## Meeting Dangerously Near Collapse After First Day

PARIS (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev today withdrew his invitation to President Eisenhower to visit Russia, and in a bitter exchange over U.S. spy flights was accused by Eisenhower of coming all the way from Moscow just to sabotage the summit talks.

The Big Four conference teetered on the verge of immediate collapse after Khrushchev sources called an "insulting" attack on Eisenhower and the United States. The Soviet Premier threatened at the three-hour session to walk out of the summit meeting unless the United States halted its spy flights and punished those responsible.

## Invitation Off In These Words

PARIS (UPI) — These are the words with which Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev today took back his invitation for President Eisenhower to visit Russia, according to an unofficial translation.

"As is known, President Eisenhower and I have agreed to exchange visits. Last September I visited the United States. We were greatly gratified by that visit and the meetings and talks we had. For all this we expressed our appreciation.

"The President of the United States was to make a return visit. Our agreement was that he would come on June 10. We were preparing to accord him a good welcome.

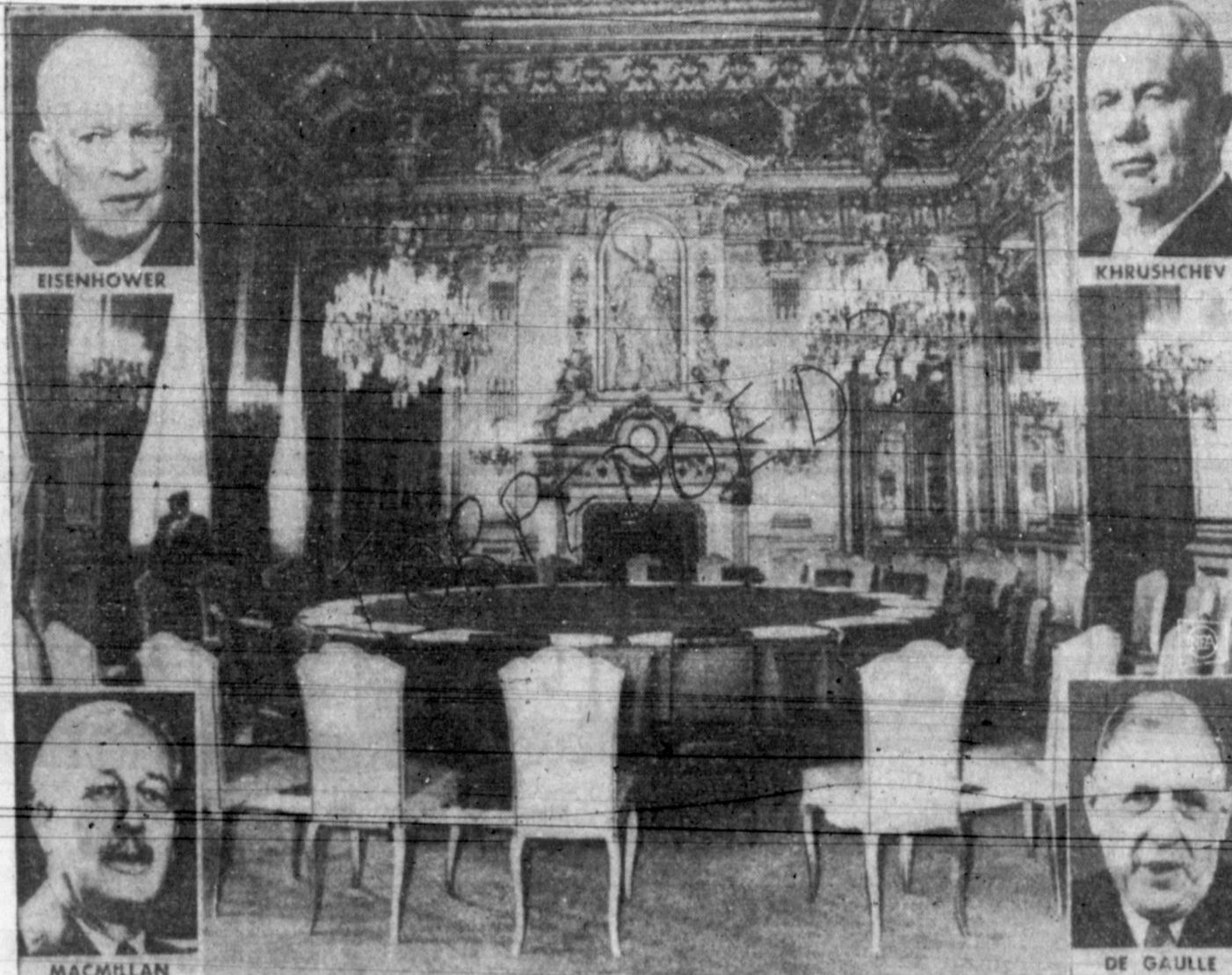
"Unfortunately as the result of provocative and aggressive actions against the U.S.S.R. there were created such conditions that we were deprived of the possibility to receive the President with the cordiality with which the Soviet people receive foreign guests.

"At present we cannot express that cordiality because of the provocative flights of military planes which have created conditions clearly unfavorable for such a visit.

"That is why we believe that at present the visit of the President of the United States to the U.S.S.R. should be postponed and agreement should be reached as to the time of the visit when conditions of the visit are mature.

"Then the people of the Soviet Union could express their cordiality to the leader of a great power with which we sincerely want to live in peace and friendship. I believe President Eisenhower and the American people will understand me correctly.

"The Soviet government declares that, on its side, it will do everything possible, in the future as well, to contribute to international relaxation to the solution of problems which still separate us today; thus doing, we shall guide ourselves by the interest of the progress of the great cause of peace on the basis of peaceful co-existence of the states having different social systems."

## Powers Ordered To Talk

### U-2 Pilot Was Following Orders

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An American official says that U.S. spy plane pilot Francis G. Powers was under orders to admit espionage mission if captured by the Russians.

George V. Allen, director of the U.S. information agency, said Sunday he understood Powers' admission of his intelligence role to a Soviet captor was in line with instructions from his superiors.

Allen later told United Press International that the pilot and hypodermic needle carried by Powers were for use in taking his life only if he were in danger of being tortured.

The information agency chief admitted speculation that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev might try to stage a propaganda coup by turning Powers over to U.S. authorities during the summit conference.

Allen predicted that Khrushchev would hold Powers "close to his chest for a while." He said about all this country could do would be to try to see that Powers gets a fair trial.

Commenting on the repercussions of the spy plane incident, Allen conceded that one of the "very difficult problems" raised was the effect on nations with U.S. air bases inside their borders. These allies, he said, "will be much more concerned" about U.S. flights.

Allen said other nations understood the United States must find out what is going on behind the Iron Curtain. He said there also was some appreciation that this country was able to make intelligence flights over Russia.

## Conner Sees Link-Up In Two Robberies

It may just be a coincidence, but Police Chief Jim Conner thinks there's a strong resemblance between the robber who struck the Vaughn-Roth Truck Terminal Sunday morning and the one who high-jacked another service station May 2.

Sunday's robbery netted the thief about \$130 in bills and coins.

He walked into the terminal, wearing Army fatigues, combat boots and a handkerchief over his face. He was carrying a .22 caliber rifle.

The robber forced night attendant Cleo Ruff to empty the cash register. Then he made Bill Wheeler, a Perryton truck driver who was at the scene, jerk the telephone loose from the wall before he left.

"I've killed before," the culprit was quoted as saying, "and I can kill again."

Both Ruff and the victim of the May 2 robbery at Bell Quality service station, described thief as being in his early 20's, between 5-8 and 5-9 tall and weighing around 150 or 160 pounds.

The robber carried the same type weapon and wore the same kind of handkerchief across his face.

"Those descriptions seem pretty close," Conner said today, "in fact, they seem very close."

Police have talked to a number of people, asking them about who might have committed the crime.

"But as far as knowing who did it," Conner said, "we have no idea. We're just working on it."

Conner also said that the Vaughn-Roth terminal had been robbed in the same manner about a year ago.

"The three men who pulled last year's robbery have been captured and are in jail in other cities," Conner said.

"That's an ideal spot for a robbery," he continued. "There's so many streets around there — some"

## Kennedy Faces Last Two Primary Tests

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) faces his final primary tests in Maryland and Oregon this week before the struggle for the Democratic presidential nomination moves into the smoke-filled rooms.

Kennedy is heavily favored to defeat Sen. Wayne L. Morse (D-Ore.) in the Maryland voting Tuesday but is conceding the Oregon primary Friday in advance to Morse, as a favorite son candidate.

However, Kennedy flew to Oregon over the weekend to campaign in an obvious bid to win Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.), and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) also will be on the Oregon ballot.

Humphrey withdrew as a presidential candidate after losing to Kennedy in the West Virginia primary last week. His name stays on the Oregon ballot, however, and he is not expected to advise his Oregon supporters to support any other candidate.

Symington issued a statement Sunday denying that the Oregon vote would test his strength.

## Protest Flight Of Unmarked Plane

BERLIN (UPI) — The Soviet military commander in East Germany has charged that an unmarked plane flew 60 miles into the Red territory May 5, ignoring Soviet fighter planes which signaled it to land, it was disclosed today.

The Communist news service ADN said Col. Gen. I. I. Jakubowski sent notes to the Western Allied commandants Sunday saying the Russians will resort to stop such violations "in future."

ADN said Jakubowski's notes said the plane flew at an altitude of 5,200 feet on a course passing 10 miles southeast of Boizenburg.

"Soviet fighters on patrol demanded repeatedly by the use of signals that the aircraft land," Jakubowski said. "However, the aircraft did not respond to this summons. It turned back toward West Germany."

Although the notes gave no specific information about the type of plane or its apparent mission, observers were considered it unlikely that a plane on a reconnaissance mission would fly at such a low altitude.

## Nationwide Combat Alert Called Today

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Defense Department early today completed a surprise combat readiness alert for all American military commands throughout the world.

Mystery surrounded the exercise, which a Pentagon spokesman called a "communications readiness alert," which was "not supposed to attract public attention."

Word of the alert, however, spread widely and caused some cases of jitters among the civilian populace.

Denver residents flooded newspaper and radio station telephone switchboards with frightened requests for information. One family reported it was hiding in the basement after hearing this military order broadcast by a civilian station.

"All fighter pilots F101 and fighter pilots F102... Code Three alert, Hotcake One and Hotcake Six scramble at Lowry immediately."

Denver station Koa-TV reported it was asked by local police, who relayed the request from Lowry Air Force Base, Denver, to read the order.

The Defense spokesman said, however, no airplanes were "scrambled" into the air, nor were other forces put in motion. He said the test covered, among other things, the ability of all commands to communicate with key personnel.

The youth, Larry Payne, fell at her feet and died without a word.

When officers reached the home they found the mother, Mrs. LeRoy Payne, kneeling above the body, wildly crying:

"I have killed my boy. I have killed my boy. I didn't mean to do it."

Payne was taken to a hospital where she is recovering from shock.

## Daniel Plan Kept Hidden

AUSTIN (UPI) — Gov. Price Daniel today handed his Tax Advisory Commission the big responsibility of helping to solve Texas' financial problems, but withheld his "secret" tax plans until the commission could get a preview of state needs.

Daniel promised to reveal his tax ideas late this afternoon after the 39-member commission receives reports on the present financial condition of the state, needs for the next two years and an estimate of anticipated revenues.

The governor said he would outline parts of the same tax plan he presented to the last Legislature plus his new suggestions and tax ideas submitted to him by lawmakers.

## Rockefeller Put Back In Presidential Race

ALBANY, N.Y. (UPI) — Supporters of Nelson A. Rockefeller put the New York governor back into the Republican presidential race today and asked him "not to rule himself out."

GOP State Chairman L. Judson Morhouse said a Republican victory in November depends on a candidate "capable of the appeal that thrills across and beyond party lines. He said Rockefeller attracts support of independents and Democrats as well as Republicans.

"The fact remains that he — along with the vice president (Richard M. Nixon) — is one of the truly forceful and distinguished leaders on the national scene," Morhouse said.

"The Republican Party as a whole, therefore, must look to one or the other of these men as its best hope in 1960. It must designate its best and wisest choice in the July convention."

The statement from Morhouse was prompted by Rockefeller's announcement Saturday that wide-spread pressure on him to accept the vice-presidential nomination against his wishes had compelled him to decide against attending the convention "in any capacity."

Morhouse is one of the governor's top political advisers and probably will head the big New York Republican delegation at the Chicago convention. He said he was urging New York delegates to remain uncommitted until the convention convenes.

## Texas Traffic Mishaps Kill 20 In One Day

A two-car smashup that killed five persons late Saturday night near Belton in Central Texas was the worst of a series of traffic accidents that killed a score of Texans within a 24-hour period.

Nearly all of the traffic deaths occurred from Saturday night to Sunday night and included one at San Antonio that took three lives and single accidents at Clarksville, near Killeen and Dawson, Tex., that took two lives each.

Ten members of a single family were injured in a traffic smash-up at San Antonio.

Dead in the crash west of Belton were three men and two women including George J. Finley, Carl G. Roetiger Jr., Catherine Ursula Hoehcher, Kenneth G. Ursula and Heide J. Hoffman.

Dead east of Killeen: Lt. Leonard E. Neale, 28, Lackland AFB, San Antonio and Dennis Moore, 34, Fort Hood.

Four persons died in two traffic accidents at San Antonio, ending 28 deathless days there. Police said an outbreak of traffic accidents injured 18 persons in San Antonio.

A two-car crash on San Antonio's Pan-Am Expressway killed three men before daylight Sunday. (See TRAFFIC, Page 3)

 Khrushchev suggested the conference be postponed for six or eight months unless the United States halted its intelligence flights over Russia.

Unimpeachable Western sources said there was general agreement among the allies that Khrushchev had wrecked the summit meeting with his tactics at the Elysee Palace, in a meeting that lasted three hours.

Khrushchev, according to these sources, made "an insulting and inaccurate statement" which he planned to follow up with a public diatribe against Eisenhower and the United States.

In addition to withdrawing his invitation to Eisenhower to visit the Soviet Union on June 10, Khrushchev also:

Demanding that the United States disavow and condemn the high-altitude intelligence-gathering flights over Russia, promise not to conduct any such additional flight, and punish all persons connected with them.

Then Khrushchev said unless those demands were met there would be no summit conference that today's meeting was merely a preliminary get-together.

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# Cardwell Twirls No-Hitter In 1st Start As A Cub

Missed Perfect Game When 2nd Batter Walked

It was a day to remember — a day on which form took a holiday. That's just about the only way you can sum up Sunday's major league game that included the season's first no-hitter, its biggest free-lance pitcher, and the spectacle of the Senators and Orioles sharing an American League lead.

In fact, San Francisco fans are about the only ones who could call it a normal day: The ant pitching staff turned in another shutout.

Here's a rundown on doings at provided 228,168 Sunday baseball fans with one of the dizziest days in years:

—Don Cardwell, 24-year-old right-hander acquired from the Phillies on Friday pitched the first no-hitter against the Cardinals in 41 years for a 4-0 victory.

—The Phillies and Reds staged free-for-all at Cincinnati which foot, 8-inch, 230-pound Gene Conroy featured by socking 5-foot, 11-inch, 165-pound Billy Martin above the left eye.

—The Indians tried to use Pete Whisenant as a pinch hitter after they had announced he had been traded to the Senators.

—The Orioles swept a doubleheader from the Red Sox, 2-1 and 4-1, to tie the White Sox for first place.

—Cardwell, a native of Winston-Salem, N.C., who had a 17-26 record in three big league seasons, missed a perfect game because he walked the second batter to face him in the first inning of the Cubs' nightcap with the Cardinals. The 4-4, 210-pound right hander retired the next 26 batters in order, striking out seven and allowing only seven balls to be hit to the outfield.

—The Cardinals, who hadn't suffered a nine-inning no-hitter since May 11, 1919, had won the first

## What Does He Do For Encore?

CHICAGO (UPI)—Ex-Philadelphia pitcher Don Cardwell, who hurled a no-hitter in his debut with the Chicago Cubs Sunday, worried today what to do for an encore.

"All I had wanted was to get out there and win so the Cubs could be impressed with their trade for me," Cardwell said. "I wanted them to be proud. But what do I do now?"

Cardwell, 25, a 6-4 righthander who came to the Cubs last week in their near-desperate search for a front line pitcher faced only 28 batters Sunday to beat the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-0, in one hour, 46 minutes.

It was the first no-hitter pitched against the Cardinals since Horace Eiler of the Cincinnati Reds turned the trick on May 11, 1919, 41 years ago. Only a first inning walk to Alex Grammas—on a 3-2 pitch—marred a perfect game for Cardwell.

Cardwell said he threw mostly fast balls and change ups, with a few curves.

The Cardinals could hit only seven balls past the infield. Cardwell struck out seven and there

The free-for-all between the Reds and Phillies broke out in the eighth inning of their opener after Cincinnati pitcher Raul Sanchez hit three players with pitched balls in the same frame. Philadelphia Manager Gene Mauch charged the mound and players spilled out of both dugouts. Umpire Bill Jackowski cleared both benches of players not in the game when it was all over.

Johnny Callison, Tony Curry, Cal Neenan and Frank Herrera homered to lead the Phillies to a 14-3 victory in that one but Gus Bell drove in three runs after homer and two doubles as the Reds won the nightcap, 5-1.

Brown and rookies Jim Gentile and Ron Hansen knocked in two runs each to produce a six-run first inning that routed Boston's Frank Sullivan in the nightcap.

Johnny Antonelli pitched San Francisco's fourth shutout in five games, 2-0, over the Dodgers and the Braves beat the Pirates, 6-4, after a 4-2 loss in other National League games. The Yankees crushed the Senators, 11-2, and the Athletics whipped the Tigers, 5-0 and 5-4, in other AL games.

## Boros Winner In Ft. Worth Golf

PORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI)—Julius Boros flew home to see his two-week-old son for the first time today—\$5,000 richer and packing a distinct partiality for southwestern golf courses after winning the Colonial National invitation title with par golf Sunday.

The 40-year-old New Englander, who now lives in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and plays out of Mid Pines, N.C., sank a 20-foot sidehill pressure putt for a birdie on the 17th green to win a wild final round scramble that also involved Australian Koi Nagle, Gene Littler of Singing Hills, Calif., and Ted Kroil of Sarasota, Fla.

Boros' final round 36-34-70 along with earlier rounds of 70-71-69 enabled him to nose in ahead of Nagle and Littler who finished at 281, and the fast-closing Kroil, who wound up at 282.

Nagle, who had a 37-35-72, and Littler, who had a 38-34-72, won \$2,500 each, while Kroil's third straight sub-par 69 after an opening 75 won him \$1,700.

It was the ninth tournament championship in Boros' career and the fifth he has won in the Southwest.

Boros said he planned to skip this week's Hot Spring open and the competing Greenbrier, W.Va., open in order to visit his new offspring, the third son in a family of four children. He will rejoin the tour at Indianapolis Memorial Day weekend.

Behind Kroil the field was strung out, with Mike Soucek of Grossinger, N.Y., Ken Venturi of Palo Alto, Calif., and Jerry Bay of Los Angeles winning \$1,400 each for their 284s, and defending

champion Ben Hogan pocketing \$1,200 for a 285.

The year's big money winner Arnold Palmer was far down the list at 289 after a final round 38-37-75. His \$243.33 was his smallest check of the year and it marked the first time in 10 tournaments he had been out of the top five. His total earnings hit \$49,803.40.

There were no close buddies to hoist him atop their shoulders and there were no ex-roommates to pour cold drinks over his head in triumph.

In the midst of baseball's greatest moment of triumph for a pitcher—a no-hit game—Don Cardwell stood almost alone.

The Cubs shook Cardwell's hand and patted his back. Manager Lou Boudreau jokingly said Cardwell's pitching was "all right" but how was his hitting?
