UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) -The 15th annual General Assembly evolved today into a spirited East-West contest to pour massive aid into the new and largely undeveloped nations of Africa.

President Eisenhower sounded the challenge in his speech before the world parliament Thursday and advance word on Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's speech to-day made it clear the Soviet Union would answer it.



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

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
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NEGLECTED SALVATION




