

Scots Say Scotch Tab Too High

LONDON (UPI) — When Scots toss back a slug of scotch they pay the British government about double the actual retail price of their whisky for the privilege. Across the border Britons get the same treatment.

Now, after six duty increases on the spirits since 1939, the industry says that scotch is so "punitive" and "excessively taxed" that home demand may sag and send the business into a slump.

Despite the heavy tax there is still a very considerable thirst for the drink in these islands, but the Scotch Whisky Association says that at current prices the home market cannot absorb all the scotch available for release. A recession in scotch would mean unemployment and a loss of revenue both at home and abroad.

The men who make and sell scotch have come out with this in the hope of getting the attention of the chancellor of the exchequer. His April budget program normally sets the tax pattern on such items.

Today the Customs and Excise Department takes in \$29.50 on every proof gallon.

On each bottle sold retail it works out this way: the government takes \$3.45 of the normal price of \$5.25. This leaves only \$1.80 to cover all sales and other costs — including the whisky itself.

Whiskey producers complain the government gives aid and encouragement to their foreign wine competitors by duty reductions. They argue that in recent years taxes on sherry and port wine have been cut by 48 per cent, on heavy "empire" wines by 60 per cent and on beer by 28 per cent, leaving scotch to carry the revenue-bearing burden.

"The industry is beginning to find the burden of duty and its international repercussions insupportable," the association said. It reckoned the export of scotch earns Britain \$190.4 million a year.

The United States is easily the biggest single foreign market and Board of Trade figures put the value of combined scotch Irish whiskey exported there last year at nearly \$100.5 million.

Rocket Pilot Thinks He Can Fly Near Space

EDWARDS AFB, Calif. (UPI) — The pilot who flew the X15 rocketship to a world speed record of better than four times the speed of sound said today he is convinced the experimental craft can take him to the brink of space.

Air Force Maj. Robert White streaked above the desert at more than 2,650 miles an hour Tuesday in the first National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) test of the X15's 640,000-horsepower rocket engine.

"I believe now we will probably reach our design goals without any difficulty," said the 36-year-old pilot after the record flight.

Goals of the \$125 million program are flying the dart-shaped plane 100 miles above the earth at 4,000 m.p.h. The first maximum performance flight is scheduled for sometime this summer.

Temperatures on the leading edges of the plane climbed to 700 degrees on White's eight-minute speed run over this desert base, blistering the heat-resisting paint on the craft's nose and tail.

Those temperatures are hot enough to melt a nickel, but the special alloy Inconel X metal the plane is made of is capable of 1,200 degrees.

Coast Guard Breaks Ice For Great Lakes Shipping

CHEBOYGAN, Mich. (UPI) — The bow snaps off the ice and sends it crashing into the void created by the front propeller water draw.

But a few ships continue to ply the icy waters of the lakes during winter months with the help of the Coast Guard icebreaker Mackinaw.

The \$10 million Mackinaw has worked its way through countless miles of ice since it was placed in operation in the Great Lakes in 1945.

It keeps shipping lanes open in the lower lakes, races to the aid of stranded vessels on frigid winter days and leads the way through the locks at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., in the spring when ore ships move into Lake Superior.

No ordinary icebreaker is the Mackinaw.

The 290-foot Mackinaw doesn't batter its way through ice fields. A front propeller draws water from beneath the ice while two rear propellers drive the bow over the top of the ice. The weight of the bow snaps off the ice and sends it crashing into the void created by the front propeller water draw.

The Mackinaw has never lost a battle against the ice. Even 30-foot-thick floes fail to stop the Cheboygan-based icebreaker.

Navy engineers who designed the Mackinaw were certain the vessel could work its way into and out of any ice field.

But they added a supplemental "freezing" on the chance that their calculations might be wrong.

It permits the Mackinaw to rock at a 24-degree arc by heeling and trimming. The rocking is achieved by alternately pumping 450 tons of water per 90 seconds into tanks on the port and starboard sides.

The Mackinaw is powered by five 10-cylinder diesel engines, each of which has 2,000 horsepower, and has a top speed of 21½ miles an hour. It was built by the Toledo Shipbuilding Co. at Toledo, Ohio.

A crew of more than 100 officers and enlisted men man the Mackinaw.

The winter work load of the Mackinaw was eased somewhat four years ago with the opening of the Mackinac Straits Bridge which links Michigan's Upper and Lower Peninsulas.

Before the bridge was opened, the Mackinaw kept lanes open for state-operated car ferries at the Straits of Mackinac.

Great Lakes seamen consider the Mackinaw the answer to their prayers. When trouble occurs the big white Coast Guard vessel is never far away.

The Mackinaw was built specifically as an icebreaker and operates primarily in the winter months.

In addition to freeing ice-locked ships and opening shipping lanes, the Mackinaw places and retrieves buoys, delivers and removes lighthouse keepers and aids resi-

FAA Investigating Plane That Went Back Into Time

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Aviation Agency is investigating — so help us — the story of an airplane that went back into time.

The investigating request came from the highly respectable but doubtful Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association which told FAA it got the story from an unidentified member.

His story: In January 1960, the pilot of a new Cessna 182 reported that he had collided with a Laird biplane aircraft of ancient vintage. Neither plane crashed but some months later, the Cessna pilot stumbled across a Laird biplane in a barn on an Ohio farm.

Pieces of aluminum were found imbedded in the Laird fuselage. They matched the aluminum on his Cessna. Paint also was found on the old plane and an analysis revealed it came from a Cessna. The pilot looked in the Laird cockpit and picked up a flight log. In it was written the account of a collision "with a strange metal plane."

He took the log to Washington where an FBI laboratory test showed it was written about 1932. That was the story as told FAA. An FAA spokesman said it already has checked its records and found no January 1960 collision involving a Cessna and anything resembling a Laird. He said the agency was checking the FBI to determine whether

it actually ran a test on the alleged flight log.

One question bothering the FAA: Did the supposed collision occur in 1960 or 1932? "It's a good question," the spokesman said (with tongue in cheek). "Did the Cessna go back in time or did the Laird somehow find itself in 1960? I know one thing — if the FBI tells us they really did test that flight log for authenticity, I'll believe anything."

X15 Hits 2,905 Miles Per Hour EDWARDS AFB, Calif. (UPI)—The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) announced yesterday revised figures show the X15 streaked to a record 2,905 miles an hour in Tuesday's speed flight of the rocketship. NASA originally estimated the top speed of the craft piloted by Air Force Maj. Robert White at 2,622 m.p.h. The old unofficial record was 2,275, set last year by an X15 with a 16,000-pound thrust engine. The X15 flown Tuesday had an engine developing 57,000 pounds of thrust—and it was flown at only slightly more than half speed. NASA said the revised speed figure was made after a complete analysis of data recorded by instruments during Tuesday's flight. The X15 this summer is expected to try an assault on the fringe of space 100 miles up at speeds of around 4,000 m.p.h.
