





agement c. burns: If the burn involves serveral fingers-the hand or hands, scalp, face, chest, back abdomen genital area more than one extremity or more than half of a single extremity, arrange for immediate transportation to your doctor's

office or hospital. If the burned area is pearly white, or charred and dry, and is insensitive to pinprick (third degree), hurry to your doctor or his hospital even if the area involved is less extensive than indicated in the previous para-

graph. Except for application of ght projective dressing of a had ever been thought of when he lowel soaked in cool water do not treat or handle the burned area before or during the trip to the doctor's office or hospital.

Until prefessional care can be obtained, urge the victim to drink large quantities of salted water (one level teaspoonful to a pint) and sweetened beverages (rola drink, orange juice, honey).

If the burn is not extensive and does not involve any of the vital areas indicated previously, bathe it in cool water or treat it with soaks of cool water.

DO NOT apply any drug or chemical of any kind. Between baths or soaks, expose it to warm

DO NOT apply bandages or dressings, except for protection during sleep. To prevent sticking, anoint the burned area with any nonmedi-

cated grease (lard, butter, oleo, cold cream, mineral oil, vase-Unless pain is excessive

FEDERAL SPENDING (Christian Economics) In speaking of the tax problem Budget Director Maurice H.

Stans said: "If you are troubled by an \$80billion budget I can tell you that unless we hold the line now the day is not too distant when the budget will rise to the \$90 or 100billion range."

Of course, federal spending is already there and beyond, for if we add to the budget federal spending not included therein, such as social security, road building, and various pension trusts, we find that we are entering the decade of the '60's with federal spending already around the \$100 billion mark. Budget Director Stans has summarized for us some of the rea-

sons why federal spending continues to spiral upward: "We spend great sums on interest charges on our national debt, but we do not reduce the principal.

"We carry on massive federal programs which State and local governments could do better. "We devote large amounts of

money to farm price supports to reduce surpluses, with the opposite results. "We lend money to benefit

special groups at rates below those which the government must pay to its own creditors, when private sources could do the job. "We perpetuate federal programs which have long since met the objectives for which they were created."

In addition to the above, Mr. Stans warns us that even if Congress does not add any new program the level of federal spending will continue upward because of built-in increases in existing programs. Congress has started many things that cost modest sums the first year or two but larger amounts are required later. Enough of such programs have already been inaugurated to greatly expand federal spending. Only an aroused determined taxpayers' revolt can
