





J. R. Hoffman, head of the real estate division at the National Better Business Bureau, said the "model pitch" is almost epidemic in Proportion. The Bureau has just sent out an alert on the racket to chambers of commerce nation-

From the sound of the "model deal," there's a chance you might even get your home fixed up for nothing. "Usually, you get a cheap repair job - and pay through the nose," Hoffman warned. Then there are the scare artists. They knock on the door and tell







President's Farm **Program Praised** By Organizations

of two of the nation's largest farm organizations and most Democratic congressmen have praised President Kennedy's plan to let farmers write their own ticket, but a Republican leader said it might be "the fruit of frustration.'

Heads of the National Grange and the National Farmers' Union both endorsed the plan.

But Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen said the plan was a "do it yourself kit for every farm commodity. It looks a little to me like the fruit of frustration.'

Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., said the proposals were "constructive." But he declined to go along with some of the recommendations "including give-away schemes and federal handouts."

Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., senior minority member of the Senate Agriculture Committee said Congress would "take a very long look" at the program. He said he personally endorsed part of the plan.

Castro Force Seizes Priest

HAVANA (UPI) - The Armed Forces' Ministry has announced the capture of a Cuban Roman Catholic priest who served for four months as the "spiritual father" of rebel bands in the island's south - central Escambray Mountains,

All of the government's controlled newspapers headlined the announcement, which is expected to set off a new anti-church campaign by the Fidel Castro regime. The semi - official newspaper Revolucion featured the news under the headline: "Thug in cassock seized in the Escambray."

A communique identified the priest as the Rev. Francisco Lopez Blazquez. It said he was arrested in the city of Trinidad where he had arrived in an at-"to escape" government militia.

The communique said Father Lopez, accompanied by an unidentified man who escaped, at tacked a militiaman in Trinidad in an attempt to disarm him.

The militiaman was "gravely wounded" in the attack but the priest was captured when he "remained paralyzed beside the wounded man," according to the announcement.

Cuban Embassy Group Resigns

THE HAGUE (UPI) - A struggle to overthrow the government of Fidel Castro got under way last week by Cuban Ambassador Ignacio Fiterre and five members of Cuban embassy here who resigned en masse.

Fiterre was once imprisoned with Castro in their struggle against former Cuban Dictator Fulgencio Batista,

On sidewalks outside the embassy demonstrators chalked the words "Away with Castro."

The mass resignation came in a cable to the Foreign Ministry in Havana, Fiterre and his staff said "we will struggle for a new Cuba, for Cuban freedom and Cuban

they are disposable and you are not carrying around a soiled and germ - laden handkerchief. Fine. Where, in the midtown of New York, so you dispose of them? My job is to cover the theater of New York. So you leave home with a bale of these useful tissues in all your pockets and go to Moore's for dinner and work your noisy way through an even dozen tissues between the soup and the coffee. Can you throw the used tissues on a restaurant floor? Of course you can't. You can't hand them to a waiter and say: "Burn these, please." So you put the sodden wads back in your pockets and think, well, on the way to the theater in the next block I'll see a trash basket and throw them away. There isn't one in sight. You walk from 46th St. through the lobby of the Edison Hotel to 47th St., where the theater is, and you see nine of those sand-packed ash urns they use in hotels. You are unwilling furtively to empty your pockets into one of them and foist the tissues on some poor devil whose job it is to cleanse these urns.






