

Four Constitutional Amendments On Texas Ballot

Texans will be called upon to decide the fate of four constitutional amendments, including three with roots deep in state controversy, in addition to the personality and party preference choices on the general election ballot Tuesday.

All of the amendments involve money, and at least one raises fundamental questions about the amendment route for changes in law.

Here is the list of amendments

in the order in which they will appear on the ballot:

No. 1 — "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a hospital district co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo counties, and co-extensive with county commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche county."

In laymen's language: This would create hospital districts in those counties, enabling each to charge a property tax to finance operations.

No. 2 — "The amendment to section 49-B of Article III of the Con-

stitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half per cent per annum."

In short: This would enable the Veterans' Land Board to increase the interest it offers bond purchasers to 3 1/2 per cent, so it can compete better in the bond market and clear some bonds already authorized by the Legislature to run the land program.

No. 3 — "The constitutional

amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed four thousand, eight hundred dollars per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed twelve dollars per day for the first one hundred and twenty days only of each session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for members of the Legislature and limiting the regular session to one hundred and forty days."

In short: A substantial pay raise for lawmakers.

No. 4 — "The constitutional amendment giving the Legislature

authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of 10 per cent per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

In short: The "loan shark" amendment to allow higher interest on loans and to encourage setting up a licensing system for the state to keep tighter reins on usury.

The first of the four amendments is, superficially, a matter

affecting only Comanche, Lamar, and Hidalgo counties, who ask to be able to charge 7 1/2, 7 1/2, and 10 cents per \$100, respectively, in property valuation taxes to support the hospitals.

However, opponents say it is costly and ridiculous to submit hospital districts to a statewide vote. Proponents, other than those connected directly with the hospital needs in each county, say the special district system opens new sources of revenue and avoids changing local government jobs drastically.

The second amendment may hold the key to the veterans' land program in Texas. Opponents would vote down the amendment so that the land board would have to apply income to retiring bonds already outstanding. Backers want the higher interest so the board can continue the program in a stronger position in the competition to find buyers for bonds. Proponents say a tight money market is keeping buyers away from the bonds, which offer only a 3 per cent interest under contract.

All Over But Voting And Shouting

Vote Could Swing To Either Side

Polls Indicate Kennedy Leads

Sen. John F. Kennedy led the presidential polls on election eve but the experts agreed today that the race was so close the actual balloting could go either way.

A total of 269 electoral votes is needed for election and a compilation of the election outlooks published by Time magazine, Newsweek, U. S. News & World Report and statewide polls in many states gave Kennedy 21 states with 268 votes, one shy of the magic number.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon was credited with 20 states with 143 electoral votes.

Nine states with 126 votes were undecided in the consensus. They were California, Hawaii, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland, Minnesota, North Carolina, Tennessee and Washington.

Two nationwide surveys have been made in addition to these polls. George Gallup's American Institute of Public Opinion reported voters leaning toward Kennedy by a slight margin. The Elmer Roper poll rated the presidential race undecided in its latest tabulations Oct. 25. Roper's final polls is to be announced tonight.

Roper's figures on Oct. 25 gave Nixon 46 per cent, Kennedy 44.5 per cent and 9.5 per cent undecided. Roper said the undecided percentage was twice as high as it had ever been at that stage of a presidential campaign.

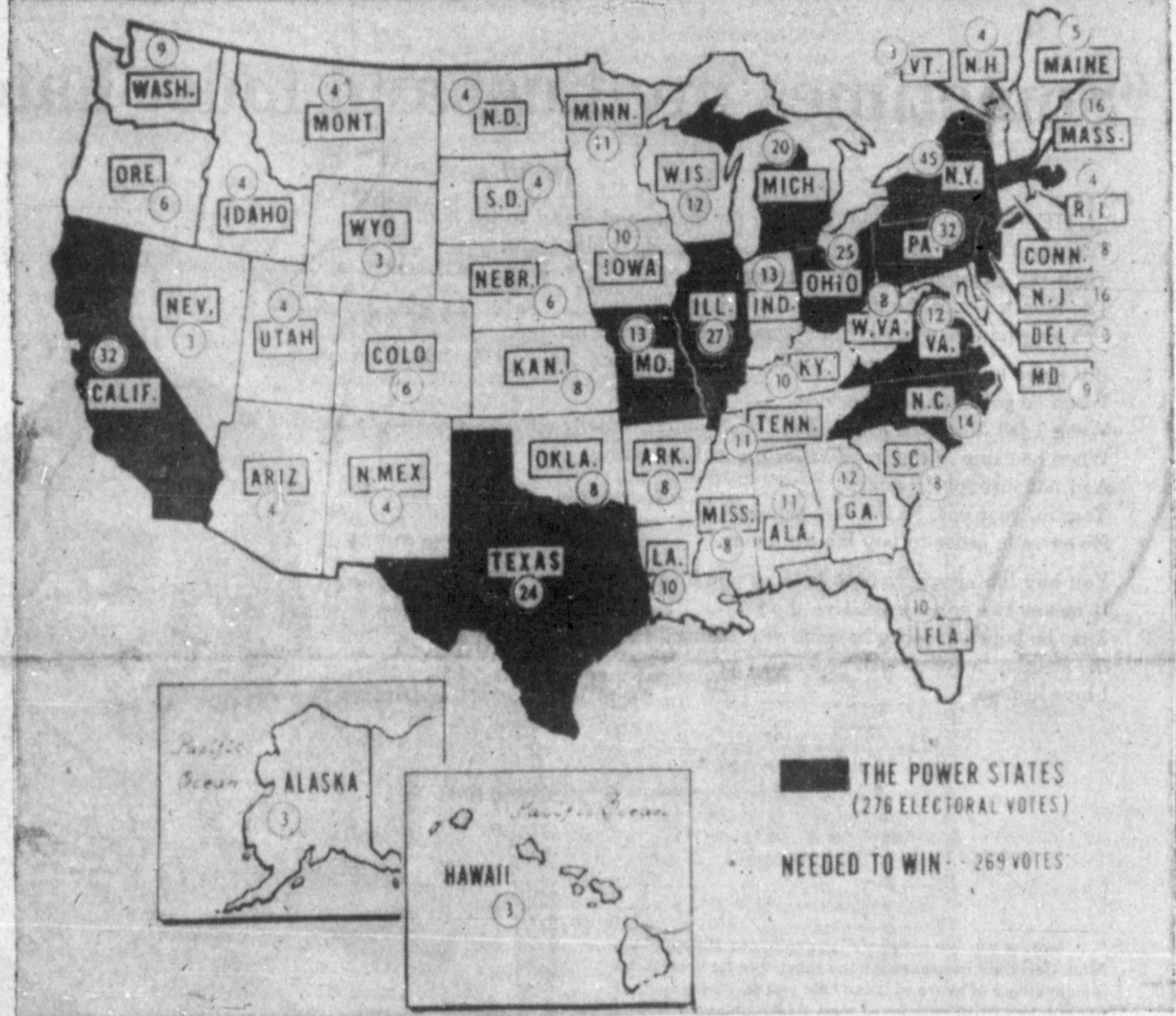
Kennedy's hopes to gather New York State's 45 electoral votes were given a boost today by the New York Daily News which gave him 54.8 per cent to Nixon's 45.2 per cent statewide. Kennedy led 65.5 per cent to 35.5 per cent in New York City. Nixon held the edge in the suburbs and upstate New York.

The Chicago Sun-Times reported today final returns from its straw poll indicated Kennedy would win Illinois by a small margin. The Sun-Times poll gave Kennedy 51.83 per cent to Nixon's 48.17. Kennedy won the Chicago straw vote by a heavy margin.

The Dallas Times-Herald took a poll in "30 carefully selected areas of Dallas County" showing that 33.5 per cent of those polled were for Kennedy, 42 per cent were for Nixon, 20.4 were undecided and the rest did not plan to vote.

The Times-Herald compared to these results with those of a similar poll six weeks earlier and that the undecided column had dropped sharply.

A statewide poll conducted by several Louisiana newspapers resulted in a straw vote majority for Kennedy of 60.5 per cent, to 30.9 per cent for Nixon. A ticket of uncommitted electors received 8.7 per cent.

Candidates Bid For Unconverted Voters In Last Minute Scramble

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The hectic 1960 presidential campaign comes to an end today with both candidates acting as if victory depended on a few more voters who could be converted by handshakes or glimpses at a TV screen.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Sen. John F. Kennedy both undertook man-killing schedules for this election eve before awaiting the verdict from Tuesday's voting.

On The Final Day — With Nixon

Public opinion polls indicated Kennedy was ahead but not by a margin big enough to generate over-confidence in Democratic command posts. Nixon lieutenants disputed the polls and said they failed to reflect that Kennedy had passed a crest two weeks ago and that the vice president's timing carried his campaign to its peak at election time.

Both sides recognized that the religious issue—Kennedy is a Roman Catholic—was one of the big unknowns of the campaign and that it could both help and hurt each candidate. Another unknown factor was the impact of President Eisenhower's vigorous, 11th hour campaign in behalf of Nixon.

A record vote is expected Tuesday. A forecast from Republican national headquarters put the figure at about 67 million or within the 65 to 68 million range. Democratic headquarters predicted that the vote might climb above 69 million, compared with the previous record vote of slightly above 62 million in the presidential election of 1956.

In his final sprint, Kennedy was booked today for appearances in Rhode Island, Connecticut, Vermont and New Hampshire before moving into his home territory of Boston tonight. He will hear the returns Tuesday night at his summer home at Hyannis Port, Mass.

After fulfilling a pledge to campaign in all 50 states by flying to Anchorage, Alaska, Sunday, Nixon headed back east in an overnight flight to Madison, Wis.

From a brief stop in Madison, he moves to Detroit, where he will make a four-hour teletalk, unprecedented in a national campaign, to answer questions telephoned to the studio.

After a Chicago stop for another national TV appearance, he flies back to his home state of California. He votes Tuesday at Whitier and receives election returns at a Los Angeles hotel.

The President and Henry Cabot Lodge, GOP vice presidential nominee, campaigning today in New England, will share the TV screen with Nixon. Eisenhower will be shown from Washington and Lodge from Boston. The GOP has time on all three national TV networks late tonight.

Kennedy scheduled his final TV appeal from Boston tonight. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Democratic vice presidential nominee, was making his final campaign appearances in his home state of Texas, one of the major battlegrounds of the campaign.

Before his Alaska flight, Nixon taped a speech for national TV broadcast Sunday night. He proposed that Eisenhower and former presidents Truman and Hoover be invited to visit the Iron Curtain countries of Eastern Europe on missions of peace and freedom. He promised, if elected, to invite the leaders of those countries to visit the United States.

Both Sides Claiming Victory As Texas Winds Up Hardest-Fought Campaign

Texas' top election official today predicted a record turnout of voters in the general election tomorrow as one of the hardest-fought campaigns in history for the state's key 24 electoral votes drew to a close. Both parties expected victory.

Bob Johnson, head of the Texas Election Bureau, said the vote may exceed 2.25 million, topping the 1952 record turnout of 2,073,000 by a wide margin.

Johnson said Texas has 2,700,000 eligible voters.

Meteorologists forecast generally cool and cloudy weather with light showers in West Texas for the polls opening at 7 a.m. Tuesday.

Both presidential candidates made two trips to Texas. Sen. John F. Kennedy and Vice President Richard Nixon made their final bid for Texas' 24 votes last week.

And political observers believed today that Texas was still a toss-up, despite victory claims by both sides.

With the state still hanging in the balance, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, candidate for re-election and Democratic vice presidential nominee returned to Texas Sunday for an intensive ninth-hour battle for his home state.

Texas, normally Democratic, was in the GOP column for President Eisenhower in 1952 and 1956. Nearly all of Texas' political contests were settled in the Democratic primary and runoff last summer. Texas voters will have to go through the motions of voting in these contests in Tuesday's general election, however, because the winners of the Democratic primaries and runoffs were technically nominated.

In his senatorial race, Johnson is opposed by John G. Tower, a Wichita Falls college professor. Tower, however, is given almost no chance of winning.

Republican Congressman Bruce Alger of Dallas, the state's only

One Dead, 18 Hurt In Subway Bomb Blast

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Sunday bomber or bombers who set off six explosive devices here in as many weeks today can claim an accomplishment New York's original mad bomber never achieved—a human victim.

The most-powerful bomb in the grim series that started Oct. 2 exploded Sunday night in a subway train standing with its doors open in a Harlem subway station. Of the 30 passengers in the car, 18 were injured and one, a 15-year-old girl, was killed.

Police Commissioner Stephen P. Kennedy said the bomb appeared to have been dynamite, and that he was not certain it was the work of the bomber who set off the earlier devices. Five of the previous bombs had been made of black powder crudely packed into cardboard containers.

With Kennedy

ENROUTE WITH KENNEDY (UPI)—John F. Kennedy's news secretary said today the four-hour election eve teletalk of Vice President Richard M. Nixon was costing the Republicans more than \$500,000 and demanded to know where the money was coming from.

"This is the most lavish spending on a day before election in the history of this country," Pierre Salinger told newsmen.

Salinger made the statement as Kennedy left Providence, R. I., during a final campaign swing around the candidate's native New England.

"We would like Mr. Nixon to state the origins of his funds and what commitments he had to make to get them," Salinger said.

He said the cost estimate included the four-hour teletalk scheduled today from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. EST plus three-hour segments in "prime time."

Kennedy spoke to an unofficially estimated crowd of 10,000 in 38-degree weather in front of City Hall in Providence. He made a biting attack on Nixon's announced plan to send American leaders to Iron Curtain countries.

The Democratic nominee started his day by throwing ice cold water on Nixon's proposal to send President Eisenhower and former

Presidents Harry S. Truman and Herbert Hoover to the Iron Curtain nations next year. Then, in remarks prepared for delivery at a Democratic rally in Springfield, Mass., Kennedy said:

"I believe that Mr. Nixon's failure to tell the truth to the American people—or, perhaps, his failure to understand the truth himself—is a clear demonstration of his incapacity to lead this nation through the troubling and hazardous years which lie ahead."

Kennedy planned to appear on a national television hookup between 6 and 8 p.m., EST to discuss points made by Nixon during the GOP nominee's four-hour teletalk from 2 to 6 p.m., EST. Kennedy also will appear on a 30-minute nationwide telecast at 11 p.m., EST on the Columbia Broadcasting System.

Nixon's proposal for sending Eisenhower, Truman and Hoover to Eastern Europe reached Kennedy while the Democratic candidate was flying to Providence from Lewiston, Maine, last stop in a full day of Sunday campaigning in Connecticut, New York state and New Jersey.

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The lawmakers' pay raise would nearly double their pay. It would provide annual salaries of \$4,800, or \$9,600 per biennium, compared with the approximately \$5,200 two-year pay legislators got through the last session, which included three special meetings.

The change would cost money — something like more than a million dollars per biennium — and opponents say it's too expensive for the work the lawmakers are doing. Proponents say the Legislature cannot help but improve when higher salaries are an inducement for good work.

The Fourth Amendment has received endorsement of high state officials, who say that letting small loan operators get more than the 10 per cent ceiling of interest will keep them from going outside the law into usury.

Attn. Gen. Will Wilson considers the amendment a key in his fight against loan sharks. He says the legislation which would inevitably follow would set up a small loan licensing system of strong checks on loan operators.

Opponents fear pressure would be placed on lawmakers to raise interest rates far above practical levels. They also fear administrators would be cajoled or pushed into decisions against the public interest in small loan regulations.

Bond Set For Missile Gap Theft Suspect Fades Away

Jewell Morgan Walker, 40 of 737 Malone, was placed on \$2,000 bond yesterday by Justice of the Peace J. W. Graham on Walker's arraignment for burglary and theft.

He was remanded to Gray County jail in lieu of bond, Sheriff Rufe Jordan said.

Walker, two juveniles and Roy Floyd Martin, 22, of Amarillo, were involved in a series of break-ins here that began in May and were climaxed in late July.

Walker and Martin both have admitted their guilt to law enforcement officials, and have implicated the two juveniles, in some 13 burglaries and attempted break-ins.

Martin and Marion Earlon Smith are also charged with two burglaries in Amarillo. These break-ins were to a jewelry store and a ladies apparel shop.

GUNFIGHT KILLS TWO
PARIS (UPI)—Two rival Algerian Moslem rebel bands staged a gun fight here Sunday night, killing two men and seriously wounding three others.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Air Force took a long stride toward closing the missile gap Saturday in an order advancing by a full year the date for completing the first squadron armed with Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missiles.

The squadron is now slated to become operational in July 1962, and will have 55 Minuteman ICBM's placed in underground "silos" within a 115-mile radius of Malstrom Air Force Base near Great Falls, Mont.

In congressional testimony last spring the years 1962 and 1963 were given as the period in which the Soviets would enjoy the greatest numerical superiority in ICBM's because of their earlier start in the production of ocean-spanning rockets.

The advance in the Minuteman program was described by Air Force as an effective means of narrowing a numerical gap because of the larger number of missiles per squadron.

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Value Line Investment Survey reports that a massive decline in earnings seems in store next year for railway equipment manufacturers.

The September 30th backlog of orders is below even the recession-ridden results of 1958 and the rate of new orders is alarmingly meager, the survey says. As a result, it adds, deliveries next year will be down and profit margins are expected to narrow.

Value Line also says that the carriers themselves face declining earnings and revenues in 1961.

B. K. Thurlow of Winalow, Cohn & Stetson says this is the time to sell cyclical stocks and over-exploited glamor issues. Many of these, he says, have only recently completed massive distributive pushes indicating substantially lower prices over the long term.

Martin Gilbert of Van Alstyne, Noel & Co. believes that regardless of any possible stimulating news or election results the Dow-Jones industrial average will not penetrate the 600 resistance barrier. He feels the list will remain near the upper part of its 35 point trading range for the time being.

Popcorn Eaters Favor Kennedy

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—America's popcorn eaters favor Democrat John Kennedy for president, a final tabulation of the popcorn presidential poll showed Saturday.

The poll showed that 53.4 per cent of those taking part prefer Kennedy over Republican Richard Nixon. The poll indicates an electoral vote of 360 for Kennedy, 176 for Nixon. It takes 269 electoral votes to win.

Jim Blevins, originator of the poll, which was right in the last three elections, including President Harry Truman's upset of Thomas Dewey in 1948, said the Kennedy-Nixon race was the closest since the poll started.

In an Oct. 7 report, the poll gave Kennedy 54.5 per cent so his final showing is a slight drop from that. Blevins said that if such a trend should continue until election day, the poll might be embarrassed.

The South was solidly behind Kennedy and the two newest states, Hawaii and Alaska, also voted for Kennedy.

The poll is conducted by putting popcorn in bags with pictures and names of the candidates on them and tabulating the sales results at movie theater.

Thornton Bank Loses \$2,000 To Gunman

THORNTON, Tex. (UPI)—A short bandit, armed with a snub-nosed revolver, locked the president, vice president and cashier of the First State Bank in the vault Saturday and made off with about \$2,000.

Jack Barnett, the president; Mrs. Barnett, vice president and Mrs. Lois Jackson, the cashier, were checking up when the bandit came in.

He ordered them into the vault, locked it and, as he went out the front door, he locked that, Jack Weaver Barnett, the president's son, went to the bank, heard his father's muffled shouts and let the three out of the vault.

Barnett estimated the loss at about \$2,000, but said he would have to check the bank's books and the cash the bandit left to determine the exact amount.

Mrs. Mary Black, whose drug store is next door, said the bandit was "very short," and walked very erectly and leisurely across the street and got into an auto, mobile. Mrs. Black wondered who he was until she heard about the robbery. He had a white canvas satchel in his hand.



Constitutional Amendments

Three of the four Constitutional amendments on tomorrow's ballot deserve particular attention.

Probably the most controversial is the attempt to raise the compensation of members of the Legislature from a flat \$25 per day, for 120 days, to \$4,800 per year plus \$12 per day for the same period. What, in effect, this would mean is that instead of a representative in Austin depending primarily on his own business interests at home for his support with compensation on the basis of the Legislature's time in session, he would become a full-fledged employee and hence a professional politician.

The argument that we would get "better men" to run for office if the job were more lucrative is a bit hollow when you look at our "servants" in Washington, D. C. The closer you can keep the politician to the reality of making a living like other people, the less chance he will be so free with other people's money.

We recommend that you vote "no" on the salary increase for legislators.

Another issue we think worthy of defeat is the expanding of the Legislature's power to define and regulate the maximum rates a service company can charge for its services.

Our reason for this stand is the same as we would take against any government intrusion into the voluntary relationships within a society. What a man pays for the

Will Uncle Become Patsy?

We don't suppose the people in Latin America had anything to do with it.

Nonetheless, with the assured policies followed in our State Department, one cannot help but wonder if they might not have figured out the whole thing and set us up for a patsy.

Castro's posturing and plundering in Cuba has created a most unhealthy atmosphere for American prestige in Latin American affairs. How does America plan to overcome this blotch on its Central and South American escutcheon? How does America plan to do anything?

The answer is always: "Spend more of the taxpayers' money." And thus the American Committee of 21 Latin-American countries which has recently met, had upmost in their minds the expedience of the moment, and had to ask the question: "How much will Uncle Sam pay so we will continue to love him in the face of the Cuban crisis?" Not that it was put in so many words, but that is certainly the reason and purpose for the conference.

In 15 years, since the end of World War II, American taxpayers have been plundered of \$4 billion which has been distributed among South and Central American nationals.

If the immorality and folly of this program isn't immediately apparent, we ought to pause with raised hair in memory of our departed dollars whenever we think of Cuba. During these 15 years, American taxpayers gave or loaned to Cuba \$50 million. It should come as no news to anyone that money is now completely wasted.

Of course, it was spent in an effort to influence the Socarras, the Batista and even the Castro regimes, so these political rascals would love us. None of them ever did get to love us. But they all got some of the taxpayers' money.

Who among us can foretell with certainty that an uprising similar to Castro's might not occur at almost any time in almost any Latin American country? If and when such a thing would occur, would we not be in the position of kissing our money goodbye once more?

So, in the face of these ridiculous policies, the Latin American countries have gotten together again to find out how much more Uncle will channel to them.

It is a sad day in our country when it becomes necessary for a "truth squad" to follow the Democratic Presidential Candidate in order to correct his misstatements to the people. It is also a sad day when we find this situation necessary to correct statements of some of our local Democrats; namely, Ivy Duncan, Mrs. Jack Smith, and Mrs. Charles Wade. Do you not realize that under increased social and economic benefits you and your kind advocate the little man has to pay to such an extent that in time there will truly be a "rich few" and they will be the Galbraiths, Schlesingers, Bowles, Soapy Williams, etc. who would head your socialistic government? Look at Russia, Hitler's Germany Mussolini's Italy, England in the late 1940s under the Labor-Socialist Party to see recent examples of the complete degradation of the individual for the "good of the state!" These systems where the little man has been or was completely stripped of fruits of his labor, his dignity, and most of all his freedom.

BILLY GRAHAM MAKING IT OFFICIAL LATER THIS WEEK—HE'S FOR NIXON, AS FRIEND WASHINGTON—Evangelist Billy Graham is publicly declaring for Vice President Nixon later this week.

This will be the first time Graham has injected himself into a presidential race.

A close friend of the Republican standard-bearer, Graham will explain he is voting for him on personal grounds.

Senator John Kennedy was notified of this by Graham some weeks ago.

In a letter to the Democratic standard-bearer, the evangelist wrote he had determined to back Nixon because of personal friendship.

Graham stressed that religion had nothing to do with this decision, and that he did not intend to raise the religious issue during the campaign. The evangelist also assured Kennedy that if he is elected, he will support him.

During Graham's crusade in Washington last June, he and his wife were guests at the Vice President's home several times. The evangelist and Nixon also had a number of long conferences in the latter's Capitol office during this two-week period. On two occasions, Graham and his wife occupied front seats reserved for the Vice President in the Senate visitors' gallery.

COUNTER-ATTACK—The accord election wrangling over the unpublished U. S. Information Agency foreign "prestige" surveys may lead to a spectacular by-product—the official release of the State Department's long secret file on the historic Yalta and Potsdam conferences.

Vice President Nixon has discussed this with Secretary Herter in connection with publishing the USA's "confidential" prestige reports.

Senator John Kennedy and other Democratic campaigners are strenuously demanding these studies be disclosed. Nixon has proposed to Herter this be done—simultaneously with the publication of the Yalta and Potsdam papers.

Under Nixon's plan, he would send Herter a telegram urging this, and then, make that known in a statement or speech.

Former National Chairman Leonard Hall, Nixon's personal campaign manager, is credited with strongly advocating this strategy. As a member of Congress, Hall hotly denounced the Yalta and Potsdam conferences as "sell-outs."

Portions of the official files on the two parleys have been published at various times since World War II. But although Republican leaders have been highly critical of the two meetings, in which the late Josef Stalin participated, the Eisenhower Administration has never released the official records.

One explanation has been that this cannot be done without the consent of the other participating countries.

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Disgraced City Judge Killed For No Reason

WEST PALM BEACH (UPI)—A disgraced city judge said Saturday he had "no motive" for the crime with which he is charged—the abduction and murder five years ago of socially prominent Circuit Judge C. E. Chillingworth and his wife, Marjorie.

"I wouldn't have been directly or indirectly involved in the judge's death," said Joseph A. Peel Jr. "It would be of no financial advantage to me."

Peel was returned from Chattanooga, Tenn., Friday night and lodged in the Palm Beach County jail with his accused accomplice in the case, Floyd A. (Lucky) Holzapfel.

The 36-year-old Peel, a former municipal judge in this resort city, was once officially chastised by Chillingworth for his handling of a case.

Chillingworth, member of a pio-

neer Florida family, was one of the most highly respected jurists in the state. His disappearance touched off an extensive investigation and brought offers of rewards totaling \$150,000. Rewards amounting to \$110,000 still are on the books.

Authorities refused Saturday to confirm or deny a copyright story in the Miami Herald that Holzapfel had written a confession saying he killed the Chillingworths at their seaside Manalapan home in 1955. Holzapfel confessed slaying the Chillingworths for \$2,000, the Herald said.

It was reported earlier that the Florida sheriffs bureau had secured tape recordings, allegedly taken without his knowledge from Holzapfel, in which the stocky suspect told how the Chillingworths were taken from their home, chained and dumped

Forty Women Seek National Office Tuesday

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Running under the banners of nine different political parties, 40 women are seeking national office in next Tuesday's election.

Two are running for the vice presidency on minor party tickets. The minor parties also are running nine women for the House and one for the U.S. Senate. These women are given almost no chance of winning.

But the odds are rated better than even for election of more than half of the 28 women running for Congress on the Republican and Democratic tickets.

A woman never has served as President or vice president. None was elected to Congress until 1916. But 17 women from 14 states served in the last Congress equalling the previous record high for feminine representation. Fifteen of them — Sen. Mar-

garet Chase Smith of Maine, and 14 House members—are seeking re-election. Maine is certain to keep a woman in the Senate. Miss Lucia M. Cormier won the Democratic nomination to oppose Mrs. Smith in the first woman vs. woman Senate race in history.

In Oregon, Mrs. Maurine B. Neuberger rates a good chance of winning the U.S. Senate seat of her late husband. If she wins, she will be the third woman ever elected to a full six-year term in the Senate.

As for the House, Rep. Iris F. Blitch, Georgia Democrat, is certain of re-election. She has no opponent.

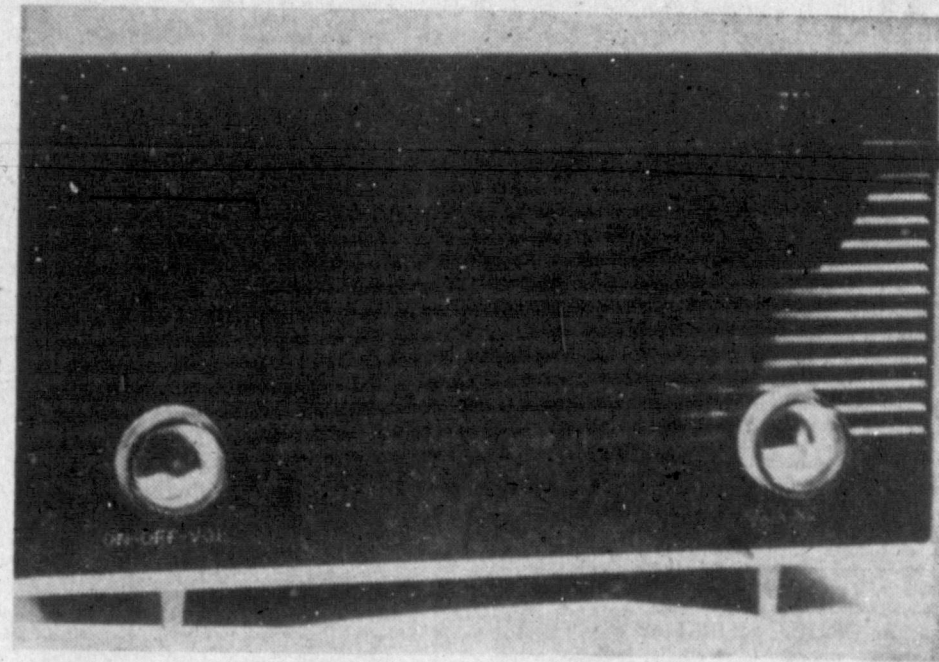
In Minnesota, former congresswoman Coya Knutson is attempting to win back the seat she lost to a Republican in a close race in 1958. Mrs. Knutson, only Democratic incumbent in Congress defeated a Republican in 1958, blamed the result on her husband's "Coya, come home" plea.

The women running for vice president are Myra Tanner Weiss of Salt Lake City, on the socialist workers' ticket, and Mrs. Georgia Cozzini, Milwaukee, on the socialist labor ticket.
