Herter Says U-2 Spy Flights Helped U. S.

Explains Espionage Activities To NATO

PARIS (UPI) - Secretary of State Christian A. Herter said today American U2 spy flights had been going on for four years and had produced information of great importance of safeguarding the free world.

Herter spoke before a meeting of the 15-nation NATO Council which unanimously condemned Soviet Premier Khrushchev for torpedoing in the dangerous days ahead.

Nikita Decision Coming

In E. Berlin For Treaty Talks

BERLIN (UPI) - Waving his right hand like a victorious boxer, Nikita Khrushchev flew into Communist East Berlin today from Paris to tell the world whether he intends to force the Berlin issue to the explosion point.

Khrushchev already had threatened to sign a separate peace treaty with Communist East Germany-a move aimed at forcing the Allies out of West Berlin, isolating the city and splitting Germany forever.

He is expected to state his in tentions Friday in another of his fiery speeches before a hate-Eisenhower rally being prepared by the satellite nation. Today the Reds greeted him with denunciations of Eisenhower and West German Chancellor Konrad Ade-

German Communist leaders ran forward and greeted the Soviet leader with kisses on both his chubby cheeks.

Khrushchev stood at attention while a military band played the East German anthem. Then he walked forward, his arms bent at the elbows and swinging like a man marching into a fist fight toward the honor guard of goosestepping soldiers,

Most of the prominent leaders of East Germany except ailing President Wilhelm Pieck were on hand.

Unlike Paris Wednesday there were no boos for Khrushchey today-just smiles, flowers and kisses. The crowd was carefully chosen to avoid such an occurrence.



Prime Minister Harold Macmillan arranged to go directly home where he will report to the British House of Commons Friday.

Macmillan and Eisenhower met for an hour with de Gaulle Wednesday night for an assessment with their foreign ministers of the international situation resulting from Khrushchev's abrupt renewal of the cold war.

The Western Big Three had expected in advance of this week that the conference would produce little in the way of concrete measures to bring East and West closer together. At the most they had hoped for an improvement of the international atmosphere, with the possibility that there would be future summit conferences.

But they were not prepared for the ranting, raving show that Khrushchev put on almost from the moment he stepped on French soil, capped by his nearly incredible performance at a news conference packed with 1,500 to 2,000 people Wednesday.

Instead of an improved international atmosphere, things today were drastically worse and Western officials said this would force the West to make a thorough study of the Allied future course.

The reappraisal started in earnest this morning at a meeting of the NATO permanent council here in Paris.

U.S., French and British sources agreed that Khrushchev's attacks on the United States and Eisenhower over the U-2 spy plane downed on Russian soil actually had strengthened the NATO al-

That's what Ambassador Liewellyn Thompson cabled from Moscow before the President departed for the summit conference.

Thompson reported the Foreign Office had informed him that Premier Khrushchev is personally handling Powers' case, and intends to discuss it with the President in Paris.

Abel was convicted for espion age in 1957, and sentenced to 30 years. He is now at the federal enitentiary in Atlanta. He will be eligible for parole in April 1968, but could be released by presidential order. During Abel's trial, the FBI produced evidence, that he was a Colonel in Russian Intelligence, and characterized him as the highest-ranking spy ever apprehended in the U.S.

The Supreme Court upheld his onviction, in March of this year, by a 5 to 4 vote. Abel's attorneys have petitioned for a rehearing The odds are against that being
