## U.N. Forces To Katanga

LEOPOLDVILLE, Congo (UPI)—The United Nations command today began deploying its troops in the secessionist province of Katanga.

While U. N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold conferred with his staff on the military maneuvers, U.N. troops took off from Leopoldville for Elisabethville, the capital of the Katanga Province, to bolster the 240-man Swedish force led into Katanga last Friday by the secretary general.

## Fleeing Red China

LONDON (UPI)— Soviet technicians and advisors were reported today to be leaving Communist China "by the trainload" apparently as the result of worsening relations between Moscow and Peking.

The reports came from Yugoslav correspondents in the Red Chinese capital.

The development gave weight to remarks that all is not well between Moscow and Peking.

Their ideological differences have been public knowledge for some time.

## Soviet Attorney Pledges Fight For Powers' Life

### Russ Allow Family To Visit Pilot Today

MOSCOW (UPI)— Mikhail Grinev, the court appointed Soviet lawyer for American U-2 pilot Francis Gary Powers, said today "I will do my utmost to fight for Powers' life" in his spy trial opening Wednesday.

## \$4,000 Taken From Safe At McLean

Thieves Leave Tire Track Trail

McLEAN (Sp) — Burglars opened the safe at Pickett's Food Store here early this morning and took nearly \$4,000 in cash and checks.

Store manager Dick Dickinson estimated that there was \$2,400 in cash and approximately \$1,500 in checks in the safe.

Gray County Sheriff Rufe Jordan, Deputy Buck Haggard and Texas Ranger Bill Henslee tracked the burglars "all over town," but lost the trail when it led back to paved streets.

Jordan said the tracks led down an alley behind the store, across railroad tracks and through a cotton field before they turned back onto a paved street.

Three Highway Patrol units, one manned by Vernon Cauthorn of Pampa, set up road blocks on Highways 273, 66, and 70, leading out of McLean, but failed to turn up any suspects.

A group of Kansas travelers also reportedly spotted two men coming out of the store early this morning, but so far the reports have not been verified.

F. B. Kizer, night watchman, discovered the break-in at 3:50 a.m. He previously had checked the building at 1:30 a.m., but found nothing wrong.

After discovering the break-in, Kizer phoned Constable J. D. Fish, who in turn notified the Gray County sheriff's office.

Jordan said the burglars had pried the front door of the grocery store to gain entry.

The sheriff said the safe door was pried open, and the inside of it stripped away and left on the floor.

Dickinson told investigating officers the haul would have been larger but he made a deposit at (See THIEVES, Page 3)

## National Primary Suggested

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Assistant Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield looked back at the two national political conventions today and decided he did not like what he saw.

He proposed that Congress consider setting up national presidential primaries or a uniform set of rules, by federal law or constitutional amendment, to govern state presidential primaries or state conventions choosing national convention delegates.

Mansfield also suggested that a time limit be set on active campaigning for the presidential nominations and that the campaigns be financed from public funds.

He outlined his criticism of the conventions in a statement in which he said he intended no criticism of the nominees chosen by the Democrats and Republicans last month.

The Montana Senator said he participated in the Democratic convention as a delegate with half a vote and concluded that (See NATIONAL, Page 3)

## OAS Meets To Discuss Red Menace

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (UPI)— Foreign ministers of the Organization of American States (OAS) gathered today for emergency debate on Soviet penetration of the hemisphere via Cuba.

Cuba's Raul Roa served notice at the outset that he intended to turn the emergency session into a trial not of the Fidel Castro regime but of the United States—a trial in which all Latin friends of the revolution must stand and be counted.

"I come to the conference not to be accused but to accuse," the foreign minister declared upon his arrival from Havana Sunday night. "Naturally I refer to the aggressive actions of the United States."

A crowd of 2,000, largest yet to greet any arriving foreign minister, cheered his words.

The OAS meeting, scheduled to open formally Tuesday night, also covered Venezuela's demands for sanctions against Dominican Dictator Rafael Leonidas Trujillo, accused of crimes against international law and human dignity.

## Verbal Posies By Nikita For Fidel On Birthday

HAVANA (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev hailed Premier Fidel Castro in a message published here today as a "fighter for liberty" and pledged "even stronger" friendly relations between Russia and Cuba.

The newspaper Revolution, official organ of Castro's 26th of July movement, published Khrushchev's remarks, which were made in the form of a birthday greeting to the Cuban premier, Castro was 34 Sunday.

Khrushchev told Castro that in the Soviet Union "You are known as the outstanding patriot of your nation and a tireless fighter for the liberty and independence of Cuba and the realization of the highest ideals of the Cuban revolution."

"I am sure that friendly relations between our nations will develop and become even stronger," Khrushchev said.

Revolution also reported that plans to read a strong anti-Communist pastoral letter drawn up by the island's Roman Catholic prelates were frustrated by the congregation in a Santiago Church Sunday.

The newspaper said the congregation sang the national anthem to drown out the priest's voice. According to Revolution's report, the priest was driven from the pulpit as the congregation shouted "Cuba si, Yankees no," and (See SOVIET, Page 3)

## Feared Her Marriage Was Breaking Up

## Mother Admits Drugging Daughters

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Police said today the mother of the little "sleeping beauty" sisters gave the girls drugs as part of a plan to save her marriage which she feared was breaking up.

Mrs. Lillian Fratantonio, 29, said in her maternity ward confession she gave drugs to 3-year-old Bernadette last September to win sympathy from the child's father, Vincent Fratantonio, 33. But Mrs. Fratantonio could give no reason for giving the sleeping drugs to another child, Venita, 5, who began suffering from the mysterious comas last month.

Detective Sgt. Norman Ferris also revealed that the heart of the 3-year-old child stopped once because of the drugs. This happened at the Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in New York, where the mother watched doctors working frantically to restore the child's heart beat as she lay between life and death.

The details of how Mrs. Fratantonio drugged her daughters into a mysterious sleep which baffled doctors here and in New York were revealed as authorities tried to decide whether to treat her as a criminal or a mental case.

Mrs. Fratantonio said she felt that by giving the youngest child drugs which would cause a mysterious illness, she might win back the affections of her husband.

Mrs. Fratantonio also said the barbiturates accomplished another purpose in quieting the active children and giving her quiet around the house.

Detectives and the coroner's office were busy trying to clear up the details of the confession Mrs. Fratantonio made in the maternity ward of St. Ann's Hospital Saturday night. She had given birth to her fifth child, and third daughter, on Tuesday.

Detective Inspector Richard Wagner said he felt his department would file charges and leave it to the courts to determine if Mrs. Fratantonio should be given medical treatment.

Cuyahoga County Coroner Dr. Samuel R. Gerber emphasized the medical stand.

"This is not a criminal case, but strictly mental," he said. (See MOTHER, Page 3)

## House Resumes Work; Session Bogged Down

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House returns to work today, joining the Senate in a pre-election legislative session already bogged down by partisan feuding.

The House probably will not accomplish much in the way of actual legislation this week but the decisions may be made that will determine whether two key bills ever reach a vote before the session adjourns probably early next month.

Sharp floor fights are likely in the House over housing and school construction legislation, both stalled in the conservative-dominated House Rules Committee.

Meanwhile, the Senate was stymied over two other pieces of major legislation, a bill to increase the minimum wage and another to provide some plan of medical care for the elderly.

Democratic presidential nominee John F. Kennedy is playing a major role in both current Senate fights. He is trying to pilot a \$1.25 an hour minimum wage hike past opposition from Republicans and Southern Democrats—and is pledged to broaden a finance committee-approved medical care plan, also over objections of Republicans and conservatives in his own party.

A showdown was expected sometime this week on the minimum wage bill, which tied up the Senate several days last week.

Other congressional news:  
Defense: Chairman George H. Mahon, D-Tex., of the House Defense Appropriations subcommittee said the nation's defense posture has suffered because President Eisenhower impounded funds voted by Congress. Mahon said Congress should not appropriate any more defense money "especially in view of the fact that the President continues to impound more than a half billion dollars of the money he now has."  
Conventions: Assistant Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., proposed that Congress consider setting up national presidential primaries—or a uniform set of rules to govern state presidential primaries or state conventions choosing national convention delegates.  
Veterans: Rep. Alvin M. Bentley, R-Mich., proposed legislation to give "cold war" GI's the same benefits and protections enjoyed by veterans of World War II and the Korean War.

The commission recently voted to remove loading zones from several businesses because the firms had what the commissioners thought to be adequate loading facilities in the rear of the buildings.

Mayor Ed Myatt has stated he definitely is against letting a firm have a loading zone for customer convenience only.

City manager John Kooztz said tomorrow's meeting should be a lengthy one.

## Experts On The Aged Haven't Got Answers

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)— Two thousand of the world's experts on the aged spent last week comparing notes—and then agreed that they simply do not know for sure how to keep themselves from growing old.

The experts had lots of ideas. But none could prove his theories to the satisfaction of everybody.

The disagreements concerned everything from what to eat, what medicines to take and how long to sleep.

The experts presented reports to each other at the third triennial congress of the International Association of Gerontology.

About the least controversial advice they could offer was summed up by Dr. Louis Kuplan, the association president. He said that a person's attitude means as much—and possibly more—than anything medical science can do to halt his aging.

To live long, he urged maintaining a constant, active interest in life, rather than a "let's give up" attitude.

As examples, he cited Grandpa Moses, who is still painting at 98, and Tommy Manville, who recently married his 11th bride at 65.

Kuplan wasn't endorsing the Manville method, but mentioned him as a person with "motivation." Grandpa Moses, he said, was always looking forward, never looking in the past.

In the body, he said, "we don't really know what the process of aging is."

# '52 Steeplechase Tops

NEW YORK (NEA) — I screamed myself hoarse the day Horace Ashenfelter won the 3,000-meter steeplechase from the Russian, Vladimir Kazantsev, at Helsinki in 1952. That was the most exciting, most heroic moment in Olympic Games history for me.

But Ashenfelter's victory when we were first Russian — conscious had something special. No one gave him a chance. The night before I was in a bedroom at Olympic Village with Horace and a couple of other distance runners, Curt Stone and Fred Witt.

Stone kidded him, "How's it going to feel running while Kazantsev's already in taking a shower?"

Witt chimed in, "Imagine, Ash, Kazantsev will be on the victory stand — and you'll still have a couple of laps to go."

Kazantsev held the world record,

had run the distance 35 seconds faster than Ash's best.

Horace told me later, "I knew my only chance was to stay with him all the way."

After the first lap, Ashenfelter got on the Russian's heels. When he sprinted, Horace sprinted. The pace was murderous, better than world record time with a lap to go, when they both started to wobble. They looked shot.

"I almost quit then," said Ashenfelter.

## Nothing Inherited

A friend of ours has reminded us that Joseph P. Kennedy, former U.S. ambassador to Great Britain and the father of one of the leading contenders for the job of chief spender in the nation, once made some pretty astute observations. The Detroit Sunday Times of May 25, 1947, published an article by Kennedy which was good enough to attract the attention of Representative Robert F. Rich of Pennsylvania and, hence, to find its way into the Congressional Record. After reading what the elder Kennedy had to say, we are more and more of the opinion that heredity plays no role whatsoever in our scheme of things. For surely, if heredity had anything to do with the transmission of tendencies to think in logical terms, then the present contestant for high honors escaped the chain of such tendencies. Actually even Joseph P. Kennedy in his zeal to back his son hasn't kept to these ideas himself. We reproduce herewith a few telling quotations from this speech of Joseph Kennedy's. "In what has been aptly termed 'an era of economic idiocy' administration economists have become politicians, and statesmen pose as economists. The net result in a very sickening and discouraging political economic philosophy which has given the nation a case of first-degree jitters." "In consequence of the worries concerning our foreign and domestic outlook 48 percent of our young men are rated as unwilling to take any chances in business, preferring security and low income to any risk. Only 3 percent were willing to take more than a 50-50 chance for the possibility of maximum reward." "Surveys reveal that 24 percent of our population believed they would get more for their money if all property were owned and operated by the government, and 9 percent felt they would just as much prefer under government ownership and control." "When industrial progress is blocked by a tax system that limits production and the output of goods demanded by an over-increasing population is choked,

## Predatory Protection

Periodically we have heard it said that the world is going to be in serious trouble when the far famed Mesabi iron ore range in northern Minnesota is worked out. Iron is a basic metal and certainly a necessity in our modern age based upon steel and its derivatives. But wiser heads have been looking knowingly at the vast deposits in South America, in Brazil, and notable in the Brazilian state of Minas Gerais. There, according to estimates, lie something close to 35 billion tons of iron ore, the largest iron reserve deposits in the world. The use of the term "reserve" is probably politically induced. Iron ore "reserves" don't stay in reserve under present market conditions unless the politicians provide a reason. The market place is clamoring for more and more iron and steel and at lower prices. New sources of raw materials could both increase consumption and lower retail prices. But there's an interesting story developing in Brazil's Minas Gerais which ought to be told in these United States. The M. A. Hanna Iron Company, a U.S. firm, whose honorary chairman, incidentally, is the former secretary of Treasury George M. Humphrey, became interested in the iron reserves in Brazil back in 1956. Humphrey was one of the better bureaucrats this nation has seen,

wise enough to retire from the political scene and confine his energies to the market place and to the enormously challenging job of producing more wealth rather than the politically rewarding job of taxing wealth away from people. The M. A. Hanna Company has holdings near Belo Horizonte in Brazil which, according to figures released recently by Business Week Magazine, assay at 64 percent iron, most of which lies on or near the surface. So high a percentage of iron in the ore makes this one of the most potentially valuable diggings in the world. Even the Mesabi Range ore would assay between 50 and 60 percent. The 64 percent iron is good enough to go directly into a blast furnace with out beneficiating. But there's a major problem about hiring the men and setting up a multi-million-dollar iron mining operation in the nation of Brazil. Not too many miles to east and northward, the Brazilian government owns some ore deposits. And with a typical dog-in-the-manger attitude the Brazilian politicians want their cake and they want to eat it, too. Although they don't own the Hanna properties, they don't want to let Hanna develop its properties. They have fearful that competition from a private firm might be so keen as to disrupt their own operations, take away their own customers, and generally benefit the

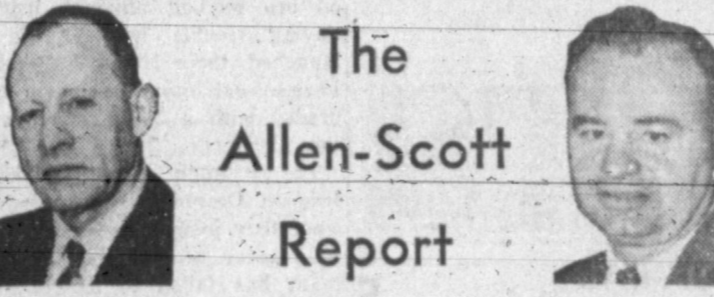

### Candidates Could Pledge To Shun All Free Rides

If I were Richard Nixon or Jack Kennedy here's something I'd promise the voters: Never to set foot in a jet or a helicopter or any other means of transportation belonging to the United States Government. Such a promise would bring them support from that segment of voters who believe that the President of the United States is due no concessions, no privileges, no extra niceties, no trappings, no trimmings. For proof, look at the criticism Ike has had levelled at him for the use of Government vehicles for his travels, be they long or short. He should, some people feel, travel day coach, stand in line to buy his ticket, and carry his own pillow. Every time he employs a helicopter to get to a golf course you'd think he'd lifted the Treasury. Instead of using the chopper the President should have slung his bags over his shoulder, walked to the nearest corner, and hailed a cab or a bus. How much cheaper it would have been for him to use a freighter on his world travels, and not a jet or a naval vessel. What does the President mean by traveling in a style little out of reach of the average man? Does he have the mad idea that his position, his responsibilities, entitle him to special privileges? Kennedy and Nixon should learn from this. They should come to understand that lots of Americans resent the President's acting, or being treated, as if he were a special person. Think of all the money Ike could save the U.S. if he moved his own lawn, rode a motorcycle, had the First Lady do all the cooking and washing, held State dinners at a cafeteria, carried a shotgun and served as his own bodyguard, did his golf playing on a public course and used second-hand balls, did his own typing, and kept a cow and chickens. It might be wise for the next President to do away with the official limousines and use a horse and buggy, or a dog-cart — or even a bicycle. For foreign travel he could make the trips ever so much more cheaply if he floated from continent to continent on a raft, or, cheaper still, climbed in a big bottle and floated over. Having a hand play "Hail To The Chief" is a bit showy as well as expensive, too. A phonograph record could be used. And why use cannons for the 21-gun salutes? Aides could pop paper bags, or set off firecrackers. Such presidential severities would outrage some citizens, those who believe that the man who holds the highest office in the world is due a little more fuss and feathers than the rest of us. But they'd soon get accustomed to seeing the President in overalls, and hanging out the wash, and rolling his own cigars. Brazilian economy in a way which could not be credited to the politicians. Hence the Hanna firm is in difficulties and the amount of iron coming to the surface in the world is far less than it would have to be. Brazil's riches in mineral and metal deposits, are legendary. It has enormous resources in tungsten, manganese, mica, tin and aluminum, not to mention iron. Most of Brazil's known wealth is concentrated in the state of Minas Gerais. Even gold and diamonds have been found there in quantity. The Bethlehem Steel Company at present is mining huge quantities of manganese in Brazil largely because its Brazilian operations are shielded by a partnership with Brazilian firm which has a 51 percent interest in the South American operations. Governments the world over always try to interfere with the production of the world's goods for which the people of the earth are hungry and for which they will gladly pay. It is undoubtedly true that all governmental operations are aimed at achieving restraint of trade. To the person wishing such restraints, governmental action is called protection. To the person wishing freedom and full market place opportunities, governmental action is called predation and serves during century after century to hold back the progress and achievement free men could bring to pass.

WASHINGTON — The old gray mare ain't what she used to be — so far as the Democratic National Committee is concerned. In the few weeks since the Los Angeles convention, it's become a very different creature. Instead of plodding along with an occasional disruptive burp under controversial former Chairman Paul Butler, the Democratic headquarters now operates at a brisk and purposeful trot in obvious preparation for a greatly increased tempo when the big election battle gets underway next month. Unlike Butler and his dawdling lieutenants, who functioned with little zest and drive, the new party chiefs know exactly what they want to do, how to do it, and are wasting no time and effort in tackling the job. All of them work long hours, at high speed, and with boundless enthusiasm and fervor. This may be due to their youth. They are all under 50, with a number in their 30s. The oldest, 49, is humorously referred to as the "old man." Senator Kennedy is in complete control of the National Committee and its machinery. It is proceeding according to his plans, his policies, his tempo, and with his hand-picked assistants in all the key positions. This far-reaching transformation has been instituted in less than a month. It's still incomplete. Other new faces are being brought in every week. This will probably go on throughout the campaign as need arises. Whatever else it is, the Kennedy organization is not static. It moves, and doesn't spare the horses in doing so. That's the way it performed in the hectic pre-convention struggle at Los Angeles, and since then in speedily and decisively taking over the Democratic National Committee apparatus. Jack is definitely in the saddle, and his boys are just as definitely running the show. Most of the old National Committee staff has been retained, but in subordinate position. Former high officials no longer give orders, they take them. Also, they execute them in a far more snappy and businesslike manner. They're really earning their pay now. WHO'S WHO — Senator Henry Jackson, 48, whom Kennedy personally picked as National Chairman, heads the list of this new high-powered outfit. Other key figures are: Robert (Bobby) Kennedy, 34, his 43-year-old brother's personal campaign manager, as he has been throughout his presidential drive. Theodore Sorensen, 33-year-old brilliant Nebraska lawyer, who is the candidate's administrative assistant and one of his closest lieutenants. ## Economic Equality

### A Sometimes Thing

British M. P. Fenner Brockway is authority for the statement that "Human freedom requires an economic equality which no country has yet achieved." A little later in the same article he says, "But Egypt has made me understand how socialism is still the need of the world." An attempt to introduce economic equality would require an advanced degree of government coercion and control and would immediately put an end to such freedom as still exists in the world. Among other things, freedom means that men have the right to develop their talents and capacities to the limit of their ability and to enjoy the reward flowing from their extraordinary efforts. If there is no hope of enjoying unusual benefits, little extraordinary effort will be put forth, production will decline and poverty increase. Even the Marxists have given up hope of economic equality and the differentials offered for able people in the Soviet Union are far greater than in the freer countries. Experience has shown that socialism develops less economic equality and the free market system develops more of it. Moreover the latter does so on a voluntary basis while socialism attempts to do it by government coercion with all the cruelty and shackling of the human spirit involved. Socialists seem never to realize that economic equality would destroy the incentive to strive without which men would certainly be doomed to a drab, colorless, low standard of living. Men who hope for great reward will perform extraordinary feats of ingenuity and constructive effort but men who have no hope of more than a common denominator level of existence will work as little as possible and think scarcely at all. That is the way God made us and the socialists who think they can change it assume that they are wiser and more powerful than God. ## Looking Sideways

Next time you pick or cut a fingertip, watch what happens when you shut off the circulation for a few minutes by twisting a rubber band around the finger's base. After blood flow is reduced sufficiently to control active bleeding, you'll note the swelling up of a red shiny droplet. Pretty soon the droplet will lose its sheen and become dull. About this time you'll also notice that it's beginning to gel like the yolk of a 6-minute egg. Shortly thereafter, it will harden and seem to shrink as it assumes the properties of the familiar clot. And, if you can resist the temptation to wipe it off and pick at it, it will remain as a protective dressing for a few days. Later, when it falls off, you'll find that the wound has almost completely healed under its protective covering. Now if the phenomenon of clotting were to occur while blood was flowing within the walls of your arteries or veins, you'd be in serious trouble. This is exactly what happens when a clot blocks an artery that feeds heart muscle (coronary thrombosis) or one that brings nutrition to the brain (cerebral thrombosis or "stroke"). It occurs, too, when a thrombus blocks a vein in the "milk leg" of pregnancy or the phlebitis which can occur in either sex. Perhaps these simple observations will give you some idea of the importance of this marvelous bleeding-clotting mechanism that keeps blood in a fluid state while it circulates within your closed system of arteries and veins and that causes it to solidify within a few moments after its escape from a vessel. I've already indicated some of the things that can happen when the mechanism is disturbed, causing solidification (thrombosis) of blood within the closed system of arteries and veins. Equally dangerous are disturbances that result in failure of the blood to clot after its escape from a vessel (bleeding diathesis). Unless some means are found to control bleeding, the vital fluid may be lost more rapidly than it can be replaced by uninterrupted or repeated transfusions. Some of the causes of abnormal bleeding are preventable and correctable. These include deficiencies of vitamins K and C, most often seen respectively in hemorrhagic disease of the newborn and in infantile scurvy. Then there are the bleedings caused by abnormal reactions to certain drugs such as arsenicals, gold compounds, antiepileptics, certain antibiotics and even some of the commonly used pain-killers. But the most mysterious of the bleeding diseases are those that run in families (congenital or hereditary). A notable example of those hereditary abnormalities is the state of hemophilia that has been the curse of certain of the royal houses of Europe. Transmitted through the unaffected mother to her sons, this disease may be traced back for generations. Unless conquered by medical science within the near future, it will continue to pass from unaffected daughters to their sons in generations to come. So next time you watch that blood clot on your pricked finger, you may thank your lucky stars you weren't destined to be a crown prince, principles, Kennedy's are violently non-Catholic if not, indeed, anti-Catholic.

## Auto Industry To Concentrate On Compact Cars For '61 Market

DETROIT (UPI)—The auto industry will emphasize compactness in all of its 1961 model cars, auto industry sources say.

The sources say smaller dimensions will not be limited to the four new compacts to be introduced this year and the six compacts already on the market.

The majority of the standard-make cars will have more compact bodies, they say.

Changes in the existing compact cars will be minor, except for the Rambler American which will have extensive sheet metal and trim changes which will give it a more dressy look.

Generally, all of the standard cars will retain a strong resemblance to their 1960 counterparts, but all General Motors lines and all Ford lines except the Ford and Thunderbird will have smaller dimensions. The greatest change in appearance will be in

the Plymouth, which will de-emphasize its fins, and the Pontiac, which will use rounded, soft lines rather than a boxy shape. The Thunderbird will abandon its crisp lines below the roof for a spear-shaped body.

One exception among the bigger cars to the trend toward compactness will be the Chrysler which will increase its overall length and alter sheet metal to increase the general feeling of increased size.

The Imperial will be about the same size as it is this year with some de-emphasis of its fins but otherwise relatively unchanged.

Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Buick and Cadillac will all have sculptured sides similar to those on this year's Ford and Falcon.

Mercury will bear a strong resemblance to the Ford as both cars will share body and chassis components.

The Dodge and Dart will bear an even stronger resemblance than last year by a "face-lift" which will give both a new ap-

pearance. The major innovations will appear on the new compacts scheduled for introduction this fall.

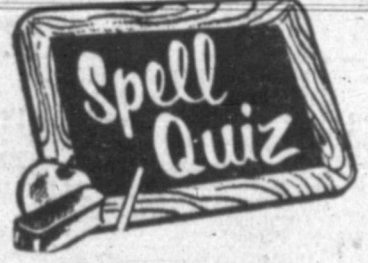

Neither Congo will yield its name and this is sure to cause some mixups in such fields as mail service, map reading, tourism and international diplomacy.



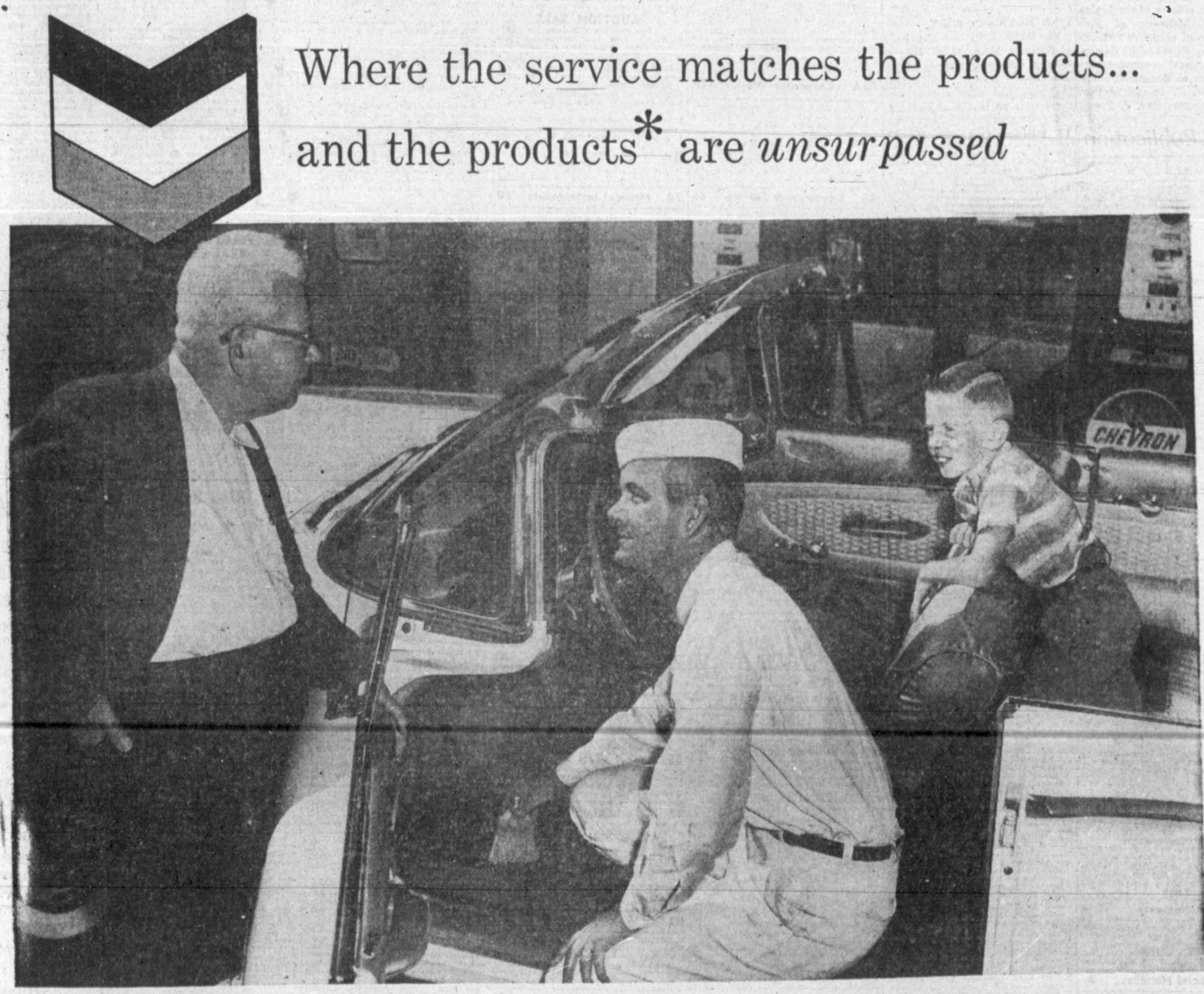
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
