





NEW YORK- I don't want to elbow the ladies out of the kitchen these nice, warm June days or whittle anything from their rightful lustre, but every magazine or hostess I run into lately is making a great, big, fat and wide-eved deal over "coeur a la creme". You'd think to read the magazines and look at the girls that it was the most difficult kitchen trick since Lady

Actually, I have the sullen feeling that the cottage and cream cheese makers have played house with the strawberry growers to loose this peasant delicacy on the American public as something closely akin to hobnobbing with royalty. There is nothing mystic about coeur a la creme and, certainly, there is nothing of nobility about it. It's a dessert, that's all. It has been a common and unimpressed dessert in France for decades, maybe centuries, and is held in such level that old men walk along the streets hawking it from twowheeled, dog-pulled little carts. They blow cheap, small and usually a little rusted tin horns to announce themselves and their wares and you buy this dish right off the carts, street dust and all. It rests in little dishes on a bed of not too clean ice. The smaller and less tourist-infested streets of Paris, Lyons, Toulon, Marseilles and so on ring to the blasts from the little horns and aproned house wives come out and buy the item.

In Mexi , almost precisely the same dessert is sold in much the same way and I have never seen a Mexican, French or Spanish hostess get pink all the way up to her ears and announce with some hauteur mingled with pleasure that, "We are having coeur a la creme tonight." They simply slap it down on the table and you get your share.

Over here, of late, we have gone in for such folderol as heartshaped little wicker baskets for the strawberries and, on some tables, even heart-shaped napkins, heaven help us all to sanity. In France the dish is heart-shaped, the dish from which the dessert is served that is, and like as not it will have nicked edges. I can only help you out with a

12-serving recipe, but you can cut it in half for six or in thirds for four, or eat it all yourself. Just don't behave as though you were serving your guests shards of the Hope Diamond. It is a peasant recipe, no more, no less, and you need not take on airs about its being that, either.

Ready: Cream cheese - one pound Creamed Cottage cheese - one

Heavy cream - one cup Confectioners' sugar - 1/2 cup Sweetened strawberries - as you will in amount

Beat the cream cheese with a rotary beater, gradually add the cottage cheese, beating steadily until just about smooth. Add the cream and sugar and beat the daylight out of the whole thing until all is blended. Line a colander with cheese-cloth, place over a pan and pour the mixture into it. Let drain in refrigerator overnight. This removes the whey. Line your heart-shaped mold dish (it can be dog-shaped or any other shape, for all I care), with a single thickness of cheesecloth, spoon the cheese mix into it, pack down and refrigerate for three hours; Remove it from the fringe unmold peel

cheesecloth away and serve with the sweetened berries. What's to get so excited about, as Ethel Merman would phrase it. All you have done is serve a common dessert without, in your case, unwashed ice and street dust. Without tin horn or patient dog, old man and cart

Communists Use Lure Of Summits To Keep Free World Off Its Guard

does well to point out in "Protracted Conflict" (Harper & Brothers, \$3.95) that the Communists are winning in the battle for the world because they know they are in it while most of our western leaders and people do not yet realize that most important fact. Cultural interchange, Summit Conferences and visits by Communist leaders are mainly for the purpose of convincing the West that there is no serious conflict, that there is no need to be alarmed and that peaceful coexistence is quite possible. All these are instruments of policy used by the Communists to further their objective—our destruc-

Such tactics have so paralyzed the will of the people and the governments of free countries that they are unable to act in the face of the demonstrated facts that the Communists continually carry the conflict into our territory. They intervened in Korea, Indonesia, Indo-China, Latin-America Egypt, Syria, Laos, Iraq and in the domestic affairs of every western country; but we must never carry the ball into Red territory.

At the time of the uprising in East Germany, the rebellion in Hungary or the suppression - in Tibet, it was assumed all over the West that we could not, even indirectly, extend military aid to the patriots or even moral support in the way of breaking relations with the Communist countries without triggering a world war. Why then are the Commun ists able to pursue their worldwide. intervention without danger of setting off a general conflict? Clearly, western idealism and confusion is being turned to the advantage of the Communists. The West seems to think that the long series of aggressions perpetrated by the Communists are isolated incidents and not part of a general campaign to weaken our will and erode our strength.

They have been outstandingly successful up to this time. If they are permitted to continue so doing for a few years longer they will have won the most decisive battle in the world's history. Most of our leaders and most of our people do not yet seem to realize that our free western. Christian civilization is engaged in a titanic struggle for its life. Already the Communists hold us

in great contempt as evidenced by the attack on Laos just at Khrushchev was accepting Mr. Eisenhower's invitation to visit our country, Evidently, Mr. Khrushchev had no respect for our will or our understanding of the significance of Communist actions in their strategy for our destruc-

Peace offensives to allay our fears are a part of the Communist campaign. These are followed by little wars for annexing bits of territory here and there, sometimes very large bits. Meanwhile the campaign to weaken our vitallty by excessive spending all over the world is prosecuted vigorously and with the help of much of our own political, commercial and clerical leadership. Another facet of the campaign

is to increase the powers and functions of the United Nations with the full expectation of being able to use it as a means for the destruction of our freedom. Once U.N. is equipped with sufficient military power and the right to tax the nations of member countries, we will be stripped of our remaining wealth and forced to go along with Communistdictated policy. The western, Christian nations are now a minority in U. N. and with the admission of additional voting countries, now being urged even by our own leaders, the voting strength of the western bloc will decline. At that point U.N., with its enlarged powers, could seize our wealth by taxation and direct its military force against us if we refused to fall in line.
