Geology flourished in Britain early in the 19th century. James Hutton had tried to give men a glimpse of a world infinitely older than they dreamed (but just how old no one yet knew) and had substituted slow, tremendous change for the chaos of a universal deluge. William Smith had taught how to read the age and history of rock formations by the fossils they contained.

Then in 1830 the great Charles Lyell brought out the first volume of his Principles of Geology, generalizing and amplifying the work that had gone before. Building upon Hutton, Lyell forced men to see that great changes in the past occurred through the normal working
