Fut mostly it's public pressure that demands secrecy. You may not want to think that a venereal disease will ever afflict a member of your family or household. But then again, there's always that possibility. And if and when the occasion arises, please do try to remember your obligation to the community in which you live. If the solid support of an enlightened public is capable of helping in the near-eradication of an incurable disease like leprosy, think of what it could accomplish if it got behind the efforts of health officers to eliminate the local reservoir of curable venereal diseases. I have described how a policy of public enlightenment made it possible to accomplish the near eradication of leprosy, an infectious diseases of which medical ing? science had neither a preventive vaccine nor a curative drug. Now we shall speak of the

consequences of public apathy. It is lack of enlightened public support that permits the continued existence of a reservoir of infectious diseases of sexual origin. And the pity of it is that each of the infections of sexual origin (venereal diseases) is easily and rapidly curable.

Let me explain. The two principal venereal diseases are gonorrhea and syphilis. Gonorrhea may be rendered completely noninfectious, if it is not completely cured, within a ver, few hours. Syphilis may be rendered completely non-infectious within a few days and it may be completely cured, if treated in its early stages, within the course of a very few weeks. In each instance, the cure may be accomplished by any one of several safe drugs. In each instance, the cure may be accom-plished by injection or by mouth

doses of the curative drug. In each instance of venereal disease, there must be a sexual partner from whom the infection was acquired. In many instances, there are other sexual partners to whom the infection may have been transmitted.

Thus it is that each patient with a venereal disease has dipped into an infectious reservoir and contributed to that infectious reservoir. Curing the patient, as must be

seen, has no effect on the infectious reservoir unless medical authorities are told where it is situated and unless they are provided with authority to drain that reservoir.

In medical terms, the physician who treats the patient has not fulfilled his obligation to his profession and to his community unless and until he learns the name et the person from whom the infection was acquired and the names of those to whom it might have been given.

And his obligations are not completed until he gives this privileged information (meaning that it is divulged to no one but the proper authorities) to a public health officer whose duty it
