Giant Statistical Firm Had Small Scale Start

NEW YORK (UPI) — One hundred years ago just about this time, Standard and Poor's was born. It was a small, struggling business, but it has grown into the largest statistical firm in the world.

It is difficult to spot the exact date because none at the time could anticipate that Poor's would become a giant. It was founded in 1860 by Henry Varnum Poor, who was the founder of the giant statistical agency which includes his name.

And it wasn't a very propitious time for anyone of anything to be born, especially a company. The Civil War was on, and the economy was in a state of depression.

It wasn't that one couldn't publish information. Freedom of the press had been assured 125 years earlier when John Peter Zenger had been acquitted of seditious libel for criticizing the royal government. But it wasn't easy to get the kind of information Poor put into his manual.

Corporations of the 1800s ago and most of them in the transportation industry, just didn't think in terms of financial statements or other information that would be of use to investors.

Poor thought otherwise and set out to get information of value to investors. He started a weekly manual, "The Standard and Poor's Manual," which was published in 1860. It was a small, struggling business, but it has grown into the largest statistical firm in the world.

Congolese Celebrate As Free Nation

LEOPOLDVILLE, Belgian Congo (UPI) — Smiling African faces danced in the streets of this ancient city with their menfolk today in dresses bearing the declaration of independence on June 30.

Spontaneous celebrations anticipated the formal emergence of the Belgian Congo as a sovereign nation flowered everywhere, even in those native sections that only two days ago were in a state of emergency because of political rioting.

Many of the Congolese men jumping the gun on a scheduled 48-hour national holiday, stepped away from their jobs to dance and party.

White residents still fearful of possible racial violence when the full day over the sprawling African territory stayed off the streets as much as possible, rarely venturing into the African sections.

The entire territory, one third the size of the United States, was reported peaceful despite political discontent among Baluba and Bangala tribesmen who failed to gain representation in the new native government.

A 10-hour television broadcast before Parliament Monday when President Joseph Kasavubu was sworn in as chief of state, but a heavy police guard discouraged any violence.

Ghana Leader Asks Stronger Admission Practices For UN

LONDON (UPI) — Dr. Kwame Nkrumah, prime minister of Ghana, said recently his government will ask the United Nations to tighten up its procedure on the admission of new members.

Nkrumah said former colonial territories emerging to independence are "too often admitted to the United Nations as nothing more than satellites, depending on their former colonial masters, who can order them how to vote."

The Ghana leader made this declaration on the same day that four more African members of the Erythraean community—the Ivory Coast, Upper Volta, Dahomey and the Niger Republic—announced their intention of demanding complete independence.

At present there are only two neutralist African states, Ghana and Guinea. Somalia, under strong Arab influence, also is expected to take a strong hand for itself.

Some leading African politicians generally regard the cold war and its problems, even the issue of Communism or democracy, as totally irrelevant to their affairs.

A typical comment was: "The Communists have never worried us, so why should we worry about them? Our problem is to get rid of the colonialists."

Sugar Loss In Warehouse Fire Under Investigation

BOSTON (UPI) — The arson squad today investigated a fire that spread from a freighter to a warehouse containing some 20 million pounds of Cuban sugar, burning for 10 hours.

The four-alarm blaze broke out Monday night in a hold of the Honduras-registered freighter *Cholera*, which was laden with 11 million pounds of sugar.

The 5,000-ton vessel arrived Monday from Cuba. The cargo of sugar was to have been unloaded today.

A fire official estimated damage at \$100,000 but a spokesman for the Reverse Sugar Refinery, which operated the warehouse, indicated the loss was higher.

The spokesman said damage to dock facilities, alone including loading cranes and conveyors, would exceed \$100,000. He said damage to the sugar and warehouse might push the loss to one million dollars.

The blaze leaped from the freighter to a pier and to the three-story brick warehouse on the Mystic River that empties into Boston Harbor.

No one was seriously injured though firemen said burning sugar gives off poisonous fumes.

The arson squad routinely investigates large fires of undetermined origin. Neither sabotage nor arson, however, was suspected immediately.

About 200 firemen and four fireboats fought the fire for nearly four hours before it was controlled early today.

The Reverse Sugar Refinery, which employs between 750 and 1,000 persons, is a subsidiary of United Fruit Co. which has extensive sugar holdings in Cuba.

A refinery vice president, who asked that his name be withheld, described the loss as "enormous." He said that water damaged much of the sugar that was not burned.

Texas Briefs UPI Picture Division Provides New Service

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate is expected to act soon on the nominations of two Texans for postmasterships, President Eisenhower Monday nominated Clemmie W. Woodard as postmaster at Azle, Tex. and Wayne H. Lawrence as postmaster at Denton, Tex.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Pictures moved today to black media throughout the world from a new ultra-modern plant of the New York Newspaper Bureau of United Press International.

The operation combines novel production-line methods with the latest automated technique in a gain of efficiency and capacity. As peak production, it can turn out 3600 prints an hour.

Among its innovations are use of an electronic brain to control the finishing phase of black-and-white pictures. It employs new concepts of push-button automatic functions, intercom microphones, and spaced cleaning of negatives.

The department was moved across Manhattan during the weekend without interruption of service to clients. Besides the use of equipment and a library of more than two million negatives and thousands of prints dating back to the 1880s.

The operation has been three years in planning and one in construction. The bureau now is on the 11th floor of a new wing of the New York Daily News Building. UPI world headquarters and New York domestic and international news operations are in consolidated offices of the same building. The picture bureau occupies 10,000 square feet, about the same as in its old location on 8th Ave. but its production capacity has been increased five-fold.

Frank Tremaine, UPI vice president and general superintendent, commented:

"This is the most modern news picture production facility of its type to be found anywhere. It includes ideas and facilities never before used in such an operation for servicing pictures to newspaper, television, magazines, and other publications."

467 CONVICTED

AUSTIN (UPI) — Action by agents of the Texas Liquor Control Board, resulted in 467 convictions of persons accused of alcohol violations last month.

Twenty-five violators were sentenced to jail terms, while fines and court costs assessed in all cases totaled \$36,911. Fees were collected in May on 110 liquor permits and 2,567 beer licenses and agents seized three illegal stills, two in Harrison County and one in Marion County.

Adept Fingerprint Expert Can Catch Criminal Or Cook Fine French Meal

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mrs. Marilyn Picard is equally adept at cooking a fine French meal or cooking up a concoction to help police catch a criminal.

Mrs. Picard, a bubbly brunette of 28, runs the fingerprinting department of her family's firm which manufactures close to 1,000 products used for crime detection.

These include fingerprint inks and powders, camera attachments for closeup work at the scene of a crime or accident, narcotics testers, solutions to detect forgeries or alterations of records, solutions to determine whether a stain is blood or just ketchup, and various sizes of laboratory kits equipped with these and other tools of the trade.

Often, she is summoned as a consultant to help track down trickery, and travels around the nation fingerprinting employees for various companies, demonstrating baby footprints to hospital staffs, helping police departments set up their fingerprint classification files, and lecturing on fingerprinting at meetings of police chiefs or heads of police identification departments.

She is in Asbury Park, N.J., this week for the New Jersey police chiefs' convention.

Mrs. Picard is one of the few women members of the International Association for Identification, and she has just completed the development of an inkless, disposable pad for use in hospitals where state law requires fingerprinting of the newborn.

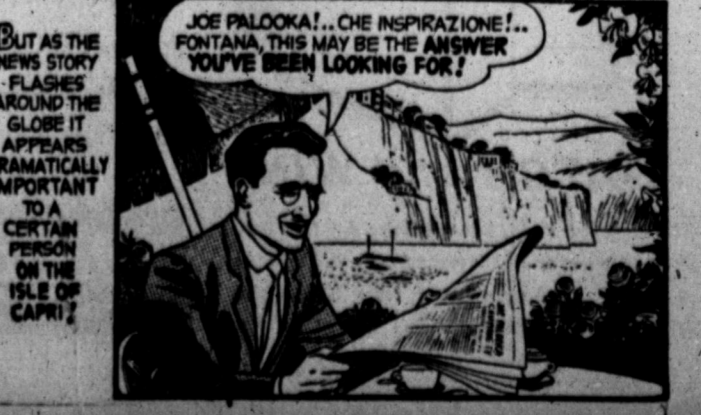
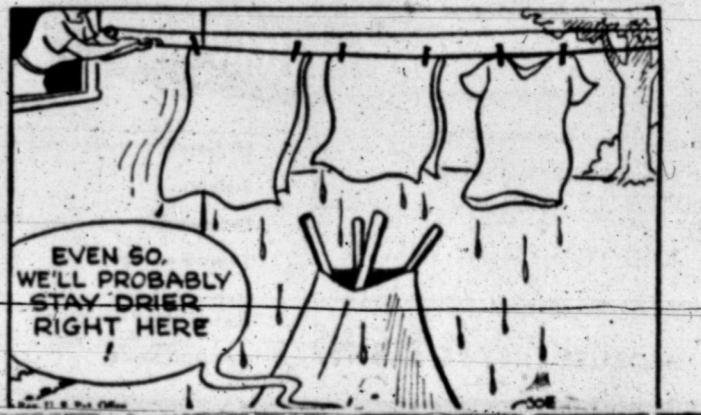
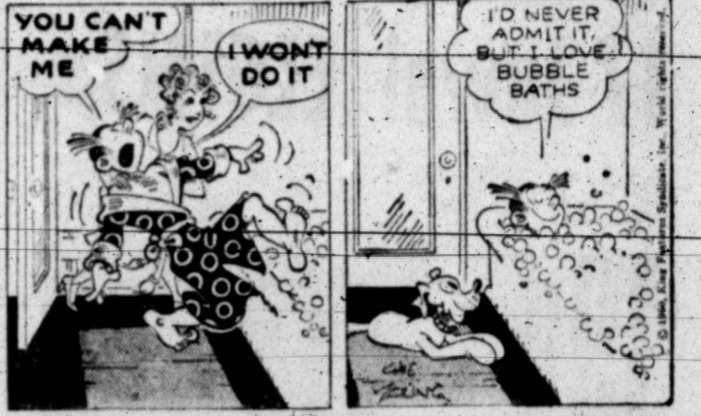

It was there a fellow named Big Henry Harris wrestled a few alligators. He also shot a few coons, skinned them and made caps with the pelts. He took the caps and two sons named Tub and Roy to the state Golden Gloves tournament and became a legend.

More recently he took his youngest son, Little Henry, to the state meet and continued the legend.

If Ollie Wilhelm had only had the foresight to wear a coon skin cap and wrestle alligators a few years back, Pampa might be the same legendary place Cut 'N Shoot is today.

Wilhelm has two sons - Gary and Bobby - who are becoming almost legendary in state Golden Gloves circles.

Both of them make the state tournament an annual occasion and when they are defeated, the verdicts usually are loudly booed.

And he can quote boxing records by the hour, either amateur or professional.

Wilhelm's youngest son, Gary, was on the University of Wisconsin boxing team last year. But the school decided to discontinue fighting after one of its boxers was killed.

"I believe they'll have a university supported team next year," Ollie said. "If they don't, the coach plans to enter the team in competition as the Madison Badgers. Any way, as far as I know Gary will be there again this fall."

Basilio Shoots To Regain Fullmer's Crown Tonight

Carmen Eyes Kayo Finish

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (UPI) — Carmen Basilio, grand little battler of the 1950's, tries to recapture the National Boxing Association's version of the world middleweight crown tonight from bull shouldered Gene Fullmer, the only man who ever stopped him.

This return 15-rounder between 33-year-old Basilio of Chittenango, N.Y., and 28-year-old Fullmer of nearby West Jordan, Utah, will be televised nationally by ABC at 10 p.m. e.d.t., but will not be seen in this area.

However, because of the time-zone differences they'll square off at sundown here at Derks Field, where fair and continued warm weather has been promised. A crowd of 13,000 and a gate of \$125,000 are expected at Salt Lake City's first world title fight.

Fullmer is favored, at 13-5 to beat Carmen again.

The West Jordan mauler is favored because he stopped Basilio, former welterweight and middleweight champion, in the 14th round of their fight for the vacant NBA crown at San Francisco last Aug. 28. The NBA had vacated Sugar Ray Robinson's title for his failure to defend.

In that San Francisco fight, which reached a thrilling competitive peak in the sixth round, left-hander Basilio was so exhausted in the 14th that his handlers asked the referee to stop the bout. In the dressing room, victorious Fullmer's face showed bruises and cuts in several places.

Basilio hasn't fought since. He took a long rest and then went into serious training. He wound up his conditioning campaign for tonight's fight at the Industrial School in Ogden, Utah — 35 miles away. There he sparred in secret, lest Fullmer learn what weapons he was sharpening.

Craggy-faced Carmen, who motored into town from Ogden Tuesday night, told friends today: "I'm geared up to knock him out. I figure I've got to knock him out to win — since we're fighting in his home state."

Cerv Powers Yankee Win

Casey Stengel almost talked himself blue in the face but finally got that red-letter performance he was after from his first-place New York Yankees.

"If I told my players once, I told 'em a thousand times not to try to kill those knuckleball pitchers," Stengel said. "It simply can't be done. You gotta just meet the ball, that's all."

Casey told the Yankees again Tuesday night and for once, they listened.

Coming up as a pinch-hitter in the eighth inning, Bob Cerv remembered Stengel's advice and merely slapped at one of knuckleballer Bud Daley's offerings. The half-swing did the trick. Cerv was credited with a blood double that broke a 2-2 tie, touched off a three-run rally and led the Yankees to a 6-2 victory over Kansas City.

Mickey Mantle, who swings from his heels no matter what Stengel says, caught hold of one of Daley's third inning pitches and rammed it into the seats for his 17th homer.

Cerv's double, which came in a pinch-hitting role for winning pitcher Bob Turley, paced the Yankees to their ninth victory in the last 12 games and enabled them to solidify their lead over the second-place Baltimore Orioles.

Cleveland beat Baltimore, 3-2, in 11 innings, Washington edged Chicago, 2-1, in 14 innings and Detroit defeated Boston, 10-1.

Milwaukee climbed to within 2 1/2 games of the National League lead with a 5-3 victory over Chicago, Pittsburgh and San Francisco battled to a 7-7 tie in a game called at the end of nine innings because of curfew. Philadelphia blanked Los Angeles, 2-0, and Cincinnati beat St. Louis, 10-4. Johnny Temple's 11th inning

homer off reliever Gordon Jones gave the Indians their victory after Al Pilarick tied the score at 2-2 for the Orioles with a two-run homer in the ninth, held the Orioles hitless the rest of the way to earn his second victory.

Julio Becquer's sacrifice fly with the bases loaded produced Washington's winning run in the 14th against Detroit.

Connie Loop Hit Hard

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Estes Kefauver's bill to bring organized baseball under the anti-trust laws today appeared dead for this session of Congress.

The Senate, striking a heavy blow at the proposed new Continental League, voted 73-12 Tuesday night to send the measure back to the judiciary committee where it is expected to remain until Congress adjourns.

Sen. John A. Carroll (D-Colo.), a leading supporter of the measure, threw in the towel and proposed recommitting the bill when the Senate approved an amendment by Sen. Alexander Wiley (R-Wis.).

Wiley's provision, adopted 45-11, was aimed at cutting the heart from Kefauver's bill. Its effect would have been to eliminate player draft provisions and other sections opposed by organized baseball.

William Shea, a guiding force behind the projected Continental League, said in New York the Senate action was a severe blow but "it still doesn't knock us out of the box."

Shea blamed Sen. Kenneth Keating (R-N.Y.) for the defeat. He said Keating had posed "as our friend" but "in the final accounting, he proved which side he was on."

Keating had told the Senate the measure as drafted was "inadequate for the task but a step in the right direction."

In Philadelphia, baseball Commissioner Ford Frick said that he considered the bill "a piece of bad legislation" which "would have hurt the Continental League as well as the National and American Leagues."

Olympic Trials Slated

Shotput Scrap Looms Heavy

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (UPI) — Blondish, bespectacled Ralph Maughan says the year's big heavyweight fight will be staged at Stanford (Calif.) University's stadium this weekend when all four world record breakers in the shotput battle it out for the three places on the United States Olympic team.

Big Ralph, track and field coach at Utah State University in nearby Logan, Utah, says the shotput competition will be so terrific that his own L. Jay Silvester has conceded the event to the "big four" and will concentrate on the discus throw, his best event.

The four giants are: Perry O'Brien of Santa Monica, Calif., two-time Olympic champion who hopes to be the first to win three Olympic shotput titles; Army Lt. Bill Nieder, formerly of Kansas, who has a new world record of 65 feet seven inches; Dallas Long, University of Southern California sophomore from Phoenix, Ariz., the NCAA champion and record holder, and Dave Davis of Los Angeles, who has beaten the others on occasion.

All four have done 63 feet 5 inches or better this spring.

Coach Maughan, in town for tonight's Gene Fullmer - Carmen Basilio fight, says the competition among the big quartet for the three shotput tickets to the Rome Olympics is so torrid that Messrs. O'Brien, Nieder, Long and Davis can hardly be regarded as "friendly rivals."

Maughan, a former National AAU champion, thrower of the hammer and javelin, believes that discus-thrower Silvester — who was graduated from Utah State last year and now is a lieutenant in the Army at Ft. Meade, Md., has made a wise choice in passing up the shotput tryouts at Stanford.
