'Moral Behavior' Topic For Speaker At Hopkins PTA Meet On Thursday

"Moral Behavior" was the subject Reverend David Mills of the Lamar Christian Church discussed at the Hopkins PTA meeting held Thursday evening. He defined "Moral Behavior" by saying, "Moral is a form of behavior." He went on to say that the dictionary meaning of moral is pertaining to or concerned with right conduct. He said there were two theories of moral law. "One theory is that we do something because there is a good to be attained within itself. After you have done the act, you feel good. The second theory is that we do something because we have been commanded to do it. This is a life of strict discipline. The reason our moral fiber of the nation is being broken down is because some people live by moral law number two alone," expressed Reverend Mills.
"Actually," Reverend Mills went on to say, "both the theories need to be taught to our young people. We shouldn't teach one theory or the other by themselves. The failures in our churches, homes, and schools to teach the necessary standards to guide our children is the reason they do not have the foundation to decide for themselves the difference in right and wrong."
"There are four things on which the foundation for a good moral behavior is built," Reverend Mills said. "They are respect for authority, respect for law, respect for others, and self respect or self reliance."
In closing Reverend Mills told the audience, "When we realize the basic importance of these standards, we will begin to make our children know 'Moral Behavior.'"

A kind of hopeless inertia settles over us so that we can no longer vividly feel a wish to take a vacation, to buy a frivolous hat to reappear the dining room. We notice the efficient new car on display in our neighbor's kitchen and admire our sister-in-law's new fall coat—but the idea that these desirable things could be possessed by us never occurs to us.
Our childhood's reproaches for asking have done their crippling work. We have lost the ability to want.

Casualty List Climbs to 20 Over Weekend

United Press International deadly automobile accidents killed nine persons, swelled weekend Texas violent death toll 20 late Sunday.

United Press International for the period from 6 p.m. to midnight Sunday showed that of the 20 violent deaths in state, 14 came in automobile accidents.

The latest accident occurred at midnight Sunday when a cycle driven by Jimmy Ray, 24, of Dallas slammed into rear of a car on the Dallas-Worth turnpike, killing Ray.

Of those came in a two-car crash about midnight Friday near Beck. Killed were Mr. and Clyde A. McCool of Sherman, one car and Earl David, 20, Mary Lou Sanders, 15, Williamson, 14, and Carl Ray, 15 all of Groesbeck, in other vehicle.

Head-on collision in LaPorte, Houston, late Sunday killed persons and sent five others to hospital. Dead were Mr. Mrs. Rudolph Oursor and 11-year-old Jimmy Elliott, all of Baytown.

Two three-year-old boys were killed in separate accidents in the state. Ronnie Wolfe died when he was hit by a car on Highway 199 just west of Fort Worth Sunday, and Sean Moore died Sunday when he was crushed against a stone wall at his home when the hand brake in a parked car slipped.

Mrs. Josepina Aranda, 66, El Paso, was killed when she was struck by a car on U.S. Highway 80 near El Paso Friday night and Francisco Frausto, 33, of Yancy, Tex., was killed in an accident near Pearsall Saturday.

James Earl Marsh, 20, of Houston died Friday night of burns suffered in an oil well fire Nov. 6. Woodrow Wilson, 17, of Bryan, was stabbed to death in Bryan Saturday night; Ruben Trejo, 22, of El Paso, was killed when he was shot in a gang fight in the border city Saturday.

Benhet Benidick, 45, of El Paso, was killed Friday night in a family argument, and T. L. Adams died Saturday when his light plane crashed on a ranch near Van Horn.

Mrs. Oscar May Wetsel, 56, wife of Joe Wetsel, former county commissioner and deputy sheriff of Fisher County died of multiple gunshot wounds early Sunday at a hospital in Roby. Wetsel, a stock farmer gave no details to officers before being hospitalized for shock.

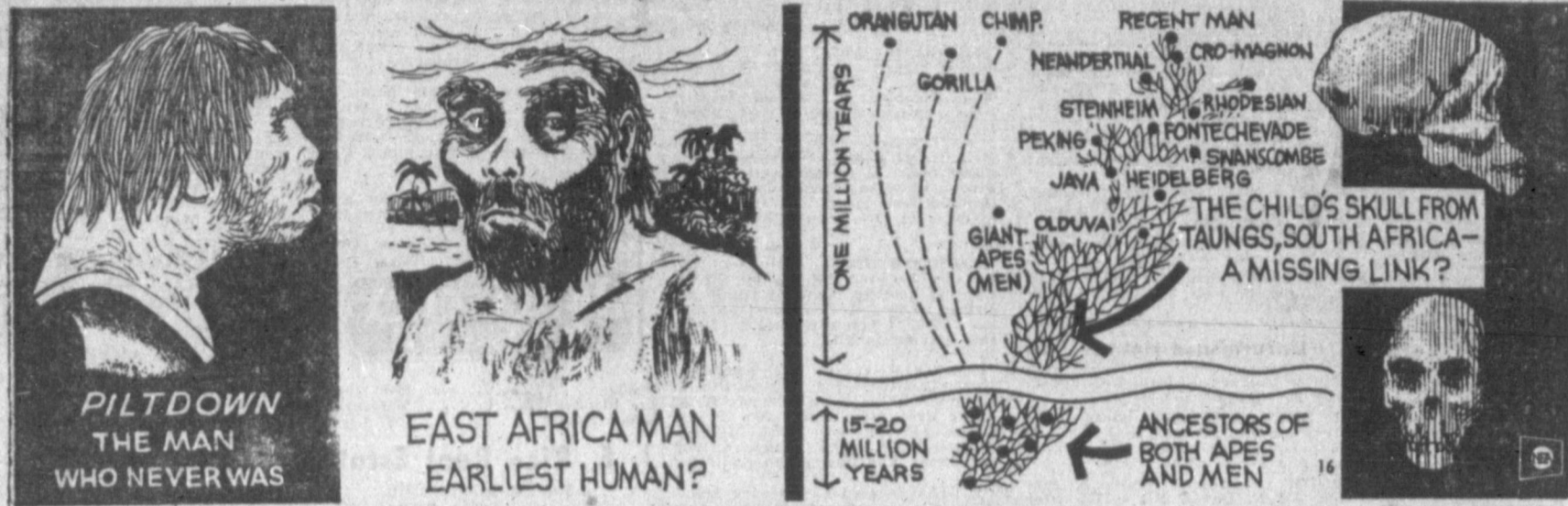

PILTDOWN THE MAN WHO NEVER WAS. Modern techniques have cleared up at least one mystery in the human story. This was the notorious Piltdown man, found in England in 1911 by an amateur geologist, Charles Dawson.

EAST AFRICA MAN EARLIEST HUMAN? The result, which everyone was relieved to hear, was that the skull was indeed pretty old—about 50,000 years—but just an ordinary Homo sapiens. The jaw, however, was that of a modern chimpanzee that had been expertly doctored to look like a fossil.

L. S. B. Leakey, a British archeologist, unearthed a skull which he believes represents "the remains of the earliest human ever found." Leakey dates his toolmaking Zinjanthropus (East Africa man) as having lived 600,000 years ago, which places him far back on the family tree of man.

Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI)—On the record of past elections, last week's polling probably was cooked in spots. Your vote may have been stolen. If you have been voting long it is not unlikely that your vote has been stolen before this.

The National Municipal Review (NMR) reported four years ago an Honest Ballot Association (HBA) estimate that at least one million votes were stolen in the 1952 election.

HBA chief investigator George Abrams then warned: "Election frauds are increasing. Nearly every area in the United States — big city, small town, cracker-barrel village — has some type of election fraud. It may be in a national election or one involving local school boards, judges or highways."

Samuel H. Still, an election investigator for Congress, said in a 1958 NMR report on election scandals that: "Approximately 50 public figures who occupy high state and municipal offices today would not have won them had the election been carried out according to law."

Abrams and HBA fingered the 1958 election of Franklin D. Roosevelt to be governor of New York, citing "the famous slow count." FDR beat Republican Albert Ottinger.

"Democratic boss 'Ed Flynn's cronies," said Abrams, "sat quietly in the Bronx counting ballots at a snail's pace until 2 a.m., when the traditionally Republican upstate returns showed Ottinger's exact margin."
