## Dishonor To U.S. Flag In Mexico City Student Melee Commie Led

MEXICO CITY (UPI)— Police said today that Communists took a leading part in a "student" demonstration Tuesday night that blew up one U. S. flag and tried to burn another.

A U. S. flag mounted on papier-mache backing was blown up with gunpowder in front of the National Palace. Another U. S. flag was rescued by police as students trampled it and tried to set it on fire.

The demonstration was organized over a U. S. State Department demand for "explanation" of a Mexican congressman's pro-Cuba remarks.

Police dispersed the "students" with tear gas Tuesday night.

Students arrested said they were summoned to a meeting on behalf of the Latin American Students Congress called for Havana on July 28. Mexican delegates will attend, they said.

The students were held briefly Tuesday night and released on direct orders of Police Chief Luis Cuervo Ramirez.

A group of six federal senators and 14 deputies released a statement backing up pro-Cuba remarks by Congressional Permanent Commission President Emilio Sanchez Piedras.

"El Universal" also charged that former President Lazaro Cardenas "supposedly retired to private life" had been indirectly trying to influence opinion on the Cuban government.

The demonstrations Tuesday came after Communist-line follower Vicente Lombardo Toledano, head of the "Popular Party," had returned from Peking, China, where he attended a meeting of the executive council of the World Trade Union Federation, Moscow-dominated labor federation.

## Congo Is Undertaking To Settle Own Strife

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)— Prime Minister Patrice Lumumba and President Joseph Kasu Vubu today ordered all Belgian troops guarding white settlers in the strife-torn Congo to return to their regular bases.

In a telegram to the Belgian embassy here, the two leaders said they would undertake the protection of Belgian nationals and Europeans with loyal Congolese soldiers.

Lumumba and Kasu Vubu said they gave the orders on the basis of the friendship and assistance treaty signed between the Congo and Belgium on June 29. The order came shortly after

disclosure that the Congolese government has urgently appealed to the United Nations to send troops to the Congo, which gained its freedom from Belgium only two weeks ago.

The Congo denounced the intervention of Belgian troops as an "act of aggression" and said that "colonialist provocations" were the actual cause for most of the trouble in the new republic.

The order by Lumumba and Kasu Vubu came as tough Belgian paratroopers appeared on the streets of Leopoldville. The soldiers showed up in the capital city early today after mutinous troops closed down the Leopoldville airport. The airport reopened soon afterward.

The request for U.N. military aid came as Belgian troops reinforcement poured into the Congo.

## U.S. Sends Ship To Aid Citizens In Congo

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States shied today from sending troops to restore order in the riot-ridden Congo but rushed the aircraft carrier Wasp to save Americans from harm in the new African nation.

The summer White House in Newport, R.I., reported President Eisenhower opposed the dispatch of U.S. troops to the Congo, even as part of a U.N. police force.

State Department officials here indicated they preferred to keep this country in the background of any U.N. action, perhaps supplying only airlift for an international force drawn from neighboring African countries.

Officials feared the use of American troops in the violence-torn Congo might spark Russian charges

of U.S. imperialism and, even worse, might prompt the Soviet Union to offer troops of its own.

The Congo government has asked the United Nations to help restore order in the two-week-old country. In a separate request Tuesday it appealed for the immediate dispatch of 3,000 U.S. troops.

U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold arranged an informal lunch meeting of the Security Council today on the Congo situation. It appeared the Congo appeal for U.S. troops would not be put to the council for a vote at that time.

## Johnson Is Coming On Strong In A Late Rally

LOS ANGELES (UPI)— Sen. John F. Kennedy lost a few votes today in frantic last minute maneuvers at the Democratic national convention but remained a top heavy favorite to win the presidential nomination at today's session.

Tension gripped the previously apathetic delegates as the hour approached for the roll call which will legalize Kennedy's claim to the nomination or provide the biggest upset in recent political history.

The 4,000 delegates and alternates were called into session at the saucer-shaped Los Angeles Sports Arena at 3 p.m. p.d.t. (5 p.m. e.s.t.) began the noisy ritual of nominating speeches and "spontaneous" demonstrations for "the man who..."

Stop - Kennedy forces, fighting down to the line, made small inroads on his strength in the California, Nevada, Delaware, Nebraska and New Mexico delegations.

The United Press International tabulation of indicated first-ballot preferences registered a slight ebb in Kennedy's lead during the past 24 hours. With 761 votes re-

quired for nomination, the latest tally gave Kennedy 736½.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson had 424½ in the latest count, Sen. Stuart Symington 80, Adlai E. Stevenson 67½, and the remaining 212½ votes were still uncommitted or scattered among favorite sons.

Rumors sped through this convention city about major defections from the Kennedy banner, but reporters found no evidence that an effective stop-Kennedy movement had materialized.

Kennedy himself shrugged off the corridor gossip that he had "crested" just short of victory. "I will win the nomination," he declared confidently in a statement this morning.

The Deep South, where there had previously been some Kennedy sentiment, solidified its support of Johnson after absorbing a bad beating in Tuesday night's floor battle over a tough civil rights platform plank authored by Kennedy's camp.

Johnson's spokesmen were still saying publicly—and with seeming

## Unpopular Platform Plank

## North-South Rift On Civil Rights Widened

LOS ANGELES (UPI)— The Democratic Party took a 1960 campaign stand on civil rights today that widened the North-South rift and seemed certain to cut into party strength in Dixie.

Riding roughshod over impassioned Southern opposition, the national convention Tuesday night roared its approval of a platform with the strongest civil rights plank in party history.

Southern delegates, whose cheers for their spokesmen were drowned out at times by boos from other state groups and the galleries, did not stage a walkout

as a number of them did when a milder plank was adopted in 1948.

Southerners Sit Tight They sat tight partly in hope of protecting the presidential chances of Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, their favorite candidate.

Under-tones of Johnson's rivalry with Sen. John F. Kennedy, came close to the surface when Sen. Philip A. Hart (Mich.), a Kennedy supporter, urged the convention not only to adopt the platform but also to nominate a man whom the document "will fit to a T."

Kennedy said Tuesday he fully endorsed the document. (See UNPOPULAR, Page 3)

## Rousing Welcome For Stevenson Inflates Hopes Of His Backers

LOS ANGELES (UPI)— Adlai E. Stevenson's partisans claimed today that the rousing welcome he got at the Democratic National Convention showed he would be nominated a third time for the presidency.

Angered backers of Sen. John F. Kennedy cried "foul," however.

Sen. Mike Monroney (D-Okla.), chief strategist in the "draft Stevenson" camp, contended jubilantly that the demonstration showed that the delegates would settle on a Stevenson-Kennedy ticket on the fourth or fifth ballot.

Ohio Gov. Michel DiSalle, Kennedy lieutenant, charged that Stevenson backers apparently had packed the seats in the lower gallery of the Sports Arena. He said they were trying to "stampede" the convention through the demonstration.

"Somebody should answer for that," DiSalle declared. The Kennedy camp split over whether Stevenson's dramatic entrance showed he was or wasn't a candidate. He has repeatedly refused to declare his candidacy but said he would bow to a draft.

DiSalle said it was a tradition for a candidate not to go to the convention floor until after a nominee is picked and therefore he assumed "Stevenson no longer is a candidate."

But Kennedy's brother, Robert, said that while he hadn't thought previously that Stevenson was a candidate, the events of Tuesday convinced him the twice-defeated presidential candidate was trying anew.

Robert Kennedy minimized the importance of the reception accorded Stevenson. He said that if any of the candidates entered the hall, they would receive a similar ovation.

## Goings On In Smoke Filled Restaurants

LOS ANGELES — Phil Regan, a low-ceiling nightclub tenor and an apostate New York policeman, has risen to the office of Social secretary to David J. McDonald, the president of the United Steel Workers. In this role, Mr. Regan put on an extra-inning ruckus at Dave Chasen's restaurant which made Perle Mesta's Mostest, of the Truman Regime, look like a tomato-cake cookout by a bunch of unwashed bindle-stiffs down by the water tank and a "whistlestop on the M. K. & T."

Mr. Regan invited 1,000 guests, including George Meany, the president of the AFL-CIO, and, for a

brief half hour, had as a special, hostage of political circumstances, Sen. Jack Kennedy, who does not drink intoxicants.

Rockefeller's sainted grampaw spinning like bobbins in their shrouds. Those American giants had waged mighty affrays against dam agitators demanding the revolutionary six-day week and that satanic invention of the Haymarket anarchists, the eight-hour day. Now many of the cops have unions and the book of protocol endorsed by the benevolent order of chiefs of police recommends "please" and "thank you" to pickets.

The leading elocutionists of the Democratic convention have been reminding the delegates that this is a time of Change and Innovation. ## Sam Rushes About Seeking Combination

LOS ANGELES, July 13—Speaker Sam Rayburn is undertaking a last-ditch effort to weld an alliance of Johnson-Symington forces behind the former — the majority leader of the Senate.

In this dramatic backstage move, Rayburn has made a spectacular proposal to former President Truman.

Under this plan, Truman would strikingly cement the advocated Johnson-Symington coalition by placing the Texas Senator in nomination at tonight's session of the convention.

For Truman to do this would mean reversing himself on Senator Symington, whom he endorsed for

this presidency. It would also entail the withdrawal of the Missouri senator from the tense struggle for the nomination.

A significant hint that this is under consideration came from Rep. Charles Brown, Mo., Symington's campaign manager.

To a staff writer of the Los Angeles Mirror-News, Brown is quoted as saying, "Six governors and four leaders from populous states have urged me to ask Senator Symington to accept the second spot. These governors include Michael DiSalle of Ohio."

The same paper also quoted Symington as asserting, "I am interested in the presidency."

Speaker Rayburn has been in constant touch with Truman since arriving in Los Angeles. Rayburn talked to him by phone several times

Meanwhile, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey is planning to declare for Stevenson today.

Yesterday, Minnesota's Gov. Orville Freeman announced he will vote for Kennedy. Sen. Eugene McCarthy, Minn., previously had come out for Johnson.

Humphrey is explaining his swing to Stevenson as a maneuver to further Freeman's chances for the vice presidency. Humphrey believes he will be in a stronger "bargaining position" to press Freeman's chances.

once a veritable page of statistics, a Moral Lesson and a compendium of more knowledge about Hollywood and the American drama than the morgue of Variety. These two dominant impressions emerged today from the White House handling of the African and Latin American situations in the past few days.

Running short, he telegraphed Ross, the editor of The New Yorker, who invested \$3,000, which by unreliable but enchanting lore repaid Ross somewhere between \$50,000 and \$500,000. The range of tolerance between these figures is typical of Hollywood economics.

Spareribs were six for a dime.

### Vest Subconsciously Is To Modern Man What Suit Of Armor Was Centuries Ago

NEW YORK (UPI)—Grandpa's watch, the Elks tooth and Phi Beta Kappa key get back their backdrop this fall.

The men's wear industry has revived the vest.

Fifty per cent more suits with vests will be sold this fall than last, reported the wool bureau.

Harold Dessler, stylist for the trade group, said that many manufacturers have included vests with suits for the last couple of years. They're finally catching on for several reasons.

"We're living in an age of conformity," said Dessler. "The vest is one symbol of conformity. It's a time also when women generally have the same status in society as men. A man feels his masculinity threatened. The vest subconsciously is to modern man what the suit of armor was

centuries ago—a sign of virility."

A spokesman for the American Institute of Men and Boys' Wear, which represents fabric makers, manufacturers and retailers, added a couple of reasons. One is that men's styles, like women's, move in cycles. The vest is cycling around again.

"And there's a general revolt against college sloppiness," said Rion Bercovici of the institute. "A trend to formality. The vest is particularly popular with the younger men."

The best goes back at least to 1600, according to Samuel Pepys' diary. During the French Revolution it died because the vest was a mark of nobility, and no noble wanted to be identified, at the risk of losing his head.

Vests have been worn in America since Revolutionary days, were extremely popular after World War I, and died again during World War II because of restrictions on use of fabric. Dessler said.

In their newest styling, they come as separates—that is, sports vests of contrasting color or fabric, often a bold red corduroy, a paisley or a plaid; as the classic vest with pointed bottom and four pockets, shown with the natural shoulder suit; and the vest cut straight across at the bottom and with lapels, worn with the continental, or shaped, suit.

If your back hairline seems to be lengthened by a low, scraggly line of dark fuzz when you wear your hair in a chignon, bleach it to skin-color lightness. It will then look like a downy fuzz instead of hair whose dark shadows tend to shorten the length of your neck.

### Razzle-Dazzle Earrings Complement Understated Cut Of Summer Clothes

NEW YORK (NEA)—Some fashions are just for fun. They don't qualify as off-beat; they're simply meant to make you revel in being a girl.

At the top of the list this summer is the gypsy hoop earring. No gypsy, of course, ever had hoop earrings like some of these. For some are fashioned from precious gold, silver or platinum and set with diamonds, sapphires, emeralds, rubies or amethysts. These carry high and fancy price tags.

But their counterparts are done in handsome costume jewelry which whose prices conform to slender budgets. Here, the materials used are fake pearls, brilliants, golden metal, coins, beads or plastic bubbles.

Altogether, there are more than 1,500 different gypsy hoop styles on jewelry counters right now at prices that start at a few cents and

The plain or textured gold hoops are designed for daytime wear. But from five on, hoops sparkle with fire as you turn your head.

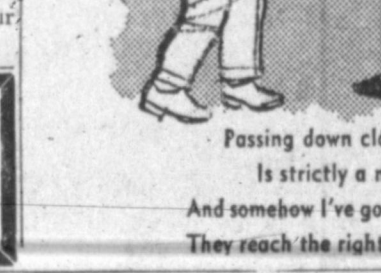

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# Khrush Says Fliers Admitted 'Spy' Flight

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev announced today two captured American Force officers had confessed making a spy flight against the Soviet Union. He accused the United States of trying to provoke a serious military conflict.

The two airmen were the only known survivors of an RB-47 reconnaissance plane shot down over the Barents Sea July 1. Khrushchev, scowling and red-faced in a mood reminiscent of his first disclosure of the explosive U-2 incident only two months before, called the flight "new, blatant violation."

# Cuba Asks UN To Settle U.S. Dispute

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) — Cuban Foreign Minister Raul Roa scheduled a series of meetings Tuesday with Communist Latin American and African delegates in an effort to whip up support for Premier Fidel Castro in a diplomatic battle with the United States. The Castro regime called Monday on the U.N. Security Council to consider what it termed United States "aggressions" against Cuba. The U.S. promptly denounced the allegations but said it would not oppose the meeting because it wanted the world to know the truth.

He told a news conference at the Kremlin that the incident showed the promises of President Eisenhower, who had promised at the Paris summit meeting that such flights would be discontinued, "are not worth a penny."

The premier said that "depositions" taken from the two survivors said they had left a base in England and "flew along the northern frontiers of the Soviet Union on an espionage mission." The first Soviet announcement on the incident Monday had said the plane was shot down 14 miles inside Soviet air space in the Kola Peninsula area. It said Russia did not carry out its previous threats to destroy the base or bases from which such a flight originated only because the plane was shot down before any deep penetration could be accomplished.


The Americans who survived were identified as 1st Lt. Freeman Bruce Olmstead, 25, of Elmira, N.Y., and 1st Lt. John R. McKone, 28, of Tonganoxie, Kans. A Russian vessel fished them out of frigid Arctic Circle waters. The body of Capt. William A. Palm, 39, of Oak Ridge, Tenn., was recovered. The other three crewmen are still missing. Khrushchev accused Britain of being an "accomplice" in what he called America's "dangerous game with the destinies of the world."

Diplomatic observers said the Castro move apparently was the first step by the bearded Cuban revolutionary leader to build himself up as the Latin American champion of the small nations of the world against American "imperialists." Last Thursday Castro pictured Cuba as the "leader" of newly-developing states in their struggle to shake off the bonds of "imperialism." On Friday he served notice he was organizing a worldwide propaganda campaign "to mobilize world public opinion in protest against (U.S.) aggressions."

Ambassador Jose A. Correa of Ecuador is currently president of the Security Council under the rotation system. It was to him that Roa submitted the Cuban indictment of the United States, charging "repeated threats, harassment, maneuvers, reprisals and aggressions." Correa said he could not set a date for a session until he has conferred with U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold.

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# Law Challenges Ford In 2nd All-Star Tilt Today

NEW YORK (UPI)—Manager Walter Alston called for another order of the same thing that won the first All-Star game, Pittsburgh pitching, and picked Vern Law to start today for his favored National League team against the American League.

Law, the 24's top winning hurler with an 11-4 mark, opposed southpaw Whitey Ford (5-5) of the American League.

A crowd of about 50,000 was expected at Yankee Stadium for the second of 1960's All-Star clashes with a forecast of warm weather, but not nearly as torrid as the 100-degree steam bath Monday when the Nationals beat the Americans, 5-3, in Kansas City.

Right hander Law relived and got the final two outs of that victory, and skipper Alston did not hesitate to ask him to get the Nationals off to a good start in this one.

"I feel fine," said Law when

asked if he was ready to pitch again so soon. "There's no tightness in my arm at all."

"A guy that lives like him is always in shape," commented catcher Smokey Burgess of the Pirates. Law is an elder in the Mormon Church.

Bob Friend, Law's Pirate teammate who started Monday's game and was the winner with a one-hit, three-inning effort, was unlikely to see service again today. But Alston undoubtedly was prepared to call again on Elroy Face, the Pirates' wee relief ace who pitched hitless ball for 1 2-3 innings on Monday.

Ford, who announced that he was "anxious to take a crack at the National League," had the advantage of working in his home ball park. And it's a park that traditionally is kinder to southpaws than to right-handers because lefties have a better chance to keep lefty batsmen from popping home runs into the "short porch" right field stands.

The same lineups were slated to start today's game as started Monday's. The starting lineups were picked for both games by a vote of the major league players themselves. Reserves and pitchers were picked by Managers Alston of Los Angeles and Al Lopez of the White Sox; last year's pennant winning pilots.

Thus Alston was to go with Willie Mays of the Giants in centerfield, Skinner in left, Ed Matthews of the Braves at third, Aaron in right, Ernie Banks of the Cubs at short, Joe Adcock of the Braves at first, Bill Mazeroski of the Pirates at second and Del Crandall of the Braves catching.

Lopez started with Minnie Miñoso of the White Sox in left,

Frank Malzone of the Red Sox at third, Roger Maris of the Yankees in right, Mickey Mantle of the Yankees in center, Bill Skowron of the Yankees at first, Yogi Berra of the Yankees catching, Pete Runnels of Boston at second, and Ron Hansen of the Orioles at short.

Thus, with Ford hurling, there were five Yanks in the starting lineup for the first All-Star game played in Yankee Stadium since 1939.

Lopez was ready to use Vic Power of Cleveland at first base as a substitute "if he's ready." Power begged off playing on Monday because he said he felt ill. This gave rise to reports Lopez and Power were feuding, but the Chicago manager denied it.

The American League leads the series, 16 games to 12.

# Reyes Selected Jersey Skipper

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (UPI)—Napoleon Reyes, 40-year-old former New York Giants infielder, will take over as temporary manager of the transplanted Jersey City baseball club when it plays its first International League game here Friday night.

Reyes, whose job is scouting for

the Cincinnati Reds in the U.S. and the Caribbean islands, will handle the team until a permanent manager can be hired.

As a native Cuban who talks the language of many of his players and a popular former Jersey City player, Reyes would be ideally suited for the job as manager. But he does not care to manage and the Reds feel he is more valuable as a scout. The Reds have a working agreement with the Jersey City franchise.

Reyes, who has been nursing an ailing leg, arrived here Tuesday night from the Caribbean. He will not join the club in Miami but will take over for the first home game against the Columbus Jets Friday night in Roosevelt Stadium.

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# Ingo Now Hermit, Trains for Next Patterson Fight

NEW YORK (UPI)—Young Bill Ingo, brand new president of Nature Sports, Inc., disclosed today that Ingemar Johansson, well known Swedish playboy, will become a semi-hermit while training for his next fight with heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson.

Draper, dark-haired Fugazy—who was elevated to the FSI presidency Tuesday—made the Johansson disclosure this morning before flying to the West for an investigation of possible sites for the fight.

Since dimpled Ingemar lost the heavyweight crown to Patterson in a fifth-round knockout, June 20, reports have been increasing at his training "left much to be desired," preyed Bill said.

"Ingemar telephoned me from Copenhagen, Denmark, yesterday," he continued. "And he said he would not train at any resort at this time. Instead, he will have his own trailer camp in the mountains—made up of seven or eight trailers for sparring partners, a cook and other members of the entourage."

Fugazy, the 35-year-old travel-bureau tycoon who owns 50 percent of the stock in Feature Sports and Johansson is taking a page from the Spartan book of Patterson this time. Patterson trained in semi-hermit seclusion for their

second fight in June, Bill stressed, to make certain that the Swede would not repeat his knockout victory of 1959.

"Over the phone Ingemar assured me yesterday he would not retire if he won back the title in November," he emphasized. "That was the main reason he called me to deny stories that said he would retire after the fight. He also wanted to know if we had a date or site yet."

Has New York been ruled out as a site?

"No, not definitely," Bill replied. "But it will have to be ruled out unless we get a definite assurance of proper police protection from Police Commissioner Stephen P. Kennedy. All other officials—city and state—want the fight, but none apparently can persuade Kennedy. And, accordingly, we do not expect to get his assurance."

Lack of proper police protection outside the Polo Grounds, June 29, resulted in three gates being smashed and approximately 15,000 admitted free to the ballpark, where they harassed the paying spectators, he charged.

"It looks good for some other city now," he added. "And Johansson, at least, hopes that the rubber match will be staged in California."

# Paret Wins By 6th Round KO

NEW YORK (UPI)—Welterweight champion Benny Kid Paret, who knocked out Sugar Hart in a non-title bout, will make his first defense of the 147-pound crown against Argentina's Federico Thompson at Madison Square Garden, Oct. 15.

Cuban Benny, 23, knocked out slender Hart of Philadelphia at 2:36 of the sixth round in their non-title bout at the Garden Tuesday night with a right to the chin.

It was such a hard right that 24-year-old Hart said: "When it hit me the lights went out. And when they came on again, I found I had been counted out." The blow stretched him on his back.

Paret, weighing 152½ pounds to Hart's 153½, was so impressed with his own punching power at that weight he said he might campaign for the middleweight crown after defending the 147-pound title against Thompson.

The champion scored his ninth knockout and 32nd victory in 41 bouts against an opponent who had been promised the October

title shot instead of Thompson if he knocked Paret out Tuesday night. The champion was favored at 13-5.

It was Hart's sixth defeat and fourth kayo in 37 starts.

### Majors Duck Expansion

## Rerieved Bills

The post-convention session of Congress holds little enchantment for the legislators, but it's a welcome windfall for all sorts of lobbyists — including the President of the United States.

A host of bills scheduled to expire quietly with an early adjournment were given a new lease on life when Congress decided to return to the job in August.

Prominent among these were a number of key White House requests, including such items as a \$534-million increase in postal rates, a one-half cent increase in the gas tax, and removal of the interest ceiling on government bonds.

Chances for these and other presidential proposals slated to wind up in the history books, not the statute books, weren't improved necessarily by the decision to take a recess.

But it's a good bet that Congress will be greeted on its return with a strong pitch from the President to act on the neglected portions of his program. He may back it up with a new estimate of income and outgo, based on congressional action to date, leaving little or none of the hoped-for surplus of \$4.2 billion.

Such a broadside could be highly embarrassing to the Democrats, including the presidential nominee. But it's no guarantee that Mr. Eisenhower will fare any better than he did in 1959, when Congress approved only 40.8 per cent of his 228 legislative requests.

Typical of the basic clash between the Administration and the

majority of Democrats in Congress are the "Big Three" welfare measures awaiting final action after the conventions: These are the bills to help the elderly to meet the costs of medical care, to initiate a program of federal grants to the states for public school construction, and to extend a higher minimum wage to millions of additional workers.

Wide gulfs separate the Administration and Democratic positions on these bills, each of which is loaded with election-year significance. Their political importance is such, in fact, that it played a key role in the decision to put off final action until August.

Sen. John F. Kennedy is a leading supporter of the liberal versions of all three bills, as is the AFL-CIO. It was for this reason, insiders say, that Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson sought a recess, in order to keep AFL-CIO leaders neutral in his battle with Kennedy for the Democratic nomination.

Whatever the outcome of the Los Angeles convention, enactment of the "Big Three" welfare bills could keep Congress in session through Labor Day. Sen. Barry Goldwater is prepared to talk for three days against the minimum wage bill alone.

On this and all other pending matters, lobbyists from Cabinet members on down will be treading the corridors of Capitol Hill in the heat of August and a presidential campaign. What will happen under these circumstances is anybody's guess.

## Managed Money

A search of economic texts reveals a strange consistency in one area of thought. When various economic writers begin to view the tragic results of inflation they almost always come up with something which indicates that inflation occurs whenever the increase in money, currency or credit exceeds the amount of goods and services then on the market.

This is not in error, but a refinement of the idea might be possible. If possible, it would be helpful.

It is certainly true and demonstrably so that all of us tend to value things on the basis of supply and demand, as well as on the basis of our own scale of values in relation to the things we want and require. If money becomes too plentiful, we do not value it as highly as we did when it was more scarce. The folly of supposing that simply pumping more money into the marketplace will provide the panacea for want and poverty is ignorance of the worst kind.

If all of us had all the dollars in our possession we wanted, whether those dollars were made of paper, of gold or of confetti, we wouldn't value those dollars too highly. We would, in fact, be very much interested in trading those dollars for something we held in higher esteem. But since the goods or services we valued would be loath to accept our dollars, having all the dollars they wanted, too, the dollar would quickly become not only valueless but meaningless. We would have to find other ways of exchanging the products of our energy.

Because this is true, economists of both collectivist and individualist persuasion have attempted to show that there is a relationship between the money in circulation at a given moment and the goods and services in the market at that same moment.

The problem relating to this equation does not lie in an error; it lies in the fact that by using

this equation one becomes tempted to believe that the supply of money and the supply of goods and services must be held at corresponding levels in order to prevent either inflation or depression.

This leads at once to the concept that a managed money is better than a natural money. This is why this illustration is dangerous, even if it is not in error. It is, of course, true that the total sum of money tends to be equated with the total sum of goods and services available.

We believe another illustration might serve equally well to demonstrate the law which might avoid the risk of creating the idea that a rigged and controlled money market is desirable.

Let us suppose that instead of having the government provide us with coin, currency, credit, money, or what have you . . . we turned to nature and used gold as our principal medium of exchange. Since gold is always fairly limited, hard to come by, beautiful and desirable, long lasting, yet malleable, it is an ideal medium of exchange. But we do NOT need to control its use. Instead, we need a free market in gold so that producers can be stimulated to produce it, dealers to trade with it, customers and consumers to use it, either in its original state or as a reserve against credit exchanges which are the real base of our economic vitality and flexibility.

What would happen under such a condition, we believe, would be an immediate rise in the total amount of goods and services available, plus a less apparent rise in the total amount of gold which could be found and pumped into the market. This would mean that, as the one side of the market place increased more rapidly (goods and services) and the other side also increased because of growing demand, but would increase more slowly because of scarcity and other difficulties, with the passage of time money would INCREASE in value.

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## Looking Sideways

NEW YORK — Occasionally this reporter has mentioned that and scientist among his country neighbors and has preserved an almost icy anonymity about it. The reasons behind not using their names have been varied: security, shyness on their part, unwillingness to be mentioned until an acute and perplexing problem has been solved. That kind of reason. Those kinds of reasons. Today, I think, I'll shuck away the fog around one of them because he is accomplishing a task of high unbelievable difficulty.

Do you know what a micron is? A micron is one-millionth of one meter. The period at the end of this sentence, assuming your newspaper is using 8 pt. for body type, is about 500 microns in diameter. A speck of foreign matter — or one-fiftieth the size of a period in newspaper print — can cause havoc with an ICBM, can explode in flames a space rocket. The next time you read of a failure at Cape Canaveral, don't hastily blame design and American awkwardness. A single speck of matter so tiny as to be almost invisible may have caused it. But it won't be in a missile or rocket to which Dr. David B. Pall, of Glen Cove, Long Island, has contributed the components he means.

Dr. Pall is king of the filtration science. That is not misspelled, by the way. Filtration is one thing, filtration is another. Early in our assault on missile and rocket problems, it was discovered that particles as small as one-twentieth of the diameter of a human hair would have to be filtered out of some of the liquids used. As though that were not problem enough, the men who came to see Dr. Pall took a deep breath and added to the specifications:

"This must be done, Doctor, under constant conditions of extraordinary high pressure, extremes of temperature and accelerated corrosion rates at flows of thousands of gallons each minute."

"How low a temperature?" Dr. Pall asked.

"Minus 365 degrees Fahrenheit, at times," they said, sounding as though they wished they didn't have to answer. He jotted the figure down.

"And the height?"

"About 1,000 degrees above zero," they said, sighing.

"Thank you," he said. And went to work.

Actually, it was about 12 years ago when he had a stainless steel filter, porous, which could meet the rules. It was made in the micron range, under high pressure, with powdered metal converted to a screen at the exact temperature where the grains would fuse — but not melt. Just six years ago he perfected an even finer woven metal mesh filter. This is the one that can take it at 1,000 degrees of heat or at minus 365 degrees.

He was the whole works at one time. One man. Now he has about 300 on his skilled, technical staff and not long ago they beat the woven job. They put together a sturdy filter that will stop a particle just three microns in diameter. This is about a third the size of a red blood corpuscle. There are, of course, finer filters in use — but not at the extremes of temperature required and not passing many, many gallons of liquid per minute.

It is of no concern to me that stock in the corporation, which went on exchange sale last May 17, has become a glamour stock. I do not own a share, am not likely to, since I don't deal in stock. I mention it only because it is a fact.

What is fascinating to me is that a business which grew from a workbench and one mind now is making jet air travel, missile firing and rocket invasion of space a daily, virtually predictable reality — because of filters which would stop the little black dot at the end of this sentence even if it were one-fiftieth smaller than it is.

condition occur we would see the following coming true. Men who were earning \$1.00 per hour would begin being paid 75 cents per hour. But this would not be tragic. For the men who worked an hour and a half (\$1.50) to buy a haircut, would soon find that with money free to appreciate in value he would only have to work an hour (75 cents) for the same haircut. He would have less money, but would be able to buy twice as much with it in terms of his own hourly production.

This same trend, once started, would proceed along so well that with the passage of years we could anticipate conditions where fine, highpowered automobiles would sell for \$150; where new homes might go for \$1,500; where a loaf of bread would cost 3 cents and a trip around the world might come to \$200. Solid money is always better than artificially controlled and manipulated money.

## The Allen-Scott Report

KENNEDY SEEKING RUNNING MATE THROUGH POLLS OF CHIEFS, 10 STATES

LOS ANGELES — Senator John Kennedy is charging right down to the finish wire riding opinion polls for all they are worth.

The Massachusetts front-runner based his highly successful pre-convention campaign strategy barely on such surveys. And now completely confident he will be the presidential nominee, Kennedy is doing the same thing to determine who his running mate should be.

Two polls are under way for this purpose. One is being made by Kennedy himself, among top Democratic leaders. The other is by Lou Harris, professional pollster, who is taking soundings in 10 selected states. Harris has made a number of private surveys for Kennedy.

Five names are on Kennedy's list of vice, presidential preferences, in the following order: Senator Hubert Humphrey, Senator Lyndon Johnson, Governor Orville Freeman, Minn.

Governor Herschel Loveless, Iowa

Governor Gaylord Nelson, Wis. So far, most of the party chiefs consulted by Kennedy favor Senator Johnson as his team-mate.

Senator Humphrey is drawing the next largest backing.

One governor is proposing a Kennedy-Stevenson slate.

Foremost among those being asked about this are Governors Edmund Brown, Calif.; LeRoy Collins, Fla.; Michael DiSalle, Ohio; Abraham Ribicoff, Conn.; Mennen Williams, Mich.; House Floor Leader John McCormack, Mass.; Chicago's Mayor Richard Daley, and various influential State Chairmen and National Committeemen.

As a result of Senator Johnson's potent showing in this polling, discreet inquiries have been initiated to ascertain his views on running with Kennedy.

An old friend of Speaker Sam Rayburn has been given this delicate job.

Rayburn will be asked what he thinks of a Kennedy-Johnson ticket, and to put that up to his fellow Texan.

Johnson is a candidate for a third term in the Senate, having won the Democratic nomination last spring without opposition. It is contended there is ample precedent for his running both for the Senate and Vice President.

Former Vice President John Garner did that in 1932 when he was the late Franklin Roosevelt's team-mate. At that time, Garner was Speaker of the House, and he was a candidate for both offices. After winning them, the Texan relinquished his House seat to become Vice President.

Another significant indication of Kennedy's certainty that he will be the Democratic standard-bearer is measures he is already taking to prepare for the fall election battle.

For example: Lawrence O'Brien, advertising man, who has long been active in Kennedy's campaigns, has been put to work compiling Adlai Stevenson's 1952 and 1956 itineraries. O'Brien handled Kennedy's primary campaigns this year in Maryland, Indiana and Nebraska, in which he was unopposed.

Also, Kennedy has started a series of private talks with minority groups to get their views and present his on issues of special moment to them.

He has already had several such meetings with Negro leaders from

## The American Way

As Viewed By Dr. Alfred P. Haase FREE ENTERPRISE ATTACKED

Freedom may be suffering its great reverses in the colleges and universities of the United States. At any rate, institutions of higher learning are harboring more than their fair share of so-called edu-

cators whose object in life seems to be to debunk this nation's traditional political philosophy.

A case in point is a recent speech in Chicago made by William C. De Vane, Dean of Yale University's undergraduate college. In the course of a commencement address, Dean De Vane openly attacked free enterprise.

"Now at first glance," he asserted, "that shibboleth has the odor of our admirable love of freedom for the individual, and may be traced back to the characteristics of our New England ancestors."

"But in common practice to day under cover of the phrase we have encouraged a spirit of voracious aggressiveness and ruthless competition." He spoke of the "wealthy slum owner who feels no pang of conscience for the hunger, squalor and disease he encouraged" and referred to the aggressive salesman who "makes outrageous claims" for his products.

For a dean of one of America's oldest private universities to make statements of this nature is truly shocking. The falsehood and folly of it can be seen in the fact that Yale was established and is supported today through the generosity of individuals who gained their wealth through the free enterprise system and who strongly believe in it.

Dean De Vane went on in his speech to complain: "In the national scene we can not give aid to such needy country without justifying the gift as in our own self interest." He deplored the "18th century doctrine" of self-interest as a guiding principle of conduct.

Dean De Vane should take some of the history courses offered at Yale. He should bear in mind that the 18th century gave birth to American freedom, to the end of royalty's tight control over trade, and to the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution, two of the noblest works of the human mind.

When he scorns the doctrine of enlightened self-interest, he scorns the men who repeated this doctrine and built the freest nation the world has ever known.

To pick out as examples of "free enterprise" a slum lord and an unscrupulous salesman is unconscionable. Head Dean De Vane has been fair-minded as an academic leader should be he would have cited the great success of the American economic system in making high quality consumer goods available to the public at low cost. He could and should have cited the benefactions which believers in free enterprise make in U.S. communications every year. The fine system of private colleges and universities in the United States, with their heavy support from businesses as well as individuals, is a testament to free enterprise.

As for saying U.S. officials should give away money to foreign lands without considering self-interest, Dean De Vane ignores a vital consideration. The money in the U.S. Treasury is not the property of the bureaucracy. It belongs to the people of the United States. And it is highly unlikely that any thinking person wants government to be improvident. The nation whose government fails to consider self-interest is a nation that soon will be bankrupt, if not non-existent.

If Dean De Vane gave away all his personal funds without thought to his self-interest and the needs of his family, his children, if he has any, would be out in the street and dependant upon charity.

It is tragic that the mistaken ideas which Dean De Vane voiced in Chicago are accepted as reasonable in some academic circles.
