

concerning my wartime responsi bility, and today I am resolved to devote myself as a democratic statesman to the building of Japan with the people.

This week, Kishi, friend of the United States, was in the midst of one of his toughest fights.

With the help of his Liberal-Democratic Party's huge major ity in Parliament, he had rammed the U.S.-Japan mutual security through to ratification over; the violent protests of the Socialists.

Unless' he can be forced from office in the meantime, the treaty automatically becomes law on June 19, the same day President Eisenhower is scheduled to arrive in Tokyo for his Japanese

Kishi's difficulties came from both left and right. The Commumunists opposed the treaty for obvious . reasons. The Socialists are committed to support a nowar Japanese Constitution and profess to see in the treaty a danger that Japan will be dragged

into a new major conflict. Within Kishi's own party, there also is opposition—not to the treaty but to Kishi himself.

These intra - party opposition leaders see the present demonstrations not as a national crisis for Japan but rather an opportunity to oust Kishi,



LONDON (NEA) - The British Broadcasting Corporation has barred the sound of bones being bro ken from its television programs. From now on, the sheriffs and villains of TV Westerns must shoot from the hip, and no funny stuff. No bone-crunching, eye-gouging, knives protruding from backs, whipping scenes-all of this is out.

So are monsters in modern dress, and background music used to create a "frightening at-. mosphere.

It's all part of the BBC's crackdown on violence, particularly in television programs that are likely to be seen by children. It could have an effect on American makers of TV films. For next to the domestic market. Britain is America's best customer for TV serials.

Already, American TV film makers are beginning to feel the pinch. Two episodes each from "Laramie" and "Philip Marlowe" have been dropped by BBC on the grounds that they might "cause offense to viewers." Anerican Westerns in general are being carefully scrutinized for unnecessary violence.

So far ITV has issued no set of channels in Britain, adding:





sassination". Therefore, for what my efforts are worth, I am more than pleas-
