Obviously the first thing to be done by the victim of any respiratory disorder is to avoid further insult to the breathing apparatus.

This may mean discontinuance of the use of tobacco, removal to a lower altitude, avoidance of localities where smog is known to accumulate, retirement from work that involves further exposure to the inhalation of dust particles or irritant fumes, masking during unavoidable exposure to the inhalation of irritants and transfer from a heavy job to one of a sedentary nature if respiratory income has been reduced by emphysema or some other type of permament lung damage. If these preventive measures 'fail to give relief, a complete

examination by a highly skilled physician, is next in order. Just as you'd expect a mechanic, looking for motor trouble, to do more than simply lift the hood of your car so you must be. prepared for your chosen doctor. to supplement his phycial examination with tests of blood and sputum, X-ray films and maybe a direct look down your bronchi by a specialist trained in the technique of this delicate procedure. And don't, I beg of you, com-
