Unity Proposal Well Received By Churchmen

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A bold proposal to unite four of the nation's largest Protestant bodies was warmly received by church leaders today.

The four-way merger, which would create an 18 million member "reformed and Catholic Church" was proposed here Sunday by the Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, stated clerk of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

It would bring together the United Presbyterian Church, the Protestant Episcopal Church, the Methodist Church, and the United Church of Christ. The latter is itself the product of a recent merger of the Congregational Christian and the Evangelical and Reformed churches.

Other Protestant denominations would be invited to join the new body once a detailed plan of union has been worked out.

Dr. Blake's surprise proposal created great excitement among the 3,000 church leaders from all parts of the nation who are assembled here for the triennial general assembly of the National Council of Churches. The national council is composed of 33 major Protestant and Orthodox denom-

nations, including the four involved in the proposed merger.

The Most Rev. Arthur H. Lichtenberger, presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church, said "this is a most important proposal and I am sure Episcopalians will study it very seriously."

The Right Rev. James A. Pike, Episcopal bishop of California, called it "the most sound and inspiring proposal for church unity in history" and said he will work vigorously for its acceptance.

Methodist Bishop John Wesley Lord, of Washington, D.C., said the plan is "worthy of deep and serious thought." He said that Methodists are interested in any move that will heal denominational divisions.

The Revs. James E. Wagner and Fred Hoskins, co-presidents of the United Church of Christ, said in a joint statement that the proposal "by its very boldness warrants the grateful consideration of us all."

They noted, however, that their church is committed to begin unity talks soon with the Disciples of Christ denomination and said it was "regrettable" that the Disciples were not included in the initial merger plans.

Major Defense Department Changes Eyed By Kennedy

Military Secretary Jobs May Be Voided

PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Sweeping changes in the American defense establishment, including abolition of the Army, Navy, and Air Force secretaries, with a possible annual savings of \$8 billion, were recommended today to President-elect John F. Kennedy.

Kennedy said the defense reorganization report made by Sen. Stuart Symington, D-Mo., was "an interesting and constructive study which I am sure will be carefully analyzed by the Congress and the incoming administration."

The recommendations resulted from a study requested by Kennedy during the recent campaign and conducted by Symington and a committee of five members, including four former officials of the Defense Department.

Principal aim of the recommendations, according to Symington, was to streamline the Defense Department to meet the needs of the nuclear space age by eliminating "the arbitrary and ridiculous division between land, sea and air."

The basic recommendations submitted to Kennedy: Elimination of the departmental structure of the Army, Navy and Air Force, although retaining the three services as separate military divisions. This would abolish the three-civilian service structure. (See MAJOR, Page 3)

29 Fatalities Noted

Highway Toll In Area Soars

Traffic deaths this year in the Pampa Highway Patrol's 8-county area to date have nearly doubled over the same period in 1959.

Sgt. E. G. Albers, highway patrol supervisor for the area, said this forenoon in Pampa that two pedestrian deaths Sunday within one hour of each other, sent the year's traffic fatality figure to 29 in the 8-county district. The figure up to this date last year was 15 traffic deaths.

The latest death came at 3:30 yesterday afternoon when Cleve Vancoster, 21, R. R. 4, Guymond, Okla., was struck and killed as

he walked along the highway four and a half miles south of Follette-F.M. Rd. 1455 in Lipscomb County. The Perryton Highway Patrol said

Vancoster was struck by a pickup truck driven by Alex Kraft. About one hour earlier another pedestrian highway death was reported near Shamrock.

Sgt. Albers said today in addition to 21 accidents in which fatalities occurred in his district there have been 22 accidents in which 15 persons were injured with property damage totalling \$25,507 so far in 1960.

The district includes Gray, Donley, Hansford, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts, Wheeler and the eastern part of Carson county.

Nativity Scenes Lighting Slated

Arrangements were being made today by the City Parks Department and the Pampa Chamber of Commerce to light the city's traditional Nativity Scenes in Central Park for the Christmas holiday season.

E. O. Wedgeworth, manager of the Pampa chamber, said the lights will be turned on at 7 o'clock Thursday night, Dec. 15.

The display is made up of seven life-sized oil paintings depicting the story of the Nativity.

The scenes, painted by Pampa artists, have been traditional for the past 12 years and each year attract hundreds of persons to Pampa during the holidays.

New Union Challenges In Mexico

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — A new union group is challenging the hitherto undisputed leadership of the powerful Confederation of Mexican Workers in this key Latin American capital.

The outcome could well be one of the most important political developments in Mexico in the past 25 years. Whether the rebel movement succeeds or not, Mexican organized labor is expected to move sharply toward complete severance of traditional government political ties.

Nucleus of the new "National Worker's Council" challenging the confederation comprises three militant nationwide unions. Their total membership is already greater than that of the confederation.

Heads of the new council presently are discussing a united front against the confederation in convention sessions here.

Their immediate objective: seizure of labor power in Mexico, a prelude to perhaps a more ambitious continent-wide program.

The leaders of the new group emphasize they are having no truck with the Communists, traditionally a power in Mexican labor. They also have taken a firm position against the close ties with government which have been held by the labor movement in recent years.

It is these latter ties which have weakened the foundation of the confederation. Rebel labor leaders have charged the confederation heads with perpetuating themselves in power by "selling out" to employers to consolidate the government political machine.

The confederation has been headed for more than 20 years by Fidel Velazquez, now serving a six-year term as a federal senator. He is expected to stand his ground against the new central's threat.

Cuba Grabs Refugees' Insurance Policies Cash

HAVANA (UPI) — The government has ordered confiscated American insurance companies to cancel life policies held by refugees from Cuba and turn over accumulated premiums to the new "recovery fund," it was reported today.

The edict, dated last Monday, also nullified the claims of insurance beneficiaries who have left the country and froze commission payments due refugee agents or brokers.

The order directed government managers of the seized companies to submit daily reports to the insurance control office on the progress of their investigation of life-policy holders.

Ailing Flier In Hiroshima Bombing Flees Hospital

WACO (UPI)—Claude R. Eatherly, 41, troubled by a guilt complex since he flew the reconnaissance plane which led the dropping of the first atomic bomb over Hiroshima, disappeared Nov. 22 from the Veterans Administration Hospital in Waco.

Dr. George T. McMahan of the VA hospital said Eatherly's presence in the hospital was voluntary, although he wasn't supposed to leave without permission.

"We can't do anything about getting him back," McMahan said. "He should not have left without permission, but his status at the hospital was that he could leave anytime. He was just supposed to report to us that he was going to do so."

McMahan said Eatherly's brother, Joe, who lives in Van Alstyne had been notified that Eatherly was gone from the hospital.

Eatherly has been in and out of the hospital since his discharge for "neurosis with psychotic manifestations." Dr. Robert P. McEl-

Ghana Expels Top Belgian Diplomat

ACCRA, Ghana (UPI) — Ghana broke off diplomatic relations with Belgium today and gave Ambassador Gerard Walravens 24 hours to get out of the country.

A spokesman said Ghana is convinced Belgium was to blame for Congo strongman Joseph Mobutu's order last month expelling Ghanaian envoy Nathaniel Welbeck and his staff from the Congo.

At the same time, the official Ghanaian Times assailed the United Nations for failing to prevent the arrest of deposed ex-Premier Patrice Lumumba by Congo troops.

N.O. Pupils Returning To Schools

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — White parents took 17 children to classes in an integrated school today and angry housewives abandoned their blockade around the building.

The smallest crowd of hecklers since integration began stood in front of William Frantz elementary school today and made little effort to stop the children from entering.

But at McDonough 19, the city's other integrated elementary school, three little Negro girls were all alone for the seventh straight day of classes. A white boycott there remained complete.

The 17 white children at Frantz—10 boys and seven girls—were in the building with Ruby Nell Bridges, a Negro 6-year-old in the first grade.

It was the highest attendance at Frantz since the third day of integration on Nov. 16, when 19 white children attended. It was nearly double last Friday's attendance of 10 whites, and the hecklers apparently lost heart.

Only about two dozen women took up their posts at the school today, and made no effort to cover every entrance. When the children began entering by side doors, only three or four of the women got excited enough to run around the block to scream at them.

The rest remained in front of the building, drinking coffee from a truck parked there with a sign saying "Free Coffee for White Mothers."

The only child to enter the building by the front door was Ruby. The women set up a loud yell from across the street, as close as police will allow them to the school.

The scene was in sharp contrast to last week, when the women roughed up parents taking their children to and from the school and stoned a car.

"Take care of her, you nurse-maids," the women screamed at federal marshals taking Ruby

Store Holdup Suspects Held In Oklahoma

Pampa police went to Cordell, Okla., today where authorities are holding two men as suspects in the \$230 armed robbery of Minit Market No. 4 here last Thursday night.

Police Chief Jim Conner said he had been notified by the Oklahoma Highway Patrol that the two men had been captured in a roadblock following a holdup in the C. R. Anthony Store at Cordell. The pair obtained \$2,500 in the Cordell robbery which was staged as employees of the store were preparing to close Saturday night.

Police Capt. Dennis Roan and Herbert Shanks, manager of the Pampa store, left this forenoon for Cordell where the men will be questioned and placed in a police line-up for possible identification by the Pampa store operator.

Bitter Fighting May Set New Congo Chaos

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—An upsurge of violence and anarchy threatened today to plunge the Congo back into the chaos that engulfed it shortly after it gained independence five months ago.

United Nations troops were trying to end a bloody battle between Congolese soldiers and civilian supporters of Patrice Lumumba in Kikwit, 250 miles southeast of Leopoldville. Reports reaching here said two days of fighting had taken 13 lives.

In Stanleyville, to the north, Mobutu now has emerged as a new local dictator and announced the big Eastern Province was "seceding." He sealed off the frontiers of the province and held 1,000 terrorized Europeans as virtual hostages.

Probers Seek Reason For Titan Blast

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (UPI)—Air Force scientists carefully gathered bits and chunks of wreckage over an area several square miles wide today to determine why a huge Titan missile exploded during fueling.

The eruption of the 97-foot intercontinental ballistic missile into a fury of sound and flame Saturday night caused an estimated \$1 million damage to a "silo" launching facility.

The missile itself, capable of hurling a three-ton atomic warhead 9,000 miles, was valued at about \$4 million. There were no injuries. No warhead was attached to the 110-ton Titan when its explosion brought residents from as far as 25 miles running out into the night to look and wonder at the brilliant orange glow in the sky above this Pacific missile range about 180 miles north of Los Angeles.

Table Decorations For Christmas Easily Made



This versatile flower centerpiece of ivy, spider mums and artificial gilded fruit is a charming addition to the buffet table. With a few quick changes, it can be converted to a low centerpiece for the dinner table.

Newspaper Enterprise Assn. A "convertible" flower arrangement is exactly what I want in order to save time and money during the Christmas social whirl. Perhaps you join me in loving the great charm of fresh flower centerpieces and arrangements. But it's an expensive taste in winter. An, with a crowded holiday schedule of family dinner, buffet suppers and a guild tea, there is little or no time to create a noteworthy centerpiece.

The idea for a "convertible" arrangement is the outgrowth of a conversation I had with another flower lover who has professional connections with an association of Florida Flower growers. One of the "top students in the association's design classes came up with the lovely arrangement pictured with this article.

The basic arrangement can be made now and will last through the holidays. It consists of a permanent greenery foundation set in "oasis" (a foam material purchasable at florists) and placed in a good-sized bowl (8 to 10 inches in diameter). Flowers, artificial fruit, even fake butterflies or birds can be added or subtracted as needed for the occasion.

Here are the specifics for duplicating this arrangement: select a block of oasis to fit the bowl (the dense material is light and porous enough to be cut easily). Cut a hole in the center of the block, place block in your container. I

Arrange the tendrils in graceful lines over the rim of the bowl. The oasis must be kept damp but it holds water for a long time. For this buffet table arrangement, I chose white Florida spider mums and gilded artificial fruit. The tallest central spider mum is placed first by simply inserting the stem gently and firmly into the oasis. Next, place two low flowers on the far left and right. The overall triangular design is then filled in.

The gilded fruit is simply light artificial fruit from the five and dime store which has been sprayed gold. Small wooden pick (also purchasable at florists and garden shops) about four inches long are pushed into the fruit on one end and into the oasis on the other.

For a quick conversion to a table centerpiece, lower and more compact, you'd remove the fruit and the taller of the large spider mums. Or substitute smaller button pompons in any color to complement the table. Other small flowers might be substituted, arranged in a low semicircle or rounded in the center of the bowl with the ivy circling them like a collar. Tiny fake butterflies on picks might be added among the flowers for a naturalistic effect or little birds perched on the rim of the bowl.

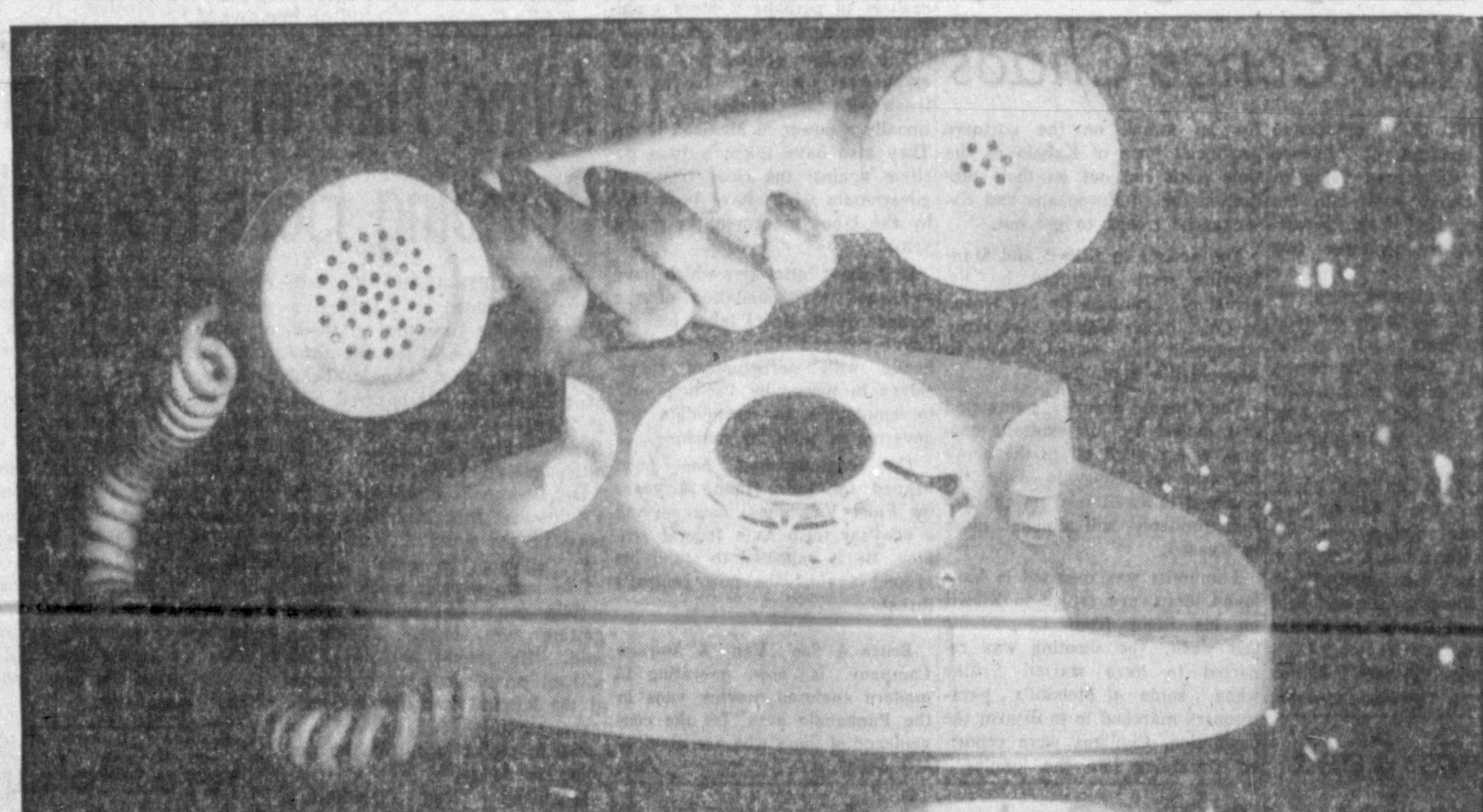

Roads Building Corruption Is Held Evident

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A House investigator charged today that there were signs of widespread corruption, graft and incompetence in the nation's highway construction program.

Chairman John A. Blatnik, D-Minn., of a House investigating subcommittee told United Press International it was beginning to appear the giant, federally subsidized road system now being built might be riddled with mismanagement and graft.

"It seems that almost every time we punch through the crust," he declared, "we find the pudding of either corruption or mismanagement."

Blatnik's group called several witnesses from Florida today to explain why officials in that state allegedly received "cash and other things of value" from contractors hired to build highways.

Cold Front Due To Hit Panhandle

A Canadian cold front was poised to strike the Panhandle today as a weak Pacific cold front moved slowly eastward and southward across the state bringing cloudy skies and rain showers.

Light rain fell today in the east portion of Northeast Texas, southward to the coast. There was not much change in temperature behind the Pacific front.

Light, misty rain fell on most of East, Central and South Texas Sunday. More showers were forecast for most sections today.

The Weather Bureau said the strong mass of Arctic air would make itself felt in the Panhandle late today and spread across Texas as Tuesday. The swift-moving Canadian front will drop readings as low as 18 in the Panhandle, forecasters said.

The Pacific front dropped temperatures into the high 20s overnight in the Panhandle. Dalhart recorded a pre-dawn reading of 29 degrees for the state low. Corpus Christi had the high, a balmy 70.

The weak front sprawled along a line from north of Fort Worth southwestward through Mineral Wells to San Angelo and southward into the Rio Grande Valley. Sunday Amarillo received 22 of an inch of rain. Childress .03, Dalhart .39, Dallas .01, El Paso .06, Fort Worth .03, Mineral Wells .27, San Antonio .03, Waco .04 and Wichita Falls .20.

The five-day forecast indicated temperatures below normal throughout the state for the first part of the week. A slow warming trend was expected the latter part of the week.

Pedestrian Killed Near Shamrock

SHAMROCK (Spl) — Clarence E. Hilburn, 58, was killed yesterday afternoon when hit by a car as he and his wife were walking along Highway 66 east of Shamrock.

State Violence Deaths On Weekend Reach 16

Highway smashups, drownings, fatal stabbings and shootings took their usual heavy death toll across the state over the weekend.

A survey by United Press International for the period beginning at 6 p.m. Friday and ending at 6 a.m. today showed 16 persons died violently in Texas for the two-day period—with highway crashes accounting for nine deaths.

Two men were killed near Clawson, Tex., in Angelina County Saturday when their pickup truck was hit by a freight train at a crossing. They were Emmett A. Thomas, 43, of Dickinson, Tex., and Darryll F. Starling, 25, of Lufkin.

Other traffic deaths included Pvt. Anthony R. Michalski of Milwaukee, Wis., who was killed in a one-car crash at Florence, Tex. Stephen P. Scherer, 34, of Houston, was killed when his bicycle was struck by a car at Houston.

Mrs. Ethel C. Allen, 55, of Benbrook, a Fort Worth suburb, was killed Saturday when she was hit by a par as she stepped off a bus near her home.

Grover Murdock, 74, of Natalia, Tex., died a few hours after his car was hit by a train north of Natalia Sunday. He died in a San Antonio hospital despite an emergency operation in which doctors opened his chest and massaged his heart.

Severo Cruz, 1, of San Benito, Tex., was killed when a car overturned at a highway intersection near San Benito Saturday.

Mrs. Mildred Furgus, 48, of Big Spring, was killed Sunday when a pickup truck in which she was riding collided with an automobile two miles north of Big Spring on SH-350.

Andrew Charles Schaeffer, 6, the son of Mrs. Mary Schaeffer of Harlingen, drowned in the swimming pool of a hotel near his home Sunday.

James E. Bryant, 32, of Wickett, Tex., drowned in the Rio Grande below Presidio Friday night.

Thomas Leroy Corley, 16, of Irving, was shot to death in a hunting accident eight miles east of Centerville Saturday.

They made their getaway in a stolen pickup truck. New Mexico police officials say the same pair stayed overnight in the jail at Santa Rosa, N.M. They listed their hometown as Anderson, Ind.

City Man Fined On Beer Count

The government has declined comment so far on the U.S. charge that Castroites supplied money and arms to Communist-led student rioters who sought to overthrow President Romulo Betancourt.

Commission Meeting To Be Routine

The City Manager said commission members may also discuss further the city's proposed contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. Authorization to enter into the contract was given at last week's commission meeting.

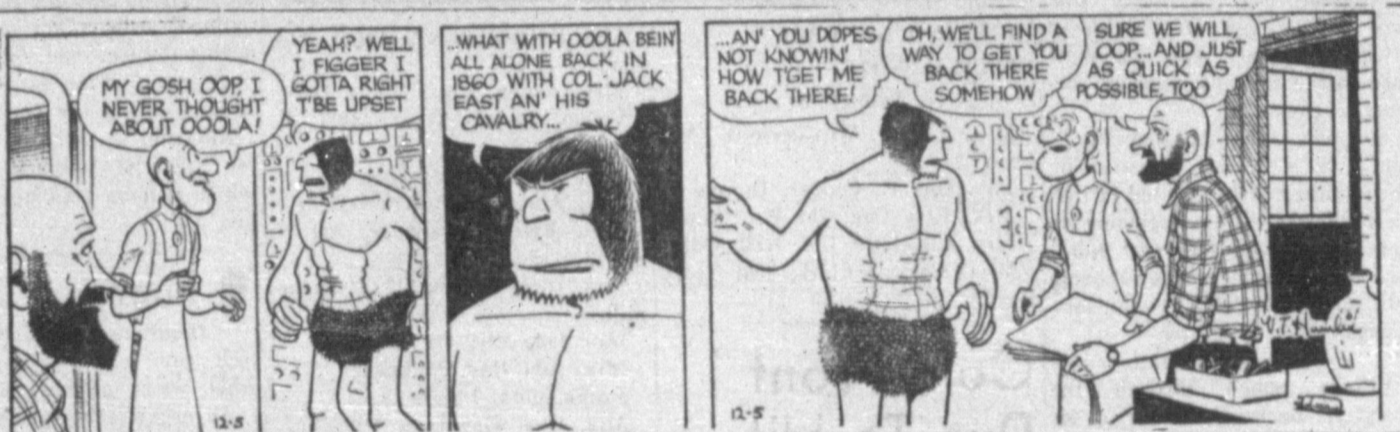

Unbeaten SWC Cagers To Host Ranked Teams

Some of the nation's better basketball teams show up on this week's 20-game Southwest Conference cage schedule, which offers action every night in the week.

As a result, the loop's group of five undefeated teams may be considerably trimmed by this time next week with such teams as Kansas, Oklahoma City, Houston, Oklahoma State, Memphis State, Utah, Florida, Georgia Tech, Vanderbilt, Mississippi, Tulane and Wyoming furnishing the opposition.

Pott Putts Past Snead In Tourney

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — Golf's old guard had its notice today from Johnny Pott and company that the old gray game ain't what it used to be.

Pott, a 25-year-old from Shreveport, La., came sailing out of nowhere with a final round four-under 68 to make up three shots on Sammy Snead and snatch the West Palm Beach Open from the Slammer.

And 23-year-old Bobby Nichols of Midland, Tex., hung on gamely for fourth money ahead of a lot of the old heroes — including leading money winner Arnold Palmer, who finished in a fifth place tie.

Pott was three shots back of Snead as they started the final round Sunday but it was Snead who "took the pipe." The Slammer, seeking his 10th tournament victory, faded to a 35-39-74. Playing right in front of him, Pott whacked out a 23-36-65 for a winning 10 under par 278 which wound up three strokes better than Snead's second place total.

Art Wall, the former Masters champion from Pocono Manor, Pa., shot a final round 70 to finish third at 282 and while Nichols soared to a 75 the former Southwest Conference golf champion took fourth money with a 287.

Palmer finished in a fifth place tie at 288 with Ted Kroil and Wes Ellis but his final round 76 netted him \$816 and ran his all-time one-year money winning record to \$74,532.

A horde of the "name" players trailed the tall, handsome Pott, whose only previous victory was the Dallas Open in September.

Spotlight On Denver City

Grid Playoffs Shift Into Semifinal Round

Texas' schoolboy football playoffs move into the semifinals this week end with the spotlight on a match between a pair of perfect record Class AA powers.

The two Class AA teams are among the five undefeated — untied squads left of the 16 playoff survivors. The AA match is the only game pitting perfect record teams this week end.

That one will be played at Snyder Saturday night when Denver City's Mustangs, averaging better than a point a minute in 13 straight victories, meet season-long AA favorite Olney. The Cubs have piled up 13 straight triumphs with a 38.6-point average to 50.2 for Denver City.

This tremendous clash overshadowed the rest of the semifinal slate that includes:

AAAA — Wichita Falls (12-0), vs. Fort Worth Paschal (9-3) and Fort Arthur (11-1) vs. Corpus Christi Miller (11-1).

AAA — Brownwood (11-1) vs. Jacksonville (11-0-1) and Cleburne (9-2-1) vs. Port Lavaca (11-1).

AA — Bellville (12-0) vs. Devine (12-1).

A — Stinnett (13-0) vs. Albany (12-1) and White Oak (12-0-1) vs. Crosby (9-4).

It appears Wichita Falls, Miller, Brownwood, Port Lavaca, Denver City, Bellville, Stinnett and White Oak will be the finalists — but the oddsmakers may differ on some of them and make Port Ar-

thur, Jacksonville and Olney the favorites.

None of the AAA semifinals encountered too much difficulty clearing the quarterfinals. Wichita Falls pulverized Ysleta 51-0, Paschal defeated Lufkin 28-0, Port Arthur beat Houston Bellaire 27-15 and Miller stopped San Antonio Jefferson 26-6.

Both AAA's top-rated Jacksonville and Cleburne, one of 1959's AAA co-champs, had scares. Jacksonville beat Greenville 13-6, while Cleburne had to use a 3-1 penetration edge to get by La Marque after they battled to a 6-6 deadlock.

Brownwood upset previously undefeated — untied Monahan's 37-16, while Port Lavaca breezed to a 49-14 triumph over substitute Seguin, which had slipped back into the playoffs after losing its bid-district game to a San Antonio Sam Houston outfit that later was suspended for misconduct involving an official.

Olney blasted Gilmer 41-6, Denver City shut out Anson 43-0 and Bellville crushed previously perfect record Gatesville 41-8 to move up with ease in AA, but Devine had a tough time getting by Sweeney 23-12.

Stinnett's poisonous Rattlers, rated like Olney as a title choice since last summer, slaughtered Plains 57-8, while Albany put out Mount Vernon 28-6, White Oak beat Clifton 21-6 and Crosby sprang its second upset of the playoffs by whipping previously undefeated — untied George West 30-14.

Arkansas, Texas Christian, Texas and Texas Tech all opened on a victory note last week, while Baylor is unscratched because it didn't play. Texas A&M and Rice, the only teams to play two games, broke even and Southern Methodist lost its only start.

The top attraction will be at Lubbock tonight when Texas Tech, which got a combined 60 points from Harold Judgens and Del Ray Mounts in a 92-78 defeat of Hamline, takes on highly-regarded Kansas. Tech also becomes the third team to meet Florida during the week when the Raiders play the Gators at Gainesville, Fla. Saturday night.

Florida meets Rice at Houston tonight and invades Dallas against SMU Tuesday night.

Rice also plays Louisiana State at Baton Rouge Saturday.

Oklahoma City, which beat SMU 84-78 last week, plays TCU at Fort Worth tonight and hops to Austin against Texas Wednesday night. TCU also plays Utah at Salt Lake City Saturday, while Texas has a date tonight at Austin with Trinity and one with Tulane in New Orleans Saturday night.

The Texas Aggies play a pair at home—against Houston Tuesday and Centenary Friday, while Arkansas plays Oklahoma State at Stillwater Tuesday, North Texas at Fayetteville Thursday and Mississippi at neutral Blytheville, Ark. Saturday.

SMU, after meeting Florida Tuesday, hits the road against High-ranking Georgia Tech at Atlanta Friday and Vanderbilt at Nashville Saturday.

Baylor catches Memphis State Tuesday for its home opener, then flies west to meet Utah at Salt Lake City Friday and Wyoming at Laramie Saturday.

In other action last week, Texas A&M beat Trinity 66-48 but lost to Kansas State 69-64; Rice lost to Lamar Tech 65-53 but beat Trinity 71-67; Arkansas upset Missouri 84-75, TCU beat Austin College 95-63 and Texas whipped Howard Payne 77-54.

The top scoring performance last week was turned in by SMU's Steve Strange, who pumped in 33 points against Oklahoma City. Hudgens got 31 and Mounts 29 against Hamline.

Medinger confirmed that the group had discussed "ways and means" for the planned AL invasion of Los Angeles. However, the Cleveland official said that Frick had not advised him specifically what amendments to baseball's rules for expansion will be presented to the major league meeting.

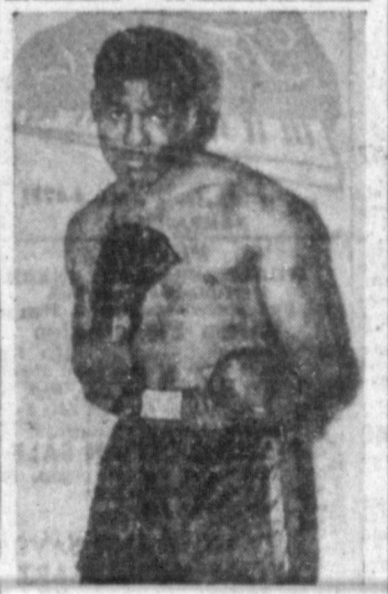

The Philadelphia Eagles, inspired by the "quiet man" and led by the "fidgety one," celebrated their first National Football League Eastern Division title in 11 years today, but it's

With Norm Van Brocklin, the "fidgety one," taking advantage of every opportunity, and Coach Buck Shaw, the "quiet man," telling them they could do it, the

Eagles defeated the pesky St. Louis Cardinals, 20-6, Sunday for their ninth straight victory that nailed down the Eastern Division title.

Van Brocklin, who admits just how nervous in the minutes just before the start of a game (as he's a veteran of 12 pro seasons) threw touchdown passes of 22 and 25 yards to Pete Retzlaff and Tommy McDonald and Bob Walston kicked a pair of field goals for all the Philadelphia points that assured the Eagles of a title berth for the first time since 1949—when they also won the NFL championship by beating the Los Angeles Rams.

Meanwhile, in the Western Division, the Detroit Lions defeated the defending champion Baltimore Colts, 20-15, the Green Bay Packers walloped the Chicago Bears, 41-13, and the San Francisco Forty Niners beat the Los Angeles Rams, 23-7, to create a three-way first-place tie between the Packers, Colts and Forty Niners.

All three clubs have identical 6-4 won-lost records and each has two games left to play. And add further to the logjam, the Bears, with a 5-4-1 mark, as only a half-game away and the Lions, at 5-5, are one game behind.

Business Sag Seen Next Year

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The U.S. Chamber of Commerce has forecast a mild business slump in the first six months of 1961, with higher unemployment becoming a "troublesome" factor during the year. Emerson P. Schmidt, chief economist for the business organization, said Sunday that the downturn would be "only 1 or 2 per cent" in total output of goods and services. Spending income of individuals will "decline even less," he predicted. But he said "unemployment is likely to average higher than in 1960 and be troublesome."

Ike Accepts Blue-Eyed White Tiger

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower was to accept today a blue-eyed white tiger from India—the first and possibly the last of the rare breed to be brought to this hemisphere. The tiger, a gift to the nation's children and the National Zoological Park, was being presented to Eisenhower on the White House lawn. Although described as friendly, the black-striped female was kept securely caged. The tiger was obtained from the Maharaja of Rewa by John Kluge, president and board chairman of the Metropolitan Broadcasting Corp. The maharaja is reported to have a corner on the white tiger market. He has six of them left and figures them worth \$10,000 or more each.
