

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

The 137-pound "Echo I," launched Friday, was given a bi-partisan tone in the simultaneous coastto-coast transmission and reception of messages during the satellite's 11th pass over this country at 3:07 a.m. edt.

Echo's success was but one of several American space achievements in the last several days, period which the Air Force said Friday encompassed its "biggest 24 hours in missile-space history.' An Air Force plane brought the "Lucky 13" Discoverer satellite capsule here Saturday for President Eisenhower to see at the White House Monday. The capsule plucked out of the Pacific Ocean Thursday night, was the first-man made object ever retrieved from

a space orbit. A few hours after the Echo I success, Air Force Maj. Bob White steered an X15 rocket ship to an altitude of almost 25 miles, higher than man has ever flown.



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



Infectious hepatitis is hard to combat, local doctors point out. The virus has not been isolated and many facets of the disease are

not known, they explained. Pampa and the Panhandle area have not escaped this disease. One local physician said, "We've had one to two patients hospitalized all the time during the last several months."

Some of this rise, he explained, can be attributed to the fact that doctors now recognize the disease more quickly than in the past. take away from the fact that the disease is on the upswing.

Difficulties in ascertaining the

disease early are posed by signals that usually accompany the common cold: lassitude and fatigue. It affects the liver and can be noted by soreness over the liver, and, as it progresses, a yellowness in the eyes. 'This would lead one to believe

this is yellow jaundice. However, it effects the patient differently and should not be construed as such," he pointed out. Bed rest has proved to be the



That was the urging 15 year ago today from Ken Dixon, top war correspondent who was filing from Ie Shima, and awaiting the arrival of the Japanese peace mission envoy who was flying to a meeting with General Douglas MacArthur, supreme Allied commander in the Far East.

It was the end of World War II, and marked the preliminary steps that would see United States troops pour into Japan to occupy the island nation. It, too, would mark the first time in history that the military of any nation would step into occupation duties completely devoid of arms.

This was how MacArthur told the Japanese the Americans would come, but warned that natives must toe the line "or else."

In Pampa, excitement was rampant. A huge street dance rocked off the celebration. It was held on Cuyler Street and but for a few persons, police had no difficulties.
