

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) - Premier Nikita Khrushchev said today that it the United States expresses "regrets" in the General Assembly for its U2 and RB 47 lights over the Soviet Union, Russia will drop the issue in the United Nations. The United States immediately rejected the Soviet demand. "If the government of the United States will not wish to show good will and will not condemn the practice of sending its spy planes to the Soviet Union and other countries," Khrushchev said, "the United Nations should in all strictness condemn such aggressive actions.'




