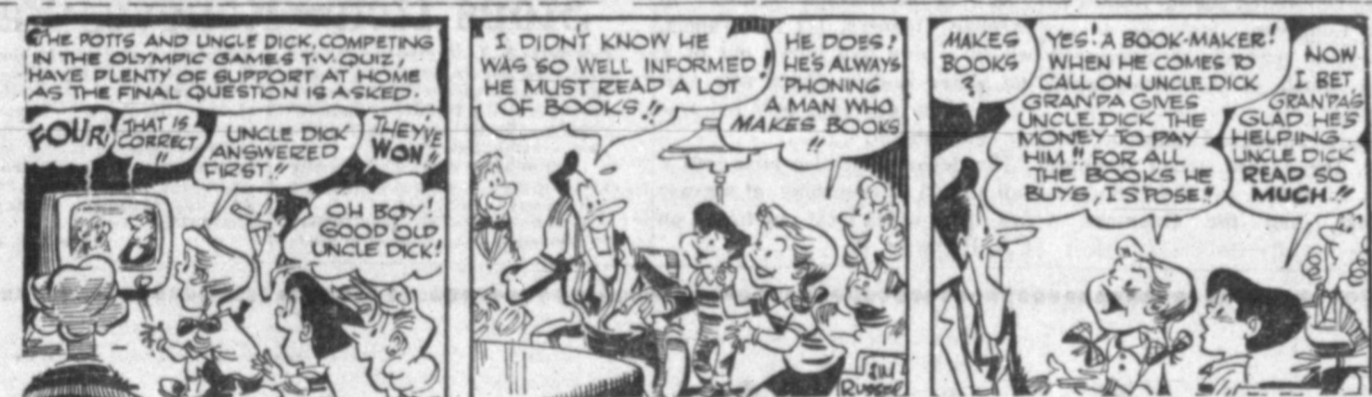

Katanga Happy With UN Pledge; Congo Hits Dag

ELISABETHVILLE (UPI) — Premier Moïse Tshombe said Saturday the Katanga Army is still mobilizing despite the United Nations decision not to enter the province which has seceded from the Congo.

was confident the Katanga question would receive fair consideration at the Security Council meeting scheduled for Sunday night.

Asked if Katanga would be represented at the Security Council meeting Tshombe said a Katanga delegation was now in Brussels but that he doubted there was time to get any member of it to New York.

Tshombe, who regarded U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold's decision to call of a U. N. troop movement into Katanga a great victory for the province, said a troop entry would have meant anarchy and chaos.

Saturday he sent light planes into the air throughout the province to drop leaflets on native villages informing them of the U.N. decision and of this government victory.

LEOPOLDVILLE (UPI) — The Congo government charged Saturday that United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold had "done his best" to ignore it in making his decisions to fly back to New York and call off the entry of U.N. troops into Katanga Province.

The central government of Premier Patrice Lumumba charged also that Hammarskjold had taken a line favorable to the secessionist Katanga regime of Premier Moïse Tshombe.

In a declaration issued by Vice Premier Antoine Gizenga after a Cabinet meeting, the Congolese government insisted on full implementation of the Security Council resolution concerning movement of U.N. troops into Katanga Province.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1960.

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election of this Amendment, and the same shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred (100) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars (\$2.00) per day for the first one hundred (100) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature."

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 35 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated limitations, providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; providing for the election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 5(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Lamar County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 2. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Hidalgo County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 5(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hidalgo County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 3. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with the limits of County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, Texas.

"If such District is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers voting who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections as long as obligations are not incurred and not to exceed the maximum limit of seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent change in the boundaries of the Commissioners Precinct.

"Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Farm Issues Remote To Most Of Populace

NEW YORK (UPI) — Before the farm problem gets kicked around too much in its usual role as a political football in the campaign months ahead, the Farm Journal hopes to get across to the voting populace the importance of farming to the U.S. economy.

The farm debate will appear remote and apart from the basic issues to most people because more than 90 per cent of the nation's population lives away from the farm.

But, the Journal points out, since the two largest items in most family budgets are food and taxes, the issues relating to agriculture are not as remote as many people suppose them to be.

Using figures supplied by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Journal explains what farm income really means to business and industry. The figures make interesting reading.

Farmers may be dwindling in numbers and in proportion to the population but they continue to be

the largest customers of many of the big manufacturing industries, the magazine notes.

The farm population may be smaller—but farming itself is continue to grow to feed and bigger than ever. And it to continue to grow to feed and Agriculture's total assets of \$208 billion at the start of the year not only were the highest in history but the largest for any American industry, according to Agriculture Department statistics.

The size of agriculture is pointed up when it is noted that farming consumes more petroleum products than any single industry, and farmers buy half as much steel as the entire giant auto industry.

In addition, there is a great number of urban jobs, and, in many cases, the well-being of entire communities, depending on the economic health of agriculture, the journal states.
