If now you actually develor some kind of recognized allerg reaction, put on your Sherlock Holmes cap and start looking for clues. Don't clear anything without careful investigation. Maybe it is exposure to sun-

light or cold. To sun tan lotion or sunburn ointment. To that new lipstick, eyeshade, nail polish, perfume, toilet water, hand soap, detergent, floor wax, insecticide, rouge, hair dye, rinse, deodorant, permanent wave lotion, depilatory, roach or ant powder or synthetic fabric.

Maybe it is something in the pain killer, *tranquilizer, nose drops, cold remedy, sedative, sleeping medicine, or the acne lotion or ointment. Maybe it is milk or eggs or fish

or shell foods

Maybe it is just "nerves." You don't need to hire a private eve for this kind of sleuthing. And you don't need to wear a white coat and build a laboratory to run down a hot clue.

Just stay away from the sus pect a few days and see if your allergy isn't better. Then expose yourself a bit and see if it isn't worse. Then a few more days away and another exposure just to double check.

But don't overdo this do ... ityourself program. When you're finally satisfied that your investigation is complete, turn your work sheets in to your doctor and let him carry on from there.


