Tax 'Show' In Austin May Prove Costly

Daily News Austin Correspondent AUSTIN - The biggest and by far the best show in town is puton by the Texas House of Representatives. The usual run in Monday through Friday. It's a scream. However, there is some doubt

whether it's worth the price taxpayers of Texas have to pay for the attraction. The figure runs pretty high.

The legislators always are in the big middle of a hassle and don't seem to be able to agree on many things, except maybe that something's got to be done about the situation. The situation, of course, is the tax problem and the big issue is who's going to have to pay and how much.

That was the big problem when the lawmakers assembled for the 57th session of the Legislature Jan. 10 and it still is. They don't seem to be any closer to a solution.

· However, there was a notable exception last week when House members did agree on an issue with some degree of unanimity. The occasion was a resolution offered by Rep. Charles Ballman of Borger which called for the legislators to erase the \$63 million deficit before tackling the problem of a broad-based tax to meet. state expenses for the next biennium. Ballman is chairman of the

Revenue and Taxation Committee. There was a lot of debate for and against the resolution. However, they threw in the towel af-

ter they had been assured that a vote for the resolution would not "" commit them to support any tax measure that might come up on

Speaker James Turman announced from the chair that he would vote for 'the resolution "to show the House in complete unanimity."

However, the speaker spoke a little too soon that time. The vote was 148-1 and the unanimity wasn't quite complete. Rep. Tom James of Dallas voted no. His explanation was that the tax problem can't be solved by stop-gap measures. Instead, he argued, the House should take a broad look at the total cost of state government and go from there.

Purpose of the resolution pro bably-was to get an expression of willingness on the part of sales tax supporters to consider "oneshot" measures to pick up the deficit before meeting the sales tax

issue headon. However; nobody attached much significance to the vote, especially the sales tax group. They said. it didn't mean a thing and the whole routine was a waste of time.

Gov. Price Daniel seemed pleased with the bipartisan support given the Ballman resolution. In-· one of his rare visits to the Capitol press room, the governor expressed the hope that "pow maybe something can be worked out by both sides of the House.




