"SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI) Machinists at Lockheed missiles. and space division walked off the job at midnight to join machinists at Convair on strike.

Auto workers at Douglas also went on strike at midnight, but nggotiators came to terms a short time later and the Douglas dispute was expected to be officially ended later today.


Picket lines were established by machinists at missile bases. The Lockheed strike, coupled with the 10-day Convair strike, could tie up much of the nation's space-age testing program.

A Lockheed spokesman said however, the company planned to operate its plants "as near normal as possible."

Douglas officials and negotiators of the United Auto Workers reached unanimous agreement shortly before 3 a.m.-less than three hours after some 23,000 Douglas workers went on strike at Douglas plants at Tulsa, Okla.; Long Beach, Calif., and Charldtte, N.C.

Fred Thompson, one of Pampa's members on the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, "laid it on the line" at Tuesday's city commission meeting - "If we decide we don't want to be in it (the water project) then we're out of it from now on," he said.

But the commissioners accepted the challenge and adopted a resolution favoring the allocations of water and the rates set up by the authority.

On one point all the commissioners agreed; that on a long range scale this is the most economical water program that has been devised.

Over a 50-year period Pampa will be charged 13.30 cents per 1,000 gallons, of water, excluding purification costs which will run another three or four cents.

Pampa will have to pay 100 per cent of its share of the cost of the proposed dam, which will be \$1,748,000. Added to this will "be \$3,241,000 for the cost' of laying pipe from the proposed lake to the city. This brings the total to \$4,-989.000. Over a 50-year period, interest

on Pampa's indebtedness will increase the total outlay to approximately \$9,923,000. Other cities in the authority also will be assessed

mula, those cities closest to the dam and hence those which would benefit the most from the recreational facilities offered will pay proportionately more toward the building of the dam itself. Amarillo, for instance, will pay 162.5 per cent of its proportionate share of the dam computed against the share of water it will withdraw. Borger will pay 257.2 per cent "above its proportionate share of water claim on the construction of the dam. In short, Borger thought

Leon Hill, an engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation who has been working on the Canadian River project, pointed out that these figures were based on a 1958 study and would have to be changed. However, any change in them now will be small.

Looking Sideways

NEW YORK - I never itched to read anything Caryl Chessman ever wrote. The first book, "Cell 2455 Death Row" was a series of words and letters to me. I was aware there was such a book. Nothing else. The next two that came along also failed to draw me to them. Even the hysteria over his sullen, dogged fight to live did not create any curiosity in me. There was - there is-a fourth book: "The Kid Was a Killer." It is just out from Gold Medal Books in Paperback form and a messenger has all but put it in my lap. This one I have read. Now I know I was right to pass up the first three. This book is described as a novel. I would doubt it. I would

think that Chessman took violent, self - pitying areas from his own early life and put them into a thinly - veiled form of fiction. Not good fiction, but fiction. If Chessman wrote it as pure

fiction, divorced from anything real in his life, I have to say that at least his own mind created the character of The Kid and The Kid, in many disturbing ways, is akin to what Chessman was: a hater of the society he lived in. What the book does is set up a series of pathetic reasons that made The Kid a killer. The June 15-22 narrator in this case is a sports and feature writer. The Kid is the object of his study. Like most -nay, all- non-newspaper writers who attempt to create a fictional newspaper reporter, Chessman failed abysmally in giving his man any even slight credibility. The dialogue is phony, the atmosphere murky. I say this not because Chessman was a criminal and is now dead. I could not 5 actually care less on that score.

I say it because he wrote a novel and that novel is for sale and it is imperfect. As in most novels, somewhere along the line, the key is to be found- the one sentence that betrays the author's personal, intimate statement. It is in this book on page 143 The Kid is dying. He looks up with the light play-

ing on him and says: "I got hurt so bad a long time ago that nobody can ever hurt me again.' In an odd way, I think Chessman took that philosophy, pity and all, to the gas chamber with him. It sustained him. Nothing that Chessman ever wrote until the last hours, creates this belief in me. What did

When it comes to pain sensations caused by disturbances other maneuver called by the originating in the internal organs of the body, things get even more confusing than they do in the examples I have just given of snafus in areas served by spinal nerves.

The reason for this is the need for the internal organ to register its painful sensation in a skin area to which it was once related in the course of its development and from which it became separated. Let me try to make this clearer

by giving examples: The so-called referred pain of heart trouble may register in the left shoulder and down the inner surface of the left arm; of stomach trouble, behind the breast bone (heartburn); of gallstone colic, in the right shoulder. Now in the case of these mis-

leading registrations of referred pains, you may be able to help your doctor to a correct interpretation of these wrong numbers or crossed lines by furnishing an eyewitness account of the


