# Men Trapped By Blast That Sealed Them Off 180 Feet Underground

WEST TERRE HAUTE, Ind. - A night-long struggle by rescue crews to save the lives of 22 men trapped by a coal mine explosion ended in tragic failure today. The body of the last of the doomed 22 was brought to the surface at

The miners were killed Thursday night when a massive blast shattered a quarter-mile long section of the Viking Coal Co. mine 180 feet below the floor of the Wabash Valley.

The explosion loosed tons of coal and earth, knocked out cement and wooden ventilators and twisted coal moles and loading machines into crumpled masses of metal. WACO (UPI)-The graceful old lady in the black fur coat was laid to rest in a lonely, unmarked

grave outside the city limits. Her name was Josephine, and for years - she reigned as regal queen of Baylor University. They called her the "darling of the campus."

There were no mourners when they buried her Thursday. Just the two Baylor students who's served as bear trainers. Yet, when word got around, the whole

school grieved. An important chapter in Baylor history had closed.

Josephine was a big, black bear, And she was as much a part of Baylor as the ivy-covered buildings. She came to the university as a scrawny 45-pound cub in

The Baylor Chamber of Commerce bought her from the Chicago zoological society for \$50. It was a bargain, even if there was a bit of a mix-up.

You see, the students named the new aprival "Joe College." It was sometime later they discovered the mistake. So they switched names to Josephine. The students couldn't have been

prouder. They took her to all of the football games. She clapped her paws at appropriate times, grinned widely, and guzzled soda pop. At halftime, she put on a

Her career at football games ended after a year or so. She' was to become a mother, and a veterinarian said it would be dangerous to take her on long trips. So Josephine "retired. She accepted it gracefully. She swam in the bear pits, climbed trees, and never failed to put on a show for campus visitors and students

During the next 14 years, she gave birth to four sets of cubs. Her latest-born in 1960-were named' "Rusty and Dusty" and they are now the current mascots of the Baylor football team.

It was Tuesday that they found her dead.

"I guess she just died of old age," said one of her trainers. "She just rolled, over, gracefully. She was the best I ever saw."

The school wanted to bury her on campus, but found out that a city ordinance requires that animals be buried outside the city

limits. So they decided to mount her head and shoulders and place her in the student union building.

It will be hard to replace her. "Josephine was mistress of all the social niceties a lady of herrank and position should know," said Earl Shoemake, another trainer.

Students thought it a shame Josephine couldn't have a gravelike one of her cubs that died recently. The little female was buried near Baylor Creek with a headstone that said, simply: "Sleep Little Princess."





There is a difference in believing before we are saved and after we become a Christian. In John 1:11-12 John said, He (Jesus) came unto His own and His own received Him not, but as many as received Him, to them gave He Power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name: Which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. Here believing means receiving. The moment I truly "receive" I am born again not by or of blood, (of the human orgin) the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God, Jesus said, Behold I stand at the door and knock, if any man hear my voice and will let me in I will come in and sup with him and he with me.

THE GOSPEL IS A STORY TOLD ABOUT A LIVING CHRIST. The question is asked. But doesn't every preacher preach Christ? Therefore isn't every preacher a gospel preacher? What does it mean to preach Christ? Paul makes it plain, that to preach Christ is to preach the gospel in all its fullness. The only Christ is the Christ of the Bible and not one of man's imagination. If he can make the proof stick, Hoffman may have the vital evidence to show that the literary works of William Shakespeare were not written by William Shakespeare at all, but by another man using the same name.

Hoffman's finding: that poetplaywright Christopher Marlowe was not murdered in 25, giving him the opportunity to have been "Shakespeare."

Hoffman says Marlowe had everything else.
