

Texans Cast 1,519,257 Votes In May 7 Primary

Texans cast a total of more than 1,519,257 votes in last Saturday's Democratic primary election, the Texas Election Bureau's final report on returns showed Saturday night.

The TEB tabulated returns from all of the state's 254 counties, including 241 complete. The returns included 3,977 of a total of 5,484 precincts.

They did not change the political picture as it shaped up from

trends a few hours after the polls closed.

Gov. Price Daniel, 49, won a third term with 902,335 votes. Jack Cox, the 38-year-old Breckenridge oilman running against Daniel, got 416,902.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey won his sixth term with 432,008 votes against 629,410 for Don Yarborough, 34, a Houston lawyer.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson won a third term with 750,248 votes over House Speaker Waggoner Carr with 584,593 votes and Austin lawyer Robert L. (Bob) Looney with 103,850.

CHICAGO (UPI) — An elevated train jumped the tracks early Monday, injuring 24 persons, two seriously.

The accident occurred about a half mile from where a four-car train derailed last month, injuring some 30 persons.

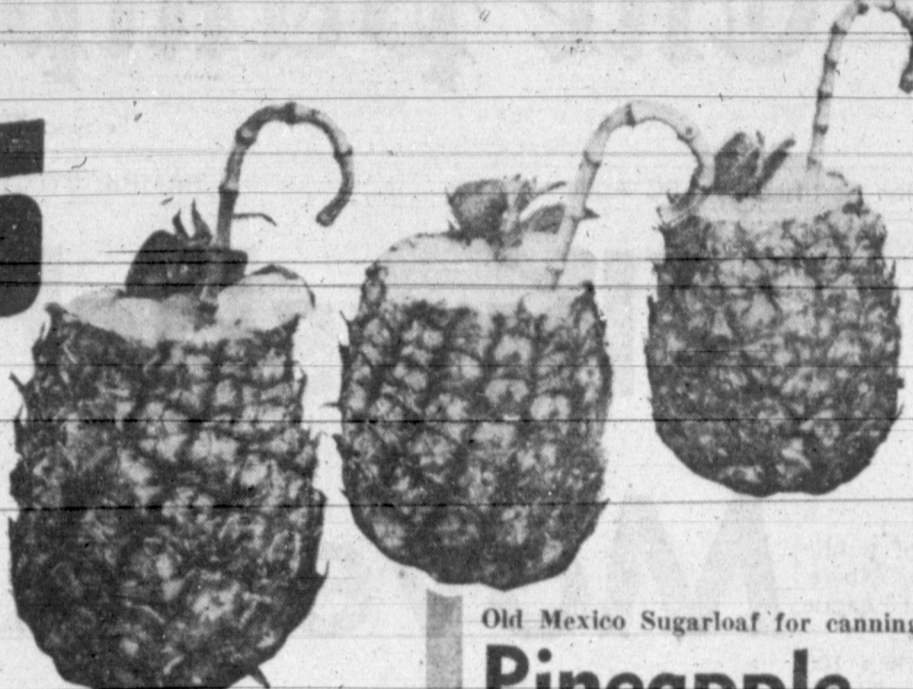

NEW YORK (UPI)—Hawaii has its bills over the years and up such an excellent credit that mainland businessmen come to take our 50th state granted.

The tax foundation gives Hawaii a gold star in its "Monthly Tax Features" publication. In its first year as a state, Hawaii has set a good example for its older sisters by reducing taxes. Says the foundation, "The tax cut is effective next Jan. 1 and it amounts to 7 per cent."

Standard and Poor's found main and capital flowing to the islands at an increasing rate, notably in tourism which it holds soon will rise above sugar and pineapple as the islands' source of income.

Cardwell Gets \$1,000-Raise For No-Hitter

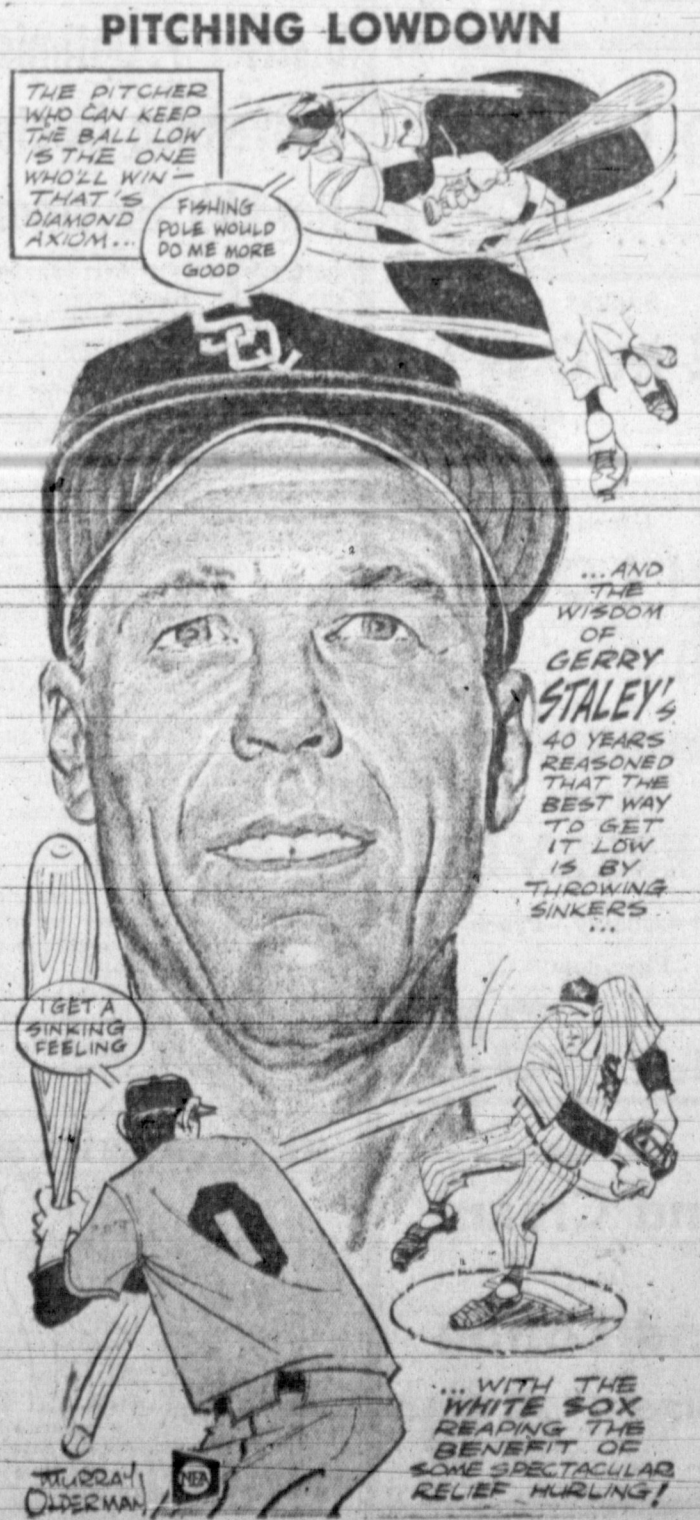

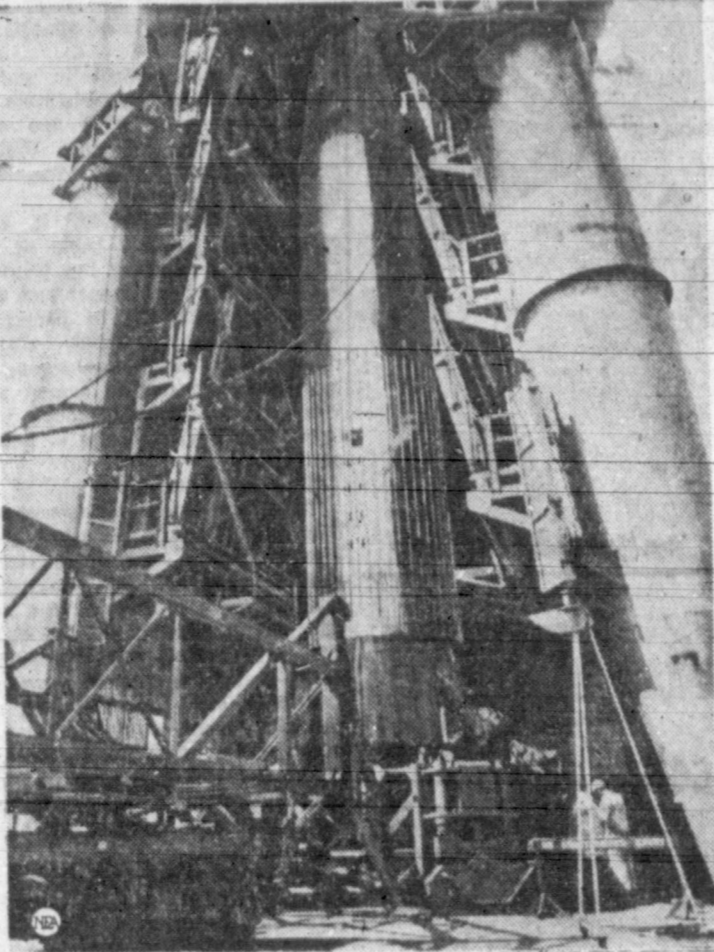

New President Of Texas U. Was Teacher

The new president of the University of Texas is a "self-styled ex-English teacher converted to administration."

He is Dr. Harry Hunt Ransom, 51, who was named president Friday by University regents after Dr. Logan Wilson was promoted from president to chancellor.

Ransom is a man of varied interests — they range from copyright law to bibliography to Texas history to a student's transition from high school to college.

At the university, Ransom has two key achievements. He pushed the founding of the Texas Quarterly, a new publication that is creating national interest, and has been instrumental in establishing the university as a research center in the Southwest.

Ransom joined the university's English faculty in 1935. He holds masters-of-arts and doctor-of-philosophy degrees from Yale.

In 1958 he was honored by his alma mater, the University of the South where he received his bachelor's degree. The same year, Baylor University conferred a doctorate of laws degree on him.

U.S. Scientists Call Red Rocket 'Minor Advance'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U. S. scientists today viewed Russia's launching of a five-ton "space ship" as only a minor advance and said they would not speed up America's program for putting a man into space.

The U.S. timetable calls for an attempt later in 1961 to orbit a one-ton manned satellite under the Project Mercury program. This country also expects to have a rocket ready next year that could duplicate the Soviet feat.

Dr. John P. Hagen, former director of the Vanguard earth satellite program, said the latest Russian launching represented only a minor step forward because "the real problem is to get the vehicle safely back to earth."

Other scientists said the "dummy" the Russians said they placed aboard the space ship might turn out to be a living man "if they get him down unharmed." Otherwise, they added, "he remains a dummy."

Members of Congress also tended to minimize the Soviet accomplishment. Chairman Overton Brooks (D-La.) of the House Space Committee said it apparently was calculated more for world psychological impact than to learn more about space.

A survey of U.S. space authorities showed they were puzzled why the Russians should put a dummy into space rather than a dog, or an ape, or a human being. They agreed that no dummy could provide the biological information that could be obtained by a living space traveler.

Progress Made In Learning How Children Will Develop

NEW YORK (UPI) — Psychologists long have been searching for reliable ways of predicting the future personality development of children.

Given the tools to make such predictions with a high degree of accuracy would mean more efficient planning educational programs to capitalize on a child's capacities.

Such a psychological crystal ball also would make it easier to identify children who are in the early stages of mental and emotional disorders — a time when prompt treatment usually is most effective.

Some progress in the search is contained in a report on a 10-year study directed by investigators at the University of Minnesota Institute of Child Welfare.

The results of the study of the mental health of children in Minnesota's Nobles County recently were reported in the Journal of Educational Psychology.

One of the important findings was that teachers' ratings of children and the scores the children made on various intelligence tests give a better indication of the children's later adjustment than did personality tests.

It appeared to be easier to predict correctly whether a child would make an outstanding adjustment than whether he would make a poor adjustment, however.

Among predictions of poor adjustment, the greatest number of correct predictions concerned the children who would drop out of school.

The next greatest number of correct predictions concerned those who would become delinquent.

During the study it also was found that when compared with poorly adjusted children, children who are well-adjusted consistently give more pleasantly rather than unpleasantly toned responses.

The better adjusted children also tended to express likes rather than dislikes with respect to particular activities.

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — L. O. Hooper, writing in Forbes Magazine, remarks that current prices for many of the high-rated science stocks still are "vogue" prices and not "value" prices and that vogue usually end unexpectedly.

He bases his conviction on: "You can't even with approximate accuracy, estimate earnings three to 10 years in advance, especially in such a dynamic scientific environment."

There is no point in buying a stock now at a price you think it might be worth several years from now because you are "paying your profit" for it in advance.

Most of these science stocks recently have been in a type of stock market vogue which in the past always has been liquidated in a correction.

Reynolds & Co. has a report on Warren Brothers Co. which notes that in view of the satisfactory outlook for the road building industry, the shares now selling at about 7.2 times 1959 earnings appear undervalued. Reynolds recommends the stock for reasonable income, safety and a potential for substantial appreciation.
