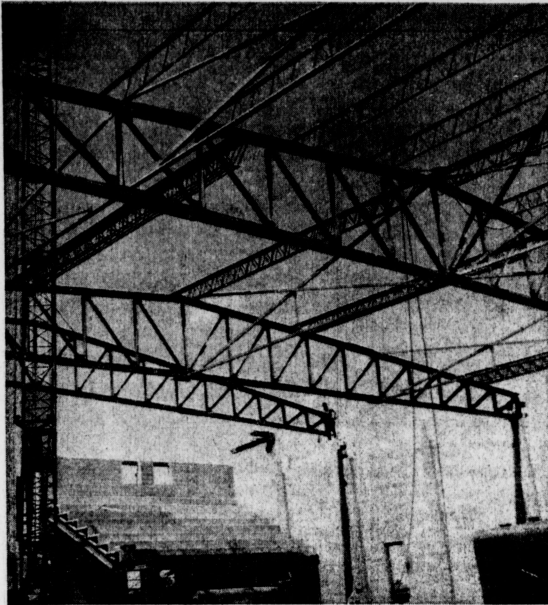

## Building Program Gets Final Steel

Muleshoe Band Boosters met Monday night and discussed consolidation of all fine arts departments — band, choir, speech and art. After a lengthy discussion by the boosters, the group turned down the proposal, feeling that the band requires more support, according to Jean Landers, reporter for the organization. Buddy Blackman, president of the Boosters, presided.

Going from here were Spencer Beaver, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Travel and Tourism committee; Clyde Henry, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Carroll and Chamber Manager Roy Davis. A proposal to change the association to the "Lost Dutchman's Gold Route" was defeated since it would have made necessary the changing of the route from U. S. 70 in Oklahoma to North Texas highways.

Bailey County Historical Survey Committee will meet Monday afternoon at 1:30 in the First National Bank community room, according to Cecil Davis, president, who urges all members to be present for what he terms "a very important meeting."

H. Elrod, Muleshoe, is leading nine Boy Scouts on a 12-day expedition over rugged mountain trails at Philmont Scout Ranch, the 137,000-acre camping area of Boy Scouts of America near Cimarron, N. M. The trek ends July 29.

Muleshoe area rodeo enthusiasts are being invited to attend the Top of Texas Rodeo in Bampa Aug. 11-14. Stock will be from the Beutler Bros. herd of Elk City, Okla., and Cy Taillon, popular rodeo announcer from Denver, will describe the events. A total of \$8000 is offered in prize money for participants.

Muleshoe school district's \$9 million building program saw its final steel put in place this past week as the big project neared its final stage. Only one building will not be completed by the time school opens six weeks from tomorrow. It was at this building, the junior high gymnasium, that the final steel was put into place Thursday. All that remains is the steel bracing for the mammoth trusses and then workmen will be ready to start adding the roof.

Superintendent Neil Dillman says the entire program is "on schedule," and should be completed by the time school opens Sept. 1. The gymnasium project was not included in the Aug. 13 deadline.

The new gymnasium, an all-steel and masonry structure, will be used for physical education classes when it is completed, and also for all basketball games. It provides a 90-foot court, bordered by steel and concrete bleachers, making it one of the finest high school gyms in this area.

## Drouth Doubled FHA's '64 Loan Volume Here

The fiscal year ending June 30, was a big one for Farmers Home Administration in Bailey County, says John Clinton Kennedy, county FHA supervisor.

His report shows that the FHA loaned \$1,065,250 in Bailey county during the fiscal year, and this is approximately twice the amount loaned the preceding year.

Adverse weather conditions during 1964 was a contributing factor in the increased loan volume, Kennedy said. Emergency loans were made available because of drouth conditions in Bailey county last year.

Kennedy says that Congress has expanded FHA's lending authority, and pending legislation indicates further broadening of the FHA programs.

Says Kennedy: "Farmers Home Administration is interested in the needs of farmers, particularly the family-sized farmer, and also is concerned about the plight of all people living in the rural community."

Kennedy said "We want the farmers and other rural residents to be informed about the various programs that Congress has provided through FHA." Information about the new credit programs, he pointed out, may be had at the local FHA office, 115 East Ave. D.

## 'Wrong' Herbicide Damages Sorghum

"Sick" grain sorghum, some of it "just sick" and some "very, very sick," brought a couple of experts to Bailey county this last week for a check, and they came up with the answer:

On the "sick" land, too much herbicide has been used, stunting the root development but on the "very, very sick" sorghum, they discovered that the wrong kind of chemical had been used.

Dr. Homer Brady, Extension weed control specialist from College Station, and Dr. Allen Wiese, weed control researcher from the Bushland Experiment Station, visited the fields where the ailing grain sorghum was languishing in the Bailey county sun.

Two stalks from the "oversold" use of atrazine showed weak stalk and fibrous root system. This was termed the "sick" grain sorghum. "If only the proper amount of atrazine had been used," one of the experts said, "the grain sorghum probably would not have been damaged, but the overdose of the herbicide definitely stunted the growth and probably will result in a complete failure for that particular crop."

The "very sick" grain sorghum, the experts said, had been grown on land treated with a trade-name herbicide which is used as a cotton prior to planting. This particular chemical, however, "should never be used to control weeds in grain sorghum," the experts said. Deformed roots and fibrous roots resulted.

Today's Meditation

FATHER, FORGIVE THEM. Of the many religious symbols of the world's many faiths, it hardly will be questioned that the crucifix is the cross. Yet this disturbing reminder of agony, injustice, treachery, and death has become the primary and universal symbol of Christianity.

We can see, at least dimly, why it had to be so. To accomplish His purpose, Jesus had to absorb the worst evils of the human heart. If this seems like gratuitous cruelty — if we think Christianity might have been founded by pleasant methods — reflect on how much less Christ's "Father, Forgive Them" would have meant if he had merely denounced in a speech or departed from the empire. But since He was able to forgive all that He forgave, at least two things follow: (1) We are assured that no matter how shameful our own sins have been, no matter how deeply we have hurt others, Christ can and will forgive us. (2) No matter how grievously others may have sinned against us, we can, through His grace, forgive. For it is hardly likely that any evil we may have committed or had committed against us is any worse than the evil of the cross.

Thus the symbol of suffering has become the symbol of vic-

tory over evil, not only for Him but for us. By His grace we are forgiven and able to forgive.

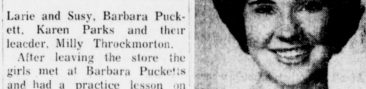
Sallie Ann Parkinson, Former Muleshoe Resident, To Be Wed

The wedding will be solemnized at 6 p.m. Sept. 4, at the Park Heights Church of Christ, Hamilton, with George Tolbert,

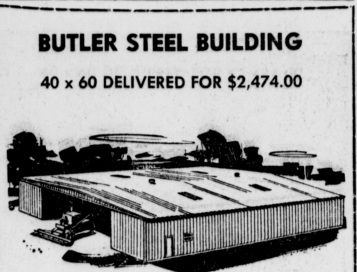
assistant minister of the Park Heights Church of Christ, officiating at the ceremony. The couple will make their home in Hamilton, where the groom is engaged in farming.

PUBLIC NOTICE  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the exemption from local ad valorem taxes of the property of certain charitable organizations, provided such organizations meet certain conditions and requirements and expend at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually on free medical and hospital care for the indigent within the State of Texas; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publications.

PREAMBLE  
WHEREAS, The Legislature finds and declares that there is a need for the operation of hospitals by private charitable enterprises which will furnish free medical and/or hospital care for the indigent in Texas; and

WHEREAS, The operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent in Texas will add to the welfare and well-being of the State of Texas and its residents and citizens; and

WHEREAS, The need for the operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent is especially great in counties having a population in excess of one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000); and

WHEREAS, It is found and declared to be the Public Policy of the State to foster and encourage such operation of hospitals as aforesaid; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Section 1. The Constitution of the State of Texas is amended hereby, by the addition of a new Section to Article VIII thereof, to be numbered Section 2-A, and reading as follows:

"2-A. The properties of any charitable trust, or organization, if such trust or organization is dedicated to, and operates a hospital furnishing free medical and/or medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas, shall be exempt from all ad valorem taxes levied by any taxing entity, except by the State of Texas itself, provided:

"(1) such trust or organization has expended for free medical and/or medical care within the State of Texas, during the calendar year next preceding, a sum of not less than

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of the State of Texas on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings or other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution shall be authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as

hereinafter provided, to acquire bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Comptroller of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10c) tax levy for the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period: Arlington State College at Arlington; Texas Technological College at Lubbock; Texas State University at Denton; Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont; Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville; Texas Woman's University at Denton; Texas Southern University at Houston; Midwestern University at Wichita Falls; Pan American College at Edinburg; East Texas State College at Commerce; Sam Houston State Teacher's College at Huntsville; Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos; West Texas State University at Canyon.

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches; Sul Ross State College at Alpine; Angelo State College at San Angelo.

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1972.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institutions to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifty per cent (50%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrolling projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the unannounced loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund so allocated to any such institution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Mrs. Bill Millen entertained during the luncheon with her rendition of pantomime of the "Mule Train".

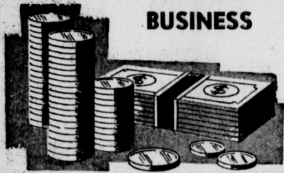

Of Law and Love

"Tails He's Guilty!"
The hour was late and the jurors were weary of trying to decide whether the defendant had really committed the crime. Finally one exasperated juror proposed that they toss a coin.

"Tails he's guilty, heads he's innocent!"
Everyone agreed to abide by the toss. And in obedience to the tails that turned up, they brought in a verdict of guilty.

But when the facts came to the attention of the court, the verdict was set aside.

For the law does not recognize coin-tossing as a legitimate method of doing the job of a jury. Nor does it recognize cutting cards or drawing lots, which jurors have also been known to try. As one court put it:

"Nothing short of a free and deliberate finding, made upon a conscientious conviction of the judgments of all the jurors, will satisfy the law."

Another shortcut, sometimes resorted to by a jury in fixing the amount of damages, is known as the "quotient verdict." In this method, each juror writes down how many dollars he recommends, then the figures are added up and divided by 12 to get the final amount. It is true that the quotient verdict is not as haphazard as the coin verdict. It is also true that such calculations could be a helpful step in the process of deliberating.

Nevertheless, courts generally frown on quotient verdicts. The main objectionable feature is the agreement, in advance, to be bound by a mathematical result — no matter how high or low low. The juror who does that abdicates his responsibility, disdains his oath, and cheats the opposing party of the "day in court" they are entitled to have.

Quite properly, jurors are reluctant to wind up deadlocked. (One jury, rather than admit defeat, brought in a verdict of "almost guilty.")

And quite properly, jurors want to speed the wheels of justice.

But speed is not all-important. Of what value is a quick verdict that makes a mockery of trial by jury? Better slow justice than no justice.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.
SECTION 49-B. RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations to be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments to this Constitution as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioners of the General Land Board and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Governor, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; and one member serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the term to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed four hundred million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Two Hundred and Fifty Million Dollars (\$250,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for

not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed four and one-half per cent. (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas. Registration of such bonds, and the payment of the principal of such bonds, shall be the responsibility of the State of Texas, and delivery of such bonds to the purchaser shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Fund, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter acquired by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale of any lands, or rights therein; the interest and penalties received from the sale of any lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, interest, rents, royalties and other moneys received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by said Board from any such lands; and any other moneys received by said Board from any such lands; and interest received from investment of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued and sold shall be paid out of the

moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of penalties as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States which funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund and shall constitute moneys therein to be used to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all of the bonds which may be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to any purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and interest thereon, together with the expenses heretofore authorized, or any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there shall be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency or institution, or the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or purchased by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent as other lands owned by purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, and at such rates of interest, under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) consecutive days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, U.S. Forest, Coast and Geodetic Survey, or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1945, and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been honorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting into the United States. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board, for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1956, shall be credited to said Veterans' Land Fund and may be used for the purpose of purchasing additional lands, to be sold as provided herein, until December 1, 1965; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds shall be set aside for that purpose until December 1, 1965; all moneys attributable to such bonds shall be set aside for the retirement of such bonds, and to pay interest thereon; and when there are sufficient moneys to retire all of such bonds, all of such moneys then remaining or hereafter becoming a part of said Veterans' Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided by law.

"If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of its adoption, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith by law."

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction for the retirement of such bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds, heretofore issued and sold

shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds heretofore issued and sold, to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided elsewhere herein, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds heretofore issued and sold at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reserved to the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, and to amend, modify, supplement, and change the same, and to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November next following the date of the adoption of this Amendment. Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; and said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with the terms and requirements that may be provided by law."

"If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of its adoption, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith by law."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.

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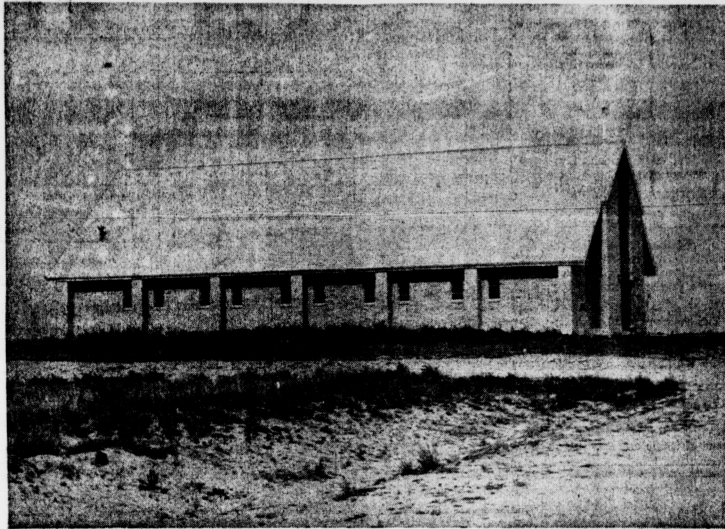

We could say a short prayer for them. Even people who are fighting bad causes-fighting against God - God loves them too He hopes that they can be converted to a better spirit. That is how God feels about His enemies; so that is how we should feel about them. A by-product of this love or thoughtfulness of our fellow readers of Bailey County Journal readers and all people is sound mental health. Most neuroses and psychoses develop from over-thinking with own selfish problems. Thoughtfulness of others weakens this dangerous selfishness; so what is good for a man's soul is usually good for his mind and body too.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section 10 as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges upon disability and to remove them from office upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions here by established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members. (6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to be, permanent in nature. (7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances charged upon proof of disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court. (8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it may determine, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, the Commission finds good cause, therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the retirement, or removal, or removal, of the Justice or Judge in question and the reasons therefor. (9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary. ### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SECTION 1. That Section 17 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to allow an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and increasing the per diem allowance of Members of the Legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Section 17 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve, or if he shall be impeached, absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government, until he shall be succeeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall receive an annual salary of not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations herefor made in the General Appropriations Bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1967, for the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall not be in excess of Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session.

SECTION 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session."

SECTION 3. The Government of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
