MOSCOW (UPI) - Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev launched another bitter personal attack on President Eisenhower today, saying he was irresponsible, unfit for office and "dangerous as the head of a major state."

Khrushchev also claimed that Eisenhower told him at Camp David he did not favor unification of Germany be-

cause he feared a strong Ger-In Washington, the White

on Khrushchev's remarks. As he did at a press conference in Paris at the collapse of the summit conference last month the Soviet Premier gesticulated with both hands in an excited manner as he lashed out at Eisenhower before 400 newspaper, television and radio correspondents.

(Another Message from the Word of God)

In the book of Genesis, chapter 14:18-20: And Melchizedek King of Salem brought forth bread and wine; and he was the priest of the most high God. And he blessed him, and said, Blessed be Abram of the most High God, possessor of heaven and earth; And blessed be the most high God, which hath delivered thine enemies into thy hand, and he gave him

Then in Hebrews 7:1-2: "For this Melchizedek, King of Solem, priest of the most high God, who met Abraham returning from the slaughters of the kings, and blessed him; To whom also Abraham gave a tenth part of all; first being by interpretation King of Salem, which is, King of peace.

Melchizedek is mentioned three times in the Bible; in history, Genesis chapter 14; in prophecy, Psalms chapter 110; and in doctrine, Hebrews chapter 7. The last reference builds upon the other two and makes him a type of Christ whose priesthood abides eternally. The writer of Hebrews sees in Melchizedek's priesthood a line that is outside of the Aaronic order and nat subject to its weaknesses and imperfections. Upon this timeless foundation he established the priesthood of Christ for believers. When the kings of Mesopotamia attacked Sodom and carried Lot and his family captive, a messenger brought the news to Abraham and he pursued the spoilers into Damascus, attacked them and recovered Lot and the spoils of war.

On his return trip Abraham met Melchizedek and paid him fithes and received his blessing. The event established the historical basis of Melchizedek.

And now in Hebrews chapter 7, verses 1, 2, 3, for this Melchizedek, King of Salem, priest of the most high God, who met Abraham returning from the slaughter of the kings and blessed him. To whom also Abraham gave a tenth part of all, first being by interpretation King of righteouness, and after that also King of Salem, which is King of peace. The author of Hebrews built upon the account: Melchizedek was a priest - king to whom God had made Himself known. Abraham recognized his authority by g-ing a tenth of the spoils of war. He also placed-him under his jurisdiction by receiving the priestly blessing. Verse 3: "Without father, without mother, without descent, having neither beginning of days, nor end of life; but, Melchizedek like Christ in that he is King of righteousness and King of peace made like unto the Son of God, obideth a priest continually. Note, not only but since the Old Testament narrative does not mention his parents, genealogy, birth or death, one need not make Melchizdek a supernatural person. The point is that since there is no record of his birth or death or priesthood terminating, he foreshadows the eternal priesthood work of Christ. -much more adequately than the sons of Levi, whose priestly work ended with the sacrifice of calvery.




