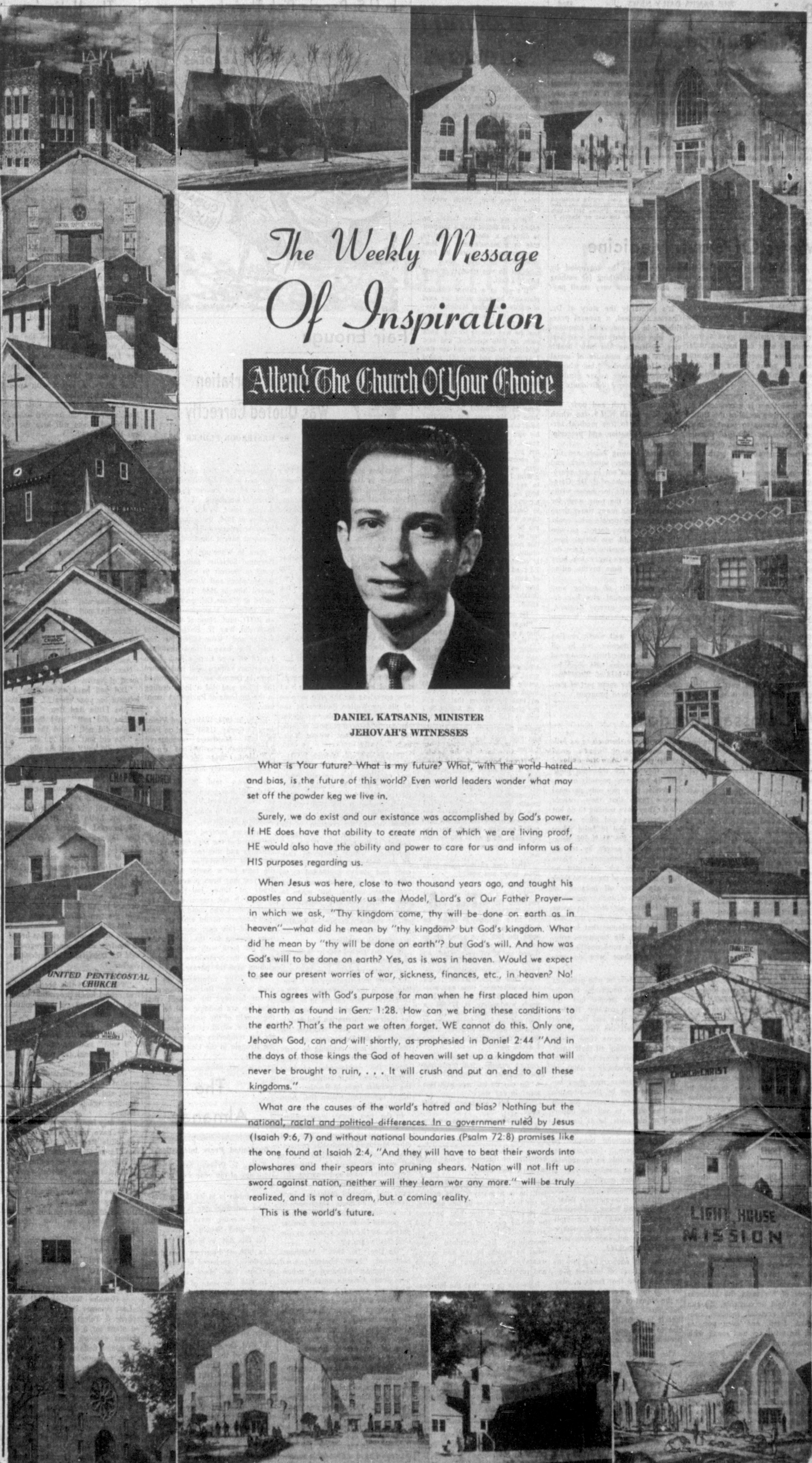

# Ponderous Plainview To Battle Pampa

## Homecoming Clash Pits 3-4A Cellar Occupants

Pampa's Harvesters, fighting to stay out of the District 3-4A cellar, will have their hands full tomorrow when Plainview's thus - far muzzled Bulldogs, small in number but big in weight, come to town for a 2 p.m. homecoming game at Harvester Field.

And, barring a possible tie, one of the teams will leave the field later in the day with its first 1960 victory in its grasp. Both teams are 0-8.

Pampa will be a two-point underdog to Plainview on the basis of comparative scores and the Bulldogs added weight advantage.

Plainview lost to Amarillo, 22-0, and Pampa fell, 31-0; Palo Duro beat Plainview 20-8 and Pampa, 40-16; Monterey topped the Bulldogs, 20-6, and Pampa, 19-6; and Lubbock stopped Plainview and the Harvesters, 28-0 and 35-6, respectively.

The Bulldogs starting line will average anywhere from 196 to 207.1 depending on whether Joe Ferguson, 240 pound tackle, starts in place of Austin Winter, a "tiny" 185.

Biggest man on either team will be Plainview's personal mountain, Jim Ferguson (no relation) who tips the scales at 290, although Plainview Coach Herman Smith claims hard work has "shrunk" Ferguson to 265.

Pampa will start perhaps its biggest line, weight-wise, of the season at 174.1, but three of the starters — Randy Matson (185) and Guards Dee Wright (185) and Carl Clark (176) — are sophomores.

As a team, Plainview will average 185.4 to Pampa's 167.1; however, the Bulldogs have sacrificed speed for weight and this should diminish the difference somewhat.

Plainview has been playing with only 19 boys on the varsity but canceled a Saturday 'B' team game this week in order to bring a larger squad to Pampa.

The Bulldogs have had difficulty in changing over from the single wing to the split-T. Coach Herman Smith installed when Buzz Warren resigned as head coach last August.

Pampa's offense, which has only scored 28 points in five district games while allowing 145, will place its hopes on a backfield that has changed so many times that fans actually need a program to tell who's playing.

In fact, Fullback Steve Dobbin is the only one expected to open this week out of the starting backfield of last week's game.

Butch Crossland moves in at quarterback, replacing Roy Don Stephens who was injured in the Lubbock game. Stephens may be used for punting purposes, although Crossland is the top punter in the district.

Rounding out the backfield will be Billy Cooper at right half, replacing Larry Taylor, who injured an ankle, and Sherill Miller at
