Trustees Discuss Paving

Make On Spot Tour Of School

The Pampa School Board and: City Manager John Koontz today made an on-the-spot investigation of the pressing drainage problem n the area about Lamar Elenentary School at McCullough and Nelson streets.

Koontz presented a plan for construction of curb, guttering and sidewalks on the two streets to essen the problems posed pupils n adverse weather. Following his suggestions Superintendent Knox Kinard asked if it wouldn't be a good idea for the entire panel to visit the site to further investigate the problem which has created a rash of telephone calls to the city manager's office and to that of Kinard from irate parents who noted that children had to walk through water and mud in rainy: weather to reach the school from points where they are unloaded from school buses and from pri-

The estimated cost for the project, as compiled by city Engineer Monroe Moore, would be \$4,597.90. Broken down the cost would be: \$1,352.71; 39.11 feet concrete valley at 52 cents a foot, \$20.34; 6,013.8 square feet of four-inch sidewalk, six-feet wide to adjoin curb, \$3,-006.90. A five per cent contingency totaling \$218.95 was included.

Earth, Stars and Man (16) A Hoax and a Hope




Modern techniques have cleared up at least one mystery in the human story. This was the notorious Piltdown man, found in England in 1911 by an amateur geologist, Charles Dawson. A modern-type human skull together with a chimpanzeelike jaw were recovered from a gravel bed at Pilt Down.

Try as they might, scientists could not reconcile the two. It was contrary to everything evolution was based on. The strange thing was given an impressive name, Eoanthropus dawsoni-Dawson's Dawn Man. Dr. J. H. McGregor of Columbia University included him in his famous series of busts of fossil men, and anthropologists tried, vainly, to forget about him. In 1949, Kenneth P. Oakley of the British Museum, who had been perfecting the fluorine dating method, tested the bone fragments. By measuring the amount of fluorine they had absorbed from the soil, he could tell if they were the same age.

The result, which everyone was relieved to hear, was that the skull was indeed pretty oldabout 50,000 years-but just an ordinary Homo sapiens. The jaw, however, was that of a modern chimpanzee that had been expertly doctored to look like a fossil. Someone, no one knows who or why, had pulled a clever hoax.

One of the most recent finds has been made at the Olduvai Gorge in East Africa, site of fossil digging since the early part of the century. In 1959, after a 30 years' search, Dr. by Don Oakley and John Lane



L. S. B. Leakey, a British archeologist, unearthed a skull which he believes represents "the remains of the earliest human ever found."

Leakey dates his toolmaking Zinjanthropus (East Africa man) as having lived 600,000 years ago, which places him far back on the family tree of man. That tree contains numerous strange names, representing fragments of human fossils that have been found in scattered parts of the world during the past century.

It was also from Africa, in the 1920s, that word came that something very like the "missing link" had been found. The story of this, possibly, most ancient ape man of all and of his fight for recognition deserves a chapter of its NEXT: Ape Men or Man Apes?

Five Oil Locations Discovered

AUSTIN (UPI)-Five oil discoveries were made in as many regions of Texas last week, according to the State Railroad Com-

The finds were made with wildcat wells drilled in the Refugio, Palestine, Kilgore, Wichita Falls and Pampa districts. A lone gas discovery was reported in the Abilene district, and there were 41

A total of 113 oil and 16 gas wells were completed during the week, and another 245 regular drilling applications received by the commission.

So far in 1960 there have been 8,516 oil and 1,751 gas well completions. That compares with respective total of 10,045 and 1,629 for the same period last year. representing a large drop in o wells and a slight gain in gas completions.

A net increase of 74 wells brought the number of active rigs in the state to 197,151. Average Channel 4 calendar day allowable increased 6.835 barrels to a total of 2.688-


