## Daniel Claims Voter Strength

Gov. Price Daniel's campaign manager said Wednesday that even though former Gov. Allan Shivers has endorsed gubernatorial candidate Jack Cox, most of Shivers' former backers are for Daniel.

"Texans make their own decisions," Jake Jacobson said. "This merely verifies the fact that a former politician simply cannot succeed in telling others how to vote."

The claims were based on a recent "statewide" poll of persons who "considered themselves friendly" to Shivers. He said 63 per cent of those polled favored Daniel, while just 20 per cent indicated they were for Cox.

Cox, speaking at Fort Worth, criticized Daniel for presenting a bill to allow the state to claim abandoned bank accounts and property.

Cox spoke to the Pro-America Club and said the bill, if made law, could result in a person being "forced to file a suit against the state to prove she owned her own money."

House Speaker Waggoner Carr, speaking in Houston, accused his opponent, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, of "political payola." In awarding of a Houston bank charter, he said he would ask that his House investigating committee to look into Wilson's "conduct" on the State Banking Board.

Wilson claimed his opposition.

# Caretaker Government Formed In South Korea

## Nation Shocked By Lee Family Suicide

SEOUL, Korea (UPI) — Acting President Huh Chung formed a new caretaker government today to wipe out the fraud and corruption of the Rhee regime in a nation shocked by the mass suicide of Vice President elect Lee Ki Poong and his family.

Huh, known as a man of deep honesty, called on the new cabinet "to wipe out illegalities, irregularities, corruption and confusion deeply accumulated" by the administration of Syngman Rhee which ended in near disgrace after a wave of violence.

Huh spoke of the "evil practices with irregularities" of the past and called in six independents to help him forge a government that would bring democracy to South Korea, guard against communism and end a system of "rotten taxes."

Appointment of the new cabinet has one major and immediate effect: It restores the flow of U.S. economic aid, halted temporarily because Korea had no reconstruction minister. U.S. military aid had not been interrupted.

Lee, who assumed "final responsibility" for the recent bloodshed and rioting in Seoul, Korea, died with his entire family at dawn in a mass suicide pact. The executioner was 2nd Lt. Kang Suk, Lee's elder son whom Rhee adopted.

The family gathered in a secretary's apartment at the presidential mansion to die together. At 5:55 a.m. Kang opened fire. He killed his father, his mother Maria and his younger brother Kang Wook with one bullet each from his .45 caliber army automatic, then turned the pistol on himself.

He fired one bullet into his abdomen and one into his brain in an act reminiscent of the Japanese tradition of harikari, or ceremonial suicide.

Today's events meant the end of the Korea of Syngman Rhee, but his final ignominy was put off. The National Assembly which was to have met and accepted his resignation probably unanimously postponed the meeting until Friday because of the Lee tragedy.

Rhee left the presidential palace today for what may have been the last time and rode through wildly cheering crowds to his own house to begin life as a private citizen. Within an hour he and a group of soldiers were out pruning the shrubbery.

The death of the Lees was expected to provide a tragic last act to South Korea's "student revolution" which forced Rhee to resign and terminated Lee's political career. The revolt grew from charges that Lee's election to the vice presidency last March 15 was rigged.

Peace was returning to the country under the acting presidency of Foreign Minister Huh Chung. Only scattered incidents of anti-government activity were reported today, none resulting in bloodshed.

Rhee himself was wildly cheered by crowds massed in the streets when he left the presidential mansion at 2:35 p.m., at least temporarily ending his 65-year public career.

News of the Lees' deaths disrupted the National Assembly session which was to have accepted Rhee's resignation. Many assemblymen, even those who had been Lee's opponents, burst into tears at the news.

Dozens of lawmakers went to the presidential mansion where Lee had sought refuge from mobs vowing to kill him, to pay their last respects.

Rhee, himself in tears, refused to see any callers except Huh and U.S. Ambassador Walter P. McCaughy.

By noon, a crowd of several thousand had gathered at the gates of the Kyong Mu-Dae, South Korea's "White House." The army massed troops in the area in anticipation of possible violence. (See CARETAKER, Page 4)

## AF Rushing Plans On Space Vehicle

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Air Force, pursuing its role as the future U.S. space force, rushed plans today for producing a manned space craft with a wide variety of military uses.

Known as Dyna Soar, the space vehicle will combine the ballistic missile and the airplane in a maneuverable machine that can put man into orbit and let him land routinely on large air bases.

The Air Force Wednesday announced the badly kept secret that the Boeing Airplane Co., Seattle, Wash., had been ordered to go ahead with "design and ground testing" looking toward construction of experimental Dyna Soars.

The Air Force space ship is a sharp departure from the Mercury Project of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). Mercury calls for rocketing a man into space in a capsule mounted on an Atlas missile. His reentry into the atmosphere would be controlled from the ground and the capsule would be let down gently on a parachute.

The Defense Department holds the Dyna Soar to be a research and development project. It shies away from discussing potential military uses.

Experts consider, however, that the Dyna Soar may be able to perform these military roles in the late 1960's.

## Violent Spring Weather

### Hail Storms And Twisters

Violent spring weather that brought hailstones as big as a man's fist near Beaumont, piles of hail as deep as 10 inches around Waco and at least two tornado funnels swept across Texas Wednesday.

The U.S. Weather Bureau forecast more thundershowers today. Temperatures were expected to range between 75 and 85 in East and North Central Texas today, in the 80's in Southwest and South Central Texas and between 72 and 82 in Northwest Texas.

Skies were reported clear across the country west of the Pampa received less than one-tenth of an inch of rain last night and early this morning.

Pecos and portions of the South Plains today but there was a cloud cover with some light drizzle in South Texas and some fog in the South Plains early today. Low temperature ranged between 43 at Dalhart and 73 in Corpus Christi and Brownsville.

Wednesday's high was 92 degrees at Pecos.

The most rainfall in Texas for the 24-hour period ending at 6 a.m. was .48 at College Station. Wichita Falls had .31, Dallas .30, Brownwood .30, Abilene .34, Fort Worth .25, Waco .03 and San Antonio a trace.

Hailstones the size of a man's fist fell about three miles north of Shepherd, Tex., which is about 70 miles northwest of Beaumont, in San Jacinto County. Sheriff Charlie Meyers of Jefferson County said he had reports that damage to farm buildings in the area was heavy.

## Tax Dodging Hoods Hunted Down By U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government's biggest crackdown on tax-dodging gamblers and racketeers continued today with Treasury agents hunting down bookies who escaped the first coast-to-coast series of raids.

The simultaneous raids in 35 cities across the country Wednesday brought at least 72 arrests of bookmakers, numbers writers and lottery operators.

An estimated 250 intelligence agents of the Internal Revenue Service, assisted by state and local police took part in the largest dragnet operation in the service's history.

The arrest total was expected to mount as agents flushed out suspects for whom they were carrying warrants. Some 51 cities in 23 states were on the IRS raid list.

Treasury sources said further enforcement drives were coming up to nail gamblers and other tax-evading racketeers.

The nationwide raids were aimed at gamblers who failed to pay their federal taxes. Federal law requires bookmakers and other gamblers to buy a \$50 tax stamp each year and to pay as taxes 10 per cent of their gross gambling income.

Those arrested, if convicted, could be punished by up to five years in jail and a \$10,000 fine.

Among the major cities where raids and arrests were made were Atlanta, Baltimore, Cleveland, Houston and Ft. Worth, Tex., Pittsburgh, Detroit, Chicago, San Francisco, and Atlantic City and Trenton, N.J.

The victim said she had been dating Couch but had broken off the affair. She told officers that Couch shot her when she refused to resume their relationship.

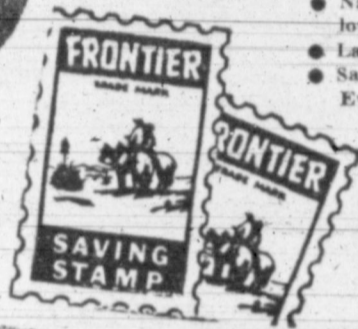

### Dull Primary Brightened By Candidates

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts and Vice President Richard M. Nixon rolled up impressive presidential "popularity" showings in a comparatively dull primary election that was heated only by voting on legalized harness racing in Pennsylvania.

Five counties, including Philadelphia, approved gambling on harness racing, seven counties including the one for Pittsburgh voted against it, and two counties were undecided.

Approximately 25 per cent of the state's more than five million registered voters balloted to climax a lack-luster primary campaign.

Although no Democratic aspirants to the presidency filed for Tuesday's primary in deference to the wishes of Gov. David L. Lawrence, Kennedy showed a

mounting strength. He surpassed the 32,000 record write-in votes established by Sen. Estes Kefauver in the 1952 Democratic primary.

Nixon, the only entrant on the Republican side, came surprisingly close to the record 951,000 votes cast for President Eisenhower in the 1956 Republican primary.

With 7,333 of the state's 9,013 precincts reported, Kennedy compiled 97,790 write-in votes, Adlai Stevenson had 14,054, Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota had 7,298, Sen. Stuart Symington of Missouri 4,201, Nixon 3,543 and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York 26.

On the Republican side, with 7,333 of the state's 9,013 precincts reported, Nixon had 730,274 votes. Rockefeller got 2,574 write-ins.

With the exception of Symington, none of the presidential hopefuls appeared in Pennsylvania during the primary campaign. Results of the state's preference primary are not binding on delegates to the national conventions.

The only other issues creating much interest were two special congressional elections in GOP

strongholds and the question of whether 14 counties favored legalized pari-mutuel betting on harness racing.

In the 17th Congressional District election, with 284 of 377 precincts reporting, Republican Herman R. Schneebeli, a Williamsport automobile dealer, had 37,965 votes to 34,362 for attorney Dean R. Fisher, also of Williamsport. They vied for the seat left vacant by the death of Republican Rep. Alvin R. Busy of Muncy.

In the 18th District, Republican State Sen. Douglas H. Elliott, Chambersburg, won the unexpired term of the late Rep. Richard M. Simpson, Huntingdon. Republican W.H. 272 of 339 precincts reporting, Elliott had 35,849 votes to 21,483 for Robert M. Meyers, Lewisport borough councilman.

Rocketfeller appeared in Pennsylvania briefly in support of Schneebeli, his old Dartmouth College roommate.

On the issue of pari-mutuel betting, Philadelphia County led the way by approving the measure by almost a five-to-one margin. Also approving the legalized gambling referenda were Delaware, Luzerne, Bucks and Chester counties.

Rejecting it were Allegheny, Erie, Fayette, Lehigh, Monroe, Northumberland and Berks counties.

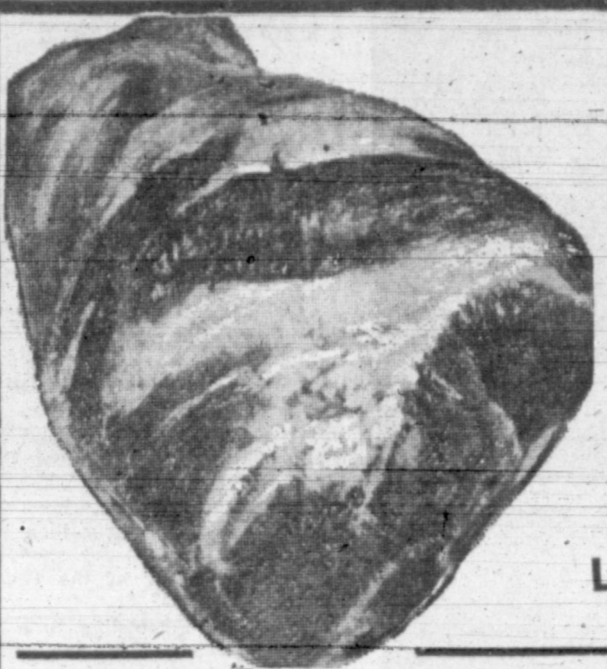
Tot Drowns In Canal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. John B. Bennett (R-Mich.) said today that House investigators have made a "pretty convincing" case that television disc jockey Dick Clark accepted payola.

Bennett, ranking Republican on the investigating subcommittee, said testimony heard in public and private so far showed the teen-age idol was involved in payola "the same as many other disc jockeys but on a much larger scale."

The subcommittee scheduled closed-door questioning today of Bernard Lowe, a song writer, music publisher, and record manufacturer, and Harry Chipetz, of the Chips Distributing Co.

Both petitioned to be heard in private under a House rule which provides for closed session when testimony may tend to defame, degrade or incriminate anyone.

Public hearings will resume Friday. The subcommittee's latest timetable calls for Clark's appearance then.

## Frisco Visit DeGaulle Ends At Stanford U.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — French President Charles de Gaulle ends his two-day visit in the San Francisco Bay area today with a tour of the Hewlett-Packard Electronics Co. and the Stanford University Medical Center at Palo Alto.

The French leader, his wife Yvonne and their party then will fly to New Orleans for the next stop of their tour of the United States.

"We (France and the United States) wish all people to have self-determination both within and without their borders," the President said.

"America and France wish all people to freely choose their destiny," he said. "This stems from the principle of liberty, equality and fraternity."

test enemy missile launchings and other activities.

A satellite interceptor and satellite inspector. It could examine objects in space to see whether they were friend or foe, and could be armed to neutralize or disarm enemy space vehicles.

As a pilotless vehicle, it could orbit the earth carrying bombs which could be dropped on command from earth stations.

It could be used as an intercontinental guided missile, which would follow a devious rather than predictable path to its target.

The Dyna Soar project is expected to result in a flying machine by about mid-1964.

The experimental version will be a winged glider, designed to resist temperatures of 2,000 degrees on reentering the atmosphere. It will be boosted into space by a Titan intercontinental ballistic missile.

The Air Force said \$29,700,000 had been released for the Boeing project, and an additional \$8,000,000 was being sought in the budget now before Congress.

### Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI)—Investment sentiment has slipped, not because the news has been bad, but because it has not been as good as anticipated, says Lucien O. Hooper of W. E. Hutton & Co.

They're talking of the "grinding sixties" instead of the "soaring sixties." Hooper points out, because now it seems you have to grind out any real earnings gains against the tide of stiff competition and surpluses.

"It is notable," he says, "that corporate executives are marking down their earlier estimates of earnings. They say business is good or fair but that the boom element is lacking."

Standard & Poor's has high regard for the stock of Duquesne Light for both income and moderate price appreciation. The issue currently yields a general 5 per cent, the statistical agency says.

On the stock market's immediate outlook, United Business Service says that while spells of temporary setbacks may occur as happened last week, the broad picture is likely to be one of irregular price recovery.

Stock Trend Service feels the stock of Thompson Ramo Wooldridge is approaching an area of heavy congestion and that lower prices are indicated for both Ford and Republic Steel.

The fortunes of the rubber industry are no longer chained to the automobile tire, according to Alexander Hamilton Institute. The industry is adding ingenious new products to its line—a neutron shield for nuclear powered ships, plastic film for flexible automobile gas tanks, and optically clear plastic canopies for supersonic aircraft. The institute says that demand for these new products has made the non-tire market the industry's best money-maker.

LOS ANGELES—Shapely actress Greta Thivsen, explaining why she shoved a traffic officer who arrested her:

"He was too close for comfort when he handed me a ticket. I thought he was going to kiss me when he bent over me."

NEW YORK—Roger M. Blough, chairman of the U.S. Steel Corp., stating that 1960 was never destined to be the boom year some people expected:

### Reuther Says Wage Less Than \$1.25 Hour Inadequate

WASHINGTON (UPI)—United Auto Workers President Walter P. Reuther today branded as "grossly inadequate" the Eisenhower administration's proposal to increase the minimum wage by 10 cents and extend its coverage to three million more workers.

Reuther urged Congress instead to approve a Democratic bill which would raise the \$1.00-an-hour floor under wages to \$1.25 and bring eight million additional workers under the law.

In a statement filed with a House labor subcommittee considering minimum wage bills, Reuther said Congress should enact the Democratic proposal "because conscience demands it and because the health of our economy requires it."

He accused the Eisenhower administration of "dragging its feet" on minimum wage legislation.

In Grand Rapids, Mich., Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.), a Democratic presidential aspirant, said the administration was conducting a "scare campaign" against a \$1.25 minimum wage. He said the administration was trying to convince the country that such a hike would cause unemployment.

Other congressional news:

Homebuilding: The House planned to open debate on a politically potent Democratic proposal to pump one billion dollars out of the Treasury to stimulate homebuilding. Supporters said the measure was needed to fight a slump in homebuilding. Republicans claimed the bill was extravagant and a windfall for some homebuilders at taxpayers' expense. The billion dollars would be used to combat high private mortgage interest rates by buying FHA and GI mortgages on lower-priced homes.

Payola: House payola investigators called in their own experts in an effort to refute a survey's finding that TV disc jockey Dick Clark picked records for his program on the basis of their popularity and not because he had a stake in many of them through his music and record company holdings. The 28-month study, which Clark ordered, showed that the teen-age idol had a financial interest in 27 per cent of the songs he played.

Drugs: The president of the Charles Pfizer Drug Co. told Senate drug price investigators that its anti-diabetic drug costs a patient no more each day than a pack of cigarettes. John E. McKean said the company made a "modest" profit of one-half cent on each pill. Chairman Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) of the investigating subcommittee has said that drug firms make excessive profits by charging too much for such medicines.

FIRST IN "SPEED" — U.S.S. CANNON AT SEA (UPI) — This guided missile cruiser scored a first in "speed" Monday when it launched a target missile that hit its target the day before it was fired.

## Racial Violence Costly To Merchants In Biloxi, Miss.

BILOXI, Miss. (UPI)—Two days of racial violence quelled by tough police action in this Gulf Coast resort city cost retail merchants as much as half their normal trade, a United Press International survey showed Wednesday.

The tourist and convention industry apparently was not hit, but one official speculated it might be crippled for the summer season if Negroes make new attempts to integrate the 28-mile public beach here. An effort by 100 Negroes to swim at the beach Sunday touched off a series of fights and shootings in which at least 14 persons were injured.

Keesler Air Force Base, with a monthly payroll of six million dollars, put the beach off limits to its 18,000 airmen and officers when fighting broke out. Bus and plane traffic dropped. There were few shoppers in the downtown area Monday and Tuesday, and most of the charter fishing boats stayed in port.

"Our business dropped 45 per cent, and the number of people in the store was off 50 per cent," the manager of one large department store said.

Another store manager said most shoppers in his establishment were men, and "there haven't been many women and children."

Hardest hit were the scores of bars in this city of 50,000 where liquor sales technically are illegal under Mississippi's statewide prohibition law. There are 200 liquor retailers in the country holding federal retail licenses despite the state law.

Police closed the bars Sunday night. Bar owners, themselves, closed voluntarily early in the evening on Monday.

There is speculation in Spain that Generalissimo Francisco Franco may be about to disclose one of his most closely guarded secrets.

That would be something about his own plans to step down and when or if a king is to return to the Spanish throne.

The speculation arises from a recent meeting between Franco and the Royal Pretender, Don Juan De Borbon. Officially unconfirmed reports from that meeting say Franco recognized the Borbon's royal claim, thus eliminating other possible claimants.

Within the Borbon family, there are two possibilities: Don Juan De Borbon, or his son, Prince Juan Carlos.

The son, under Franco's guidance, has been given the education of royalty—attendance at all three of the nation's military academies, army, navy and air.

He now is embarking on a term of civilian studies under tutors. Monarchist sources say the father allowed his son to return to Spain only upon assurance from Franco that the Borbon dynasty would be the chosen one.

Don Juan is the man on whom monarchists currently are placing their bets.

Spanish law now provides that whoever takes the Spanish throne must be more than 30 years old, a Catholic, a Spaniard and from a recognized royal family. The 47-year-old Don Juan fits the description. His son still is too young.

Monarchist sources in France and Portugal expect Franco to give a hint of his plans during a forthcoming visit to Barcelona where he is expected to make at least two important speeches.

These sources believe one of Franco's first moves will be to bring forth a law establishing the rights and powers both of a chief of state and a chief of government, roles now filled by Franco.

Francisco himself has said repeatedly that Spain is a monarchy but that he has a life-time mandate to direct Spain's destiny.

## Book Salesman's Paramour Freed Of Murder Charge

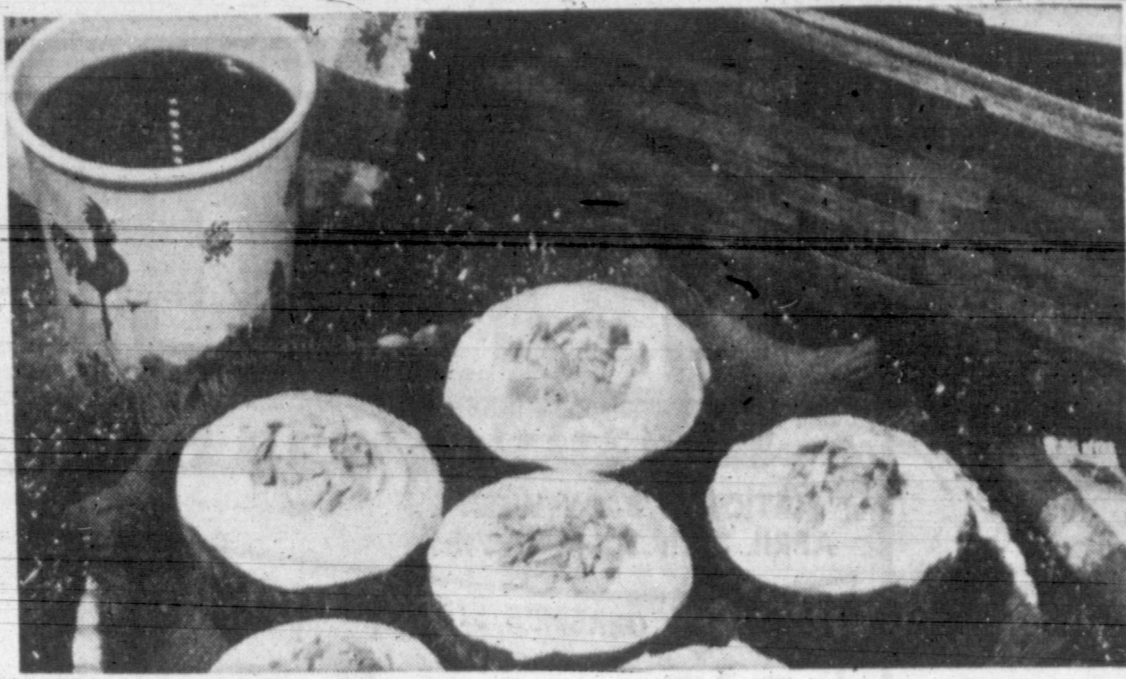

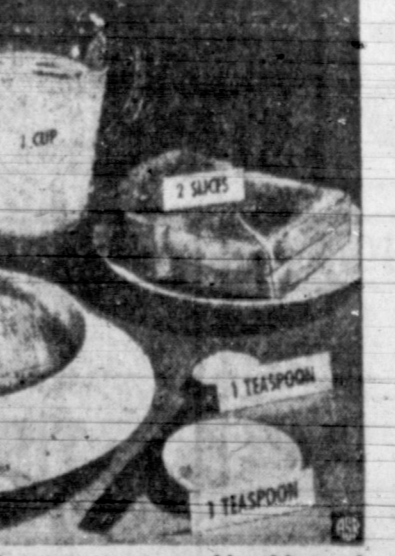

Science has demonstrated that you can eat a good breakfast and still lose weight. Research at The State University of Iowa demonstrated that skipping breakfast or eating breakfast did not make the subjects lose weight provided the day's total calories remained constant. Subjects on a weight-reduction program felt better and performed better, especially in the late morning hours, when they had an adequate breakfast.

Research at The State University of Iowa demonstrated that skipping breakfast or eating breakfast did not make the subjects lose weight provided the day's total calories remained constant. Subjects on a weight-reduction program felt better and performed better, especially in the late morning hours, when they had an adequate breakfast.

### Foster Care Becomes Permanent For Quarter Of Million American Children

UPI Women's Editor Home sweet home—with a genuine mom and pop as head of the household—is out of the grasp of an ever-growing number of children.

So says the Child Welfare League of America, which estimates there are 250,000 children in the United States now living in foster homes; that half of these will spend most of their young lives without homes of their own, and that the number of children for whom foster care is becoming a permanent way of life grows each year.

The League includes these statistics in what it says is the first comprehensive study of American youngsters in foster care.

The field foundation financed the study. Dr. Henry S. Maas, professor of social welfare at the University of California at Berkeley, and two research teams spent a year talking to social workers, interviewing judges, visiting courts, and examining laws affecting children.

The study covered the case histories of 4,231 "children in limbo"—in nine contrasting communities from coast to coast. One was a homogenous white Protestant town; another, a city torn by differences in race and religion; one community was rural; another, a bustling city of one million.

The researchers found that only two of every 10 foster children are adoptable in the eyes of the law. Only a fifth of these are adopted or returned to their parents. And if the youngster lives away from his parents for more than 18 months, the separation usually is indefinite in length.

Few of the 4,231 children studied were true orphans. More than half were what the league called "living orphans"—turned voluntarily over to social agencies by mothers or fathers because of broken homes, economic problems, illness, or psychological reasons.

Of the non-adoptables, the study found that some were too old; most adopting parents want a child under four. Or they were "different"—of Negro, Portuguese, Spanish or American Indian origin; they were "imperfect," below average in intelligence or with serious physical defects; or they were "difficult." Half of the children studied "showed signs of emotional disturbance."

The League said that although foster care "often is a necessary

### Didn't Pad Show With Own Records

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House payola investigators set out today to show that an analysis which Dick Clark had made of records played on his TV show was weighted in the disc jockey's favor.  
The statistical report indicated that Clark picked records for his program on the basis of their popularity and not because he had a stake in many of them through music and record holdings.  
The investigating subcommittee, which got mired in a bog of confusing statistics in questioning a co-author of the report Tuesday, called three of its own experts to testify today in an effort to knock down its findings.  
The subcommittee said experts would be asked their views on the report prepared by Computech, Inc., New York City.  
Bernard Goldstein, a vice president of the firm, said the 28-month study of Clark's ABC network "American Bandstand" program showed that Clark may have had a financial interest in 27 per cent of the songs played.  
However, Goldstein said, when these figures were related to record ratings prepared by Billboard and Cashbox magazines, it was apparent the playing of the Clark discs was "consistent with the popularity of these records."  
The subcommittee has been told that Clark had an interest in 17 music publishing and record companies before he got rid of them at network orders late last year. His income from these outside activities has been estimated at \$500,000 a year.  
A member of the subcommittee charged Clark was accepting payola and counsel Robert W. Lisman said the TV personality or his companies had been dishing it out, too.

The general's cold shoulder undoubtedly kept many celebrities from the April in Paris ball, but one thousand lesser lights subscribed in the vain expectation that de Gaulle would relent at the last minute.

"Who's that?" was the universal question asked by 500 males. She was half in white satin and half in the flesh. And soon her name was whispered from end to end of the gorgeously decorated ballroom to the other "Sabrina."  
It was just as well that de Gaulle stayed away. The limelight couldn't have encompassed six feet plus of him and all of Sabrina. Maybe that's why the Duchess of Windsor failed to appear, too, though her excuse was an ailing aged aunt.  
Except for the sight of Sabrina doing the cha cha cha, the April in Paris ball lacked much of the charm of its eight previous years. The ballroom was too crowded, the guest list lacked real glamor, and the dinner lacked Gallic blaise.

Indiana Grid Boss May Be Dismissed

NCAA Suspension Tough On Dickens

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (UPI) — Phil Dickens of Indiana may be the first prominent football coach to lose his job in 1960 as a result of the school's new recruiting scandal.

Dickens who sat out a year-long suspension as Hoosier football coach in 1957 for violating the recruiting code said Wednesday's action by the NCAA was a "damn, darned shame."

Dickens denied he or any of his staff was guilty of wrong doing in obtaining players despite the NCAA move and a parallel investigation into recruiting irregularities by the Big Ten.

It appeared that Dickens may become the victim of well-meaning Hoosier alumni who sought to boost Indiana into the football limelight.

Personally guilty or not, Dickens' future appeared shaky. A Big Ten regulation on recruiting puts in jeopardy the employment of a staff member guilty of violations.

It also threatens the offending school with suspension of its members or expulsion from the conference for failure to correct abuses.

The NCAA Council announced in Atlanta, Ga., that it had placed Indiana on probation for four years for violating football recruiting rules.

The action means that Indiana cannot participate in any NCAA-sanctioned television, post-season or special events during the probationary period.

The NCAA said the new infractions involved six football players. Five of the violations it said, occurred in 1958 when Indiana already was on a one-year probation as a result of similar offenses.

The sixth violation was in 1959, the NCAA said. Infractions committee chairman George H. Young of Wisconsin reported that four of the six violations involved representatives of alumni of Indiana who offered excessive aid to prospective football prospects. None of the players ever enrolled at Indiana.

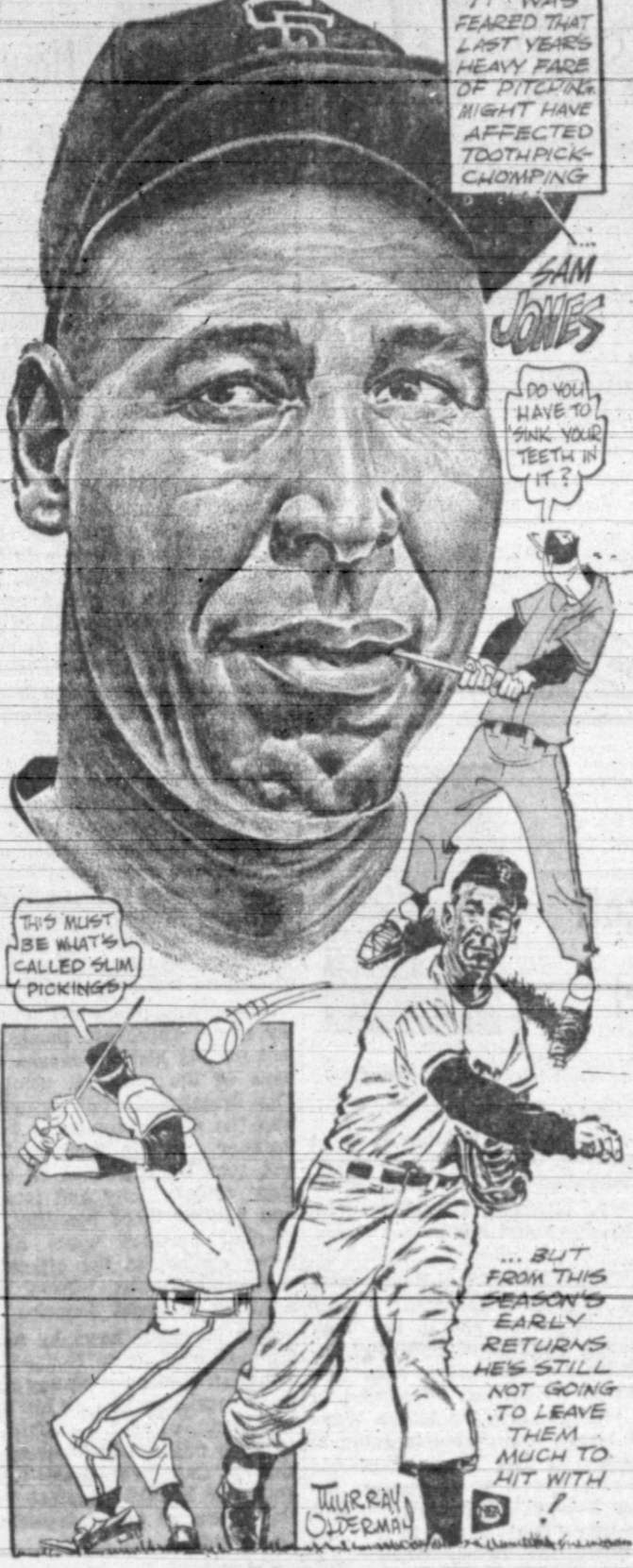
In-the-wool pointer and setter men, who thought I was running down their favorite breed. This was not the case, because there are good dogs and bad ones in every breed.

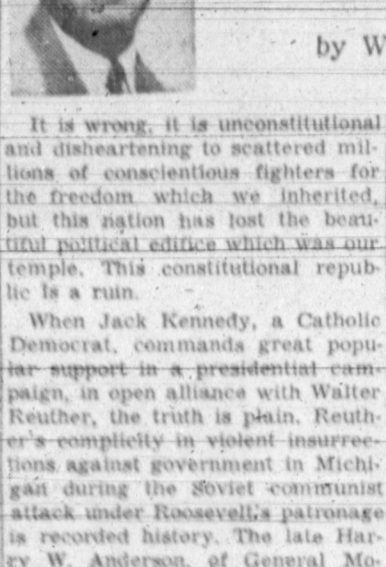

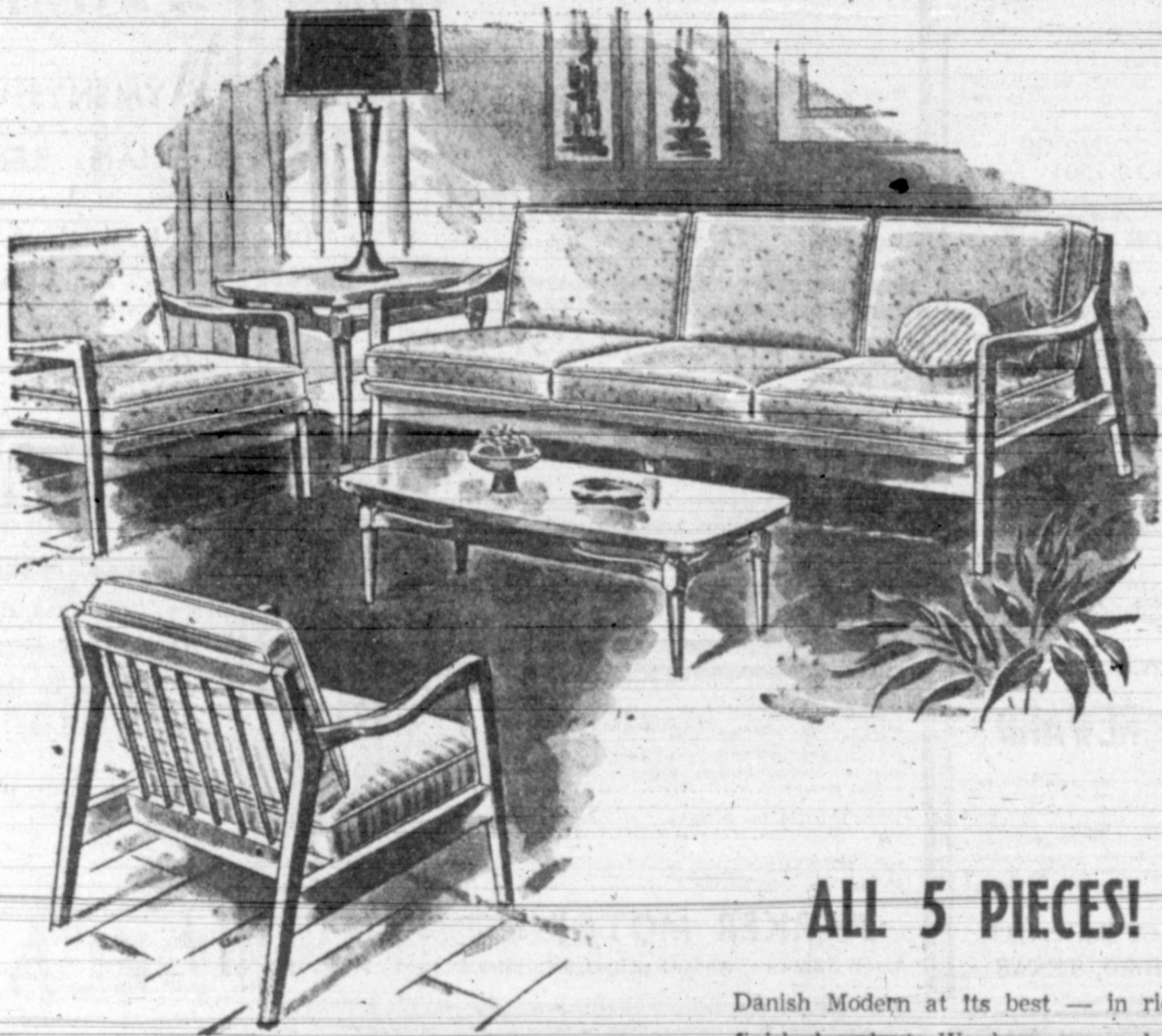

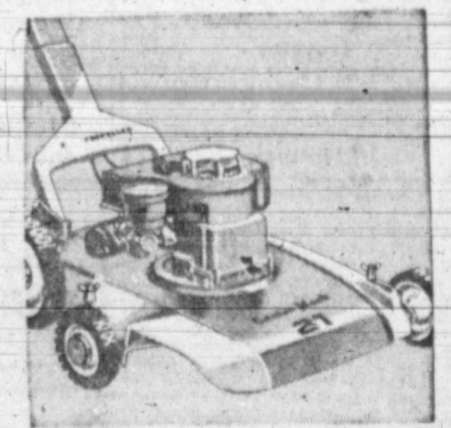
