This is what interests me: the fact that a very rich little boy, nine years old and feeling perfectly terrible, made his fonely days on an Arizona ranch tolerable by training goats. John Cuneo Jr. is the son of the family that owns the Cuneo Press in Chicago. Twenty years ago he was a sick little boy and they sent him out to Arizona to pick up some health. He found the ranch swarming with unemployed goats, so he gave them a job learning how to do things in unison. Once he had trained thom he also found he was well again. He shipped himself and the goats back to the family dairy farm near Chicago. It was this kind of giant farm: city people came out on Saturdays and. Sundays 10 watch the milking of the cows. Young John figured that the average citizen would get his fill of milking-watching in about nine minutes flat, so he added his trained goats to the spectacle and began corralling other creatures worth training. In time, money assembled a full menagerie.

He assumed that in time he would be active in management at Cuneo Press, so when he was, old enough he went to Georgetown University and studied pusiness administration. But he couldn't get his animals off his mind and each summer he added to the collection. He is now 23 years old and wears a black tie and dinner jacket (plus trousers, of course) to work his eight savage leopards (almost anybody can train lions and tigers; leopards are born killers); eight wild Siberian wolf dogs (they are killers, too); a black panther; and African zebra; five bears; motorcycle - riding polar bear; an Lica Ilama and a Liberty pony troupe plus some midget Irish ponies. What is remarkable is the assemblage of these and the training of them, since wolf dogs and leopards are, by common consent and no holds barred, bitter, immediate enemies.





ISTANBUL (NEA) - A grimfaced student leader stamped out his cigarette and said bitterly: "Menderes gave us bread but he robbed us of our freedom.'

As he spoke, students were counting their casualties in prisoners and wounded and girding to continue their fight against the repressive regime of Premier Adnan Menderes. An uneasy truce prevailed in this city whose bustling life is familiar to me from years' of residence and many return visits.

The fabulous Golden Horn was again teeming with humanity and ferry boats were playing the narrow strait separating Europe from Asia - but one sensed the tension as tanks and armored cars roamed the streets and grim-faced soldiers, carrying clubs and rifles, continued patrolling.

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


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



They will become increasingly solated and lost in their lonely struggle to comprehend this hardpressed world we live in, never earning to feel compassion and meness with it.

What we American parents want is help with the truth about ourselves - a new way to find skilled friends to call on when we are overpowered with the work of creating Americans.
