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Snowy Gale Hits In Midwest Area; Storms In South

A new snowstorm rocketed into the upper Midwest today, powered by winds expected to reach gale strength on the thawing Great Lakes.

Michigan and Wisconsin braced for up to a half-foot of snow as the U.S. Weather Bureau warned of sleet and snow accompanying 40 miles an hour gales on Lake Huron, Erie, St. Clair and Michigan.

High winds and tornado conditions that threatened southern Illinois and Indiana during the night shifted east into the Ohio Valley. A Weather Bureau spokesman said the winds appeared to be losing strength as the low pressure center broadened.

Tornadoes Sunday scaped Missouri and Arkansas and hovered over southern Illinois. The Ozark twisters killed a woman and injured her husband and 10 other persons at a West Plains, Mo., prayer meeting. At least 33 other persons were reported injured in Missouri and Arkansas.

Three Nebraska teen-agers were killed Sunday night when their automobile slid into the path of a truck on a slushy road west of Wahoo.

Thunderstorms blanketed a wide area south and east of the Ohio Valley and lower Mississippi Valley east to the Atlantic Coast.

Car Insurance Plan Before House Today

AUSTIN (UPI) — Speaker James A. Turman said today he would place before the House of Representatives for floor action a bill to permit flexible automobile insurance rates.

The insurance bill by Rep. C. W. Pearce Jr. of Temple would authorize companies to offer optional policies in addition to the standard coverage and rates prescribed by the State Insurance Board.

Pearce attacked the "monopoly-like rate" system used only in Texas, where all firms must offer their automobile policies at the same premiums.

"A competitive rating law would provide even more protection for the insuring public than is now possible because of the standards imposed by the test of competition in the market place," Pearce's Bill stated.

It is supported by some of the largest casualty insurance firms doing business in Texas, but opposed by many of the mutual companies. Similar legislation offered in previous sessions failed to pass.

Turman will also begin referring to committees a tidal wave of 142 bills which were introduced on Friday in time to beat a 60-day deadline for the presentation of legislation. A four-fifths majority approval is required to introduce new bills from now on.

Benavides Given No Certain Word On Federal Post

LAREDO (UPI) — Webb County Judge Robert Benavides, who said Saturday he had been told by Sen. Ralph Yarborough his name had been submitted for nomination as a federal judge, still had no official confirmation today his name had been submitted.

Benavides, a wealthy 46-year-old rancher-attorney, said Yarborough notified him by telephone his name had been submitted as a nominee to replace the late Judge James V. Allred of Corpus Christi as federal district judge for the South Texas judicial district.

The judge said Yarborough "didn't elaborate." He said it was his understanding his name had gone to the justice department.

In Washington, a confidential source told United Press International that Benavides' name had not been submitted to the White House. The White House itself had no comment on the matter.

The post has been vacant since Allred's death several months ago. Cases on the docket have been handled by Dist. Judge Ben C. Connally of Houston.

Another Laredo jurist has been prominently mentioned for the post. He was state Dist. Judge E. D. Salinas. Speculation was that a judge of Latin-American extraction would be named to fill the position.

Benavides, endorsed recently by several South Texas groups for appointment as ambassador to Mexico, is a graduate of Laredo High School and Notre Dame University.

County judge since 1958, he served as assistant district attorney in 1942-43 and was formerly associated with the law firm of the late South Texas political leader Manuel J. Raymond.

IRS Succeeding In Speeding Tax Refund Dollars

The Internal Revenue Service has long been noted for efficiency in the taking in of our tax dollars. This year's "hurryup" tax refund program to bolster the sagging economy has called for the tax folks turning their skill to getting tax dollars out. They are proving equal to the occasion.

Refunds mailed to Dallas District taxpayers by March 3, 1961 amount to 217,427 checks totaling \$21,063,600, or an average of \$97 per check. This is well ahead of the 143,148 checks totaling \$13,056,214, or an average of \$88 per check mailed to taxpayers by March 3, 1960. The tax men feel that the increase of \$9 per refund check is due to increased unemployment during 1960. They expect refunds amounting to some seventy to eighty millions to be mailed to more than 720,000 taxpayers before July 1.

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director, advises all taxpayers to file now. He stated, "Those having refunds coming will help us to get their refund to them sooner by making their tax returns now."
