Under the tax law, if a profit is reinvested within the time limit in a newly acquired residence, the individual avoids the liability of paying a capital gains tax on the earlier transaction. Since the inquirer points out that he is in the 53 per cent bracket, this factor of timing should not be overlooked.

. At the same time, the tax bracket cuts by more than half the net realized benefit of interest earnings on ordinary taxable bonds or savings accounts during the temporary investment of the funds. In the circumstances, the reader should seriously consider putting his funds in tax-free state or municipal obligations which mature in not more than two years.

For this special financial need, such an investment would be preferable to the reader's own suggestion that he put his funds in an insured savings and loan association or in an outstanding, no-load mutual fund. As for the latter, the absence of the load charge reduces the disadvantage of using a more or less permanent investment commitment to meet a temporary purpose. It seems to me, however, more sen sible for the reader to put his \$10,000 in a short term investment, such as tax-free municipal bonds of short maturity until such time as he and his wife reach a decision whether to use the funds toward the purchase of a replacement home instead of



VOICES BOUNCED OVER SEA



tachycardia and bradycardia, dependent on the respiratory cycle, known as sinus arrhythmia. It's a perfectly normal abnormality that's frequently observed in infancy and early childhood.

The last of the normal abnormalities is the occasional 'slipped," or "'dropped" beat (extra-systole) that's perhaps more fear-inspiring than any of the other conditions we've discussed.

Usually caused by some passing physical or emotional disturbance (like overeating, overexertion, sudden panic or hearty laughter), the extra-systole (pronouned sis - toe-lee) may produce a fluttery chest sensation (palpitation).

However, I would not advise you to dismiss too lightly a sense of palpitation or the actual demonstration of pulse skipping. If only for reassurance, you owe it to yourself to submit to


