Legislators Will Recess For Easter

AUSTIN (UPI) - Texas law makers were to close shop today for a long Easter holiday

The shutdown will mark the 80th day of the 140-day 57th session that has seen little major legislation passed and only a fraction of the tax problem considered.

The House and Senate have passed a resolution authorizing members to quit until next Wednesday. The long holiday will enable them to be at home for the April 4 U.S. Senate special election.

Before leaving the Senate was scheduled to consider House bills and House members were to work on upper chamber legislation.

The time off will give lawmakers another chance to sound out their constitutents on the tax battle.

The only tax bill approved so far was a \$32 million piecemeal bill passed by the House and sent to the Senate where it is still pending. The measure was passed by House members Tuesday and is designed to erase one-half of the \$63 million expected state deficit.

Lawmakers will also have to retire the rest of the deficit and find some \$300 million in new revenue

United Press International In Holy Week services today through Sunday, Protestant and Roman Catholic Christians will commemorate the climactic events in the life of Jesus. .

Today's "Maundy Thursday" services recall Jesus' Last Supper with His disciples, from which stemmed the central rite of Christian worship, known variously as

the Eucharist, the Mass, the Lord's Supper and Holy Commu-

. It was during the Last Supper, in the upper room of a home in Jerusalem, that Jesus washed the feet of His disciples, as a lesson in humility, and distributed bread and wine as symbols of His body and blood, soon to be sacrificed for them.

Jesus' crucifixion by Roman soldiers on a hill named Calvary, just outside of Jerusalem. Many churches will conduct three-hour services, from noon until 3 p.m., the hours during which Jesus hung

Despite the grim nature of the event it commemorates, the Friday of Holy Week is called "good" because on that day, Christians

believe, Jesus achieved an eternal reconciliation between the holiness of God and the sinfulness of man.

The Saturday of Holy Week is observed in many churches with services of baptism-a tradition that can be traced all the way

back to the early Christians. The observance culminates on Sunday with the feast of the Resurrection, which celebrates Jesus' victory over death.

Congo Operation **Poses Financial** Problem In UN

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) -The United Nations today faced the threat of a financial crisis s'emming from the multi-milliondollar operations in the Congo.

The assembly's budgetary committee met this morning to resume discussion on how to meet

Expenses in 1960 totaled \$48.5 million. Estimates for operations in 1961 run between \$120 million and \$135 million.

Soviet Russia and its allies have refused to contribute any funds toward the U.N. Congo operations. The major burden thus far has been borne by the United States which has contributed nearly \$16 million as its full assessment for 1960. Another \$1 million has come from Ireland, The Netherlands and Australia, leaving the budget for 1960 about \$32 million in the red.

The problem was sharpened Tuesday when Latin Amrican countries declared opposition to paying the Congo costs on the scale of assessments for the regular budget.

Venezuelan Ambassador Carlos Sosa-Rodriguez, speaking for 19 of the Latin American nations, suggested that the major share be borne by the five council powers - the United States, Britain, France, Nationalist China and

He said a substantial contribution also should come from countries with special political or economic interests in the Congo while other U.N. members would make only a "symbolic" pay-



If the truth has to out, and I promise you I'm going to haul it out screaming and kicking though it may be, almost any individual can get along just fine on four hours' sleep in each 24 and most of the people I know who have discovered that are pretty fat and savvy in the area of making money, getting a lot done and being respected by the citizens for miles around. They are Doers.

Second, I have never yet come up with the common cold on my person that some doctor didn't tell me to be sure to go to bed and get a lot of rest. I used to and colds were on me like barnacles on a four-master that has just come in from a voyage around the world. The last two colds I had died inside 36 hours because I was doing four jobs and doing them on a strict fours of sleep. I felt great.

There was a piece in the papers the other day about a girl named Teal Ames, who has been a heroine for some time on that most demanding of all performing jobs-a daily soap opera. They killed her off in the plot recently because she was weary of the same old-tearful treacle every day but not because she was physically tired, and Teal has been a four hours' sleep girl all through the routine. It ought to be added that she claims her stamina comes from bread she bakes herself and because she looks upon the eating of meat as a major crime against the person, but-I think if she lushed it up on steaks every day she'd still be able to be brighteyed and alert on her four hours

Try it for a week. It will take you a few days to get used to four hours, after so long a time on the eight-hour habit. But once you are used to it, you will feel great. And you won't have insomnia. When it is time to sleep, brother, you'll really sleep.

"My daughter," writes this listressed mother," is going with a boy who has boils on his neck. He visits our house and never as these boils covered. He has his hands picking on them and then he touches objects without washing. I clean as much as possible after him. But now, the last six or seven months, my daughter, then me and now my husband have gotten boils. We never had boils in our family before.

Please let me know your opinion. Am I wrong that boils are contagious? If so, how can we protect ourselves from him?"

Dear lady, you couldn't be more right. Boils are contagious. And the carrier of the golden staph that's responsible for your household epidemic is almost surely

It's easy enough to tell you how to protect yourselves, but I don't envy you the job of carrying out the program. Either you or your husband will have to explain the situation to the young man and give him the following advice: (1) go to his doctor for treatment with the new penicillin preparation (Staphcillin) to which these bugs have not yet developed resistance; 2 keep the boils covered with a dressing of sterile gauze; (3) keep hands off infected areas, and (4) scrub hands for at least five minutes with soap and a stiff brush before he comes

If you and your husband then survive the tempest - in-the-teapot your daughter probably will raise, ou too may have to get injections to rid yourselves of the golden staph. And, if she 's still talking to you, better take along the boy friend's girl friend. To say nothing of Cupid if he happens to be hanging around.






