They may produce a painless discoloration of the skin. But if they enlarge and there is complicating phlebitis or ulceration, they may then give rise to leg weariness, localized pain and cramps.

Pregnancy varicosities tend to become smaller and may even disappear after the baby is born. But, with each subsequent pregnancy, they are apt to appear earlier, enlarge more considerably and produce increasing discomfort.

If treated by injection or operation during the pregnancy, the results are not apt to be satisfactory. Furthermore, the occasional reaction that follows injection treatment may have an unfavorable effect on mother or

child.


