

Calls Measure Indefensible By Any Light

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Prestdent Eisenhower today vetoed as "indefensible by any light" the bill to raise the pay of federal workers by \$750 million a year, The chief executive in a special message to the House said the present federal pay system was badly antiquated and the pay bill would make the situation worse. Attempts will be made to override the veto.

He called the pay raise an example of "fiscal and legislative irresponsibility" and said it would discriminate against certain federal employes in such a manner that would offend all thinking Americans.

The President said that under the bill federal employes making higher salaries would have gotten larger pay raises on a percentage basis than those whose pres-"To thus heighten the present distortion would bde grossly unfair and highly discriminatory," Eisenhower said.

He said the measure was "manifestly unjust" because for some employes it granted a pay increase of nearly 9 per cent but for others performing exactly the same work the increase would be

However, there should be advance information conveyed to those who have the power of creating such situations. This advance information should be to the effect that this country has given thought to these pos sibilities, has prepared and developed an effective plan to cope therewith, and will have no pesitancy in bringing it into play. You can find, if you are alert, reports claiming that men are wiser drivers than women, or vice-versa. That men tend to have stronger teeth but women are more immune to the common cold. more vindicative. I don't know who puts up the money to conduct these surveys, but it must cost a lot and, in the end, nothing spectacular or even greatly useful is proved. Now, here is a long report sum

marizing a survey that took 15 years to make. It covers only 252 Harvard men, and all I can say about that is that if it took 15 years to study the smoking habits of 252 men, the surveyors must have passed a lot of time asleep. Nor am I persuaded that 252 Harvard men comprise an accurate survey of anything. This one has to do with what smok-

ing reveals about people. Since literally millions of people smoke and a large group of those millions are men and Harvard men often are peculiar, anyway, I don't see how 252 Harvard Yard boyos are any kind of accurate

gauge at all.

Accurate or not, one thing that came out of the long end of the smoking horn was that Harvard men who do not smoke at all are apt to be more masculine than Harvard men who do smoke.

Smoking was never the gauge used to measure Harvard masculinity in the circles in which I move in New York. Usually a glance would do, and it didn't matter if the lad had a lighted cigarette in his hand or not. The survey also says that Harvard smokers would be more shy, inhibited and self-conscious. Never having met a shy, inhibited or self - conscious Harvard lad, I'd say they were far off base in that discovery. In the field of muscular display, they slid off the track, too, They say that smok-

ers are less apt to go out for strenuous exercises and sports. Obviously, Football players et al. don't smoke during training season. This is not the true use of logic. Just because athletes swear off smoking while in training, and bookworms do not at any time, is no proof that smok-

Highway Safety Slogans Not Worth A Dime A Dozen

I did a lot of thinking about highway safety on my recent motor trip, and it's a good thing I did, else I would have been knocked galleywise ten times before my first gas stop.

I continue to read that speed isn't the major cause of highway accidents, and maybe it isn't. But you can take it from me that speed has a lot to do with cars coming apart at the seams when they hit, and a great deal to do with scattering the occupants around the ountryside.

Speed may not have brought the ars together in the first place, but it surely showed its hand once they got together. It's entirely possible to be killed at ten miles an hour, but it's nowhere as assured as at 70 or 80 miles an hour.

The safest stretches of highway I ran on --- indeed, the only safe stretches - were those on which police patrol cars were present, or known to be present. did What were the charges? There were only three in the ... ir Force Manual that involved the National Council of Churches. The first concerned the Revised Standard Version of the Bible. The second was made in connection with quotations from a book by

Dr. E. Stanley Jones and, the third, was in relation to the activities of Dr. Harry F. Ward. The Air Force Manual stated: "The National Council of

Churches in The U.S.A. officially sponsored the Revised Standard Version of the Bible. Of the 95. persons who served in this project, 30 have been affiliated with pro-Communist fronts, projects and publications." The statement is correct and is a matter of public record, easily verified. The Manual did not say that these 30 were Communists, nor even that they were Communist sympa-

thizers, although membership in such obviously Communist front organizations as the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties would seem to carry some implications.

The National Federation for Constitutional Liberties has a charming name. Communist front organizations usually do have. However, Attorney General Francis Biddle has described this organization as: "Part of what Lenin called the solar system of organizations, ostensibly having no connection with the Communist Party, by which Communists attempt to create sympathizers and supporters of their program." Six of the thirty just mentioped associated with the Revised Stand-

ard Version of the Bible were members of this National Federation for Constitutional Liberties. In the second instance, the National Council of Churches was mentioned in the Manual as highly approving the famous missionary, Dr. E. Stanley Jones. Dr. Jones is widely acclaimed for
