77 Die In Plane Disaster Hits Peak On Guam

AGANA, Guam (UPI) — A four-engine transport plane carrying U.S. servicemen and civilians home to America flew into the jungled side of Mt. Barrigada at dawn today carrying 77 persons to their deaths. There were 17 survivors.

There were reports that the plane, a DC6B chartered by the Military Air Transport Service from World Airways, exploded in flight but there was no official confirmation.

A smooth-working rescue team brought the survivors by helicopter to the U.S. Naval Hospital in Agana.

Three were in critical condition, four in serious condition and the rest listed as fair.

Some of the passengers apparently were not killed immediately in the crash but were trapped and burned to death before rescuers could reach them.

Rescue workers said they had recovered 71 bodies. The other six were listed officially as "missing" but there was no hope of finding them alive. The bodies of the victims were so badly burned that identification will be difficult.

Officials here said the plane was carrying 71 servicemen, 15 civilians and a crew of 8.

(In Oakland, Calif., World Airways president Edward J. Daly listed only seven crew men. He said the pilot, first officer, flight engineer and three stewardesses had been killed but the navigator survived.)

The flight started in Taipei Sunday night. It stopped at Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines for refueling and then flew here.

The crash occurred after the takeoff about three miles from the end of the runway.

The plane had been scheduled to fly on to Travis Air Force Base, Calif., via Midway and Honolulu.

Commission Sets Agenda For Tuesday

First readings of ordinances to legalize the 1960-61 city budget of \$1,623,000, and the \$1.50 tax levy will be major items on the agenda for the meeting at 9 a.m. tomorrow of the City Commission in the commission room of City Hall.

Other items expected to be aired are the possibility of Pampa establishing Nov. 22 as the election date for residents to decide whether Pampa should enter into contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, and discussion of a possible ordinance which would prohibit the city from entering into pacts to extend water and sewer lines.

A. A. Meredith, executive secretary of the CRMWA, recently pointed out that if the city holds its election with the authority on the same date (Nov. 22) that the CRMWA holds its election with the federal government, it will save Pampa \$600 or more.

Laos Reports Commie Invasion

BANGKOK, Thailand (UPI) — Rival military factions in Laos announced today that the country had been invaded by Communists. One side called on the free world for help.

The Red threat increased the possibility that the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization would send aid to the tiny land-locked kingdom. A U.S. aircraft carrier and combat-ready Marines are on maneuvers in the South China Sea and presumably would be available in an emergency.

Tropical Blow Is In Bahamas

MIAMI (UPI) — Tropical storm Florence, moving on a path closely paralleling that of Hurricane Donna almost two weeks ago, was expected to increase its 55-miles-per-hour winds today and change to a more northwesterly course.

A 5 a. m. EST advisory from the Miami Weather Bureau placed the storm center near Great Inagua Island in the southeast Bahamas, about 565 miles southeast of Miami. It was moving on a westerly course which would take the center along and a short distance off the northeast coast of Cuba.

The location was given as latitude 21.3 north, longitude 73.0 west.

"The storm is expected to remain about the same size with possibly a slight increase in intensity within the next 24 hours," the weather advisory said.

Florence, the season's sixth tropical storm, was moving almost due west at about 11 MPH. Forecaster Arnold Sugg said the storm probably would increase in intensity and hook upward on a more west-northwesterly course sometime today.

Winds of 30 to 45 miles per hour fanned outward 175 miles in the north and east semicircles and a short distance to the southwest.

The advisory said persons living on the northeast coast of Cuba and in the southeastern Bahamas Islands should be ready for increasing winds and abnormally high tides early today. It said increasing winds and tides would advance into the central Bahamas and along the north and central Cuban coasts later today.

21 Violent Deaths In Texas Over Weekend

Traffic once again was the leading culprit, with 12 of the victims dying either in or as a result of automobile accidents. Five of the dead were shooting victims, one drowned, one died after a fall, one after taking sleeping tablets and one was hit by a railroad switch engine.

Mrs. Nannie Mildred Swendell, 72, and Mrs. Gertie Burke, both of Justin, Tex., were killed Saturday in an accident near Grapevine in North Texas.

Modesta Escalante, 35, and Matias L. Castillo, 30, both of Greenville, were killed Saturday when their car hit a bridge abutment on State Highway 34 near Farmersville.

Other traffic fatalities included Mrs. Emma Louise Hallstrom, 32, crushed to death by a trailer she was towing when she fell out of her car Saturday near Cornudas

in far West Texas; John A. Teague, 68, of Fort Worth, killed when his pickup truck collided with a loaded grain truck on U.S. 81 south of Fort Worth Saturday.

Edwin J. McWilliams, 62, of Angleton, killed when his car hit a concrete bridge rail on State Highway 6 near Arcadia; Alfred J. Degergh, 50, of Berlin, N. H., killed in El Paso in an auto-pedestrian accident; Joe Louis Flores, 6, of San Antonio, killed when hit by a car on a San Antonio street.

Mrs. Maria Diaz of San Benito was killed when hit by a car on a road near Brownsville; Jack Miller, 36, Houston, killed in a head-on collision near Navasota; Dennis Curtis, 15, Greenville, killed when his motor scooter collided with an auto in Greenville Sunday.

'K' Lands Today In U.S. Exudes Same Old 'C'

Small Dockside Crowd Hears Him Blast Ike

NEW YORK (UPI)—Premier Nikita Khrushchev arrived today in a drenching rainstorm for his "Red Summit" at the United Nations and received the most dismal and aloof reception of his globe-circling travels.

The Soviet leader took a jab at President Eisenhower as soon as he stepped onto American soil from the liner Baltika.

Khrushchev said he hoped Eisenhower would make more than a "fancy speech" at the U.N. assembly and said his own purpose was to spare no effort until "even the thick-skulled" realize the necessity of general disarmament.

Standing bare-headed beneath the leaky roof of a dingy pier in the East River after arrival with a band of satellite chieftains, Khrushchev said he came with the "very best feelings" from his U.S. visit last year and was confident that Russo-American relations would improve.

But there was not a representative of the city of New York, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller or President Eisenhower on hand to greet him.

Khrushchev arrived in a city tense with security preparations. Demonstrators Sunday night had almost overwhelmed police at the Soviet U.N. headquarters on Park Avenue where he will stay during the sessions of the General Assembly.

The Communist leaders of Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania also arrived on the Baltika. Waiting on the gloomy pier were the leaders of Communist Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Castro Mum—Will Say His Piece At U.N.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, greeted with alternating cheers and catcalls, relaxed in a heavily guarded hotel suite today and waited for his first face-to-face meeting with Communist boss Nikita Khrushchev.

Castro virtually isolated himself in his third-floor quarters at the midtown Shelburne Hotel, only a few blocks from the United Nations where the revolutionary leader speaks a week from today.

Wearing his usual military field uniform and smoking a black cigar, the bearded Castro arrived Sunday, the first of nearly a score of anti-American leaders due at the historic United Nations General Assembly meeting which opens Tuesday.

"I want to salute the people of the United States," Castro said in a hoarse voice at the airport. "All I have to say I will say to the United Nations."

His arrival at Idlewild Airport touched off a wild scramble among about 3,000 pro-Castro demonstra-

tors who cheered, tried to crawl over a fence and then created a huge traffic snarl when they tried to form a motorcade to follow their hero to his Manhattan hotel.

Along the route to the hotel, Castro was greeted by boos and catcalls as well as more cheers. One man shouted in the lobby: "You ought to drop dead, you bum." Castro ignored the taunts and went straight to his room.

At least two anti-Castro demonstrators were arrested by police. More than 200 officers were assigned around, within and on the roof of the hotel and adjoining buildings.

Castro's mixed reception was in marked contrast to his visit in April, 1959, when he received a rousing welcome from Cuba's New York colony of about 100,000 (See CASTRO, Page 3)

British Envoy Meets With Ike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Lord Home, British foreign secretary, said after meeting with President Eisenhower today that Soviet attempts to extend the cold war to Africa could lead to a "dangerous and explosive" world situation.

The foreign secretary said any attempt to promote ideological warfare in independent or would-be independent African states would be a "disaster" for the Africans and could lead to a Korea-type situation.

He made the comments after a 45-minute conference with the President on American-British strategy at the forthcoming United Nations General Assembly session.

Mobutu Forces Reinforced Interim Ruling To Be Named

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—Momentary panic hit Leopoldville today when 400 recruits arrived to join the forces of Congolese strongman Col. Joseph Mobutu and were mistaken for reinforcements for ousted pro-Soviet Premier Patrice Lumumba.

The recruits appeared off the waterfront in a barge. Dock workers left their jobs and fled through the streets. Panic heightened when a Congolese soldier fired a shot in the direction of the khaki-clad recruits.

But an hour later all was quiet. Loud-speakers announced that the new arrivals were unarmed men coming down river to join up with Mobutu's forces.

The bespectacled Mobutu shut himself in his Camp Leopold villa and refused to see reporters. Earlier, he moved to set up a "public safety committee" to run the Congo after foiling and attempt on his life by a supporter of Lumumba.

Moroccan troops and his own Congolese soldiers surrounded his residence in the military camp on the outskirts of the city as he told a newsmen by phone:

"I'm living on pills. I have not slept for about four days. I still have the situation completely under control. The troops are still obeying my orders."

Lumumba himself was reported to have spent the night in his own troop-guarded house. Reliable sources said he was still there this morning. A meeting he had scheduled for parliament to hear of his "common declaration of reconciliation" did not come off.

Lumumba showed up at his official residence Sunday, firing off communiques and saying he would deal with Mobutu, who seized power last week and announced he would "neutralize" all politicians until the end of the year.

Among other things, Lumumba announced his intention to recall the Soviet and Czech diplomats expelled by Mobutu.

In Brazzaville, across the Congo River in the Congo Republic, news agencies received photostatic copies of an "ultimatum" allegedly signed by Lumumba which said that "within less than a week, Russian troops will land in the Congo to chase the U.N. troops out of our country."

The "ultimatum" was dated Sept. 16, and said that "let it be understood I will not hesitate to appeal to the devil himself to save the country from the anarchy"

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"We'll probably draw up a platform that will be more conservative than the one passed at the national convention," said J. A. H. "But I don't think there will be any trouble on the platform."

A heavy schedule for Tuesday faces the Republicans. They are due to select 13 electoral college nominees, name state party officers including state chairman and state executive committee, and adopt a state platform.

An effort is expected to elect state chairman Bud Hutchinson of Houston to run for another year (See GOP, Page 4)

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) — Massive Afro-Asian support of Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold's peace efforts in the Congo confronted the Soviet Union with a major diplomatic setback today as Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev sailed into the East River.

It was considered possible Khrushchev might barge into the emergency session of the General Assembly before tonight to try to salvage some of the pieces.

With Cuban Premier Fidel Castro also in town, and likely to follow Khrushchev's lead, the United Nations could get its first display of summit fireworks even before the scheduled opening of the regular General Assembly Tuesday.

The Soviet campaign to present the Communist world as the best and only friend of the emerging African nations suffered a rebuff Sunday night when 16 African nations sponsored a draft resolution that in effect expressed confidence in Hammarskjold.

It called on all countries to refrain from providing military assistance of any type to the Congo except upon the request of the United Nations.

It also would set up a group of Asian and African representatives, to be appointed by the U.N. advisory committee on the Congo in consultation with the secretary general, to help the Congolese solve their problems.

The draft was similar to a resolution that Tunisia and Ceylon introduced in the Security Council and the Soviet Union vetoed.

Kart enthusiasts of Pampa were cautioned today by city police to stay within the laws and regulations governing such vehicles. Capt. Denny Ruan said that the department has received numerous complaints about the riding of karts on sidewalks, streets, and especially about the noise created by their engines. These vehicles must be licensed just the same as other motorized vehicles, and drivers must be licensed if they are used on the streets, Capt. Ruan said. He also pointed to the clamor created by the engines, saying, "A majority of the complaints have been brought about by the noisy engines."

speak in a loud voice to be heard. He seemed impatient for his companions to get their own speeches finished. Each took only about three minutes.

The convoy of automobiles carrying Khrushchev and his party to their headquarters traveled at normal speed with no sirens. They attracted little attention.

The Park Avenue mission traffic had been detoured. When Khrushchev arrived he was completely hidden behind a phalanx of security agents. There was no picketing or crowd in the rain.

The only American of any prominence present was Mrs. Cyrus Eaton, wife of the Cleveland industrialist who won the Lenin peace prize last year.

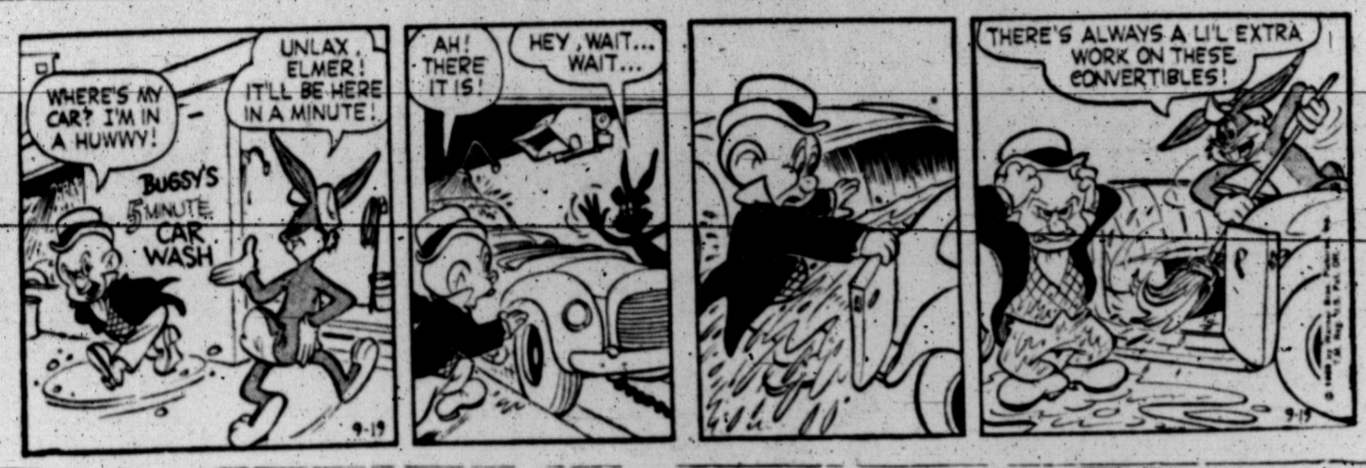

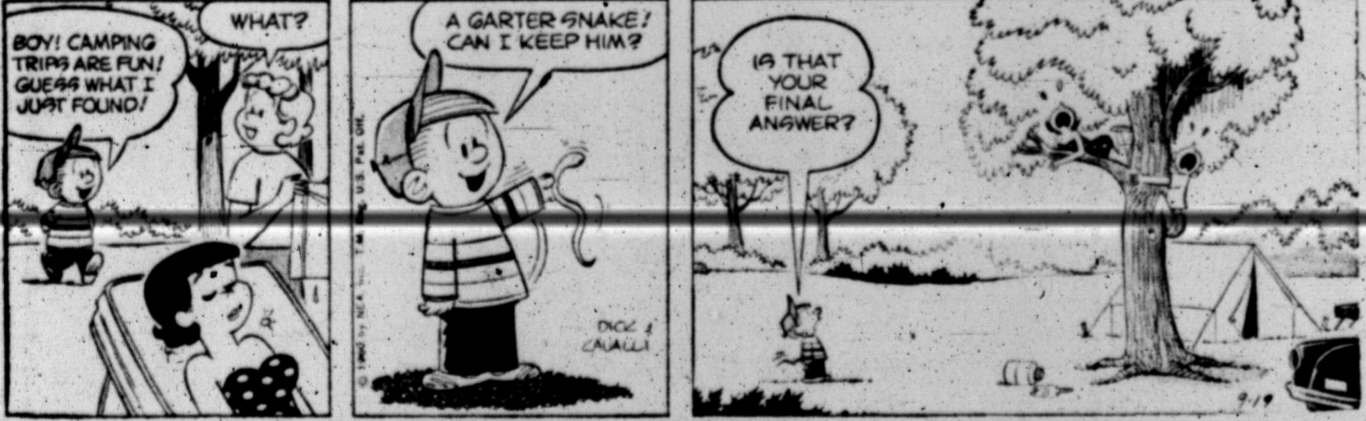

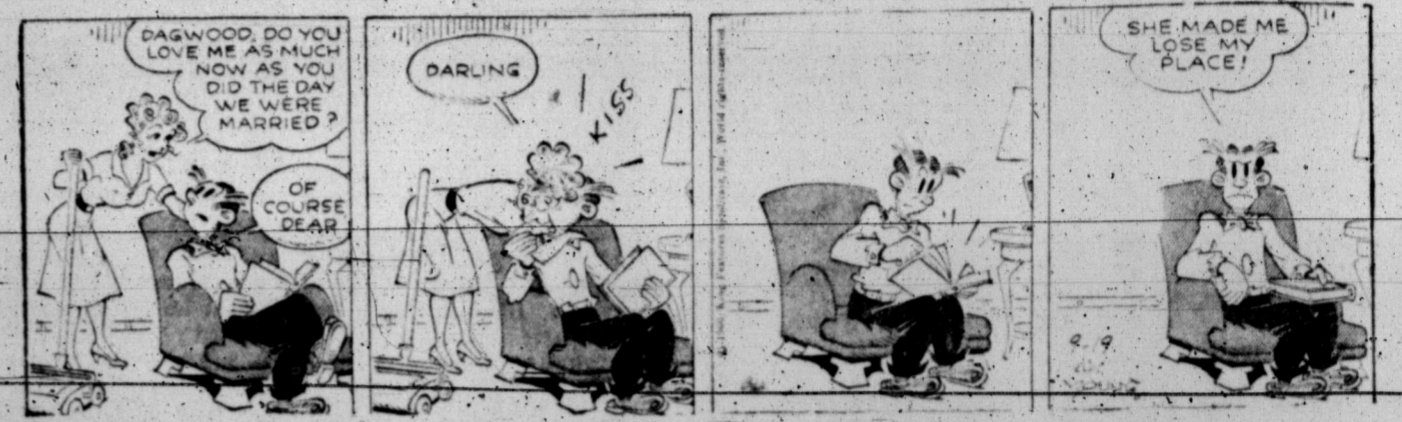

Sports Slivers

This is the week of the great debate: did Billy Cooper score against Ysleta last Friday night in the game at Harvester Stadium or not?

Some say "Yea," and some say "Nay." But it remains a solid fact that the referee said Coop's knee touched the ground less than six inches from the goal, killing the chance the Harvesters had of tying the score, going ahead by a point, or being one marker shy of the Indians seven-point lead.

There is quite a bit of bitterness on this. Harvester fans, to be frank, feel that they received a raw deal. They point to several questionable calls in the Ysleta game (both way, mind you) and in the first game with Big Spring, and are beginning to wonder if the Texas High School Athletic Association isn't a bit laggard in its selection of officials.

In the first game we felt the officiating was wanting. We said so. In the game with Ysleta we feel it was the same.

It's true that an official must make a ruling. He must make it stick, if his decision is within the bounds of the rule book. But, and this is a major point, he should be consistent.

If he and his working partners are going to work strictly by the book, they should do it throughout a game, not just in spurts.

And that's what irked us more than anything else: the questionable call, a play that our Jim Lacy, the managing editor, snapped clearly showing Cooper in the end zone, but still not clearly the referee's ruling that Billy's knee had touched.

Thus, that one call hangs fire. The referee's ruling stands, and the fans clamor for his noggin.

We cannot question his decision. We thought, as did everyone in the press box, that Billy had scored. However, we were, well up the playing field from the happening, so we cannot be positive. But we are positive of one thing: the officials were not consistent!

Sherrill Miller, the always trying left halfback of the Harvesters, was stopped cold earlier in the series of plays that brought about the Cooper episode on the Ysleta 34-yard line, near the sidelines on the Harvester side of the field. But Sherrill crawled forward to the Ysleta 20 and that was where the referee put the ball in play!

We take nothing from Sherrill for his aggressiveness: more power to him in fact. But we must challenge the alertness of the referee who was standing "on top" of the play and who didn't either return the ball to the Ysleta 20 or assess a penalty against the Harvesters for Miller's four yard crawl.

The whistle had not blown, we'll admit that. But if a fellow's knee touches the ground a few inches from the goal line and you whistle the ball dead at that point, how come you can't do the same thing in an incident calling for the same decision, the same swift action, when the ball is up field?

The Harvesters did not protest to the officials, and we're proud of them for their restraint. But it's a good thing those fellows weren't working a college or pro game, or they may have needed an escort to leave the field in safety.

Understand, we realize that everyone is susceptible to mistakes; we all make them, time and again. But putting men who are supposed to be competent, consistent on the field to handle a

high school game and watching them commit numerous errors, is well, for the lack of words, unbearable.

Coaches of the Harvester eleven had no comment on the officiating other than to say, in summation, "He called the play. His decision stands."

And so it does.

If you want to know how Gen. Bob Neyland operated when he coached Tennessee so successfully for the many years, he labored at the Knoxville institution, have a look at the Texas Tech and Texas A&M conflict at College Station Saturday night.

Both head coaches schooled under Gen. Bob, Jim Myers (1947) and DeWitt Weaver (1937), as did Beattie Feathers (1934) and an All-America back in his senior year) an aide to Weaver at Tech.

Other Southeastern grads involved in this one are Matt Lair, (Kentucky 1948) an A&M Assistant; J. T. King, who once coached at Tulane, and Tom Hamm, also on the Tech staff, who put in a year at Miss. State before transferring to Tulsa.

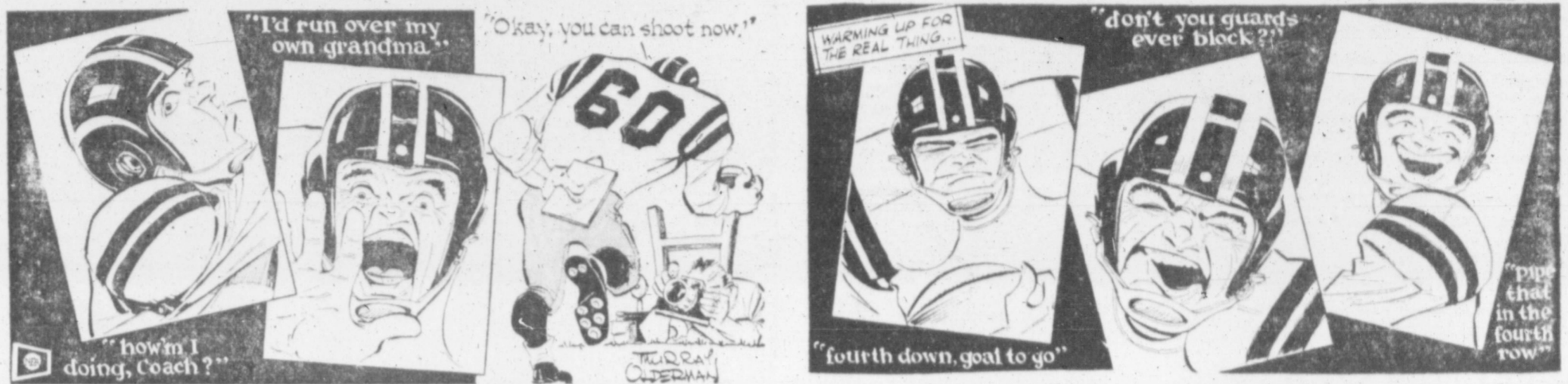

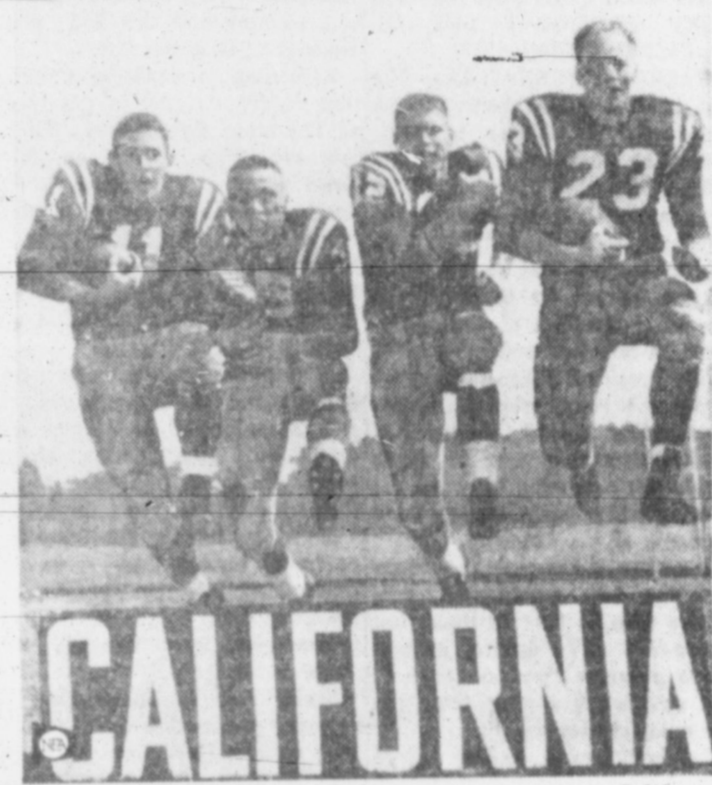

The magic numbers which will produce the first New York-Pittsburgh World Series in 33 years were reduced today to seven for the Yankees and six for the Pirates.

In other words, it will be all over in the American League if the Yankees win seven of their remaining 11 games and the race will end in the National League if the Pirates win six of their last 11.

The countdown which will wipe out the last mathematical hopes of the Baltimore Orioles, Chicago White Sox, St. Louis Cardinals and Milwaukee Braves began in earnest Sunday when the Yankees and Pirates swept doubleheaders.

The Yankees whipped the Orioles, 7-3 and 2-0, to complete a crushing four-game sweep of the vital head-to-head series while the Pirates beat the Cincinnati Reds, 5-3 and 1-0, with Vern Law winning his 20th game.

As a result, the Yankees opened up a four-game AL lead over both the Orioles and White Sox and the Pirates zoomed six games ahead of the Cardinals and 6 1/2 ahead of the Braves.

The White Sox won their opener, 8-4, but then suffered a jolting 7-0 loss that left them five games behind the Yankees in the loss column. The Cleveland Indians beat the Kansas City Athletics, 9-2, after a 3-2 loss and the Boston Red Sox defeated the Washington Senators, 3-1, in other AL games.

The Cardinals edged the San Francisco Giants, 4-3, the Braves whipped the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-1, and the Chicago Cubs beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 5-2, in other NL action.

A crowd of 53,876 at Yankee Stadium saw the Yankees win the big ones as they have done so often over the years. Tony Kubek's homer and a two-run double by Yogi Berra were the big blows of

the opener in which Art Ditmar received credit for his 15th victory. Ralph Terry pitched a no-hitter for seven innings and wound up with a two-hitter in the second game with Kubek and Berra driving in the Yankees' runs with sacrifice flies.
