Near-Blizzard Smacks Middle West Area Again

The second near-blizzard in five days paralyzed cities and towns in the Middle West today. Forecasters said the late winter blast would sweep all the way into New England.
The snow piled up nine inches deep in Spencer, Iowa, and was measured at eight inches in Omaha. More snow—as much as 10 inches of it—was expected along a long, narrow band stretching from Iowa into northwest Pennsylvania and western New York state.
Heavy snow warnings were up for 10 states.

Air Force Defends 'Culling' Practice

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Air Force joined the Army and Navy today in defending procedures designed to cull misfits from the armed services without formal trial.
An Air Force spokesman, testifying before a Senate Judiciary Subcommittee, said he agreed with the other services that honorable discharges should not be cheapened by awarding them to slackers or "morally inadequate" men.
These men—an Army spokesman described them Tuesday as "dead beats"—receive undesirable discharges. A Navy spokesman said most men receiving such discharges prefer to leave the service that way rather than face a court-martial.

Specialists Gathering Mission Information

GRAND TURK ISLAND, Bahamas (UPI) — Astronaut John Glenn today begins describing for science the sights, sounds and feelings he experienced while rocketing America into the area of earth orbit.
After two days of rest, briefings and physical observation, he will return to the United States for a hero's welcome.
A score of medical and engineering specialists, along with two fellow astronauts, were on hand here to gather and document all the details of the 40-year-old Marine's triple orbit.
Project Mercury officials are particularly interested in how Glenn reacted physically and mentally to 4 hours of weighing nothing, and to a brief period of weighing 1,200 pounds.
It is likely Glenn will be questioned especially about the thousands of tiny particles he saw during one of his swings around the globe. The astronaut mentioned these only briefly in a radio message, and space officials have offered no speculation on what they might be.
Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson was scheduled to fly to this little island today, and on Friday will accompany Glenn back to Cape Canaveral where the trail-blazing astronaut will receive the personal plaudits of President Kennedy.
There was speculation that the President might decorate Glenn or promote him from lieutenant colonel to colonel.
Aside from fatigue, skinned knuckles and a touch of seasickness while his capsule bobbed in the sea, the astronaut suffered no apparent ill effects during the flight.
Monday or Tuesday, the freckled Marine pilot will go to Washington for a White House visit, a parade to the Capitol and a congressional reception.
Glenn was flown to this little British possession in the Bahamas from the Atlantic landing area where his capsule Friendship 7 splashed down after 4 hours and 56 minutes as America's first manned satellite.
"I'm fine, wonderful, couldn't feel better," he told a small group on hand to greet him. But he was hungry, and immediately ordered a steak when he entered the small hospital set up for him here.
His country and the rest of the world applauded Glenn's historic flight, which followed delays and disappointments dating all the way back to December.
The President, who watched television coverage of the flight, told Glenn by telephone later: "Colonel, we are really proud of you and I must say you did a wonderful job."
"Thanks, Mr. President," the Marine lieutenant colonel replied. (See GLENN, Page 2)

Red Chief Wires Congratulations To President

MOSCOW (UPI)—Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today congratulated the United States on its successful three-orbit manned flight of the earth, and suggested joint Soviet-American cooperation in exploration of outer space.
Khrushchev sent a telegram to President Kennedy asking him to convey his "heartiest congratulations" to astronaut Lt. Col. John H. Glenn.
The message suggested that now might be the time for the United States and Russia to pool "their efforts—scientific, technical and material—to explore outer space...to the advance of science."
"I should like to hope that the genius of man, who penetrated the depth of the universe, will be able to find a road to an enduring peace and to ensure prosperity to all peoples on our planet earth which, in the space age, though it does not seem to be so large, is still dear to all its inhabitants," Khrushchev's message said.
Tass News Agency carried the message.
Glenn's space flight was big news in Moscow and focused attention on speculation that the Soviet Union might make a new cosmic effort in the near future.
Details of Glenn's safe recovery after orbiting the earth three times were announced here too late Tuesday night for the morning newspapers. But Russians were fully aware of the Marine's achievement through radio and television broadcasts.
Many individual Russians in Moscow gave a "khorosho" (very good) reaction to the flight, although government announcements played down the feat in comparison with the pioneer efforts of Soviet cosmonauts Yuri Gagarin and Gherman Titov.
The Soviets have not launched any known space flights since Titov orbited the earth 17 times last August. Gagarin circled the globe once last April.
The Russians have claimed that a more complex effort than the Titov flight would be made, but there has been no indication as to when this would come. There has been speculation that an attempt would be made to send a Soviet (See KHRUSHCHEV, Page 2)

Secretary Is Released In Congo Slaying

LEOPOLDVILLE (UPI) — Congolese authorities today released blonde Elizabeth Thring who had been held in custody in connection with the bedroom slaying of Lt. Col. Hulon Stogner, U.S. assistant military attache in Leopoldville.
Miss Thring, 22, of Arlington, Va., described as Stogner's private secretary, was arrested last Saturday on a warrant charging suspicion in the slaying.
Stogner, 39, of El Paso, Tex., was shot to death while lying on his bed in his home on St. Valentine's Day, Feb. 14.
Authorities said Miss Thring was in the bedroom at the time but that it was believed Stogner had been killed by a bullet fired through the window.
No specific charge ever was lodged against Miss Thring.
She was first taken to Makala prison but transferred Monday to a hospital.
One of her attorneys, Belgian Alphonse Ossemert, said Tuesday she needed medical surveillance and was being kept in custody to guarantee her personal safety.
"She is the only witness," he said.

Union Launches Campaign To Get Out Vote

MIAMI (UPI) — AFL-CIO leaders prepared today to launch a \$750,000 campaign to register voters for the 1962 election.
The campaign, billed as non-partisan, was regarded as part of organized labor's effort to prevent an off-year decline in Democratic ranks in Congress.
The AFL-CIO has made little secret of its hopes to increase the margin of Democratic control in the House and Senate to improve chances of passing labor-backed legislation.
At least \$200,000 of the fund already has been pledged by Walter P. Reuther's United Auto Workers union, and the Reuther-led AFL-CIO Industrial Union Department, George Meany, president of the big labor federation, was also reported to be solidly behind the plan.
Meany was said to be eager to make a fast start on the register-and-vote drive this year so it will have a greater impact than previously.
In the presidential year of 1960, the AFL-CIO spent \$587,000 on a similar program that was conducted on a crash basis starting 90 days before the election.
Meany has said that this was an important factor in President Kennedy's narrow victory.
The plans were said to call for heavy concentration in working class neighborhoods in big industrial states like New York, California, Ohio, Illinois and Massachusetts.
The money raised would pay for transportation, publicity, manpower and other requirements of a registration campaign.

Mobeetie Bank Is Hit For \$1,000 In Safe Burglary

Bank robbers pried their way into the First State Bank at Mobeetie, 30 miles east of Pampa, last night and made away with an estimated \$1,000 in silver after knocking the locks off two vaults.
Law enforcement officers from Gray and Wheeler counties, a Texas ranger and FBI agent were in Mobeetie today investigating the robbery.
Henry Flanagan, bank president, said the robbers did not

break into the main vault which contained the bank's heaviest deposits of currency.
The robbery was discovered at 7:20 a.m. today by H. J. Ridgeway, assistant cashier, who was the first to open the bank this morning. Ridgeway notified other bank officials and J. T. Johnson, cashier, said law enforcement officers were immediately summoned. Sheriff Bus Dorman and Deputy Sheriff John Topper of Wheeler County, Deputy Sheriff D. L. Day of Pampa, and Texas Ranger Bill Hensley were on the scene all forenoon searching for clues that might lead to identity of the robbers. Bank officials said an FBI agent from Amarillo also was called in on the case.
Bank Cashier Johnson said the robbers pried a lock off a side-door to the bank to gain entrance.
Two vaults were battered open, apparently with a sledge hammer. The combinations were knocked off and the tumblers pushed in allowing the robbers to open the doors of the records vault and the lock-box vault. The \$1,000 in silver was taken from the records vault in rolls made up of nickels, dimes, quarters and half-dollars.
Texas Ranger Hensley said in his opinion the job was done by professionals, inasmuch as certain types of tools were necessary to punch in the vault locks after combinations were knocked off.
Officers reported that the robbers stole a 45 - calibre pistol and a 38 - calibre snub - nose from the records vault. They said nothing was taken from the lock - box vault, but boxes had been broken open and papers scattered over the floor.
Late this forenoon officers said they had found nothing definite that would lead them to the robbers' trail. Some finger print specimens were obtained and will be checked against files of known robbers, they said.

500 Acres Burned In Grass Fire

Two fire units, one from Pampa and the other from Lefors, fought a grass fire 6½ miles south of Pampa for three hours Tuesday before bringing it under control.
The fire started from burning trash in the Shell Gasoline Refinery about 1:50 p.m. By 4:30, the fire had been brought under control.
The fire, which blackened some 500 acres, was fanned by 40-mile per hour winds with flames forming a three - mile front and moving into the canyon terrain area. The burned areas were on the Worley - Sinclair - Reynolds oil lease, directly north of the Shell booster plant.
Firemen saturated three homes in the area to prevent the fire from spreading there.

GOP Lieutenant Governor Candidate In Address Here

Bil Hayes, Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor of Texas, told a luncheon group of GOP regulars yesterday that "I'm not a flexible conservative, but a firm conservative." Further, the reason he stated that he is running for this post is because it is the most powerful and influential legislative position in Texas.
Telling of his background, which includes serving in the New Hampshire legislature, Hayes outlined his six-point platform as follows:
1. Establish a Texas economy commission, similar to the national Hoover Commission,
2. Lower the percentage of sales tax by making it apply across the board.
3. A positive program to implement the learning of our American heritage in the public schools.
4. Indoctrinate the Texas National Guard as to the dangers of communism.
5. Push for firmer laws and more enforcement on banning pornographic material.
6. Create a better climate for business, especially by giving industry an idea of its future tax situation.
The luncheon was preceded by a coffee given by the women of the local GOP organization.

Tomorrow night's show will feature the perennial minstrel end men, six of them, and the various chorus, dance and specialty numbers. There will be comedy galore. Interlocutor for the show is Wynne Veale.

World Watches In Awe As U. S. Honors Its Hero

Achievement Delights The Residents Of Planet Earth

Lt. Col. John H. Glenn's three trips around the earth, wrapped the world in a glow of wonder, awe and admiration today.
From north, south, east and west congratulations and expressions of delight with America's space achievement gushed forth spontaneously.
Statesmen calculated the political implications of an American joining two Russians in an exclusive club of humans who have orbited the earth in space.
Scientists boldly spoke of the next long step—the race to the moon.
The man in the street, allowed to follow the space spectacular live from launch to recovery, spoke of little else but the coolness of the freckle-faced, 40-year-old astronaut.
Into the White House in Washington poured messages of congratulations from United Nations Acting Secretary General Thant, Argentine President Arturo Frondizi, Brazilian President Joao Goulart, Chilean President Jorge Alessandri, Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Queen Elizabeth of Britain, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, Australian Prime Minister Robert Menzies, Swedish Prime Minister Tage Erlander, West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt, French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville, Italian Foreign Minister Antonio Segni, Japanese Premier Hayato Ikeda, Spain's Generalissimo Francisco Franco and many others.
Pope John XXIII was depicted as "very happy" at the prospect of another step toward the peaceful use of outer space. The Vatican prayed for Glenn, a Presbyterian while he was in orbit.
Communist reaction varied from country to country.
Soviet Radio and television gave equal coverage to the feat and (See DELIGHTS, Page 2)

Glenn Ceremony Is Scheduled In Florida

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy made preparations today to honor astronaut John Glenn at a ceremony in Florida Friday and give him a colorful welcome to the nation's capital next week.
Kennedy was expected to give his appraisal of Glenn's three-orbit flight around the world and its meaning to the free world at a presidential news conference at 4 p.m. EST.
The Chief Executive telephoned the astronaut shortly after he was recovered from the Atlantic by the destroyer Noa and told Glenn that "we are really proud of you...you did a wonderful job."
Kennedy then informed the Marine officer that he would go to Cape Canaveral Friday to see him and said he hoped Glenn would come to Washington on Monday or Tuesday.
The decision to hold a public ceremony at Cape Canaveral was interpreted as an effort by the President to honor the entire Project Mercury team for the nation's great space achievement.
The Washington celebration will be strictly for Glenn himself. He will visit Kennedy at the White House and then ride in a parade to the Capitol where he will be the guest at a congressional reception.
There was speculation that the President might bestow a decoration on the astronaut, and possibly even promote him from lieutenant colonel to colonel.
The President, reading a statement in the Rose Garden outside his office, expressed "the great happiness and thanksgiving of all of us that Col. Glenn has completed his trip."
"We have a long way to go in this space race," Kennedy said. "We started late. But this is the new ocean, and I believe the United States must sail on it and be in a position second to none."

Market Fails To Match Astronaut

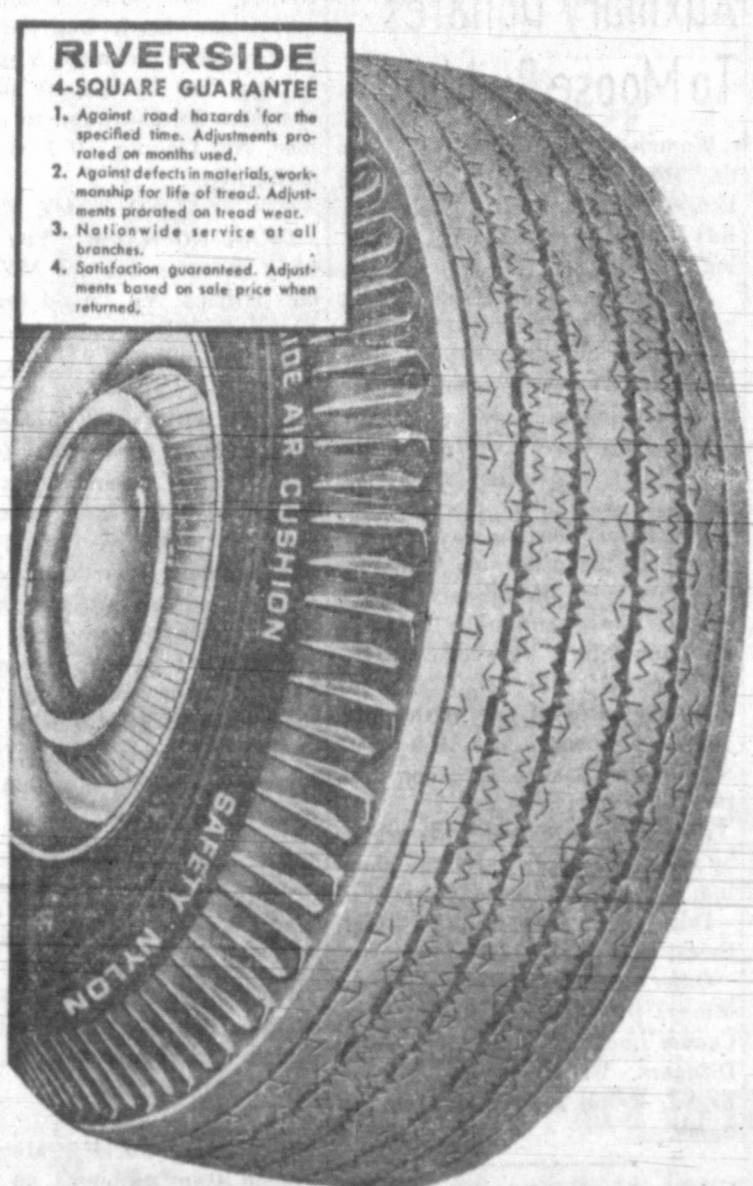
NEW YORK (UPI)—The stock market failed Tuesday to match the high flying success of astronaut John Glenn as had been expected.
Where there were gains, they were generally in the aerospace issues. Experts had expected a successful launching to send the market higher, and were surprised by unimpressive response.
Among the gainers were Beckman, RCA, Zenith, IBM, General Dynamics, North American Aviation and United Aircraft, which added about one point each, and Minneapolis-Honeywell which rose better than 1.

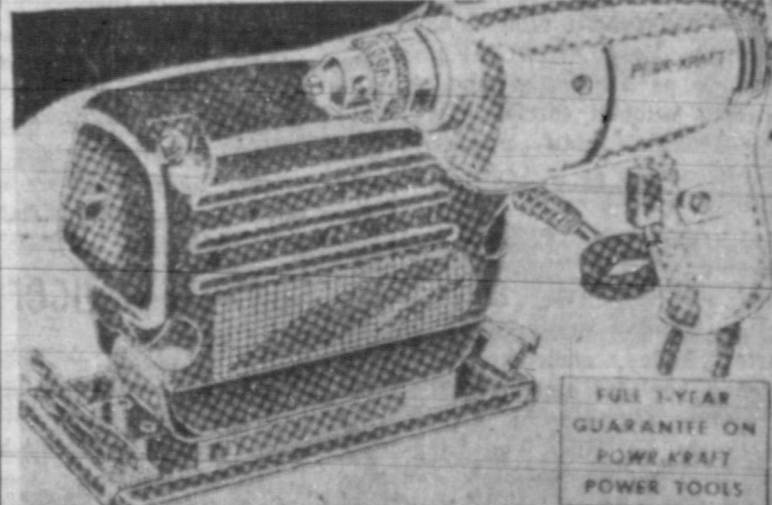

Look In Mirror Shows What Should Be Done

At dinner recently, a friend of mine told me the shocking story of a friend of hers who has not looked in a mirror for 10 years except for fleeting close-ups when she quickly applies make-up. Her reason? Because she feels that she looks so haggard.
—This surely is fleeing reality. The fact that she refuses to look in a mirror doesn't make her look less haggard or others.
How much more sensible she would be to look squarely at herself in a mirror in the harsh light of daytime and decide what needs to be done to improve herself—and then go ahead and do it.
For the truth is that almost any one of us could improve ourselves in some way if we set about it.
A few pounds off here. Some spot exercises to reduce thighs or tighten flabby upper arms or restore slack neck muscles. Daily use of a hairbrush to produce healthy, polished hair. A brisk walk every day to firm up a flabby body.
And after that, the happy feeling of being able to look yourself straight in the face!
If you can bring yourself to sleep without a pillow at night, you're that much ahead in the posture and good looks department. If you doubt this, lie flat on the bed and see what happens to your facial contours — (They smooth out at once).
—Now prop yourself with a pillow or two and run your fingertip slightly over your face. That's right, there's a downward pull. From the time we learn to walk, we are defying gravity. This means that sagging facial muscles are inevitable. With some women, they arrive earlier than with others.
But there are ways to counteract this downward pull. Standing on your head is one (Good for face and hair and neck as well as for circulation).
But if you can't manage this, then prop the narrow end of an ironing board up against the seat of a chair or a couch and lie on it with feet up. This is a great help. So is facial massage.
And keep your pillows to make your bed look pretty during the daytime. Or to prop up your feet when you take a nap.
The way in which you walk has a good deal to do with how much walking benefits you.
If you shuffle along from the knee, don't expect much in the way of results. But if you stride gracefully, swinging from the hip, your whole body benefits. Walking exercises nearly as many muscles of the body as swimming.
Try walking from the hip and feel the difference!

Mardi Gras 'Hustlers' 'Kick In' For Charity

By EUGENE V. KNISPTEL United Press International NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—The word is out—for hustlers—Kick in for the kids at Charity Hospital or don't bother to peddle "garbage" on Mardi Gras this year.

An army of hustlers, sometimes called carnies, annually descends on this Mardi Gras capital to sell "garbage" during carnival parades. The gaudy processions start on Saturday and reach a climax on Mardi Gras, March 6.

"In our game, 'garbage' is novelties like pennants, buttons, balloons, hats, whistles and dolls," explained Pat Conlon, one of the first hustlers in town.

Jimmie the Baker, "Scratches" Bernie, "Middle-of-the-road" Shorty and the rest better drop in at Curley's Bar and pay off in advance if they want to hustle the carnival unmolested this year.

That's the word. It comes from Allen (Black Cat) Lacombe, a "turf advisor" whose avocations include running for political office and acting as unofficial mouthpiece for hustlers.

"This is the first time I'm asking anything for takin' those guys down to city hall to get their permits," he declared, "and getting 'em out the klink when they get pinched."

"Those carnies better come across or we'll have 'em picked up and let 'em rot in the can," Lacombe blustered. He told a local television audience while running unsuccessfully in the first mayoralty primary here last month he was drawing unemployment insurance.

Despite Black Cat's good-natured threats, no one really expects trouble collecting the charitable kickback. But he and the boys at Curley's neutral corner are serious.

They intend to fill a large cardboard box or two with trinkets from the street vendors to take to the children's wards at Charity Hospital.

"After all, those poor kids are cooped up while practically everybody else in town will be havin' a picnic."

White House Workers 'Tight-Lipped' People

MERRIMAN SMITH UPI WHITE HOUSE REPORTER WASHINGTON (UPI)—Back stairs at the White House:

Some of the most tight-lipped people in government are members of the permanent staff at the White House. Working in the residence itself, they see a President and his family in many off-guard moments. They also observe the behavior of presidential guests.

During the course of any White House tenancy, the help incessantly sees and hears words and behavior which, if related to the outside world as typical, would cast the most saintly Chief Executive in a rather unfavorable light.

This permanent staff—the ushers who run the White House as a domicile, butlers, maids and cooks, plus the security personnel of Secret Service agents and White House police—needs no lecture on silence. They darned well keep quiet or they get the heave, and with considerable detriment to their civil service status.

Thus, it would seem only natural that some of these dedicated employees are a little aghast, if not downright disgusted by the behavior of some of the recent guests of President and Mrs. Kennedy. And it is more than likely that the Chief Executive shares their views to a certain extent.

The household staff was asked at the outset of this administration to sign agreements that they would never sell or tell intimate, first person accounts of life inside the White House while it was occupied by the Kennedys. This agreement was intended more as a deterrent than an iron-clad preventive. Once Kennedy leaves office there really is no legal bar to any sort of story-telling.

But even without such agreement, the permanent staff knows the wisdom of silence and they assume that a President's guest would have something approaching the same general idea of respect for a tiny part of a first family's life that can be considered private.

So, what happened? The guests at a recent Kennedy party titillated their chums on two continents with no-so-little tidbits. These enabled society columnists to unwork charming articles about how divinely Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara does the twist, the mere mention of which sent shudders of indignation through the official family only a few weeks before.

This gossipous situation is not entirely peculiar to guests of the Kennedys. Bragging about having been at White House parties has been a great indoor sport since the days when Andrew Jackson's friends ruined the carpets with spilled whiskey.

At a recent party, however, some of the guests unwittingly made the official side of the White House appear less than sincere.

A dinner dance the night of Feb. 9 extended well into the next day. This was the night the Russians released U2 pilot Francis Gary Powers and we turned over to them the Soviet master spy, Col. Rudolph Abel.

Press Secretary Pierre Salinger made a point of telling reporters that the President and his wife left the party around 2 a.m. The announcement on Powers came shortly after 3 a.m. by which time Salinger was under the impression that the festivities in the house had ended. In fact, he told of conferring with the Chief Executive about the dramatic prisoner exchange at 2:57 a.m. and again later. Salinger and Kennedy discussed the matter by telephone and the President instructed that word be flashed to members of the Powers family. Salinger finished up his work and then went home to bed.

But some of the guests could not wait to fan out over Washington and New York with breathless stories of how the President and Mrs. Kennedy were dancing until about 4:30 a.m.; how the affair actually didn't break up until 5 a.m. and how some of the last stragglers didn't leave until shortly before 6 a.m. Judging from rather detailed accounts that turned up in several columns, Mrs. Kennedy did the twist ever so gracefully with Secretary McNamara, who seemed to be the dancing star of the evening. There were some reports that the President tried the current dance fad, but this was most unlikely unless his chronic back condition has vanished miraculously.

Perhaps the day will come when a President will put a small stack of no-sell-or-tell agreements at the door of the East Room when his guests arrive for an evening of fun in the lap of history.

RETAIN MILITARY RULE JERUSALEM, Israel (UPI)—The Knesset (parliament) Tuesday night defeated by narrow margins five bills calling for the abolition of military government in border areas inhabited mostly by Arabs.

The military government has been in force since 1945 when it was instituted under British mandatory emergency regulations. Premier David Ben-Gurion has said he will relax the restrictions.

NEED \$5 TUNERS NEW YORK (UPI)—The Board of Education has about 5,000 out of the tune pianos on hand and no piano tuner.

The board has been trying to get the instruments tuned for three years, but the budget allows only \$5 per piano while the going rate is \$10 to \$12.

Apparently there are no \$5 piano tuners in New York.

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI)—Ralph Rotnem of Harris, Upham & Co. notes the old Wall Street saying that "one should buy the stocks that refuse to go down in a declining market."

He says groups that ignored the general January market setback included aerospace, airlines, coal mining, copper, machine tools, machinery & equipment, rail equipment, farm equipment, rails and rayons.

James Dines, the A.M. Kidder & Co. analyst, says there is no change in his expectation of a leveling off process around 730 in the industrial average over the rest of the month. He says the best way to garner major capital gains during a dull market is to watch for emerging strength in individual issues on market weakness.

Richard T. Leahy of J. W. Sparks & Co. says the inability of the market to gain ground last week attests to the power of the 715-720 (Dow-Jones industrials) overhead supply area and bears out his contention that a consolidation period is needed. He still thinks a retracement to the 700-705 area of the industrial average is in the making.

William Kurtz of Paine, Webber, Jackson & Curtis says that for the near-term, our industry's need to improve its competitive position for the period of increased trade ahead (with the Common Market) should stimulate investment in capital equipment. This in turn, he feels, should help sustain the current business recovery and create a favorable environment for a rising stock market.

Other congressional news: Urban: President Kennedy's plan to create a Department of Urban Affairs was brought up for debate in the House today and opponents said they had the votes to kill it. The issue was expected to come to a vote Thursday. The bill's enemies stopped a leadership effort to delay the House vote until next week.

Solon Asks Investigation Be 'Released'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Republican congressman charged today that the Democratic majority on the House Highway Investigation subcommittee has "handcuffed" its investigators.

Rep. William C. Cramer, R-Fla., said the staff of the special subcommittee should be "turned loose" to look into all phases of the highway program in Massachusetts.

Cramer claimed the majority had limited the investigation to right-of-way issues. He said other phases of the Massachusetts highway program should be examined.

Subcommittee investigator John Constandy held up his arms in answer and said "Do I look like I've been handcuffed?"

Assistant Massachusetts Atty. Gen. Joseph F. Lyons told the subcommittee Tuesday he would wait until it finished its hearings before attempting to recover money from any fraudulent transactions. The subcommittee has said the Justice Department, the Internal Revenue Service and other federal agencies are watching the hearings to determine if they should take action.

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Republican Wins Election CHARLESTON, S.C. (UPI)—Republican G. Fred Worsham, 52, swept to victory Tuesday in a special election to fill a vacancy in the South Carolina House. Worsham is the second Republican to be elected to the legislature since Reconstruction, joining GOP Rep. Charles E. Boineau who broke the ice last August.

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Patrick Henry

It is frequently true that great and moving speeches and significant contributions in the field of written literature, are unbelievably brief.

Whenever Americans think of cogency and of precise utterance in condensed form, they almost automatically turn to Lincoln's Gettysburg address.

It should come as no surprise, then, to discover that another speech, probably more important insofar as the destiny of America was concerned, contained only six paragraphs.

Henry was a remarkable man. His formal schooling concluded when he was fifteen, nor was he more than an average student.

From this point on, his success was certain. He had a meager, rather pinched, pale face. But when he stood up to talk it was as tho he was transformed.

The Speech

It was March 23, 1775. The second revolutionary convention of the Virginia had met at Richmond.

A number of leading men had stood up to give their views regarding the current outrages perpetrated by their political leader, who seemed intent on bringing them under absolute government control and regulation.

Mr. President, no man thinks more highly than I do of the patriotism, as well as the abilities, of the very worthy gentlemen who have just addressed this house.

The truth, and fulfill the great responsibility which we hold to God be our country. Should I keep my own opinions at such a time, I could consider myself as guilty

There was one particular case at law which he undertook in 1763, the famous "Parson's Cause," in which the full flower of his genius came to bloom.

William Wirt, who wrote of Henry in an excellent biography, says of this occasion: "And now was first witnessed that mysterious and almost supernatural transformation of appearance, which the fire of his own eloquence never failed to work in him."

An orator had come into his own in the American colonies who was to become one of the great and moving forces setting the course for his own state and for the colonies in their ultimate union against the tyranny of excessive taxation and oppression from their king.

In these early days prior to shorthand, stenotype machines or tape recorders, the actual words of Henry in his various presentations have been lost, for the most part.

His great speech in the Virginia House of Burgesses in 1774 which contained the reference to King George III as being comparable to both Caesar and Cromwell, was never written down.

But Henry is principally remembered for his "Give Me Liberty or Give Me Death" address. And this particular talk appeared to have been remembered almost word for word by the members of his audience.

Because of the impact of this talk and its enormous significance currently, we are going to reproduce it in a series of articles, with comments concerning it, beginning immediately below.

of treason towards my country, and of an act of disloyalty toward the Majesty of Heaven, which I reverence above all earthly kings.

The implications of this paragraph are readily discernible. In it, Mr. Henry, in essence, set the American stage and placed the dramatic issue of that day in sharp focus.

He did three things. He revealed that the matter at hand far transcended personalities, and in consequence, even tho a majority might oppose him, he believed he was close enough to truth to dare the displeasure of men with whom he was associated and whose love and admiration must have been important to him.

Next, he took the issue out of the "middle of the road" category. Patrick Henry proposes here to show that what must be determined at this moment is something that may not be compromised. He wants no "greys" in the solution. He paints a picture of blacks and whites. There can be no compromise as he sees it between right and wrong, truth and falsehood, freedom and slavery. It is going to be one way or another.

Finally, he accomplished a dramatic breakthrough in thought. Remember, in one of his earlier talks, relating to George III, he had been interrupted by a cry of "Treason." This interruption and the accusation which accompanied it had remained in his mind to color his thinking. He knew

BE ALERT TO FALSE CLAIMS OF SINUS CURE DEVICES

Q — How good are household air purifiers for the treatment of sinus troubles with asthma that my doctor thinks may be due to dust?

A — The Food and Drug Administration has just obtained a ruling on two types of device seized in a Washington retail store on charges that they were "misbranded by false and misleading therapeutic claims in their advertising."

Experiments conducted by the agency showed that "such devices have no significant effect in ridding the air of contaminants and dust and will afford no relief to sufferers of asthma, hay fever, allergies and sinus conditions."

As a result of these experiments, the court issued a decree in which it ordered destruction of leaflets stating that the device "performs miracles for the dust allergy patient."

I call this incident to the attention of all readers to alert them to the importance of reading the labels on foods, medicinals and therapeutic devices they purchase.

Q — I am one of those who has to watch his cholesterol content. I am very fond of bananas. I know they contain oil and I wonder whether this oil has a high cholesterol content. Can you tell me?

House Probe Reveals New 'Conflict of Interest' Cases Among Defense Department Consultants

WASHINGTON — House investigators are striking real pay dirt in their preliminary inquiry into "think factories" employed by the Defense Department.

Headed by Representative F. Edward Hebert, D. La., chairman of the House Armed Services Investigating Subcommittee, the probe has uncovered more than twenty potential "conflict of interest" cases involving business and scientific consultants.

In most instances, these "advisers" are working for corporations or organizations set up as non-profit foundations to handle defense problems. The consultants receive salaries several times higher than government employees who formerly did the same work.

Samples of these cases under investigation include: CASE "A" — Scientific consultant hired by the Air Force to advise how best to spend \$200 million in research.

CASE "B" — A consultant team of scientists hired by the Defense Department to review procurement methods recommends the award of a \$600,000 contract to a company headed by one of the scientists.

CASE "C" — A former government scientist, working under contract with the Pentagon, is given a salary three times the \$18,000-a-year pay he received when employed by the Defense Department for the same type of work.

Other sensational cases under investigation by the Hebert subcommittee involve scientists who consult with the Defense Department and then speculate in the stock market with the "advance" information obtained through their employment.

In a few of these instances, the "advisers" are reported to have made more in a year from their market speculations than the government paid them for their work.

GETTING RESULTS — The Hebert subcommittee's probe already is bringing results although its members haven't even issued their first press release or held a public hearing.

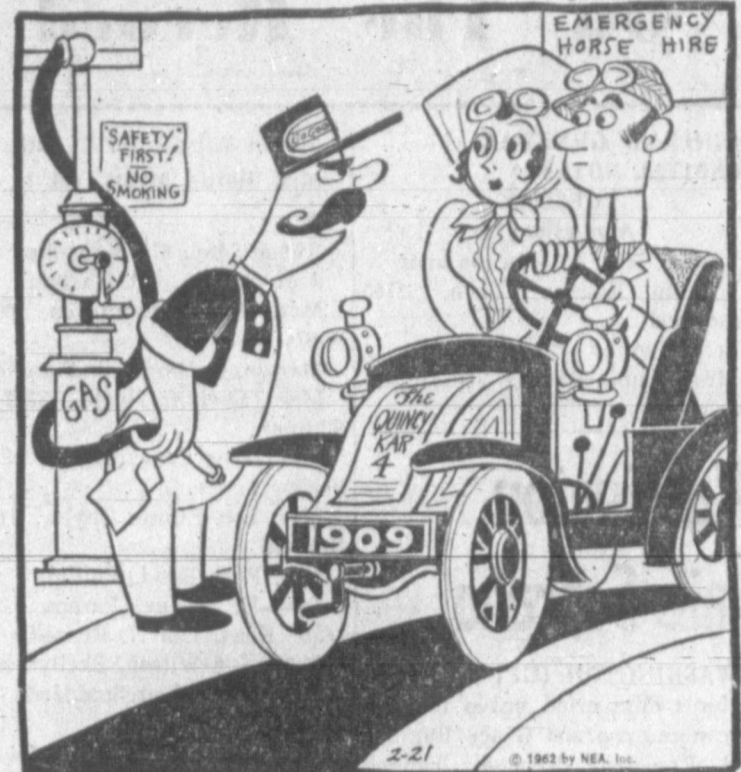

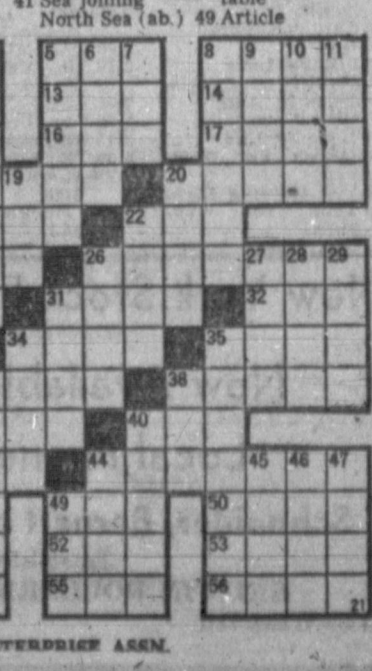
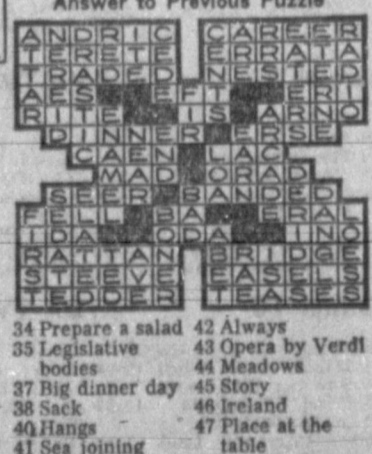

Department's Press Relations Are Hurting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Some eager-beaver pixies in the Department of State are taking prime advantage of the infatuation of Secretary Dean Rusk with electronic public relations.
Rusk and others in the Kennedy administration appear much to favor television and radio over other news media. Perhaps this is because they feel that in electronic public relations they can better control their public image.
An unhappy and sharp-spoken observer of this developing situation made this comment:
"Rusk comes over TV like Brand X and what he needs, as I see it, is less exposure rather than more."
This week's snafu at the State Department was typical. Rusk decided to make public through the Westinghouse Broadcasting Co. the U. S. rejection of the Kremlin's proposal that an 18-man summit meeting should convene next month in Geneva to discuss disarmament.

Westinghouse taped the interview with Rusk on Monday morning, Feb. 12. The plan then was that the tape would be released over 14 stations on Tuesday evening. Westinghouse discovered it had a hot story on its tape—the U. S. rejection of the Kremlin bid.
So, Monday afternoon, Westinghouse informed the department that three stations would air the interview Monday night. All other news media were clamoring at the department for the text of the Rusk interview. The department response was: "Westinghouse will handle it."
Thus the department—with a numerous, expensive and adequately intelligent office of public information—simply abandoned its responsibility for timing and distributing an important policy statement by the secretary of state. This is a shocking abdication of responsibility.
Moreover, it appears that the department did not possess a text of what Rusk taped for Westinghouse, not even a file copy. Westinghouse was helpful and cooperative, especially to UPI, but was unable to provide texts for all media by the time the interview was aired.
The department finally did manage to obtain one copy of the secretary's policy statement. Lincoln White, chief press officer, read excerpts from that text to newsmen. This is a ridiculous situation.
The department should control absolutely the timing and distribution of important public statements. There is no quarrel with the decision to give the interview to Westinghouse. The complaint is against the fixing of the time of the announcement and the distribution of the text by any private concern. All of that is the department's job.
Secretary Rusk apparently does not understand this situation, or he does understand and does not care. The general press policy of the department is crumbling into chaos. Rusk apparently doesn't care about that, either.
It would be too alarming to consider this much: that television, radio, newspapers, news magazines and wire services want official news to be official.

Campus Life Has Changed In Ten Years

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A notice from the alumni office advises that next June will make the 20th anniversary of my class graduation. Twenty years!
I can't resist setting forth an obvious conclusion: Campus life certainly has changed a lot in the past two decades.
Nowadays, you read about college students frittering away their time on "panty raids," phone booth stacking and other frivolous behavior. In my day, even our free moments were spent in academic pursuits.
As evidence of this, consider the night that two of my contemporaries, whom I shall identify only as Joe and Squeak, conducted a notable experiment in aerodynamics.
Joe was the leading beer drinker in the senior class. Had he been enrolled in a brewery, rather than a university, he would have graduated magna cum laude.
On the night in question, as he and Squeak were boozing it up, they became involved in an argument that led to a wager.
I forget what the stakes were, but the point at issue was whether Joe could fly from the roof of the college administration building to a corner drug store located about one block away.
By some means or other, they gained admittance to the building, a four-story structure with a steep slate roof, and made their way to the top floor.
Joe then crawled out of a window and was proceeding along a ledge to the take-off point when he suddenly blacked out. His body silently plunged from the ledge and disappeared in the darkness.

Foreign Commentary

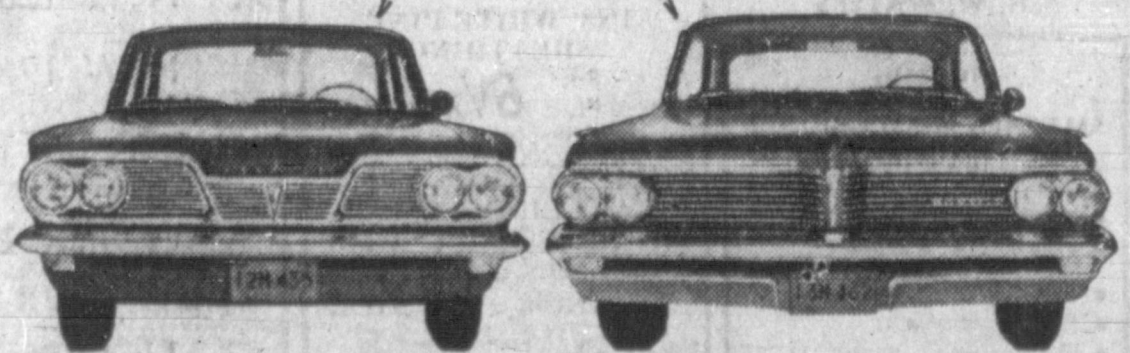

At this time of year, when the fog comes rolling in from the North Sea, it seems that more often than not the air corridor linking Frankfurt and Berlin is covered with an impenetrable blanket.
As the air transport lifts from Frankfurt airport's wet, glistening runway, there will be no further sight of the ground until some 45 minutes later when suddenly the wingtips seem almost to brush Berlin apartment houses and moments later it pulls up under the passenger canopy at Tempelhof.
Even with the fog, it is not a particularly hazardous flight so long as men and machines are allowed to function without interference.
Tempelhof is located in the American sector of West Berlin. Also located there is the Allied air control center which is one of the last vestiges of the old four-power control authority under which the Soviet Union cooperated with the three victorious Western powers in the administration of the whole of Berlin.
The other remnant of cooperation with the Soviets is the administration of Spandau Prison for war criminals.
At the air control center, the concern is air safety rather than control, and generally the exchange of information is a silent one in notes passed back and forth.
The chief Russian is named A. P. Stromov.
In the last two weeks Stromov has been extraordinarily busy as the Russians sought to establish authority over the corridors, the one link not subject to Communist checkpoints.

This was done in a series of notices that in specified periods the Soviet air force would require exclusive use of the corridors for maneuvers.
The notices were summarily rejected, and President Kennedy's personal representative, Gen. Lucius Clay, made himself a conspicuous passenger in one of the air transports defying the Soviet ban.
Allied commanders are agreed that the greatest chance for armed conflict over Berlin lies in the corridors, whether it be by interference from Communist fighter planes or from Communist jamming of the radio beams which guide Allied craft through fog to their destination.
So far, Soviet tactics on the railroads, the highways and the corridors leading to Berlin seem more designed to create annoyance rather than war-making incidents.
As such, they are a continuing test of Allied determination. They may be part of a Khrushchev campaign to force President Kennedy and other Western leaders into agreeing to a new meeting at the summit.
Researchers predict that more than three million single-family homes in the U.S. will have central air-conditioning by 1966.
