

## **Meeting Dangerously Near** Collapse After First Day

PARIS (UPL) - Premier Nikita Khrushchev today withdrew his invitation to Pres dent Eisenhower to visit Russia, and in a bitter exchange over U.S. spy flights was accused by Eisenhower of coming all the way from Moscow just to sabotage the summit talks.

The Big Four conference teetered on the verge of immediate collapse after Khrushhey delivered what Western sources called an "insulting" attack on Eisenhower and

Premier threatened at the three-hour session to walk out of the summit meeting unless the United States halted its spy flights and punished those responsible.

Eisenhower issued a statement after today's angry and abortive opening session in which he said intelligence flights already had been suspended since the U2 incident, and asserted they will not be resumed.

Eisenhower then offered to neon such flights.







#### Looking **Sideways**

NEW YORK-Ninety years from now, when I am close to 150 years old and people are making more of a clamor for my memoirs than now is the case, I shall sit down and write, "How I Nodded to The President of France" and how he nodded to me. After all, it is a reporter's duty to be close enough to Gen. de Gaulle to nod. It was as known to me as to

anybody who could read that the General would arrive on the Columbine at 11 a.m. sharp at La-Guardia Airport, but when you have had four hours' sleep and there is no orange juice in the house, you tend to forget details like that, So I left Sea Cliff just at 10:30, driving in on the Expressway and thence toward La-Guardia on the Grand Central Parkway, My mind numbed by lack of sleep, I turned on the radio and it blared the news: "The Columbine is just reaching the deplaning area, the engines have been cut off, the ramp is lowering, There he is, standing in the door, the President of France, The plan is to..." There was no help for it. I was in The Area, I looked around. Every bridge over the parkway had a policeman and a detective and every 100 yards on the ground there was a policeman, I could hear motorcycles stuttering at the airport, I was

The best thing to do was risk a ticket, a small risk when every policeman in sight had the safety of the distinguished visitor and not my speeding on his mind, and speed up and get beyond the airport. I whipped it up to 55 miles an hour and listened to the radio: . Wagner has just welcomed the General and Mmes, de Gaulle, They are now getting into President Eisenhower's bubble car for the fast trip into Manhattan. The route will be Grand Central Parkway, East River Drive to South Street, thence up Broadway for a ticker-tape parade." I decided to cut away from the parkway and was stopped by a patrol car.

Parkway. Now I could hear the

sirens of the motorcycle police

behind me. I zipped off the Parkway and onto the Triborough Bridge. There the police stood in the center strip 100 feet apart. Patrol cars were clustered like grapes. No one seemed to care if I went fast and I did, keeping far to the right lane. Two trucks ahead of me, in the middle lane, were rudely shunted to the right by a patrol car with annoyed officers sticking their heads out and yelling.

The sirens were getting louder and it occurred to me that we would jam simultaneously into urved section leads off to the Manhattan exit. I saw the entrance to it looming ahead and now the sirens were loud behind me. I got to the turn, made it on two wheels and two officers waving violently bade me speed up. I took the tunneled curve at 65, tires squealing and the old freight car station wagon rocking, then braked as I came up to the toll booth. The officer there gave me a cold look and said: "It's a little early for a rodeo, isn't it?" I said; no, it was little early for the President of France. He took my quarter and waved me on just as the motorcade snarled its way through the

non-pay entry and roared on. The motorcycle officers leading the way didn't even look sideways. The nose of the presidential bubble car came alongside and then the tonneau. I glanced in and there he sat, all six feet four inches of him, and alongside him huddled the mayor of New York. Our eyes caught and I nodded. The grave. capped head nodded back. I ventured a small smile of amity. The

president of France merely nodded again. He didn't smile. The bubble car sped on, leaving me behind. I tried, at the 125th Street exit, to swing out into the middle line for more turning room

and a siren blasted behind me. "Keep right!" a voice commanded. "Keep there all the way!"

Swerved back to the right, managed the curve without scraping paint or steel, settled down to 40 miles an hour and curved down and off the bridge onto the Eas River Drive. The motorcade was far ahead now, but the line of officers still stood at the curbing stiffly at attention. A block ahead I thought I saw an inspector of police I knew, Dan Shannon, but it wasn't he. I passed on and, at 53rd Street, was stopped.

A young policeman came over. "You come by way of La-Guardia?" he asked. I said yes. "Must of been something," he said. "Big deal."

I said I suppose so. "Well, how often do you get a president of France in New York?" he said, "One of those

VICTORY FOR FEATHERBEDDERS

The U. S. Supreme Court has handed down a decision that means more and bigger featherbeds at the expense of the nation's railroad system. Involved in the litigation was

the Chicago & Northwestern Railway, which decided three years ago to shut down 123 freight stations that were little used. Closing of the stations meant that the jobs of some telegraph operators, a number of whom had been drawing a full day's pay for less than 60 minutes' work per day, would come to an end. The telegraphers' union threat-

ened to call a strike unless the rail line agreed to negotiate on a demand that none of the men be dropped unless the union approved. The U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals agreed to issue an injunction barring the strike. In mid - April, however, the

U. S. Supreme Court held 5 to 4 that the injunction was improper and conflicted with the Norris-LaGuardia Act that prohibits court interference in "labor disputes." The meaning of this ruling is that a union demand for job security is regarded as a proper subject for negotiation. Other spions can be expected to demand a clause in their contract that says no position shall be discontinued except by agreement between the union and the employer. Such a clause would be an ironclad guarantee of featherbed-

Associate Justice Tom Clark, who dissented from the decision, pointed out that a strike "would be the deathknell of the railroad." He declared that the high court was, in effect, telling the Chicago and Northwestern that it must obtain the okay of the union before letting go employes that it no longer has use of. "Everyone," he added, "knows what the answer of the union will be Speaking for the majority, As

sociate Justice Black dismissed

the railroad's reasonable contention that the union demand constituted "an attempt to usurp legitimate managerial prerogative in the exercise of business judgment." He blithely observed that Congress passed the Norris - La Guardia Act "knowing that it might sometimes increase the expense of railroad operations because of increased wages and better working conditions." Then the judge, who has so often voted on the court to invade the rights of Congress and the states, had the gall to say: "If the scope of the Norris - La Guardia Act IN ... be cut down in order to prevent waste, Congress should be the body to do so."

Another dissenter from the majority decision, Justice Charles Whittaker said he was "Fearful that the innovation and reach of the court's conclusion will be destructive of congressional policy and the public interest." He cited the unsatisfactory profits of the rail line, and observed that the contemplated efficiencies were planned in an effort to protect service to the public and the jobs of 18,000 other employes whose livelihood is dependent upon the railway's success.
