Convoy Reaches Arabs

Israeli forces in Egypt permitted a mercy convoy of food, water and medical supplies to cross its lines today for relief of the 20,000-man Egyptian 3rd Army trapped on the east bank of the Suez Canal, but its planes and guns shot down three Egyptian helicopters trying to reach the force in the middle of the night.

More men of a United Nations peace-keeping force moved out of Cairo today to form a buffer zone between the existing Israeli-Egyptian lines but a U.N. spokesman dodged the politically explosive question of a pullback by the two sides to the positions they held when the cease-fire went into effect Oct. 22.

The Tel Aviv newspaper Ma'ariv said the United States was applying pressure to Israel to lift its encirclement of the Egyptian 3rd Army whose surrender would threaten the survival of President Anwar Sadat's regime but that Israel is resisting the pressure.

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger. There was speculation in Cairo that the mission might be connected with forthcoming Mideast peace talks.

A possible clue to a future settlement came today from the well-informed Beirut newspaper An Nahar which said the United States and Russia had agreed on a broad plan calling for Israeli withdrawal from occupied lands but with a U.N. security force to safeguard its borders and establishment of a Palestinian state on the occupied west bank of the Jordan.

FREE OF CONTROL Congressmen Demanding 'Independent' Prosecutor

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Edward Gurney, R-Fla., the Senate Watergate committee member considered friendliest to President Nixon, today joined a growing demand for appointment of a new special prosecutor who would be free from administration control.

"I think above all, we've got to have a special prosecutor that is independent, because I don't think people are going to buy the idea of a special prosecutor, that is the President's man, as part of the administration prosecuting the administration," Gurney said.

How Dory Previn found herself and a new career

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — She looks like a frightened doll, with her frizzy hair sticking out. She used to be frightened a lot but today Dory Previn is pretty sure of herself.
She has a right to that assurance because she's become a potent force. Her poems, her songs, her singing and now her screen-writing are all successful. She is, suddenly, a hot personality. Everything she does, lately, seems to turn out right.
It wasn't always thus. Despite her exotic name and even more exotic appearance, Dory Previn once was really plain Dorothy Langan, a little Irish girl from Woodbridge, N.J. Her father did a lot of different things, from running a lunch counter to working in the

Man Measures Life In Darkness, Light

ARLINGTON, Tex. (UPI) — Ron Milliman measures his life not in days and nights but in darkness and light. Sometimes he is blind and sometimes he can see.

Milliman is a marketing professor at the University of Texas at Arlington and could

see until he was 17. Illness blinded him for the next 12 years, but in that time he married, fathered two sons and worked through college and graduate school to a doctorate.

The darkness ended last April, the result of a delicate plastic implant to his right eye, the only eye he has left. But the operation has not been a complete success.

His body reacts to the plastic device and his sight comes and goes with each correcting operation. Total blindness has become a frustrating game of now-you-see, now-you-don't.

"I could see for five weeks after they opened it," he said. "Then I was out one Saturday afternoon playing with a Frisbee with my brother and a couple of the kids and I came in, seems like I came in to change my shoes. I looked down and I couldn't see my shoes anymore."
Recently Failed Again
"I could see most of the time through the summer up until three to four weeks ago. There were times when I had to stop and think whether I really saw that or whether it was just in my mind, a visualization of my mind."

It is not often that blind men see, no matter how clouded or sporadic the sight might be, and when the light comes more than a decade after the darkness, the sight of it is startling.

"Over a period of 12 years the brain does some funny things on you," Milliman said. "It has the ability to make things look the way you want them to look."
Milliman's father, mother and wife were in his hospital room when he returned from the operation.

"I hadn't seen any of these people in 12 years and they had really changed. I had to make some adjustments," he said. "It's sort of like the guy somebody's arranged a blind date for — it's pretty hard for him not to visualize the girl the way he wants her to look and nine out of 10 times there is a little disappointment."
These people didn't look exactly the way I expected them to look."

During the darkness Milliman's own appearance had changed. Small and with a mottled dark complexion, he found he was not the prettiest human alive. He also found he could not even comb his hair correctly. His style had changed in 12 years and he had never seen it.

"So I tried to make what I saw in the mirror look like me, like what I thought I should look like or what I used to look like or something like that and so I combed my hair the way I used to comb it," he said. "Finally, I practically had to shut my eyes and comb my hair, not looking in the mirror or anything and then look to learn, to relearn what I'm supposed to look like now."

Notes Drastic Changes
"I went berserk going into stores because of the new things, new data, new styles. Frankly, I was looking at things I didn't even know what they were. Some of the styles and designs looked like things we read about in comic books or science fiction things 12, 12 or 15 years ago."
Despite the confusion, the light had finally come and Milliman discovered he had

what he thought was a pretty good perspective from which to look at the things about him — his environment and his society.

"I remembered looking out at a nice bright clear blue sky with, you know, a few lofty clouds, but today, frankly, it's more likely than not you're gonna look out at a haze, you're gonna see some smog and there's been that kind of change," he said.

Milliman looked at the people around him too and saw them in a particular way for the first time.

"I've always been pretty good at seeing patterns, in other words, taking quite a lot of almost meaningless data and finding a pattern in it. All the

various input that came to me in terms of things I'm describing fell into a pattern," he said.

"This pattern I'm calling freedom."

He Saw Freedom
"I mean that I felt that was the underlying thread, the unifying thread. A lot of what I saw was freedom, that the people really had more freedom than they realized. I think there's a broader definition of normal behavior. The way people dress, the way people are all interrelated and I see a great deal more freedom than ever."

"We've been told that freedom is what we have been after, what we have been fighting for and when all of a sudden I open up my eyes and I look around and see freedom like I've never been able to see before — that's exciting."

"But all the freedom a world can allow cannot take from a man the burden of his own life and blindness makes Milliman's burden a little heavier."

"When I get a new class, I'll be talking along and then remember to tell them, 'My God, if you've got a question, don't raise your hand. That doesn't do a thing for me.'"

Alert Issued For Suspect

MINDEN, La. (UPI) — Officials announced they have issued a nation-wide alert for 22-year-old Milton Traylor, described as armed and extremely dangerous, who also was wanted on several federal charges.

T. C. Bloom of the Webster Parish sheriff's office said Traylor was wanted for the shooting death of Clinton Jones, 23, of Dallas, found in a running shower of a motel about 17 hours after his death.

Bloom said Traylor accompanied Jones to the Ramada Inn Thursday, and left about 30 minutes after the men checked in. Jones' body was found Friday by a maid, after two guests complained of the running water.

Jones had been shot once in the back of the head.

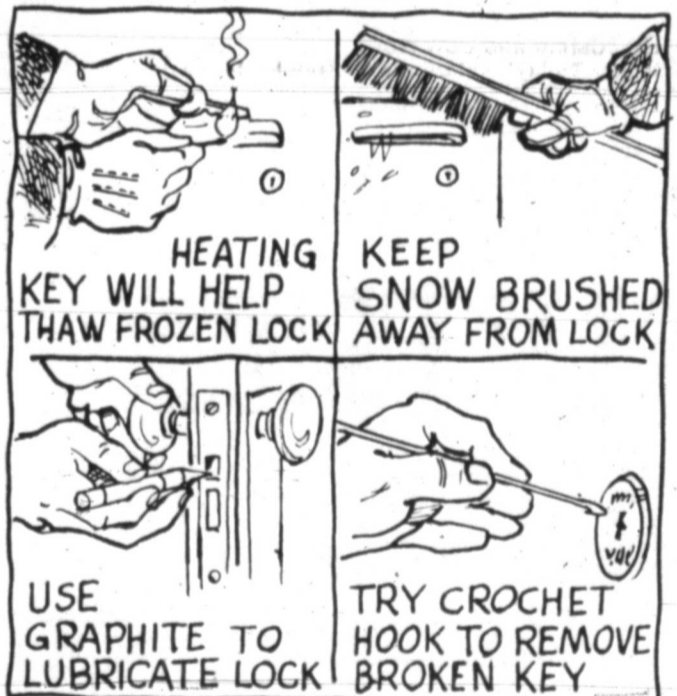

Cold locks cause winter problems

An older generation remembers the days when nobody locked his door, but those days are gone and today locks are very much a part of modern living. The problem is that sometimes you have trouble unlocking one or more of those locks.
There are all kinds of locks, any number of makes and models. Working principles are pretty much the same, however, and maintenance practices are similar for all of them.
A balky lock is more likely to be a problem in cold weather than warm since locks can freeze. While frozen locks are more common on ear doors they can occur on the outside door of your house as well.
Chip away the ice from the lock if there is any. If you can warm up the key in a flame it will help thaw the lock cylinder when you insert it.
Dipping the key in alcohol may help. Work slowly. Turn the key gradually. If the tumblers in the lock are frozen it will take a little time to get them loose.
Keeping the snow brushed away from the lock will make trouble less likely. Any lock exposed to the weather may give you trouble which is another good reason for having a storm door.
Locks will work more easily if they are kept lubricated. Do not use oil or grease since ordinary lubricants will cause the lock parts to become gummy. Use powdered graphite which can be sprayed into the lock.
A lock that works easily is not so likely to cause a binding or a broken key. A key



may bind for other reasons too. If the cylinder has turned slightly in the face plate you will have trouble. Loosen the setscrew and line up the cylinder again. A poorly made duplicate key will also bind.
Sometimes a key will break off in the lock. Try holding the remaining part of the key tightly against the part remaining in the lock and then try turning it. If this fails use a piece of stiff wire with a hook bent in the end, or a fine crochet hook, and insert the wire over the top of the key and pull the broken piece out. The pieces that can be used to make a duplicate.
If you cannot remove the piece this way you will have to remove the entire cylinder.

(Loosen the setscrew and then unscrew the cylinder from the face plate and tap out the remaining piece).
You can prevent breaking the key by taking care to insert it all the way before turning it. A well lubricated lock will prevent binding and in turn prevent breaking.
Sometimes a key will fit the lock but will bind and break when you try to turn it. Similar looking keys should be well marked.
If the key does not make the bolt move it may mean trouble with the door. Try moving the strike plate slightly, cutting out some wood behind the opening. If this doesn't work, you may have to re-hang the door.

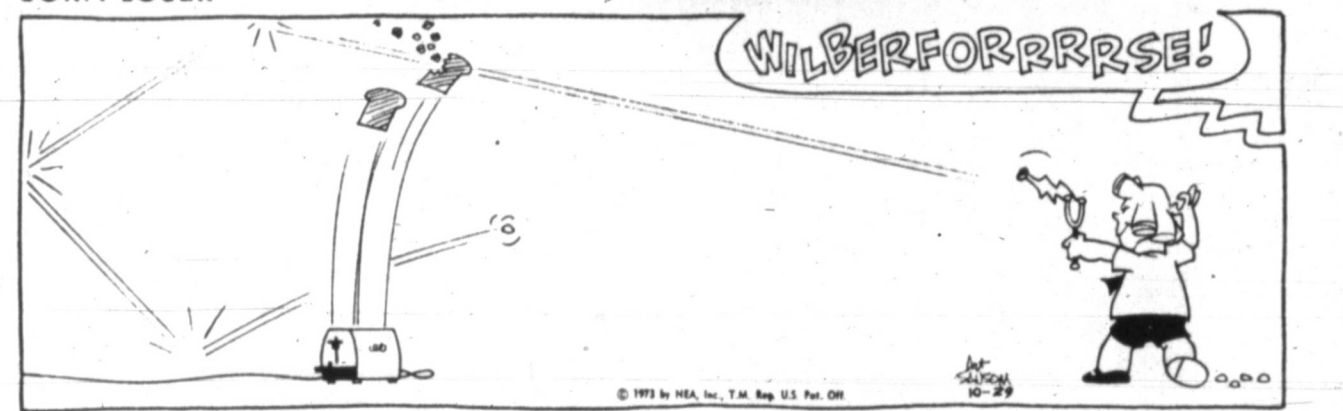

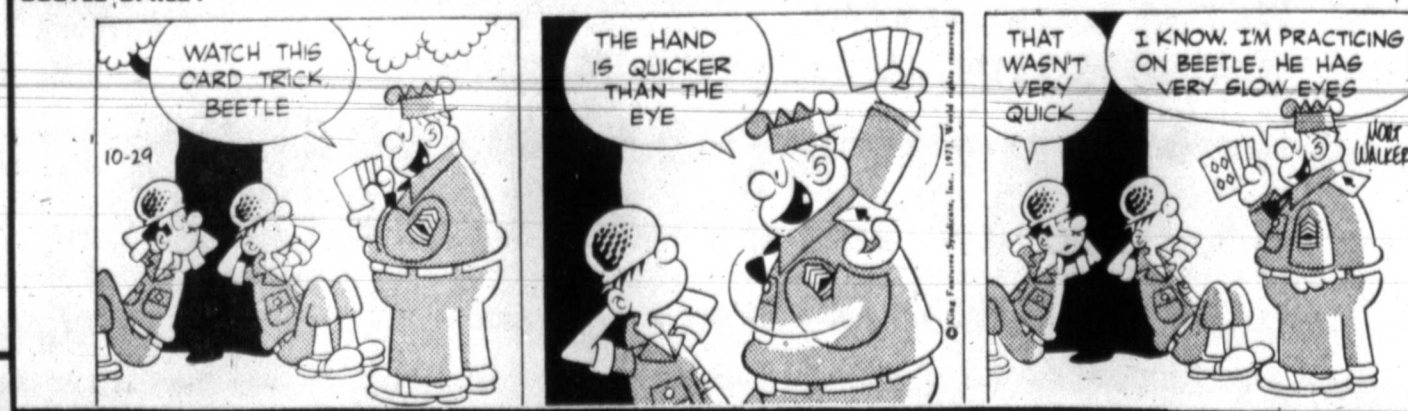

CIGARETTE SALES
WASHINGTON (UPI) — In fiscal 1973, the cigarette market expanded to historic proportions with the manufacture of over 600 billion cigarettes. Dollar volume in the industry has grown by \$455,000,000 since fiscal 1971, the National Association of Tobacco Distributors says.
The wholesale tobacco distributor has a corner on 77.5 per cent of the total wholesale cigarette business, the wholesale grocer 22 per cent, and all other wholesalers 0.5 per cent, according to a NATD survey.
