Husband-Family First In Mrs. Kennedy's Life

Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy married right into the midst of politics when she became the wife of Senator John F. Kennedy on September 12, 1953.

A novice in the political world, she soon learned how to adapt to large crowds and late hours, the unexpected arrival of 40 persons for dinner, receptions and teas, dinners and speaking engagements.

And through all the constant activity, she has tried to organize her household so it can always run smoothly and, even more important, so she can take care of the needs of her young daughter Caroline.

Although she is now sidelined from the campaign because of her expected baby, Mrs. Kennedy is still taking care of the myriad tasks for which she is particularly talented.

Fluent in French, Spanish and Italian, she keeps in writing contact with nationality groups. Once when she was with the Senator in Louisiana for the Rice Festival she addressed the many French-Americans in the audience in their native tongue.

Her knowledge of French also proved invaluable to the Senator when he met former French Premier de Gaulle in Italy.

Mrs. Kennedy also keeps in touch with women's groups and charity organizations. She has often done work with retarded children for the Kennedy Foundation, where she is a member of the Board.

And, above all else, of course, she is in daily contact with Senator Kennedy.

In her Yannis Port summer home, where she is resting (on doctor's orders because of previous miscarriages), the constant flood of mail keeps her abreast of what voters, particularly women, are thinking about during the campaign.

Mrs. Kennedy personally answers all the correspondence directed to her.

She is expecting to return to Washington on September 18 for a few days to appear on television with her husband and to attend a fund-raising dinner. When it is possible for her to make short trips to join her husband, as to New York City, she plans to do so.

Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy, born July 28, 1929, in Southampton, New York, is the daughter of Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss of Newport, Rhode Island and Virginia, and the late John Vernon Bouvier of New York.

She has a younger sister, Lee, who is married to Prince Stanislas Radziwill of Poland. They live in London.

Mrs. Kennedy attended Miss Porter's School in Farmington, Connecticut, from 1944 to 1947 and Vassar College from 1947 to 1949.

Her junior year at college was spent at the Sorbonne in Paris where she studied the history of art.

At George Washington University, from which she was graduated in 1951, she won the Vogue Magazine Prix de Paris for planning an entire magazine built around a single theme. After she was married, Mrs. Kennedy also took courses in American history at Georgetown University.

In 1952, she joined the staff of the Times-Herald in Washington as an inquiring photographer. She covered the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in the capacity of both artist and reporter.

She married Senator John F. Kennedy on September 12, 1953, at St. Mary's Gothic Church, Newport, Rhode Island. The Kennedys have a daughter, Caroline, who will be three in November. Another child is expected in December.

Mrs. Kennedy is 5 ft. 7, normally weighs 125 lbs. and wears a size 10 or 12 dress.

She enjoys painting which she began as a child with her mother's encouragement. But she approaches it as an amateur, she says, with no intention or desire of becoming professional about it.

A more serious interest and one at which she would like to have made her living was as a writer. Her experience on the newspaper helped in that field, she believes, and developed her already casual interest in photography. Now she follows the work of great current photographers as avidly as she does modern artists. She also keeps three cameras always loaded and ready for shooting. Her favorite subjects — her husband and child. Riding and jumping which she began when she was only 6 years

old won her prizes during her childhood. But her riding is only occasional now, although she still retains her love of horses and her enjoyment at being outdoors with them.

During her 14th and 15th summers, she helped out at a Rhode Island farm, watering chickens in the range houses, herding cattle home to be milked and raising her own 4-H calf. She has also worked in hospitals as a volunteer helper during summers.

Her reading interests are varied. Like her husband, she reads quickly, dipping into several books at one time. In addition, she is always browsing through her art books and collecting books on old drawings.

Her overriding concern is that her home life can be maintained at as normal a pace as possible for the well-being of her husband and child.

Her main object in life is her responsibility to them, she believes. "It will always be that," she says, "for I believe it's the one goal in every woman's life to think of the comfort and happiness of her husband and family first."

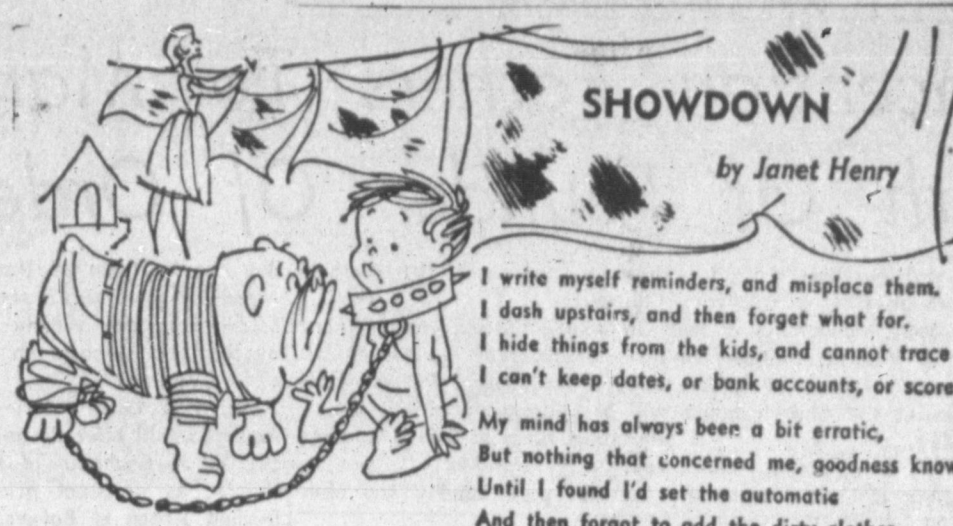

Episcopal Bishop To Visit Here

The Rt. Rev. Dr. R. Heber Gooden, bishop of the Episcopal Missionary District of the Canal Zone, will arrive in Pampa Monday for a short visit.

The bishop was educated at Harvard Military Academy, Los Angeles, from where he received his B. A. degree, and at Stanford University, from where he received his B.D. degree. He later entered Berkeley (Conn.) Divinity School. He entered the ministry in 1934 as a deacon, and one year later became a priest.

Dr. Gooden headed St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Camaguey, Cuba, from 1935 to 1939; was dean of Holy Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Havana from 1939 to 1945, and was transferred to his present post from his Havana deanship.

Dr. Gooden's ministry includes Spanish and English. The services are conducted for U.S. servicemen and their families, residents of the countries involved, and English residents of the countries also administered by Dr. Gooden's bishopric at the request of the Church of England.

He was born March 22, 1910, at Long Beach, Calif., and is the son of the Rt. Rev. Robert E. Gooden, retired suffragan bishop of the Diocese of Los Angeles.

Politics And Religion On Many Lips

Nearly everyone seems to be talking about the impact of religion on the U. S. presidential campaign. Let's look at the other side of the coin for a change.

What effect will the campaign have on religion? Some church leaders fear that it may set back, by many years, the most hopeful religious development of our time.

This so-called "ecumenical movement" (the name comes from a Greek word which means "drawing together") has not resolved the theological differences which separate Catholics and Protestants, and there is no prospect that it will lead to organic reunion within the foreseeable future.

But it has done something else of tremendous importance. It has begun to create a sense of Christian community which transcends honest differences of belief, and makes it possible to discuss those differences in an atmosphere of mutual respect and understanding.

For the first time in 400 years, Protestants and Catholics are facing one another as separated brethren rather than as mortal enemies. The growth in Protestant-Catholic amity has so far been more evident in Europe than in the United States. But the quest for reconciliation is also under way in this country, and it has made more progress than is generally realized during the past two years.

Now comes a presidential campaign in which some people seem determined to revive ancient antagonisms, and to fan into flame the embers of suspicion and distrust which the ecumenical movement has tried so hard to douse.

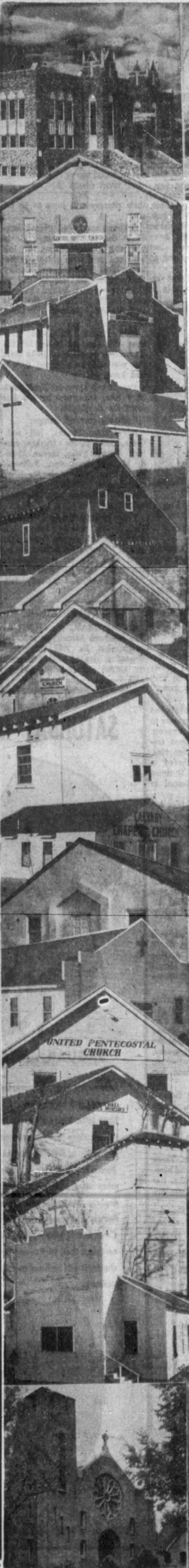

NEGLECTED SALVATION

Heb. 2:3 — How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation: which at the first began to be spoken by the Lord, and was confirmed unto us, by them that heard him.

All men have to do to be lost is just neglect Salvation. For the Bible says in Rom. 3:23 For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God; so by nature when we reach the age of accountability we are sinners, and the wages of sin is death. Harvesters Due Big Chore

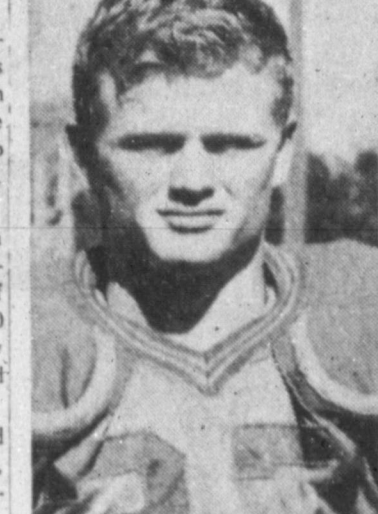

Bullet Hanover Wins 'Brown Jug'

Yanks Due Small Edge Over Bucs

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Yankees' two "hidden advantages" in a World Series with the Pittsburgh Pirates will be experience and the Series' schedule itself — a schedule which could have been made up by Casey Stengel.

"Despite the fact that no long jump to the West Coast will be made this year, the schedule calls for two days off for travel. The first two games are scheduled for the National League park, Oct. 5-6, the next three for the American League park, Oct. 8-9-10, and the final two, if necessary, for Oct. 12-13.

This, plus that Series experience are the reasons Broadway oddsmakers have made the Yankees 6½ to 5 favorites over the Pirates.

Betting men believe that the anticipated New York-Pittsburgh will be a "psychological Series." That 6½ to 5 "man to man" price is inside the bookmaker's range of 6 (5)-7 (5). Which means that a bookmaker will lay \$6 of his money against \$5 of a Pittsburgh bettor. But the bookie will lay only \$5 of his money against \$7 of anyone wagering on the Yankees.

A prominent New York oddsmaker explained that the Yankees are favored largely because of their experience under pressure in World Series contests and because of that seasoning are more likely to stand up than the unseasoned Pirates. He said, "It's largely a matter of psychology rather than any particular differences in the abilities of the clubs."

But another very good reason for the "opening line" is that schedule which will tend to equalize two pitching staffs which, in truth, aren't really equal at all.

"The Yankees will be a much better World Series team than we have been during the regular-season schedule," says Gil McDougald, utility ace of the New York club. "Our pitching is going to look a lot stronger in the Series than during the season."

Were the games to be played on successive days, Stengel would be faced with a tremendously tricky pitching problem. The fact that there are two travel days means that he'll be able to "spread out" his staff in a way that is bound to increase its effectiveness.

The Bullet and Muncy shattered those records in the Jug, with The Bullet, after breaking her stride in the first heat, com-

ing back to win two exciting heats and the Jug. Both went the mile on the half-mile track in 1:58 3-5, a world record for age and gait.

Crafty Johnny Simpson, part owner, trainer and driver, had pointed his horse for this race, passing up the rich Messenger Stake and Cane Futurity legs of pacing's Triple Crown for the prestige of the Jug.

There had been considerable doubt The Bullet could make the turn but Simpson smiled as he rode into the winner's circle and said, "I guess we ended all doubt about that out there."

Simpson was the first person to drive three winners in the Jug, established in 1946.

Chilean President Angered At Trading On Human Misery

SANTIAGO, Chile (UPI) — Tragedy has become a political football in Chile and the nation's president, Jorge Alessandri, is showing evident signs of growing anger at the trading on human misery.

The slowness with which the Parliament is reacting to insistent government demands for funds to cope with the aftermath of May's disastrous chain of earthquakes, and the manner in which the emergency requests are being trimmed has upset President Alessandri.

The government position is that its political opposition and supporting forces are seeking wilfully to weaken the official drive against the inflation feared as an aftermath to the Chilean tragedy.

Alessandri two months ago asked Congress for an estimated \$275-million dollars to be spread over a five-year period in a government drive to attain a sane and stable economy. However, the House cut his aid request to \$150-million and the Senate slashed that to \$88-million.

Alessandri fumes in private.

Some of his other government officials are not so discreet.

Finance Minister Roberto Vergara lost his cabinet job last weekend because of his bitterness towards parliamentarians blocking government demands for more and higher taxes to meet the earthquake and relief rehabilitation bill.

He had accused members of both chambers of adding boondoggling projects to the original administration measure in the form of expenditures not contemplated by the government project.

Vergara, Alessandri's right-hand man on economic matters, was principal target of the cabinet reform because of what his opponents termed his "inflexibility" in the discussion of anti-inflationary and currency stabilization measures.

He was substituted by Eduardo Figueroa, Chilean Central Bank president, described as a conservative and a man of high national prestige.

Before leaving the cabinet Vergara flatly warned the president would veto any inadequate relief measure which would

threaten inflation. Such a measure "would be more serious to Chile than (May's) earthquakes," he said.

To the hundreds of delegations relief aid, economy under-secretary Luis Marty has a stock reply: "The Congress as of now has not approved the (drafted) law and we have no funds."

Chile knows where it wants to go in rehabilitation but the huge amounts required to put the machinery in motion are lacking.

More serious yet, however, is the fact that Chile's search abroad for a half-billion dollars in relief credits also has halted abruptly. Chile must first put its economic house in order before seeking aid abroad.

The government describes its political opposition in the Congress as including Communists, Socialists and Christian Democrats.
